Public Comment

Members of the general public who were present did not offer comment.

Meeting Summary (Committee actions or decisions in bold)

Meeting convened at 9:10am by Dr. Moorhead.

Minutes from the March 31st meeting were approved.

Sean Kolmer gave an update on activities of the Health Policy Board and its various committees. At its last meeting in Bend, the Board expressed that it is not interested in re-doing federal reform and that the federal concentration on coverage issues leaves the state more room to work on delivery system reform and population health. States will still have heavy lifting to do around cost containment. Board committees, such as Workforce, should weigh in on the important barriers and opportunities in federal reform.

Lisa Angus announced that a joint meeting of Chairs and staff from all the Health Policy Board committees, as well as relevant OHA advisory bodies like the Health Information Technology Oversight Council (HITOC) and the Safety Net Advisory Committee (SNAC) would take place on May 4. It would be the first in an occasional series of meetings to help ensure that all the Committee work is well coordinated.

The committee turned its attention to a list of draft strategic recommendations developed based on discussion at the February and March meetings. In starting the discussion, Dr. Moorhead noted that the objective was to get through the long list of recommendations (all of which were good and many of which were probably familiar to committee members) and come up with a very small number of strategic objectives for the Committee's initial work; objectives that were reasonable, practical and where the Committee could make a meaningful and satisfying change.

A comprehensive discussion followed. Specific suggestions as to the recommendations will be incorporated into a revised version of the strategic recommendations document to be distributed at the May committee meeting. Key points from the general discussion included:

- While the list of draft recommendations is very long, it should be kept so as not to lose the whole picture and the chance to coordinate workforce policy longitudinally. The Committee should, however, identify immediate, mid-term, and long-term priorities.
- There are many groups in Oregon already taking leadership roles on the issues identified. The Committee should look to see which issues do not already have leadership, or where policy action is needed or connections between constituencies need to be made and concentrate its work on those issues.
- With its statewide focus and broad membership, the Committee has a macro-level viewpoint. Using its strategic plan as a framework, the Committee can solicit more detailed information from groups already piloting innovative workforce strategies and can help these groups address policy or other barriers that are preventing them from moving innovations from beta-testing stage to business as usual.
- When identifying its own short-term priorities, the Committee needs to consider both the state's budget situation and the time that Committee members are willing and able to spend on moving work forward between meetings.

- The primary need is to get trained and talented people in the field. The Committee should keep that goal in mind and attempt to identify strategies that will produce outcomes quickly.

The Committee briefly discussed some of the workforce-related funding opportunities in the federal health reform law and ways in which the Committee might play a lead or collaborative role. Suggestions included:

- Keeping track of who applies for and/or is awarded grants, so that the Committee can ask them a few questions about what they are trying to achieve and what kind of results they are seeing;
- Having the committee provide space and/or the opportunity for collaboration or coordination on the funding opportunities, so that there isn't unnecessary competition within the state;
- Having the Committee identify 3 or 4 particular grants that it thinks would be good opportunities for collaboration (safe opportunities to bring various constituencies together) and for funding.

Jo Isgrigg gave a brief progress report on the inventory of workforce resources due to the Health Policy Board in May. Requests for information were sent to about 120 entities and the initial response rate was about 25%; OHWI is doing and phone and email follow-up. The inventory will also include a listing of health professions programs at Oregon educational institutions; a list of health career preparation programs in Oregon high schools, and the list of funding opportunities contained in the federal health reform law.

The Committee also discussed how to handle requests for review, input, or endorsement from other groups or organizations. **Committee members asked staff to develop a short draft protocol for their consideration at the next meeting.**

Dr. Moorhead adjourned the meeting at 12 noon.

The Oregon Healthcare Workforce Committee encourages collaborative partnerships between education, industry, state agencies, and other groups to identify and address healthcare workforce issues. In support of such collaboration, the Committee may review and provide feedback on Oregon healthcare workforce policies or initiatives and take them into consideration for its own planning. More rarely, the Committee may elect to endorse or officially support policies or projects that are directly aligned with its strategic objectives and mutually beneficial to the Committee and the requesting body.

Process

1. Requests for review, feedback, endorsement, and/or letters of support should come first to Committee staff: Lisa Angus, lisa.angus@state.or.us 503-373-1632 or Jo Isgrigg, jo@oregonhwi.org or 503-479-6002.
 - o When making a request of the Committee, please be specific about the nature of the request (FYI review only? Input and feedback desired? Letter of support?) and the timeframe for response. Requests should be made as far in advance as possible.
 - o Material to be reviewed should be concise and provided in electronic format.
2. In consultation with Committee chairs, staff will ask for interested volunteers from the Committee to review the material. This may be done verbally at a Committee meeting or via email.
3. After reviewing, volunteers will:
 - o Let Committee Chairs and staff know if the matter should be given discussion time on a future meeting agenda and if the organization or person requesting review should be asked to attend the meeting. (Note: If formal Committee action or support is requested, the matter must be part of a future meeting agenda.)
 - o Provide their fellow Committee members with a very brief summary of the material reviewed and their recommendation(s) for feedback. This may be done verbally at a Committee meeting or via email in advance of a meeting.

The Committee's general policy is to conduct business by discussion and consensus. In cases where action is taken by vote, the approval of the majority of Committee members is required in keeping with the Committee's by-laws.

4. Committee staff will relay feedback or the results of any Committee action to the organization or person requesting review.
5. If time-sensitive requests are received, staff will consult with the Chairs to determine whether it would be appropriate for the Chairs or a small volunteer group of Committee members to provide feedback as individual members rather than Committee representatives. Any recommendations made in this manner will be reviewed at the next Committee meeting.

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**COMPILATION OF GRANTS, INVESTMENTS AND OTHER RESOURCES
TO BUILD OREGON'S HEALTH CARE WORKFORCE
MAY 2010**

Established by House Bill 2009, Section 7 (3)(a), the Health Care Workforce Committee is chartered to coordinate efforts in Oregon to educate and recruit health care professionals and retain a quality workforce to meet the demand created by the expansion in health care coverage, system transformation and an increasingly diverse population.

In that role, the Health Care Workforce Committee conducted a statewide inventory of current public and private grants and resources available to expand the health care workforce to meet the needs of Oregonians for health care. Combined with information on school programs and federal reform funding, this compilation of grants and resources will be used to inform recommendations to the Oregon Health Policy Board for investments in Oregon's health care workforce.

The compilation file of grants and resources is provided in an Excel spreadsheet format and contains tabs with the following documents:

1. ***Inventory of Current Grants and Investments in Oregon's Health Care Workforce, May 2010.*** Provided in a sort-able spreadsheet format, this inventory identifies current executed grants, investments and other resources to build Oregon's health care workforce.

The request for the inventory information was sent in April 2010 to a total of 118 stakeholders in the following categories: educational institutions (44), provider organizations (38), associations (4), foundations (11) and workforce organizations (21). Government entities are represented in educational institutions and workforce organizations. Follow-up contacts were made over a one-month period to increase the response rate. Forty-two percent of the stakeholders responded. Four organizations responded that they had no information for the inventory. A list of responders who supplied information for this inventory follows.

2. ***Oregon Public High Schools with Health Science Career Programs.*** This spreadsheet lists information from the Oregon Department of Education on Oregon's 56 public high schools with health occupations career training programs operating in the 2009-2010 school year.
3. ***Oregon Post-Secondary Institutions with Graduates from Clinical Health Profession Programs – 2008-2009 School Year.*** This spreadsheet, formatted to print on one 11x17 paper, lists the public and private post-secondary clinical health profession education programs in Oregon that graduated students during the 2008-2009 school year.
4. ***Non-Oregon Based Schools with Health Care-Related External Placements in Oregon Approved by the Oregon Office of Degree Authorization.*** This spreadsheet lists non-Oregon post-secondary schools with external placements in Oregon that have been approved by the Oregon Office of Degree Authorization as of April 13, 2010.
5. ***Federal Reform-Related Funding for the Health Care Workforce, May 2010.*** This spreadsheet lists the appropriated and authorized health care workforce development funding opportunities included in the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act.

To date, OHPR has received 2009 data from the Oregon Medical Board (MDs, DOs, and PAs), the Oregon Board of Nursing (NPs, RNs, and CRNAs), and the Board of Examiners of Licensed Dietitians. The Boards of Pharmacy, Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, and Dentistry will submit 2010 data at various points in the year in accordance with their licensing renewal periods; see the schedule below. However, boards with split 2-year licensing periods will only submit data for half their licensees in any given year.
