Need for the Rule(s):

A master plan for Iwetemlaykin State Heritage Site is being adopted to provide direction to the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD) regarding the future management of the park resources and development of facilities for public access. The master plan responds to the most current information on park resource conditions and public recreation needs as they pertain to this park. The purpose of amending OAR 736-018-0045 is to adopt the park master plan through the administrative rule process.

Documents Relied Upon, and where they are available:

Marr Ranch Property Master Plan, September 2008 Draft (Marr Ranch has since been renamed Iwetemlaykin State Heritage Site by the State Parks Commission). Available for review at the OPRD web site, http://egov.oregon.gov/OPRD/PLANS/planning_marranch.shtml. Hard copies are available upon request from OPRD in Salem.

Fiscal and Economic Impact:

The park master plan will provide guidance to OPRD on the management of the park resources and development of facilities for public access. Neither the master plan nor the rule amendment for adoption of the master plan will impose requirements on other public entities, businesses or individuals. Park master plans are sometimes used as a basis for seeking funding for planned projects, however, master plans provide no guarantees that planned projects will be funded or implemented. Neither the master plan nor the rule amendment for adoption of the master plan will provide the funding for the planned projects. As such, there will be no positive or negative fiscal or economic impacts as a result of the rulemaking action.



An advisory committee has assisted OPRD in formulating the draft master plan. Committee members were chosen to represent a broad spectrum of interests related to the park resources and recreation needs. The various interests represented include public parks and recreation interests, affected state and federal agencies, environmental protection and education advocacy groups, affected local governments, affected ditch companies, tribes affiliated with the area, and the local community.
