Set requirements for renewing an expired limited permit and applying for temporary license following graduation.

Rulemaking by the Board of Medical Imaging to set requirements for renewing an expired limited permit and for those applying for a temporary license following graduation.

Need for the Rule(s):

The Board believes the public health is protected by requiring those with periods of expired or inactive licensure extending over 24 consecutive months to demonstrate competency by completing educational requirements and passing the ARRT examination.

The Board believes the public health is protected by requiring graduates to obtain a temporary license within a specific period of time (no more than 24 months) following completion of school programs.

Fiscal and Economic Impact:

Fiscal impact anticipated to be minimal. The Board already oversees and manages limited permit authorizations and temporary license applications; these rule changes place no additional duties upon the agency.

Statement of Cost of Compliance:

1. Impact on state agencies, units of local government and the public (ORS 183.335(2)(b)(E)):

No impact anticipated for any units of government. Limited permit holders who allow their permits to lapse for more than 24 months will be required to re-take the examination, which includes an examination fee. Limited permit holders who cannot pass the exam would need to return to school for those areas in which they did not pass the exam. This rule may only impact a very small number of limited permit holders; it is not possible to estimate how many.

2. Cost of compliance effect on small business (ORS 183.336):

a. Estimate the number of small business and types of businesses and industries with small businesses subject to the rule:

None.

b. Projected reporting, recordkeeping and other administrative activities required for compliance, including costs of professional services:

The agency already handles these applications and any additional administrative activities would be minimal and would be handled within the normal job functions within the office, using existing resources.

c. Equipment, supplies, labor and increased administration required for compliance:

None.

How were small businesses involved in the development of this rule?

Small businesses were not involved in development of this rule because this rule does not impact small businesses; it only impacts a very small subset of limited permit holders and graduates of imaging schools who wait for more than two years to submit paperwork to renew permits or obtain a temporary license.

Administrative Rule Advisory Committee consulted?:No

If not, why?:

This proposed rulemaking establishes deadlines within existing regulatory functions and is expected to have a minimal impact upon the public and upon the agency. Because the impact is expected to be minimal, the agency believes that an advisory committee is unnecessary.
