Federal Funds Increase for SHPO

The Historic Preservation Fund (HPF), through which SHPO receives an annual allocation of approximately \$780,000, is slated for an approximate 10 percent increase in the 2009 federal fiscal year. This translates to an additional \$156,000 (approx.) for Oregon's 2009-11 biennium. While the budget bill has not yet passed the Congress, all parties are currently in agreement on the amount (a very rare occurrence!), so it is highly likely that the funds will come through as planned. These additional funds will probably be used to shore up programs that would otherwise face much larger reductions due to state financial cutbacks.

Archaeological Events Held Statewide

OPRD and SHPO are among the 29 partners who promote awareness and appreciation of archaeology through the annual Oregon Archaeology Celebration, which is typically held during the month of October. This year more than two dozen events were held statewide, including several at Smith Rock State Park. The poster and calendar of events also featured Champoege State Heritage Area. See the attached Celebration calendar for a full list of activities.

Main Street Program

A very well-qualified candidate has been hired to fill the Oregon Main Street Coordinator position. Sheri Stuart has 20 years experience working with the Main Street program at local, statewide, and national levels (most recently Washington State). She takes over a very vibrant state program that currently has 62 participating communities. The Main Street program is jointly administered by OPRD and Oregon Business Development Department (OBDD), and is paid for by non-Lottery funds from Heritage Programs' budget

State Advisory Committee on Historic Preservation (SACHP)

The SACHP is one of four "sub-commissions" within Heritage Programs. Its primary role is to review and make recommendations about nominations of historic properties in Oregon for placement in the National Register of Historic Places. It consists of nine members appointed by the governor, representing disciplines such as history, archaeology, architectural history, and architecture, among others. The committee meets three times per year and usually reviews about 7-12 nominations per meeting. Committee vice-chair John Goodenberger, a resident of Astoria, will address the Commission and provide further details about the SACHP and its role.

The Archaeology of Cultural Diversity

Oregon Archaeology Celebration October 2009



Champoeg school photo ca. 1859. At Oregon's statehood, 150 years ago, there were American Indians, Americans, and people from France, Scotland, Ireland, Africa, Hawaii, and other nations, living in Champoeg. Today, archaeologists are looking for evidence of their daily lives.

Kalapuya Indian families lived in the Champoeg area for generations prior to the first permanent homes of Hudson Bay Company families established in the 1830s. In its growing population, Champoeg saw many diverse cultures and people, including American Indians from many different tribes in the United States and Canada, people from France, Scotland, Ireland, Africa, Hawaii and from the eastern United States. On May 2, 1843, settlers in the Willamette Valley met at Champoeg's Hudson Bay Company granary and trade store and voted 52 to 50 to organize a provisional government, the first such government in the Pacific Northwest. From this initial decision at Champoeg, the people of Oregon made a choice to become part of the United States and, on February 14, 1859, Oregon joined the Union as the 33rd state. By the time of statehood, Champoeg had 50 buildings and a population of 200. The cultural diversity of Champoeg is evidenced in the naming of its streets and in the cultural material that archaeologists have found.

This year, we are celebrating Oregon's sesquicentennial (150th

year of statehood). The 2009 Oregon Archaeology Celebration poster and images in the Calendar of Events honor the cultural diversity that is represented in the archaeological record from Champoeg. By visiting Champoeg State Heritage Area, you can experience the early history of Oregon's founding as a state and the cultural diversity of this early town through displays of information and exhibits of artifacts recovered from archaeological projects.

Oregon Archaeology Celebration events provide learning experiences for everyone. We invite you to join us in celebrating our heritage by participating in events that are offered this year. Please remember that archaeological sites are an important part of our heritage but they are also fragile. If you visit an archaeological or historical site, please treat the site with respect so that others may enjoy it as well. State and federal laws prohibit site damage or the removal of artifacts from sites.

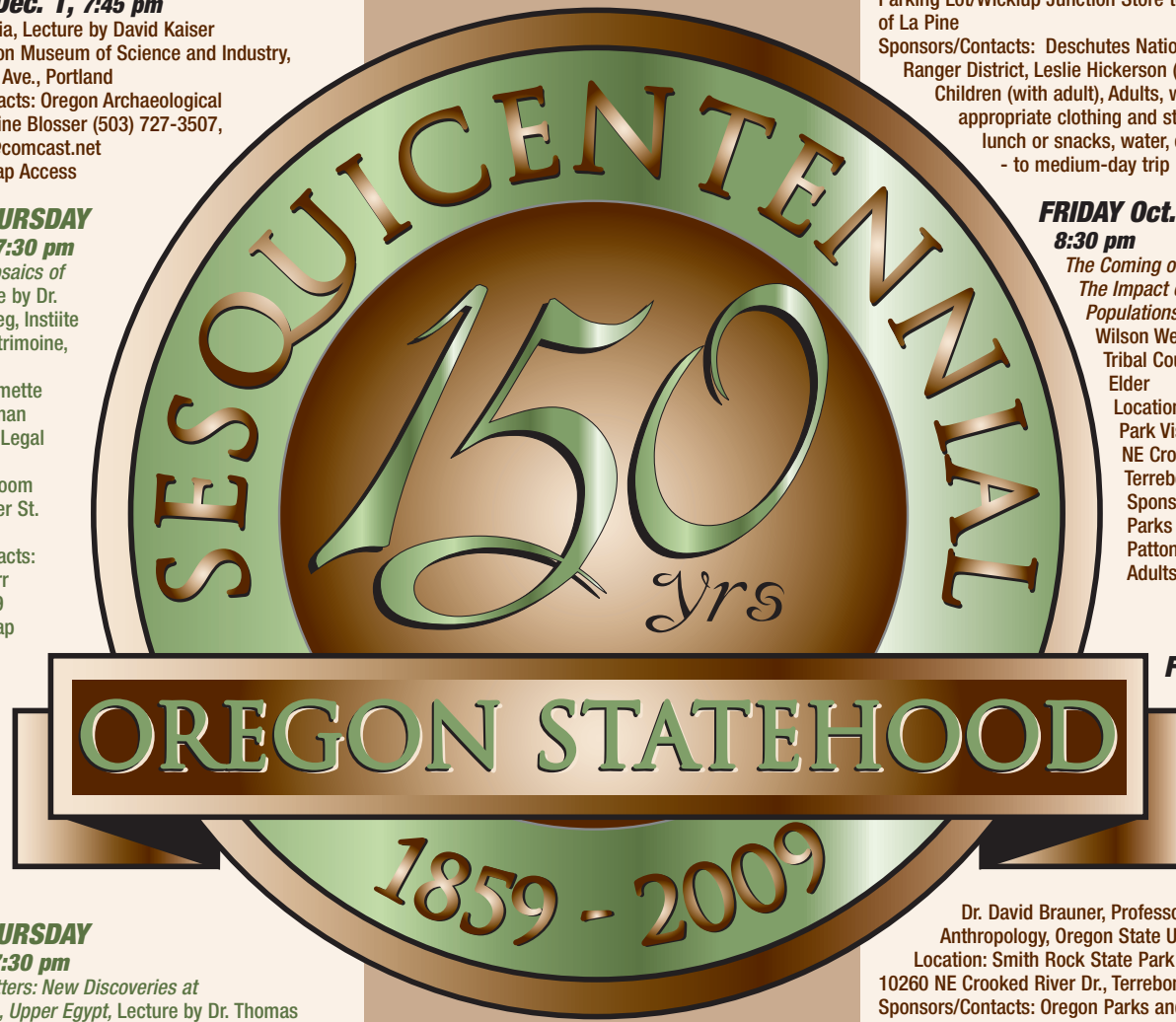
