

OREGON RECREATIONAL BOATING ACCIDENT STATISTICS — 2009

The following statistics were taken from boating accident reports received by the State Marine Board for 2009. Accidents involving death, injury, or property damage exceeding \$2,000 must be reported.

Comments on the year.....

In 2009, 13 people died in recreational boating accidents in Oregon.

Three of the 13 victims were wearing their life jackets. It is reasonable to assume that had the other victims worn their life jackets most would have survived their accidents.

Nine of the 13 victims were in open motor boats, the other 4 were in non-powered craft. On average, 35% of our fatalities are in non-motorized boats.

Also something to note is that 7 of 11 operators were over the age of 50, which is unusual.

And as usual the number one type of accident for this year (aside from the unknown) was *Capsizing*, followed by *Collision with Fixed Object*.
