

# OREGON RECREATIONAL BOATING ACCIDENT STATISTICS – 1990

The following statistics were extracted from boating accident reports received by the Oregon State Marine Board for 1990 calendar year.

## Comments on the year...

1990 was the safest year ever recorded by the Marine Board. While, unfortunately, seven people died in Oregon boating accidents last year, this is fewer than half the previous low of 15, recorded in 1966. It should be noted that in 1966 there were fewer than 70,000 registered boats. By comparison, there are now over 173,000.

It is encouraging that the record low number of fatalities occurred in a year when we had the greatest increase in boat registration in over a decade. This continues a trend of fewer deaths despite increased boating activity.

Oregon's fatality rate for 1990 plummeted to .35 deaths per 10,000 registered boats, also a record low. Fourteen years ago, Oregon's boating fatality rate was 3.54, ten times higher than 1990's rate.

This is the first time in almost 20 years that Oregon's fatality rate was lower than the national rate.

The reduction in boating accident fatalities can be attributed in large part to an increased effort in boating safety education and law enforcement.

Another first is the fact that in 1990 there were no oceans or whitewater recreational boating fatalities.

Personal Watercraft accidents fell off slightly in 1990. There were eight accidents involving personal watercraft, down from ten in 1989. In May of 1990, the Board set rules regulating personal watercraft operation.
