Ms. Uherbelau is one of two public members on the Board. Ms. Uherbelau is the Communications Consultant for the Oregon Education Association. She resides in Portland.

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
# OSBN CELEBRATES 100 YEARS OF NURSING REGULATION

On June 7, 1911, the Oregon State Board for the Examination and Registration of nurses held its first meeting in the home of one of its members in Portland, Ore., Mrs. O. E. Osborn of Medford, presiding. The board, consisting of three members, discussed the bill that originated the Board, agreed upon a motto, authorized the Secretary to purchase a seal and stationary, sent a notice of the meeting to the *Pacific Coast Journal*, and postponed a decision on the Secretary's salary.

Those were the good old days.

A century later, although the Board's meeting agendas are considerably more complex, its mission of public protection remains constant. The Board was created to solve two major problems. First, any individual could represent herself or himself to the public as a qualified nurse, regardless of whether she or he had received any training — a clear public safety issue.

Second, there were no uniform standards for nursing theory, clinical experience or beginning competencies amongst the four Oregon nursing education programs that existed: Good Samaritan, St. Vincent Hospital, and Portland Sanitarium and Hospital (Portland

Adventist Hospital) in Portland, and St. Anthony's Hospital in Pendleton.

Early Board members spent their meetings approving applications and signing license certificates. "The Board

approved and issued 64 licenses that first year," says OSBN Licensing Manager DeWayne Hatcher. "That's a far cry from the almost 8,000 new licenses and 32,000 renewals we process each year now."

The Board has enjoyed a strong relationship with The Oregon Nurses' Association since the very beginning. A committee of the ONA, which formed in 1904, drafted legislation to create the Board and provided the means to establish it in 1911 by loaning it \$50. The Board repaid the funds within three weeks.

Although general licensing requirements haven't changed much since 1911, the methods the Board uses to process applications has transformed greatly. Technological advances begin-

ning in the 1980s moved the Board from using typewriters and manual methods to computer databases and online systems to serve its licensees and the public. Approximately 92 percent of all current licenses are renewed using the Board's online license renewal system and 78 percent of endorsements used the new online endorsement application process in April 2011. The Board plans to develop an online system in early 2012 to streamline the licensure process for new exam applicants.

In 1912, the Board began to formulate standard curricula and textbooks for Oregon schools of nursing, based

The first Board members were Mrs. Olivia E. Osborn of Medford, President, Miss Helen Jones of Portland, Secretary, and Miss Jane Doyle, also of Portland.

Nurse Practitioners were recognized in Oregon statute in 1975 and first licensed in 1977. They received prescriptive authority for schedule III-V drugs in 1979; authority for schedule II drugs followed in 2003.

In 1917, nursing education programs changed from two-year, to three-year programs.

on principles drawn by the American Nurses Association. The first standardized Oregon nursing exam was held July 20, 1914, taken by 49 applicants. In 2010, by comparison, 1,311 Oregon applicants took the National Council for State Boards of Nursing (NCLEX) RN examination, and 419 took the NCLEX-PN exam.

The Board now approves and surveys almost 40 RN and PN nursing education programs, 55 nursing assistant and 17 medication aide training programs, and has approved 38 CNA2 training programs. All approved educational and *continued on page 8*

In addition to licensing and education, the third leg of the regulatory stool—discipline—was added in December 1928, when Board members revoked a nurse's license for a medication error. Public safety is the Board's primary purpose, and discipline for infractions of the Nurse Practice Act is a necessary aspect of regulation. In Fiscal Year 2010, Board staff received and investigated 2,742 complaints, resulting in 573 disciplinary actions and 71 cases referred to the Health Professionals' Services Program. The resulting cases were either dismissed or carried over into the next fiscal year.

The Board has come far since its inception in 1911. Now with nine members and a staff of almost 50, it continues to serve its 70,000 licenses and the public as effectively and efficiently as possible, always looking for ways to streamline processes and remove unnecessary barriers to licensure. Many things have changed since 1911—such as the complexity of educational training, the size of the agency's budget, and the Internet—however, the Board's commitment to the citizens of Oregon has never wavered.

"The way we operate has changed drastically, but the Board's primary mission remains the same," says Executive Director Holly Mercer. "To safeguard the public's safety by providing guidance for, and regulation of, entry into the profession, nursing education and continuing safe practice."

# YOUR BOARD IN ACTION

*Highlights from the February and April 2011 Board Meetings*



## RULEMAKING—FIRST READING

The Board accepted proposed rule language in April to Division 56 of the Nurse Practice Act (OAR 851-056) that will clarify the prescribing of drugs that are compounded, grandfathered, and/or off-label. The rule hearing will occur in September 2011.

During the April meeting, the Board also accepted proposed rule language to Division 61 (OAR 851-061) that will broaden clinical preceptor qualifications and increase classroom and lab hours for medication aide training programs and incorporate changes discussed with the Department of Education regarding all training programs.

## ADMINISTRATION

Board staff provided an outline of the Board's budget and Affirmative Action Report during the February meeting and answered questions. During the April meeting, Executive Director Holly Mercer reported the agency's budget hearing before the Ways and Means Subcommittee on Human Services went very smoothly, and that she expected to return to the subcommittee for a work session in early May. Once the budget (SB 5527) is passed out of the subcommittee, it will go before the full Joint Committee on Ways and Means, and then onto the Senate and House of Representatives. ## LICENSING AND DISCIPLINE

The Board approved two policies in April regarding work settings, "Work Setting Restrictions for Licensees and Certificate-Holders on Probation," and "Work Setting Restrictions for Licensees in the Health Professionals' Services Program (HPSP)." ## EDUCATION

The Board granted initial approval in April for Lane Community College's practical nurse (PN) program. LCC is located in Eugene, Ore. The Board also approved the PN programs of Sumner College for up to four years, and Umpqua Community College for up to five years.

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## “MY PRESCRIPTION HAS RUN OUT....” REFILLS AND OREGON LAW

Nurses and their employers frequently contact the Board about the practice of refilling medications by phone or electronic authorization. The high volume of calls is probably due to several changes in law and practice over the last decade, including the use of automated refill processes by pharmacies and increased use of electronic prescribing. The following advice addresses several frequently asked questions in an effort to provide a resource for all interested parties.

### 1. Who may authorize a “refill” in Oregon?

Prescriptions, prescription refills, and drug orders must be correctly dispensed in accordance with the prescribing practitioner’s authorization according to 855-041-0065 in Oregon pharmacy law.

### 2. How long is a prescription valid in Oregon?

A prescription for a non-controlled drug can be written for up to two years in Oregon by a prescriber. This is designated by writing the prescription with refills “prn up to <date>”. The use of this designation may help diminish frequent refill requests for routine medications.

A prescription for a controlled substance in Schedule III-IV may be refilled up to five times within the six months after the date on which the prescription was issued. A schedule II drug may not be refilled, but may be written following DEA guidelines for up to a 90-day supply. See <http://www.deadiversion.usdoj.gov/pubs/manuals/pract/section5.htm> for further details.

### 3. What if the prescriber is not available?

If the practitioner is not available and in the professional judgment of

the pharmacist an emergency need for the refill of a prescription drug has been demonstrated (provided it is not a Schedule II substance), the pharmacist may dispense a sufficient quantity (not



to exceed a 72-hour supply) of the drug consistent with the dosage regimen, until a practitioner can be contacted for authorization. The practitioner shall be promptly notified of the emergency refill (OAR 855-041-0065 (4)). Pharmacists may also develop collaborative therapy protocols with prescribers to minimize repeated requests for refills according to OAR 855-019-0260. Please contact the

Board of Pharmacy for further details regarding these regulations.

### 4. What about refill protocols? My employer uses a protocol and standing order that allows the RN or medical assistant to order a refill. Is that consistent with the Board’s requirements?

Pharmacy law requires that refills of medications occur with the authorization of the prescribing practitioner. A protocol and standing order may be

used to authorize administration of medication or provision of a prescription to an individual patient (“patient specific protocols”) or for an individual condition (“condition specific protocols”). However, a protocol and standing order does not permit the delegation of prescribing functions such as routine refills by a nurse prescriber to someone without prescriptive authority, nor are

nurses authorized to renew/refill or extend a prescription that has expired without first consulting the prescriber.

**5. What is an example of a patient specific protocol?**

Chloe Jones is a 19-year-old, full-time college student with asthma. Her physician has written a standing order for her to have nebulizer treatments x 2 if her wheezing meets specific parameters. She has additional regular prescriptions that she takes for asthma management. Nurses may implement the nebulizer treatments per standing order and protocol without an additional prescription or order.

**6. What is an example of a condition specific protocol?**

Multiple employees of a hospital are

exposed to meningitis by a patient. The occupational health office implements a protocol signed by their medical director that provides for administration of antibiotic prophylaxis to all patients who meet specific criteria for exposure and have no contraindications. Condition specific protocols are also used for immunizations for disease prevention/wellness indications.

**7. What are common protocol/standing order errors?**

Protocols which start with a diagnosis “Strep Throat” rather than a symptom “Pharyngitis” may lead to improper treatment or over-use of antibiotics. Protocols which do provide options for patients who are allergic, pregnant, and intolerant or contraindicated for treatments may contribute to medication

or treatment errors. Standing orders that are vague such as “refill diuretic prescriptions for patients who have a normal blood pressure up to 6 months” do not help the nurse identify the specific medication parameters necessary to provide good patient care. When in doubt, involve a pharmacist or prescriber to clarify incomplete protocols and standing orders.

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## Nursing Assistant and Medication Aide Training Program Changes

Stakeholders participated in a review of the Board's policy on Approved Curriculum Content for Medication Aide Training Programs by WebEx on February 3 and 10, 2011. As a result of those two meetings, changes to the Board's curriculum policy and Division 61 of the Nurse Practice Act (OAR 851-061) were proposed and approved by the Board during its April 21, 2011 meeting.

The curriculum changes were modeled off of the National Council of State Board's of Nursing (NCSBN) 2007 Medication Assistant-Certified (MA-C) Model Curriculum. The new curriculum for Medication Aide Training Programs can be found at [http://www.oregon.gov/OSBN/pdfs/policies/macurr\\_1.pdf](http://www.oregon.gov/OSBN/pdfs/policies/macurr_1.pdf).

The group's recommended changes to Division 61 regarding medication aide training programs will:

- Remove a barrier from qualifications for program directors and primary instructors.
- Broaden clinical preceptor qualifications for the clinical experience.
- Increase the classroom/lab hours.
- Simplify the language related to the process for the student progression during the clinical experience.

During this past year, Board staff has worked with the Oregon Department of Education and various stakeholders to increase student protections in our administrative rules. Changes to Division 61 that reflect these discussions

will be considered during the June 23, 2011, OSBN Board meeting.

These proposed changes to Division 61 would:

- Require training program providers to be licensed with the Department of Education if they offer more than just the nursing assistant and medication aide training.
- Offer an option to training programs to apply for exemption from licensing through the Department of Education if they only offer nursing assistant and medication aide training.
- Provide specific requirements for an enrollment agreement and disclosure statement.

- Add changes to policies and procedures to list of items requiring Board approval.
- Insert new standards related to organization and administration, e.g., financial viability and business practices. Other proposed changes to Division 61 would:
- Add definitions for assisted living and residential care facilities for clarification.

- Broaden the definition of on-line programs to allow for on-line training for CNA 2 and medication aides.
- Provide language clarification related to the process for reinstatement of active status after a training program has been on inactive status.
- Establish parameters related to on-line training for CNA 2 and medication aide training programs.

CNA/CMA instructors and employers to review the CNA & CMA state certification examination statistics and make recommendations to Headmaster on the content and administration of the examinations. Preference will be given to ensure the panel members represent a variety of training and

employment settings and geographic locations in Oregon.

## Best Practices for Lab & Clinical Experiences

### LAB

The lab experience provides a safe place for students to practice skills in a controlled environment. It allows students to perform the skills on other students or a mannequin before they perform them in a real-life situation. To increase the effectiveness of the lab experience, students need to be actively engaged in the learning process. Make sure the students understand the objective of the specific lab experience in which they are about to participate and the expected timeframe to complete the activity. Then divide the students into groups of three or four. The instructor may assign students to the groups or allow students to select their own partners. When there are more than four individuals assigned to a group, they tend to not focus or participate equitably. Give the groups a few minutes to review the steps for the skill to be return demonstrated.

One member of each group will act as the client/patient/resident. Another member will assume the role of the nursing assistant. The remaining member(s) will have a checklist with the specific steps of the skill to be performed. As the nursing assistant performs the skill on the client/patient/resident or mannequin, the observing group member(s) will silently check off the steps as they see them performed. A laminated checklist with a dry erase marker makes the checklist reusable. At the completion of the skill, all group members review the outcome of the demonstration. Then the group members rotate roles and repeat the process until all members have had an opportunity to play all of the roles.

The student-to-instructor ratio for the lab experience in nursing assistant level

1, CNA 2, and medication aide training programs is no more than 10 students per instructor. The instructor role during the skill practice is to rotate from group to group to ensure the process is followed, answer questions, and provide feedback. Group learning activities help promote teamwork which is a vital part of nursing. It is the instructor's role to direct and facilitate the learning activity.

### CLINICAL

The clinical experience allows students to apply the knowledge and perform the skills they learned in the classroom in a real-life situation under supervision. Students often cite the clinical experience as the most valuable part of the learning process. The goal of the clinical experience is to give the student(s) the opportunity to master the concepts and skills that they learned in the classroom setting, not to have the student become familiar with all

areas of the clinical setting. The key to an effective clinical experience is in the selection of the client/patient/resident(s) to provide the student with the chance to have every hour of the clinical experience contribute to learning and mastering the expected content. Students gain confidence as they apply their critical thinking, psychomotor, and psychosocial skills with real client/patient/resident(s).

The student-to-instructor ratio for the clinical experience in nursing assistant level 1 training programs is a maximum of 10 students per instructor. In a CNA 2 training program, the ratio for the clinical experience is a maximum of eight students per instructor; for medication aide training clinical experience, the ratio is one student per clinical preceptor during the first 24-hours of the clinical experience.

Students provide direct client/patient/resident care within the CNA authorized duties under the supervision of a Board-approved clinical instructor/preceptor. They only provide care at the level that they have been deemed competent to perform by the Board-approved clinical instructor/preceptor. The Board-approved clinical instructor/preceptor is the person responsible for establishing the objectives for the clinical day, selecting the client/patient/resident(s) for the students, and evaluating the students' performance.

While each of the client/patient/resident(s) that is assigned to a student also has a CNA assigned to their care, the CNA is not the person who directs the clinical experience or evaluates the student on the performance of the skills. It is important that the students are actually performing the skills and

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not just observing the CNA(s) as they provide care.

Clinical objectives for each day should be tailored to each student's needs.. Students in a clinical group may have different objectives for the day to meet their individual needs. The student's assignment should meet the clinical objective(s) but not overwhelm the student. Pay attention to the cumulative experiences and needs of each student. Some students will master the concepts and skills quicker than other students. The student should master the previous clinical assignment before they are assigned more client/patient/resident(s).

An example of clinical progression:

**Clinical Day One:** Assign each student one client/patient/resident. On this first day, the more dependent the client/patient/resident, the more skills the student will get to perform, e.g. bedbath, transferring, assisting with dining, oral care, etc.

**Clinical Day Two:** Assign each student the same client/patient/resident as day one, plus one other client/patient/resident. If the new assignment can be a roommate of their day one assignment, then the student has the benefit of observing how the CNA interacted with that client/patient/resident on the previous day.

**Clinical Day Three:** Assign each student the same client/patient/resident as day two plus one other client/patient/resident. While students generally have no problem organizing the care for two individuals, once the third client/patient/resident is added, their organization falls apart.

**Clinical Day Four:** For most students, the assignment will need to be the same

as day three to allow them to master the organization of the care being provided.

**Clinical Day Five:** Assign each student the same client/patient/resident as day four, plus one other client/patient/resident.

**Clinical Day Six:** For most students, the assignment will need to be the same as day five to allow them to master the organization of the care being provided.

**Clinical Day Seven:** Assign each student the same client/patient/resident as day six, plus one other client/patient/resident.

**Clinical Day Eight:** For most students, the assignment will need to be the same as day seven to allow them to master the organization of the care being provided.

**Clinical Day Nine & 10:** Make the assignments to meet the individual student learning needs and course objectives.

To increase the effectiveness of the clinical experience, it is important to start the clinical day with a pre-conference and end with a post-conference. During the pre-clinical conference, the Board-approved instructor reviews the day's learning objectives and assignments and validates students' preparation. The pre-conference is usually short and to the point, approximately 30 minutes long. The post-conference can be a little longer. This conference provides the opportunity to help the students process the clinical experience. It is a time to discuss a unique experience that happened or to reinforce previously learned concepts. The post-conference is also a time to set the stage for the next day's clinical experience.

# 2011 Legislative Session Update

Although the 2011 Legislative Session is winding down, several bills that would affect nursing are still live, as of this writing. The session is scheduled to end by June 30, 2011, although that date could be extended depending on state budget talks. The following is a brief description of several bills that affect licensees, the Board itself or healthcare in general:

#### House Bills

- HB 2397A — Creates a loan forgiveness program in the Office of Rural Health for primary care practitioners.

- HB 2650A — Requires home health agencies or in-home care agencies to complete criminal records checks on individuals paid by the agencies to provide home health or in-home care services.
- HB 3220A — Allows the Oregon State Board of Nursing to use results of the nursing assistant examination for the continuing education of nursing assistants. Specifically, it would allow Board staff to share the results of failed Certified Nursing Assistant exams with the students who failed, in the hopes that

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

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students will do better when they retake the exam. The bill would remove a barrier to licensure and end a lot of frustration for many nursing assistant candidates.

#### Senate Bills

- SB 210A — Requires the Oregon Health Authority to reimburse primary care practitioners directly or through prepaid management care health services organizations based on Medicare reimbursement rates.
- SB 493A — Establishes a task force to review Oregon curriculum and training standards for performing clinical breast exams. The task force must submit a report of its findings and recommendations to the Legislature prior to the 2013 Legislative Session.
- SB 563A — Allows previously licensed, certified, or otherwise authorized healthcare providers to register as emergency healthcare providers and to provide healthcare services without license or certification during a Governor-declared emergency. Also permits the Oregon Health Authority to direct registered emergency healthcare providers to proceed to another state where emergency healthcare services are required.
- SB 858A — Requires insurers to reimburse independent Nurse Practitioners at the same rate as physicians for the same services.

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## EMPLOYERS: New Online Service Enables Bulk License Verifications

The new OSBN online auto-verification subscription service makes the duty of verifying nursing and nursing assistant licenses much easier for employers. Subscribers to the low-cost auto-verification service may receive daily, weekly or monthly e-mail notifications of the current license status for all nurses and nursing assistants in their employ, including any new disciplinary actions and when licenses are due to renew.

Subscribers access the service through the online services section of the Board's website. Notices can be sent to one or multiple e-mail addresses for tracking. To assist

with the initial sign-up, Board staff will load an employer's entire employee list into the web-based system. Employers then have the ability to add and subtract employees from their subscription list as needed.

All of us at ONA look forward to working with the OSBN to advance the profession of nursing for many years to come! Happy Anniversary, OSBN, from your colleagues at ONA!

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


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
