**PROCLAMATION**  
OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR

- WHEREAS:** Oregon has regularly dealt with the presence of unwanted noxious weeds that are not native to the state and that by their invasive nature pose a genuine danger to the well-being of the state; and
- WHEREAS:** Oregon farmers, commercial greenhouse and nursery owners, ranchers, recreational groups, government, and industry clearly acknowledge the economic and environmental dangers posed to their continued economic and social well-being by the presence of invasive weeds; and
- WHEREAS:** Oregon farmers, ranchers, government, private sector entities, state agencies, and conservation groups unanimously support implementation of integrated weed management; and
- WHEREAS:** Weed Awareness Week is recognized nationally during the last week in February; and
- WHEREAS:** The economic impact of just 21 weeds in Oregon has been estimated to reduce Oregonian's personal income by \$83 million per year, which is equivalent to 3,329 jobs lost to Oregon's economy; and
- WHEREAS:** The potential impacts of continued spread of just six noxious weeds could reduce Oregonian's personal income by an additional \$54 million and result in the loss of another 2,143 jobs; and
- WHEREAS:** The Oregon Invasive Species Council, along with the Oregon State Noxious Weed Board, is implementing a public awareness campaign to help educate Oregon citizens about the economic and environmental impacts of invasive weeds and other invasive species.

**THEREFORE:** I, John A. Kitzhaber, M.D., Governor of the State of Oregon, hereby proclaim **May 15-21, 2011** to be

in Oregon and encourage all Oregonians to join in this observance.
