	<p>delivered by Dan Embree in early December.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Challenges: • When to transfer and move children out of the county as opposed to keeping them in the project and providing care coordination “from a distance”. • The lack of resources induced by the DHS hiring freeze has made it hard to connect with both caseworkers and supervisors in CAF. • Use of Wraparound more as an early intervention strategy than a last resort. Looking into research on how plans of care are written around addressing the needs of children who are not on the extreme end of the continuum in terms of needs, and how to best help them. One idea is to review the SCWI Progress Review data to assess readiness to transition out of the project. • Portland State University is very aware of the barriers. They are addressing this by looking at alternative ways of providing trainings. • Caseworkers do not feel this program will be beneficial for the amount of work required. The supervisor came to the caseworkers and suggested they try Wraparound for three months. • Rogue Valley Accomplishments: • Shared written feedback from a principal at a school. Great feedback. • Site finished the memorandum of understanding with stakeholders. 	<p>Matt Pearl</p>		
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	<ul style="list-style-type: none">•Site is brainstorming gaps in the service delivery system.Challenges:•Leadership council has not been meeting frequently.•A SCWIAC member shared a story about agencies coming together for one child to provide the child with individualized services.•Family partners need to be the ones doing the initial engaging.•A question was asked if there is a brochure discussing the family benefits? Answer, No•The Rogue Valley has been self empowered and self motivating. They are working on having a family member co-facilitate trainings.•What was developed about the flexible funding? Bus tickets or gas cards for folks who cannot get to treatment meetings. Gym membership. Minimizing medications. Books for parents to educate on mental illness. Living for transitional age youth.•Clinical supervision.•Is there a way to assist the leadership committee to be more active? It is a calendar problem but the work has not suffered.•We need to have all levels of the system functioning or it doesn't work. That is why we are looking at all systems.•Shared story about child in multiple placements in five or six years. Now he has been in a six month placement and this has

He is no longer in residential treatment.</p> <p>Other comments:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> •Child Welfare has increased the foster care rates as a result of a rate redesign initiative. •Blending funds so they can provide creative services. •Do any of the three sites use the parent peer in the initial outreach? Yes. However, when they go out into the field, a Wraparound facilitator accompanies them.
