**Willamette Valley Genealogical Society's
DNA Project**

WVGS has a DNA Project for both men and women. To join under WVGS:

1. Go to the State Library URL at: <http://oregon.gov/OSL/GRES/genealogy.shtml>
2. Click on Genealogy Research on the left.
3. Click on WVGS DNA Project.
4. Click on the Family Tree DNA icon in the middle of the page.
5. Scroll to the bottom of the next page and complete the form.
6. Click CONTINUE to complete the next screen.
7. Be sure to click only once when you are done so you order just one set.

You will receive a confirmation in your e-mail box that your order was taken. Remember: Only men can order the Y-DNA test, but both men and women can order the mtDNA. It is cheaper to order the Y-DNA 37 marker test as it will tell you that you have a common ancestor within genealogical time for persons you match. Lesser tests (12 markers) provide information on older ancestors prior to 600 years ago. However you may wish to start small and upgrade. For the mtDNA order both the HVR1 and HVR2 panels (mtDNA plus) as this will give you the best information on your ethnic origins. Again, you can start small and upgrade, if needed.

The DNA Project is open to anyone, not just WVGS members. You are not charged until you send in your test kit. You can do the DNA testing through WVGS and submit it to other groups.

WVGS News**February Program**

Steve Betschart, a retired school teacher, history buff and Civil War enthusiast and re-enactor, was our excellent February speaker. This year is the beginning of the 150th Anniversary of the Civil War. Steve talked about the Civil War in general and the Oregon during the Civil War.

Even at a distance, repercussions of the Civil War reached Oregon. As the War began, federal troops were needed to fight in the East and Oregon troops were replaced by volunteers. Military forces in Oregon were faced with three basic duties:

1. Enforcement of Indian treaties made during the 1850's
2. Protection of settlers and commercial interest in central and eastern Oregon from hostile tribes
3. Opposition to various pro-Southern elements within the state which were either real or perceived threats.

Steve talked about each of these three factors. He was dressed in uniform and brought along typical supplies that a soldier would have carried. Steve was a very knowledgeable and entertaining speaker. His hand-out is available at the Reference Desk at the Oregon State Library on the 2nd floor.

Oregon Asylum Cremains

On January 28, 2001 the Oregon State hospital released the following information:

The Oregon State Hospital is the custodian of the cremated remains of approximately 3,500 people who died while living at Oregon State Hospital, Oregon State Tuberculosis Hospital, Mid-Columbia Hospital, Dammasch State Hospital, Oregon State Penitentiary, and Fairview Training Center between 1914 and the 1970s. These cremains were never claimed. The hospital hopes to change that and unite the cremains with family members. To that end, the hospital has posted this list of names of the people whose cremated remains are in its possession. Hospital officials urge anyone who thinks he or she may have a family member who passed away at one of these institutions to review the list. As soon as the connection can be confirmed, the hospital will make arrangements for the cremains to be sent to the family.

In a few mouse clicks, you can publish your family tree to the Internet on your own family Website and share it with family and friends!

MyHeritage.com Family Pages lets you create your family's own meeting place on the Internet. Invite your family members to participate in your site, share family photos easily, post your family tree online and share it with family members, trace the family's medical history, keep track of important family events and more.

Find your ancestors, using our unique genealogy search engine, My Heritage.com Research. It is a free search engine that lets you run an aggregate search in hundreds of important genealogy databases. It does require that you register.

RootsWeb primary purpose and function of RootsWeb.com is to connect people so that they can help each other and share genealogical research. Most resources on RootsWeb.com are designed to facilitate such connections. We will be having a program later in the year on RootsWeb but briefly, here are some features.

Research on-line**Share your Research:**

Submit records you have transcribed for inclusion in our **user-contributed databases**.

Upload your family tree to the **WorldConnect Project**
Post your family surnames on the **RootsWeb Surname List**.

You can contribute to these or search them.

Communicate with Others:

Join a **mailing list**.

Post a message to a **message board**.

Add Post-em Notes to the **Social Security Death Index**, **WorldConnect Project** or other **databases**.

Build your own **genealogy website** on RootsWeb.com.

Add a link to your website using **RootsLink**.

Other Databases:

U. S. Town and County Database, helps find the county, links to other resources.

Websites include GenWeb Projects for countries around the world, not just the US.

FreeBMD is an ongoing project, the aim of which is to transcribe the Civil Registration index of births, marriages, and deaths for England and Wales for the period 1837-1983.

The USGenWeb Project is a group of volunteers working to provide free genealogy websites for every county and state in the United States. It is organized by state and then county. How much information is on the site really depends on the volunteers and coordinators, some are full of databases and links, others counties still be needing a coordinator.

For example, **Oregon** categories:

Oregon Counties: a map or list to select each county. Marion County is maintained by Bettie Wood. It has Archived databases, Biographies, Cemeteries, Census, Deaths, Family Info, Links, Look Up Volunteers, Mailing Lists, Map & Location Finders, Marriages, Military Info, Miscellaneous, Native American Research, Neighboring counties, Newspapers, Obituaries, Photos, Queries, Resources, Surnames, and Vital Records. Lots of information!

Oregon Trail and Native Americans, Oregon Genealogical & Historical Societies, Oregon Military, Oregon State Archives, Oregon Vital Records (where to find them), Oregon Pioneer Biographies and Oregon History.

Help Sites

Also listed are links to **Oregon Books & Newspapers**, **Oregon Maps & Mailing Lists**, **Oregon Tombstone Transcription Project**, and **US and World Resources**.

And that's just Oregon!

Special Projects on USGW:

The USGenWeb Archives Project has actual transcriptions of public domain records.

The USGenWeb Tombstone Transcription Project has transcription of cemeteries and links to other cemetery transcriptions.

The WorldGenWeb Project

The WorldGenWeb Project is similar to the USGenWeb, a volunteer based organization dedicated to providing genealogical and historical records and resources world-wide. Some countries have not been developed yet.

The Canada GenWeb

CanadaGenWeb.org is the "Gateway to free Canadian Genealogy". There is a listing for Province and Territory GenWebs, Projects and Research.

The Ontario GenWeb, for example, has links, Research By Topic, Research By Year, Research By Area, Submissions and Volunteers. It also lists County and District GenWebs.

Research by topic is very helpful, as it has information under *What is it?* (for example Birth Records), *How do I find it?*, *How do I use it?*, *What information does it offer?*, *What does it look like?*, *Where can I find it?*, *Is it online?*, and *Alternate Resources*.

Ancestry.com at the Oregon State Library has a good Canadian collection of censuses, birth, marriage, and death records.

TribalPages is a site to build your free family tree website online. Each private and secure website can be loaded with Photos, Charts, Reports, Maps, Relationships, Events and Stories. You can invite friends and family to view or update your site.

You can import a GEDCOM file directly into your website. You can send newsletters to family members, that include pictures and charts.
