The workshop explores the range of options in tobacco freedom cessation supports, from various nicotine replacement therapies (NRT) and treatment interventions to peer-to-peer support. It stresses the importance of working with a person’s own motivation and worldview in their healing process.</p>
<i>Oregon Room</i>	<p><b>Level of Care Utilization System (LOCUS<sup>®</sup>)</b>                      Chad Scott, AMH Community Outreach Specialist</p> <p>The Level of Care Utilization System for Psychiatric and Addiction Services is a clinical tool developed by the American Association of Community Psychiatrists. The LOCUS<sup>®</sup> instrument is designed to independently determine level of care recommendations based on information gathered by the professional while performing a clinical assessment. This 90-minute session will instruct participants in using the LOCUS<sup>®</sup> tool to effectively and accurately provide a level of care determination for individuals in residential, outpatient and hospital settings.</p>
