ISA Progress Review	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Reviewed document: <i>Integrated Service Array Progress Review Data Analysis</i>. A more extensive report will be mailed out Jan 28 or 31. • Integrated Service Array (ISA) Progress Review is administered when children begin ISA services and one year following. Report reflects initial reviews only. • ISA covers children ages 6-18. Rate of entry into ISA declines rapidly beginning at age 16. This could be a suggested topic for a future meeting to discuss how help can be provided and services can be made more appealing to this age group. • Approximately 70 children who completed ISA Review were 16 years of age, approximately 30 were 17 and approximately 5 were 18, totaling about 10% of the total population surveyed. • Children not enrolled in Mental Health Organization (MHO) and children with private insurance were not reflected in the report. • Question: Does data stating Primary Care Givers were present at 84% of the admission meetings include the child 		Kathleen Burns

Yes.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Data reporting problem: Progress review does not specify male or female and is determined by matching existing data in the system. • Primary Physical Care Providers frequently don't bill the MH diagnosis because reimbursement is denied which leads to under represented data.
