

## OREGON RECREATIONAL BOATING ACCIDENT STATISTICS - 1997

The following statistics were taken from boating accident reports received by the State Marine Board for 1997. Accidents involving death, injury, or property damage exceeding \$500 must be reported.

## Comments on the year...

There were 123 reported recreational boating accidents in 1997. These accidents resulted in 19 fatalities, more than double the total in 1996 and the highest since 1993.

Fourteen of the nineteen fatalities involved capsizing or a fall overboard. In almost any given year, these two accident types will account for a majority of fatalities.

Although there were no fatalities in 1997 involving personal watercraft (PWC), PWC accidents rose to an all time high of 34, as the craft continued to grow in popularity.

Of the 19 total fatalities, only 3 victims were wearing their life jackets. Ten of the victims who were not wearing life jackets had them on board the boat.

Eight of nineteen fatalities involved non-motorized vessels. Five of the eight involved canoes and one a kayak. Both of these small craft overturn easily, so it is very important to wear a life jacket while in these types of vessels. Four of the victims in the canoe and kayak accidents were not wearing their life jackets, and 3 of these 4 were not carrying them on board at the time of the accident.

Fourteen of the victims were tested for alcohol. Of these, 8 tested negative, 2 tested positive but well below the legal limit of .08, and four tested above the legal limit.
