I-5 Santiam Highway Over-Crossing

Project location

- This project is located on I-5 Pacific Hwy at the Santiam Hwy (US20) overpass, MP 233.33 - 233.43 in Albany.

Project purpose and need

- This project will provide for increased vertical clearance under the overpass structure by lowering the grade of I-5 Northbound. Increasing the vertical clearance will provide better passage for tall commercial vehicles and Interstate trucking.

Construction overview

- Project will reconstruct approx. 2200' of I-5 in order to lower the elevation of I-5 Northbound.
- The elevation (grade) of the off-ramp will also be lowered for trucks exiting onto the Santiam Hwy (Hwy 016).
- A temporary diversion lane(s) will be constructed in the existing median to allow through traffic during construction. It is likely that there will be a significant amount of night work to avoid heavy daytime traffic volumes.
- Depending on temporary diversion width, over-height and width restrictions may apply.

Cost and contractor information

- Contract Awarded to Knife River Inc
- \$1.66 million
- Funding source is Federal Bridge Funds.
