DNA Project**

**WVGS has a DNA Project for both men and women.  
To join under WVGS:**

1. Go to the State Library URL at: <http://oregon.gov/OSL/GRES/genealogy.shtml>
2. Click on Genealogy Research on the left.
3. Click on WVGS DNA Project.
4. Click on the Family Tree DNA icon in the middle of the page.
5. Scroll to the bottom of the next page and complete the form.
6. Click CONTINUE to complete the next screen.
7. Be sure to click only once when you are done so you order just one set.

**You will receive a confirmation in your e-mail box that your order was taken. Remember: Only men can order the Y-DNA test, but both men and women can order the mtDNA.** It is cheaper to order the Y-DNA 37 marker test as it will tell you that you have a common ancestor within genealogical time for persons you match. Lesser tests (12 markers) provide information on older ancestors prior to 600 years ago. However you may wish to start small and upgrade. For the mtDNA order both the HVR1 and HVR2 panels (mtDNA plus) as this will give you the best information on your ethnic origins. Again, you can start small and upgrade, if needed.

**August Program**

Our speaker for August was **Gwen Carr**. Gwen spoke about Oregon Northwest Black Pioneers. She gave an excellent presentation, tracing African-American settlement in Oregon. The earliest recorded Black person in Oregon was Marcus Lopez who served with Robert Gray on the *Lady Washington* and was killed in Tillamook Bay. Gwen mentioned early Black settlers such as James Beckworth who was with Kit Carson and Moses Harris with Jesse Applegate.

Oregon struggled with slavery issues, declaring slavery illegal but approving Black exclusion laws. Research African-Americans in Oregon is difficult to a lack of documentation. The Oregon Northwest Black Pioneers association continues to work on research. The website is [www.oregonnorthwestblackpioneers.org](http://www.oregonnorthwestblackpioneers.org).

**Perseverance: Black Pioneers in Oregon** is the organizations recently published book, extensively researched and illustrated. The book is 280 pages, cost is \$25, available through their website.

Thank you, Gwen, for a different perspective on Oregon history with Salem examples in particular. We received many comment on the excellent presentation.

## Oregon State Library

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### Collections at the Oregon State Library

Are you at the point in your research where you want to look at **original records**? The following collections are original copies of other state records, kept in the Genealogy Annex on the second floor. **Ask the Genealogy Volunteer to retrieve them for you.**

#### State Records

- **The Public Records of the Colony of Connecticut, 1636-1776 Volumes 3 Part 1 & 2, 4, 6-11, 13-15**

The Public Records of the Colony of Connecticut, from April 1636 to October 1776" is a very extensive collection of records from the towns of Connecticut and the colonial legislature. Researchers in the nineteenth century painstakingly transcribed documents from original manuscripts and then created the pages of these books with handset type. The results were printed as a collection of fifteen volumes, totaling thousands of pages. The first volume was published in 1850 with the final volume becoming available in 1890.

These books list births, marriages, and deaths but also contain a lot more information of interest to genealogists and historians alike. "The Public Records of the Colony of Connecticut" is rich in historical, social, economic, political, and cultural data relating to the colony of Connecticut. For example, users can find information on what types of punishments were handed down to lawbreakers in 17th century Connecticut, what people were growing on their farms, and what was happening in Connecticut during the dawn of the American Revolution.

- **The Public Records of the State of Connecticut, 1776-1796 Volumes I – V, VII, VIII**

Volumes covering the Revolutionary War period include appointment of officers to militia units; acceptance of accounts; memorials by citizens who lost property during the war, etc.

- **Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors of the Revolutionary War, Volumes I – XVII**

Prepared by the Secretary of the Commonwealth, this is an indexed compilation of the records of the Massachusetts soldiers and sailors who served in

the army or navy during the Revolutionary War. This is a 17 volume series, and contains an alphabetized list of all surnames. There are over 175,000 records in this database, which give, when available, the name and age of the individual, town of residence, the date and location of enlistment, areas and length of service, date of discharge, and description of their physical features.

- **Suffolk (Massachusetts) Deeds, Volume I-VI, VII, X, XIV**

These printed editions of the first 14 volumes of manuscript records of Suffolk County deeds covering 1629-1697." Each volume contains indexes of grantors, grantees, other persons, and places. They contain original manuscript records of deeds from 1629-1886, bound into 1,706 volumes, and housed in the Suffolk County Registry of Deeds office. The materials are primarily land transactions.

- **Rhode Island Vital Records, 1636-1850, Volumes 1-21**

These **Vital Records** were obtained from various sources such as town and church records, Revolutionary rolls, and several newspapers. The first six volumes contain town vital records, arranged by county; volume 7 contains Quaker records; later volumes include church, military, and newspaper records.

- **Rhode Island Colonial Records, Volume 2-8**

These records were originally published between 1856 and 1865 in ten volumes as *Records of the Colony of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations* and *Records of the State of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations in New England*. These volumes cover over a century and a half of information on the inhabitants of the Ocean State, from its earliest settlement in 1636 until the end of the Revolutionary era in 1792. Much can be learned about the early settlers of towns, those who served in the colonial militias and during the Revolutionary War, individuals who petitioned the General Assembly for grievance, those involved in probate and court matters, persons receiving payment for service to the colony and state and much, much more.



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- **New Jersey Archives: Documents Relating to the History of the State of New Jersey, 1st Series Volumes 2-42, 2nd Series Volumes 2-5**

This set contains general data and proceedings, will abstracts, patents, deeds, newspaper abstracts, and marriages. Most volumes are individually indexed. The first ten volumes of New Jersey Archives contains the earliest records of colonial New Jersey.

- **Pennsylvania Archives**  
1st Series Volumes 1-12, 2nd Series Volumes 1-19, 3rd Series Volumes 3-30, 3rd Series Maps 1-26, 4th Series Volumes 1-12, 5th Series Volume 1-8, 6th Series Volumes 1-15, 7th Series Volumes 1-5, 8th Series Volumes 1-8, 9th Series Volumes 1-10

The Pennsylvania Archives are a 138 volume set of reference books compiling transcriptions of letters and early records relating to the colony and state of Pennsylvania. The volumes were published in nine different series between 1838 and 1935 by acts of the Pennsylvania legislature. Contents of the archives include Letters between key government figures in Pennsylvania, Papers of the Governors, Marriage Licenses issued prior to 1810, Militia and Continental Muster Rolls including French-Indian War, Revolution and War of 1812, Revolutionary Diaries, County Tax Lists (typically of the Revolutionary era), Oath's of Allegiance, Ship Lists (compiling German immigrants during 18th century), Land related records, Election returns.

- **State Papers of New Hampshire, Probate Volume I and IX**

The nine volumes (31-39) of the *New Hampshire State Papers* include the *Probate Records* for most of the provincial period. Wills for each period are published in full and where possible, are accompanied by related documents. We have only Volume 1 (31) and 9 (39).

### Civil War

- **Report of the adjutant general of the state of Illinois , 1861-1866, Volumes 1-8**

The following histories of Illinois Civil War regiments and units originate from the volumes of the nine volume publication, Report of the Adjutant General of the State of Illinois (1900-1902). The histories, some written shortly after the war's end, are the work of numerous authors throughout the intervening years. Includes rosters of officers and enlisted men, 1861-1866 and The original Muster and Descriptive Rolls.

- **Report of the adjutant general of the state of Indiana , 1861-1865, Volumes 1-8**

These volumes contain detailed information on the Indiana volunteer units. Volumes 2–8 contain rosters of officers and men by regiment and give the soldier's name, with date, place, and cause of death in the war.

- **Report of the adjutant general of the state of Iowa , 1861-1865, Volumes 1-6**

*Roster and Record of Iowa Soldiers in the War of the Rebellion: Together with Historical Sketches of Volunteer Organizations, 1861–1866.* This book provides each soldier's name, rank, and often the date and place he was mustered out and histories of the regiments. The soldiers are listed by company but not alphabetically. Volume 6 has names of soldiers from later wars, as well.

- **History of Pennsylvania Volunteers, 1861-1865, Volumes 1-5**

Pennsylvania Civil War regimental rosters, regimental histories, POW lists, and regimental losses. Transcripts of the preface, regimental histories and muster rolls of regiments. Each of the following regiments has the history of the organization and service of the regiment followed by muster rolls for the Field and Staff Officers, Regimental Band (if any), the Companies from Company A to Company K, and Unassigned Men (if any).

by **LYON GARDINER TYLER**

Published 1915, in New York, by the Lewis Historical Publishing Company. This work is in five volumes. The fourth and fifth volumes are numbered as if they were one, and the index to both is in the fifth volume.

I am just starting work on transcribing these volumes. Address comments to me, Fred Spradlin, [fspradlin@earthlink.net](mailto:fspradlin@earthlink.net) via email. I do not intend mimicking the look of the books. In my original, each page has two columns, which might make reading a long biography cumbersome. Each volume has its own index of the subjects of the biographies. My approach will include transcribing the index first, and then add links to the biographies as their transcription is posted.

Volumes I and II convey the history of the state, through the biographies, up to 1861. Volume III brings that up to 1915.

Volumes IV and V are supplemental, and reputed to have been prepared by "staff writers" sometimes from data provided by the families.

**WARNING!** ... I've been informed that there are significant "errors in fact" to be found in the biographies included in these volumes. Apparently, Tyler did none of the research into the facts, but merely supervised the preparation of the final results. Perhaps this should be put into the category of the popular "Heritage Books" of contributory history ???

**Should you use flour to read a gravestone?**

**Dick Eastman weighs in:**

William Jerry (Champ) Champion has created a YouTube video that shows a quick and easy way to read and photograph grave markers that are worn or have become discolored. In years past, genealogists have used a variety of materials to improve legibility of tombstones, from shaving cream to chalk and a variety of other materials. However, most of those methods reportedly damage the stone to some extent. Many of the materials are abrasive and also may leave chemicals behind that cause long-term damage. However, Champ claims the use of flour creates no damage.

Not everyone agrees. Some so-called "experts" will tell you that flour is harmful because it can penetrate into small pores of the stone, and, when wet, the flour will swell and can cause flaking of the stone. Some also claim that flour contains yeast, which encourages the growth of lichens and micro-organisms that can then live and grow in the stone, causing expansion and cracking. Technically, flour does not contain yeast when first ground. However, yeast floats in the air most everywhere and may land on flour, where it may flourish.

I do question the qualifications of all these so-called "experts." I therefore turned to the Association for Gravestone Studies' web site as this is the nationally-recognized expert organization. I'd believe whatever the Association for Gravestone Studies says. The Association's web site at <http://www.gravestonestudies.org/faq.htm> has a long list of things to never do, and it cautions, "Don't use shaving cream, chalk, graphite, dirt, or other concoctions in an attempt to read worn inscriptions." Flour is not mentioned although it might qualify as an "other concoction."

**Blue Earth County Historical Society, Minnesota**  
**www.bechshistory.com/**

Blue Earth County is located in southern Minnesota. Mankato is its county seat. The Blue Earth County Historical Society (BECHS) has made a number of indexes available on its website. You can view a collection of county photographs that have been digitized and made available by the Minnesota Digital Library. The originals of the 1,426 images are part of the BECHS photograph collection. Cemetery Index Burials in seventy-eight cemeteries have been transcribed and included in this alphabetical index. It contains only the full name of the deceased. Complete information is available in the BECHS Research Center in book form.

- **Marriage Index** This is an alphabetical index to marriage announcements published in the Mankato Free Press in 1947 and 1948.
- **Minnesota State Census** This database comprises an alphabetical index to the Minnesota State Census of 1865 for Blue Earth County.
- **Obituary Index** Like the Marriage Index above, this database indexes obituaries published in the Mankato Free Press in 1947 and 1948.
- **Social Notes** This database contains indexes to articles published in Blue Earth County newspapers from 1875 to the 1940s. These articles have been clipped from the original papers, and are in scrapbooks at the Historical Society. They have been indexed by town and are listed in chronological order. The towns covered in these scrapbooks are Beauford, Cambria, Caroline, Ceresco, Cray, Cream, Danville, Decoria, Eagle Lake, and Garden City.
- **Wills Index** This database provides an alphabetical index to wills that were donated to the society. It indexes only Blue Earth County residents. The wills date from 1858 to 1973. Researchers can request a copy of a will for a fee.
