- The purpose of skin needling
- Should the length of needle & depth of penetration be limited

Is the public or licensees allowed to attend the meeting?

Yes. Members of the public are invited and encouraged to be in attendance at all committee meetings, although public comment is not generally taken during this time. Technical experts may be in attendance at committee meetings and could be called upon to provide knowledge in specific areas.

What if the committee enters into executive session?

Prior to entering into executive session the committee chairperson will announce the nature of and the authority for holding executive session, at which time all audience members are asked to leave the room with the exception of news media and designated staff. Executive session would be held according to ORS 192.660.

No final actions or final decisions will be made in executive session. The committee will return to open session before taking any final action or making any final decisions.

Hi, my name is Dr Philippa McCaffery.

I am a Cosmetic Physician practising in Sydney, Australia and my practice specialises in non invasive, effective and affordable solutions for everyday skin problems like acne, acne scar, aging skin and sun damage.

I have been performing Skin Needling for 4 years to treat acne scars and deep facial lines. I was trained in the technique of Skin Needling by a French dermatologist, who has been performing Skin Needling for 20 years. I developed the Novaderm Skin Roller range to perform skin needling after 2 years of research and patient trials.

Skin Needling can safely treat depressed acne scar, hypertrophic surgical scar, borders of skin grafts, chicken pox scars, deep facial lines, wrinkles and pigmented skin.

History of Skin Needling

Skin Needling has been performed for many years, using a variety of instruments, to soften depressed scars and deep facial lines.

Dr Philippe Simonin, a Swissfrench dermatologist, published his results in Baran's Cosmetic Dermatology 1994, but his ground breaking technique, which he named **Electroridopuncture (ERP)**, remained largely unknown to the wider medical community. In his study of 600 patients, he examined results for 2 patient groups - one with Skin Aging and the other with Old Scars. He performed 10 treatments on all patients.

In the patient group with Skin Aging, 40% showed significant improvement, 22% moderate improvement and 13% some improvement - as measured by comparative skin imprints. In the patient group with Old Scars, 60% improved with 5-6 treatments. Best results were obtained for old fibrous and depressed scars.

Another pioneer of Skin Needling was Dr Andre Camirand, a Canadian Plastic Surgeon who made a chance observation of improvement in the texture and depression of the scars of some of his facelift patients, who had undergone tattooing for scar camouflage. He experimented with tattooing facelift scars without pigment, and noted improvement in texture and colour. He published an article on his results in JACPS in 1992.

Dr Camirand postulated that hypochromic (depigmented) skin repigmented through the transplantation of melanocytes (pigment producing skin cells) from normal skin into the hypochromic skin during the needling procedure. He also reported flattening of hypertrophic (overgrown) scars. He performed his needling procedures using a high speed tattoo gun, under local anaesthesia and treated each scar to pinpoint bleeding. He repeated the procedure every 2-8 weeks and no side effects or complications were reported.

Making Skin Needling easier

It is possible to obtain good results with ERP for deep depressed scars and deep lines after 10-15 treatment sessions.

However performing ERP is time consuming and requires extreme patience, so during 2003/2004, I worked with an Australian instrument designer to develop an affordable, autoclavable medical skin roller and homecare rollers that could make Skin Needling easier to perform and accessible to every patient who needed it.

Skin Needling can be safely performed on all skin colours and types. There is no risk of postinflammatory hyperpigmentation (depigmentation of the skin as a result of skin trauma) as the melanocytes remain intact, like the dermis, during Skin Needling. This is the major distinguishing safety feature when comparing Skin Needling and other invasive procedures that are used to treat deep line and depressed scars, ie. laser resurfacing, deep chemical peels and dermabrasion.

Other distinguishing safety features of Skin Needling include:

- significantly reduced risk of infection;
- significantly reduced downtime period for healing; and
- significantly reduced comparative cost.

How Skin Needling works

Skin Needling with a skin roller produces hundreds of tiny dermal injuries. Each dermal injury triggers the body's natural wound healing response within the skin, producing and depositing new collagen and elastin in the treatment area. Each successive treatment triggers the production and deposition of new collagen and elastin that progressively in-fill (collagen induction) the depressed scars and deep lines. Collagen induction can continue for up to 12 months after a treatment has been performed.

As the dermal layer produces more collagen and elastin, with successive treatments skin becomes firmer, smoother and more elastic, and the complexion becomes and looks more balanced and healthier. Effectively Skin Needling performs a non surgical facelift.

The hundreds of tiny dermal injuries produced by the skin rollers also act as channels that significantly increase the absorption of skincare creams. For the hair, the skin roller also stimulates blood flow around blood starved hair follicles and gently exfoliates dead skin cells. Used in combination with Minoxidil for hair restoration, the skin roller significantly increases the uptake of Minoxidil reducing the period from when first results are evident from 3 months down to 4-6 weeks.

Conclusion

In my experience, results vary between patients, with some achieving 90%+ improvement in scarring and others less than 50%. However, all patients achieve some improvements.

The most exciting feature of Skin Needling is its safety advantages. Skin Needling can be safely performed on Asian and darker skins, as well as skins that have been previously lasered or had dermabrasion treatments.

Generally, deep ice pick acne scars and deep facial lines will need to be treated by a medical professional using a medical face roller. However, not as deep wider acne scars and other depressed scars, aging, sun damaged and pigmented skin can be treated using homecare rollers.

Skin Needling can be performed for whole face rejuvenation, and when combined with tretinoin and hydroquinone, delivers equivalent results to laser resurfacing with a no risk profile. It can also be regularly repeated as a patient ages to replenish collagen and elastin.

C8 Home Unit- Reusable vs. Medical Grade Rollers- Disposable

The Home Roller C8 contains needles that are 0.2mm. This size needle will not penetrate beyond a certain depth or thickness of the epidermis. If the needle is 0.3mm or greater in length, then you begin penetrate the dermis. Thus, with a few exceptions i.e. patients on blood thinners or hemophiliacs, the aged, untreated menopausal women or those who have exceptionally thin skin, bleeding commonly does not occur. This is true no matter how hard you push on the roller. Therefore, since the 0.2mm needles have limited penetration no bleeding is involved. Since the debris commonly found on the skin i.e. skin oils, dead cells and proteinaceous material will adhere to the needles and roller, the needles and roller only need to be cleaned. However, the solution used to clean the roller has to be able to degrade and remove the residue without corrupting the roller and needles. The solution cannot be toxic to the user. And, most important, the roller is not to be shared.

It is also important to note that the public does not have access to solutions that could sterilize the roller without damaging it. Common cleaning agents such as rubbing alcohol or any other alcohol based solution does not sterilize anything; clean yes, sterilize no; remove protein and debris yes, sterilize no; damage the glue yes, sterilize no; probably loosen needles yes, sterilize no.

A medical micro-needling device has the following composition. It is composed of a plastic roller into which, as in the case of the Medical Dermalrollers, surgical grade special alloy needles are precisely aligned and embedded. Then, the needles are glued into the roller. Bleeding will occur. The devices are designed for single use only. The device is disposable because any attempts to autoclave i.e. sterilize by heating or use of other solutions will alter the integrity of the device by deforming the plastic, thus affecting the needles by loosening and misdirecting the orientation of the needles. Tissue injury is the obvious result or potential needle dislodgement into the patient.

CIT is a medical/surgical procedure. A medical micro-needling device has micro-needles ranging in lengths from 0.5mm to 2.5mm. And, although the procedure and the medical device appear simple, please consider the following prior to allowing anyone to perform CIT on you. Complications can occur as with any other medical/surgical procedure. The medical professional has to be competent and able to deal with such events should they occur. Medical judgment, prudence and discretion have to be exercised. The public is frequently misled and is unaware of these facts. Use of a Home Roller, which has needles that are 0.2mm long, is not considered a medical procedure.

CIT requires preparation. As the patient, you need to be adequately **medically** assessed prior to CIT. Why? Because, in order to determine if you are an adequate candidate for CIT and in order to determine if there are any other causes contributing to your skin condition, it requires a deep foundation in anatomy, neuroanatomy, immunology, physiology, pharmacology, endocrinology, gastroenterology, nutrition and dermatology. For this reason, Medical

DermaRoller® devices are provided only to trained medical professionals who will serve you. They will not be sold directly to the public unlike other companies.

Due to their training and experience, the medical professionals that are **allowed** by their respective regulatory boards to perform CIT are licensed physicians such as an M.D, D.O. or N.D. A duly licensed R.N and physician assistant (PA) can perform CIT if under the direct supervision of a licensed physician.

Although regulations are currently being reviewed and redrafted in many states, in most states independent estheticians are not allowed to perform CIT. Estheticians who are properly trained and are under the supervision of a physician can perform CIT. Acupuncturists may or may not be able to perform CIT depending on the scope of practice limitations in their respective states.

 **Re: Has anyone used the Derma Roller**

After significant research in needle design at Georgia Tech University, an engineering breakthrough was made. This research was incorporated into the Original Dermaroller® which is manufactured in Germany. Although there are many copycats there is only one Original Dermaroller®. There are two types of Dermaroller® devices. Both are made of high quality stainless steel. One is packaged sterilely and the other is for home use. Both are produced according to tough European standards. One is designed for home use thus the name Home Roller. It has 192 0.2mm needles. The other Dermaroller® devices are medical-surgical devices to be used only by medical professionals. The number of needles range from 96-192 and in lengths ranging from 0.5-2.5 mm. These rollers are made of different widths according to the medical procedure and indications for their use.

The Original Dermaroller® medical device is most effective in the treatment of acne scars as changes can be dramatic when properly used and applied by a trained professional with minimal risk. The rolling causes your skin cells to reproduce faster and to produce more collagen and elastin after the acne scars are penetrated and the appropriate levels of your skin stimulated. The acne scars fill in from below the scar and eventually smoothen. Because the needles penetrate the skin down to a certain level it is painful. In the treatment of acne scars of all types, a Dermaroller® with 1.5mm needles would be used. In order to assure comfort, a topical anesthetic cream has to be appropriately applied with a concurrent use of the Home roller prior to the procedure to make sure that the anesthetic cream is absorbed and that the patient's skin is anesthetized. Thereafter, the procedure ie. rolling can proceed safely to obtain the expected response. The procedure takes about one hour and can be repeated every 6-8 weeks as indicated by the clinical response ie. Degree of improvement. You must wait that long in order to allow the body's own healing process to take place without any further scarring or social down time as can be experienced with dermabrasion or laser treatments. If you have already tried other methods such as LASER or dermabrasion amongst others, perhaps then you are ready to try the Original Dermaroller®.

The Original Dermaroller® medical devices can also be used in the treatment of burn scars, wrinkles, stretch marks, hyperpigmentation, Melasma, big skin pores, and oily skin. It can also thicken and rejuvenate the skin by collagen and elastin induction, and by creating an increased turnover of skin cells. The Home Roller can be used to increase the penetration and effectiveness of medical grade topical creams.

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Why Choose Micro-needling? Is Dermaroller Right For You?

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For years we have watched the LASER (Light Amplification by Stimulated Emission of Radiation) industry make inroads into the cosmetic industry with resurfacing and fractionated (fraxel) lasers claiming superiority. Likewise, microdermabrasion and chemical peels have become commonplace procedures. Collectively, these are referred to as ablative procedures. Ablation refers to removal or destruction of tissue by surgery, a noxious substance (e.g. acid) or by radiation.

Collagen Induction Therapy (CIT) was made possible by German engineer Horst Liebl, the creator and designer of the original microneedling device Dermaroller. Others falsely claim the same distinction. Since the advent of Collagen Induction Therapy (CIT) for skin restoration, the evidence based conclusion is that CIT is a safe medical procedure without side effects when compared to the abovementioned ablative procedures. CIT is a non-ablative medical procedure. Although initially met with skepticism and disbelief, this is rapidly becoming the conclusion of dermatologists and plastic surgeons alike; microneedling is effective; CIT is effective. Some have stopped using lasers in favor of CIT. Some have actually stopped performing microdermabrasion due to marginal results, and "deep" chemical peels due to pigmentation changes.

The much trumpeted laser has to contend with the fact it fails to achieve its claims of skin restoration. The reasons for its failure are many. Ablative lasers' emitted radiation causes too much tissue injury. The skin (epidermis and dermis) is damaged causing a prolonged healing period, the skin's collagen is coagulated, scarring and hypo or hyperpigmentation changes can occur and post-operative prolonged skin redness is the rule. The damage that can occur may be irreversible. Radiation burns the skin. The most common side-effect is prolonged skin redness after treatment often lasting months. After a laser procedure initially the skin turns red and then into an opaque, pale, lusterless white color. Many patients have experienced these results. Frequently, make up is unable to hide the resultant changes.

"Deep" chemical peels are currently less frequently performed due to potential pigment changes. If a "peel" is considered, consideration should be given to a "medium" chemical peel. The effect is noticeable without the risk profile of laser or deeper treatment modalities.

Microdermabrasion removes the upper layers of the skin by using micro crystals such as aluminum oxide crystals. The "sand blasting" action that follows thins the skin. This is particularly important as we age since the skin becomes thinner. There is no need to make the skin even thinner. Careful attention during this procedure is mandatory. Nevertheless, this procedure is very common.

So why is Collagen Induction Therapy (CIT) becoming more popular and well accepted? Simply, the answer is because CIT is proving to achieve better results than the ablative procedures. Many patients have witnessed and benefitted from this medical procedure performed by Dermaroller trained medical professionals using this very simple appearing tool. But, that is not the whole story. Skin rejuvenation is remarkable. The skin is thickened by inducing more skin growth. Acne and burn scars, and stretch marks fade. Hyperpigmentation can disappear. These are some of the many benefits of CIT. There are no reported significant complications. There is no social downtime, no infections, no pigmentation changes and most definitely, no thinning of the skin. Adequate patient assessment, preparation and post-operative care is equally as important. This is why the Dermaroller technique is being endorsed by many physicians across the USA and the world.

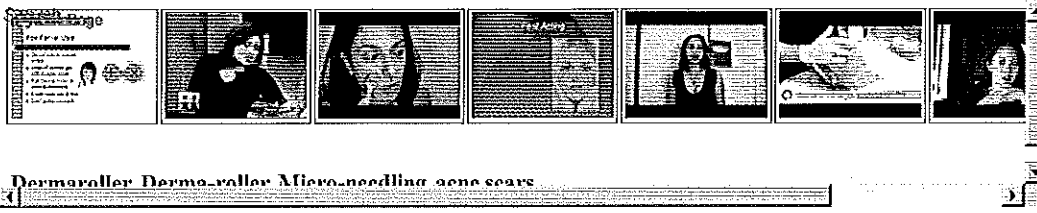

Carson City, Nevada, March 8, 2011 – Cynergy LLC, the U.S. agent of Dermaroller® is actively and aggressively enforcing its trademarks to protect consumers from copycat micro-needling products. Many unethical companies sell their products online using a variation of the respected Dermaroller® name to mislead consumers. People who unknowingly buy these copycat products put their health at risk.

"Protecting our trademark directly protects the consumer. These online, foreign-based and domestic resellers are selling rollers to medical professionals and consumers indiscriminately. These rollers are poorly designed, poorly manufactured, and are not sterile packaged. They're also selling wrong, excessive and dangerous needle lengths to the public. Some rollers have 2.5mm to 3mm lengths. That's extremely dangerous because the skin is only 2mm thick in some areas. Penetrating too deeply can cause severe nerve and tissue damage," explains Phillip Terrazas, Cynergy's sales and marketing director.

Mr. Terrazas adds, "Others purposely mislead consumers by using our Dermaroller® name because we're the original, most researched, trusted and largest micro-needle device manufacturer worldwide. But these copycats fall extremely short of Dermaroller's® trusted quality and exacting manufacturing standards."

For example, copycat devices claim the rollers can be sterilized with rubbing alcohol and reused. That's dangerous because rubbing alcohol alone does not sterilize a medical device. Using rubbing alcohol in order to reuse medical rolling devices can also result in device damage, skin damage, infections and injury to the skin because the poorly manufactured needles can loosen and break.

Copycat devices also use acupuncture needles which do not have the strength required, thus risking injury. And, acupuncture needles can't provide the therapeutic effects seen with quality engineered micro-needling devices like the Dermaroller®.

Another important note is that most micro-needling sellers are based overseas and do not have a US office. This allows them to make false claims about their products without being held liable for any damage(s) they cause the consumer. This leaves the consumer without recourse.

Cynergy's retained counsel is sending out cease and desist letters to trademark offenders explaining, "Dermaroller® products have been sold for many years, therefore it is very unlikely that someone's illegal use of the Trademark was innocent. Their intentional and willful infringement entitles Cynergy and the Dermaroller® Company to file an action in federal court and recover significant and statutory damages, attorneys fees and costs."

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Skin Needling / Micro Needling

Skin Needling or Micro-Needling is a form of Collagen Induction Therapy which is intended to smooth wrinkles, improve depressed acne scarring as well as reduce the appearance of stretch marks. It is one the newest, easiest and most effective skin treatments available and is a process which can be carried out clinically or in the home. As the process gains awareness it is important to understand, what skin needling is, how it works and whether it is a suitable treatment for you.

QUESTION? What do scars, wrinkles, stretch marks and uneven skin have in common?

ANSWER: A lack of collagen! If your body would produce more collagen then you wouldn't get them. Using a Scientia Derma Roller offers nature a helping hand by encouraging collagen production in the skin, which helps prevent or reverse their formation.

What is Micro-Needling?

Micro needling is process carried out with a roller that is covered with numerous tiny needles. These needles penetrate the upper layers of skin to a depth of up to 2mm (depending on the needle length used). This process has two major benefits. It effectively stimulates collagen formation at the same time as providing a clear channel for topical gels and creams to be absorbed more effectively through the top layer (epidermis) of skin. Microneedling creates a very minor (almost microscopic) trauma which lasts for a short period of time and does not result in bruising or swelling or bleeding in the treated area in the way that chemical peels, laser therapy or microdermabrasion do.

Derma Roller Needle sizes for home use include 0.5mm, 1mm (1.0mm), 1.5mm and for professional use, we have 2mm (2.0mm) and 2.5mm rollers. We also have 3 line rollers (made narrow to reach harder to treat areas like around the nose) in 1.0mm and 1.5mm sizes.

Which needle size for stretch marks?

We recommend 1.0mm for light stretch marks and 1.5mm for deep stretch marks, you would need to decide which would best suit your needs.

The correct needle size for acne scars or other facial scars?

We recommend 0.5mm for light acne scarring, mild chicken pox scars or ice pick scars, or simply regular anti ageing treatments. A 1.0mm roller is more suitable for deep acne scarring, surgery scars, ice pick or chicken pox scars, and 1.5mm Derma Rollers are for very deep scarring. A Derma Roller 1.5mm is the maximum we would recommend for use on the face (unless as part of a professional treatment), but your body is less sensitive to treatment, so you should decide which would best suit your needs.

You may also wish to choose the 3 line roller as it is better suited to use on certain parts of your face (such as around the nose), but it is not always necessary as our regular roller may suit you.

What size for hair loss?

For thinning hair or greying hair, the 0.5mm Derma Roller is ideal, with 1mm rollers more suitable for more extensive hair loss.

What about for Cellulite?

The best needle size for cellulite is 1mm or 1.5mm depending on how severe the case is.

Is the right Derma Roller needle length the only factor?

No. We also recommend the use of our vitamin rich treatment cream and Scientia Nutrition MultiVitamins as they have all the ingredients needed to support the use of the Scientia Derma Roller, and we find it can speed up results by giving your skin the building blocks it needs to generate new collagen and elastin - the materials which give your skin its elasticity and smooth texture.

What about sterilizing your Derma Roller?

To sterilize your Derma Roller, we recommend the same product used to sterilize baby's bottles (sterilisation liquid or sterilising fluid) available from your local pharmacy or supermarket.

We highly recommend that these procedures be performed under the direct supervisor of a medical professional in case there is a adverse reaction to the numbing agent used.

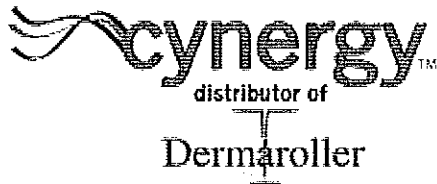
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
