**Overview:** The Oregon Drug Evaluation & Classification Program has received national acclaim for its success in identifying the drug-impaired driver. Officers trained as Drug Recognition Experts (DREs) are frequently called upon to differentiate between drug influence and medical and/or mental disorders. The certified DRE is a critical tool in combating the adverse impact of drug and alcohol impaired driving in our communities.

DRE School is extremely demanding. To receive certification as a DRE, three phases of training must be completed. The following summarizes each phase:

**ACADEMIC TRAINING (Phase I & II):** This phase is conducted over nine days (72 hours). It includes courses in physiology, vital signs, standardized field sobriety testing (SFST), and extensive material on each of the seven categories of the drugs of abuse. The training includes three written examinations, an SFST proficiency examination and five written quizzes. Students must achieve a minimum of 80% on each examination, and must demonstrate proficiency in administering SFSTs.

**CERTIFICATION PHASE (Phase III):** After successfully completing the academic portion, the students must complete the certification phase. Certification Training is tentatively scheduled within May 16th-27th in Portland, OR. The class will be split in half and each group will be required to attend a five day training week, within these dates. This is an additional five days of training after phase 1 & 2. At this time, the above certification dates are the only dates available in Oregon for 2017. With the recommendation of the DRE State Coordinator, out of state certification training is an option, but will be at the expense of the student's agency. It is the student's responsibility to attend and complete the certification requirements within six months following DRE School. The requirements include: conducting a minimum of 12 drug influence evaluations while under the supervision of a DRE instructor; identifying subjects under the influence, and attaining a 80% toxicological confirmation rate. Written reports will be submitted to the DRE instructor observing the evaluation for review and approval. In addition, the student must maintain an accurate progress certification log, DRE rolling log and submit a curriculum vitae. Lastly, the student must pass a comprehensive final knowledge examination, and obtain the written endorsement from two certified DRE instructors and the DRE State Coordinator before obtaining certification and IACP credentials.

The International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) and the Oregon DECP Policies and Procedures are the regulating body for Oregon's DRE Program. Certification and credentials are valid for two years. In order to maintain certification, DRE's must conduct a minimum of four evaluations (one

It involves listening to the subject in order to identify recurring themes in their life from which we will discern hooks, triggers, and ultimately our overall strategy. It focuses the negotiation, making every contact more efficient and prevents a random loop of ALS that goes nowhere. It allows CNT to shift from initial use of ALS to maintaining power and control in order to influence.

Biography for Constable Cinda Michael: Cinda is a 27 year veteran of the Vancouver Police Department. She has served in a variety of operational roles including Patrol, Narcotics and Mounted Squads. She has been a negotiator for 16 years and has responded to over 250 critical incidents. TCCC launched a total reassessment of practices with one common goal: Decrease Preventable Combat Death at the point of wounding. These new strategies based on historical wounding patterns in combat also bear a particular relevance to the operators of Tactical Law Enforcement who share many operational parallels with their military counterparts.

Instead of the civilian-based approaches of the past, integrated strategies specific to combat realities continue to emerge. Compared to standard pre-hospital treatment modalities, which are fundamentally based on blunt trauma, TCCC distinguishes itself from the norm by focusing primarily on the intrinsic tactical variables of penetrating trauma compounded by prolonged evacuation times.

Today, TCCC has become the standard of care for the tactical management of combat casualties within the Department of Defense and is the sole standard of care dually endorsed by both the American College of Surgeons and the National Association of EMT's for casualty management in tactical environments.

TCCC is built around three definitive phases of casualty care:

Care Under Fire:

Care rendered at the scene of the injury while both the medic and the casualty are under hostile fire. Available medical equipment is limited to that carried by each operator and the medic.

Tactical Field Care:

Care rendered once the casualty is no longer under effective hostile fire. Medical equipment is still limited to that carried into the field by mission personnel. Time prior to evacuation may range from a few minutes to many hours.

Because emergency calltakers must focus, first and foremost on the safety of citizens and first responders, they often have limited time in which to establish a communication mode that minimizes the risk of violence. Furthermore, if they are not able to calm down the caller, vital information may be missed or misinterpreted. Agitated individuals can often be directed away from chaos by specific communication skills. Successful verbal de-escalation also sets a precedent with emotionally disturbed people who are likely to frequently call 911. At the next call, they are more likely to have an expectation that they will be talked down.
