The Workers' Compensation Division received notification of 20,461 accepted disabling claims in 2016. Employment increased by 59,000 workers, resulting in a 2016 claims rate of 1.0 claims per 100 workers.



In 2016, there were 75 years separating the oldest and youngest workers. The youngest was a 14-year-old farm worker who fractured his wrist after falling from a horse. The oldest were two 89-year-olds, a car rental worker who suffered a head injury from a fall, and a clergy person who fell and injured his shoulder.


There were 4,060 accepted disabling claims for falls in 2016. Approximately 72 percent resulted in either sprains, strains, or tears (2,039) or fractures (874).


Bodily condition and motion incidents are cases in which workers themselves are the primary source of injury or illness, such as a worker twisting his or her back when reaching for something. These events most commonly result in sprains or strains (approximately 65 percent).

INJURY/DISEASE FACTS, OREGON, 2016

- Occupational diseases comprised 5.2 percent of the accepted disabling claims.
- Workers in their first year with an employer filed 6,378 claims, 31.2 percent of the total accepted disabling claims in 2016, compared to 2,101 (10.3 percent) for those in their second year.
- Of the total 20,461 accepted disabling claims, 99 were for workers younger than age 18, and 717 were for workers age 65 or older. The average age of claimants in 2016 was 42.
- Of the total 20,461 claims, 1.9 percent (384) occurred out of state.
- Most of the claims were for male workers, accounting for 13,006 (63.6 percent) of the total, compared to 7,455 for females.
- The average weekly wage at time of injury for all claimants was \$727.05. The average weekly wage for all Oregon workers, excluding federal employees, was \$963.01.
- Private industry accounted for 17,922 of the accepted disabling claims (87.6 percent).
- Transportation and material movers are the most commonly injured worker occupation, comprising nearly 18 percent of all accepted disabling claims in 2016.
