The site is working closely with Portland State University (PSU) to schedule and facilitate the training for Wraparound 101. Third - site has made good progress in developing project policy and procedures that will require approval by DHS.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Challenges: one challenge is achieving a shared understanding and agreement about how additional funding will be used. Secondly, achieving a shared understanding about the various roles family members and youth can play and how to fund the support for their involvement is another challenge. ○ A questions was asked, how many family partners are being hired? Answer: unknown at this time. ○ Martin Rafferty will send out a document that can assist Young Adults in Transition to better understand the Wraparound process. ○ <u>Mid Valley Behavioral Care Network (MVBCN)</u>: The review committee has been meeting weekly, reviewing 128 	<p>Martin</p>

Their cohort target is 140.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ The past month a sub-committee to look at rapid access for children in Wraparound has been developed. This committee has a wide representation of foster parents, youth, parents, CW, BRS providers. ○ A focus group for foster parents has been developed. This focus group will discuss what kind of supports foster parents and the children need. ○ MVBCN is requiring Oregon Family Support Network (OFSN) staff to co-train with the PSU Workforce development trainings. ○ Challenges: Workforce development- There is a lag in the implementation with all community partners not knowing what the mission and the values are of the MVBC site. ○ Tillamook county- only one child picked for Wraparound. It was suggested that the children in Tillamook get connected with Community Care Network (CCN). A suggestion for the Oregon Center for Children and Youth with Special Health Needs (OCCYSHN) www.ohsu.edu/cdrc/oscsn/ would be a place that more information could be found. ○ Another challenge is the culture of foster 	<p>Judy Rinkin will get this document out to the Site Leads.</p>

This is a workforce and training issue that needs to be addressed.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ A question was raised about foster youth and the possibility of using a focus group to address this issue. MVBCN is currently meeting with foster parent's focus group and could invite youth to be part of the focus group. ○ Washington: The Family Find project is being implemented into the Wraparound process. Casey Foundation, Washington County Mental Health and CW are all linked to ensure this will happen. ○ A Wraparound kick off on October 6th, 2010 at the Hillsboro CW office will take place. All systems partners are invited to attend, including family partners and care coordinators who will introduce themselves. A family member will share her story at this event. Bill and Benjamin will be speaking to the group aswell. ○ 44 youth are enrolled out of 60, with the goal being reached by next week (9/27-30). ○ Challenges: The workforce development takes time from other activities. Time issues with CW because of the hiring freeze. ○ A question was asked, about the role of the education system at this project? Answer, the site is still working on this by getting 			
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	<p>some representatives on the advisory committee but it hasn't happened yet. The time constraint is a significant barrier.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ <u>PSU</u> met with persons from Positive Behavior Intervention Supports (PBIS). They are reviewing how PBIS and Wraparound can support each other. ○ It is important to be aware that education has some constraints because of contract hours. ○ Washington County does have a school liaison within mental health.
