Older Problem Gamblers May Face Greater Suicide Risk Than Younger Counterparts, Study Finds.

Compared to their younger counterparts, older problem gamblers who ask casinos to bar them from returning are three to four times more likely to do so because they fear they will kill themselves if they don't stop betting, according to a new study



Key Point from the study:

- Older adults (>age 55) gambled an average of 17 years before "self-exclusion", twice the length of time reported by other groups.
- Nearly 14% of older adults sought help because they wanted to prevent themselves from committing suicide.
- Older adults are more likely to prefer non-strategic games, such as slots, VLT and lottery tickets.
- Older adults began gambling as a later age than other groups.
- Older adults are less likely to receive mental health treatment.
