

## RADIO SCRIPTS

### Public Service Announcement # 1

***Where and how you build will impact whether or not your home will survive a wildfire.***

Each year the Oregon fire service fight wildfires threatening property, homes and communities. Reduce your risk. Fire-resistant structures and landscaping make a big difference. Use fire-resistant materials when building or remodeling. For more information contact \_\_\_\_\_ (FIRE DEPARTMENT or other community contact AND PHONE NUMBER).

### Public Service Announcement #2

***Do you know what part of your home will catch fire first?*** The most vulnerable point on your home is the roof. Use fire-resistant roofing and siding when building or remodeling your home if you live in an area vulnerable to wildfire. Screen vent openings to stop embers from igniting your home. ### Public Service Announcement #3

***Will your home survive a wildfire?*** Increase the chance your home will survive by taking a few simple steps such as screening vents with 1/8" mesh to keep embers out, clean gutters, remove dead leaves, branches and debris close to your home. ### Public Service Announcement #4

***Your fire department would like you to curb your outdoor burning.*** Debris burning causes wildfires. This spring control your urge to burn debris. Use an alternative; composting, mulching and recycling will enhance your yard and make landscaping easier. Consider these alternatives to burning. It may save you from paying the costs of a wildfire or having to find somewhere else to live. ### Public Service Announcement #5

***Wildfires can be deadly, especially where homes are close to grass and forest lands.***

Protect your home and family by clearing and maintaining a survivable space around your home and other buildings. Haul away burnable materials such as dead grass and leaves. Prune your trees. Move firewood and other materials away from the building. Make sure street and road signs are easy for firefighters to see should they need to find your home.
