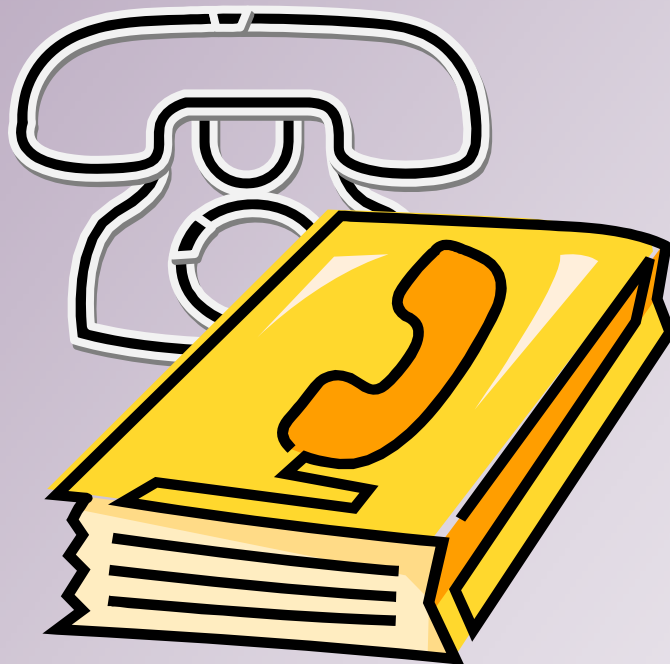

SERVICES

BRS Level 4 Residential: Belloni Boys Ranch and the Wineva Johnson Center for Girls serve youth in separate, gender-specific facilities. Referrals are accepted statewide.

The program provides residential treatment in a structured environment and assists youth in developing coping skills, achieving a greater sense of competency and responsibility, and improving self-esteem. The program provides structure, support, and guidance to help youth internalize appropriate behavior. Services include drug and alcohol education, male sex offender treatment, on-site alternative school, as well as individual, group and family counseling. Vocational services are also provided.

Referrals should include Reformation Plan, ERASOR, OYA RNA, recent psychological evaluation (within last 12 months), court orders, juvenile records, social and family histories, and conditions of parole/probation.

Youth accepted into this program must meet BRS requirements and will require BRS authorization prior to placement.

SERVICES

BRS Level 4 : The Pettygrove program provides evidenced based treatment services to adjudicated females, ages 13-18, in need of residential services as prevention to a higher level of care or to provide for transition services from a more secure setting. Youth receive structured, 24-hour supervision in a semi-secure setting, with the goal of returning home or becoming independent. Youth can attend a DART school for diploma completion. The Program offers treatment and services that are developmentally informed and assesses and treats the girls in a holistic manner. There are six domains in which the Program organizes its interventions. The six domains are: Physical, Spiritual, Relational, Intellectual, Emotional and Sexual. These domains are focused on in multiple ways: through daily living within the residential setting, formal and informal treatment groups, recreation, referrals to community programs, family/individual counseling, and through individual treatment planning and case management. Therapeutic groups include: Thinking for a Change, Seeking Safety, Girls Circle, A.R.T , and Power Source. Youth are referred to mental health and drug and alcohol assessments within their first 30-days and may access services as needed. Pettygrove

offers a wide range of recreational and cultural activities. Youth accepted into this program must meet BRS requirements and will require BRS authorization prior to placement. Referrals must include a Reformation Plan/ OYA Referral Case Plan, ERASOR, OYA RNA, psychological and/or psychiatric evaluation (if available), social/family history, placement history, and treatment recommendations.

BRS Level 3 Pettygrove: Phase 1 services will be provided in the Pettygrove program facility or in a proctor setting. Phase 2 will be when youth actually move into their own housing in the community, paying their own expenses. Clients will be in a separate bedroom and receive different services and privileges than BRS 4 clients when placed at the Pettygrove house. This program is designed to help youth successfully transition back into the community living independently.

SERVICES

BRS Level 4 Residential: This program provides structured, supervised residential services primarily to Hispanic/Latino youth who may be gang afflicted. Contractor provides bilingual, bicultural staff for Latino youth and families. The program offers holistic treatment and emphasizes family involvement. Individual, group, and family counseling is provided. A variety of public and alternative educational programs are available to meet individual needs.

Youth accepted into this program must meet BRS requirements and will require BRS authorization.

Prior to placement: Referrals should include Reformation Plan, OYA RNA, previous treatment history and recommendations and, if available social and family history, recent psychological evaluation, educational records, and immunization record.

SERVICES

Compass: This program is a proctor model with a focus on transition, and provides BRS Basic Services to a variety of treatment populations including youth with substance abusing behaviors, mental health issues and some gang involvement. Compass accepts youth transitioning into the community from YCFs, other residential placements, or those needing placement with an increased level of supervision and support. This program is designed to help youth successfully transition back into the community, via either living independently or reunification with a family member. Services provided to all youth include: BRS documentation, individual, family and group counseling, educational support, vocational support, and skill building curriculum.

Service plans are tailored to meet individual needs. However, the primary treatment focus will be on relapse prevention, offense specific aftercare and independent living skill acquisition.

Youth accepted into this program must meet BRS requirements and will require BRS authorization prior to placement. Referrals should include Comprehensive Case Plan, OYA RNA, previous treatment history and recommendation and, if available, please include social and family history, and recent psychological evaluation. Statewide referrals are accepted.

BRS Proctor - Independent Girls Options: This residential proctor model program accepts youth transitioning into the community from Oak Creek, other residential placements, or those needing placement with an increased level of supervision and support. This program is designed to help youth successfully transition back into the community, via either living independently or reunification with a family member. Services provided to all youth include: BRS documentation, individual, family and group counseling, educational support, vocational support, and skill building curriculum.

Services for medication management are obtained through community resources and monitored by CCPC staff. Services for drug and alcohol are accessed through community providers.

Youth accepted into this program must meet BRS requirements and will require BRS authorization prior to placement. Referrals should include Comprehensive Case Plan, OYA RNA, previous treatment history and recommendation and, if available, please include social and family history, and recent psychological evaluation. Statewide referrals are accepted.

SERVICES

BRS Level 4 Residential/Proctor: Lithia Springs Program provides evidenced based treatment services to 13 through 18 year old males and females in a group living or foster family setting. The program is based on family participation, cognitive-behavior interventions and social learning theories. The multidisciplinary team includes masters level mental health therapists, alcohol & drug counselors, trained educators and direct care staff who come together to provide an integrated treatment approach. Lithia Springs Program serves primarily youth offenders, and therefore, it provides programming that emphasizes cognitive behavioral strategies that are proven to be most effective with this population.

Cognitive behavioral approaches are delivered by trained staff members who understand anti-social thinking, behaving and the need for social learning. Interventions used by the program are designed to target criminogenic needs and behaviors associated with recidivism. These include changing anti-

social feelings, attitudes and values, increasing self-control, self-management and problem solving skills, improving skills in interpersonal conflict resolution, promoting positive attitudes and performances regarding work and education, addressing problems related to alcohol and drug abuse, resolving emotional problems, and relapse prevention.

Youth receive treatment and education at an on-site alternative school during the day. Lithia Springs Program is also the home to Mission Candle Factory, a small on-site manufacturing business. The factory provides a sheltered vocational experience for youth who need to develop basic job skills to be employable in the community and for youth who are not yet at a level of trust in their program to pursue paid employment off-site. Individual and group mental health and substance abuse counseling, employment experience, and skill building activities are provided onsite as well. In the proctor setting, proctor parents are considered a part of the treatment team and participate in treatment planning and progress reviews.

Youth accepted into these programs must meet BRS requirements and will require BRS authorization prior to placement. Referrals should include Case Plan and/or Reformation Plan, ERASOR (if applicable) OYA RNA, previous treatment history and recommendation and, if available, social and family history, current alcohol & drug assessment, and recent psychological evaluation (within 6-12 months). The length of the residential programs is approximately 10 – 12 months and the length of the proctor program is approximately 8 – 10 months.

SERVICES

BRS Level 5 Residential: Eastern Oregon Academy provides Behavioral Rehabilitation Services (BRS), within a staff secure residential treatment facility, for male adolescents from the ages of twelve to twenty-one. Within the BRS program, EOA provides such services as therapeutic work experience, independent living training, milieu therapy, cultural activities, therapeutic recreational activities, transition/aftercare planning and evidenced based skills training Aggression Replacement Training (ART), Dialectical Behavioral Training (DBT), Changing Offender Behavior (COB), conflict resolution, etc. EOA also partners with various community teams to ensure that each youth's academic, medical and mental health needs are met.

Youth residing at Eastern Oregon Academy typically have failed to thrive in a less restrictive setting and may have a long history of social, emotional and behavioral difficulties. To include but not limited to; being physically and verbally aggressive towards others, running away, problems with authority, lack of pro-social skills, depression, poor conflict resolution skills, a lack of trust in adults, feelings of hopelessness or helplessness, impulsivity, and poor interpersonal relationships.

BRS Level 3&4 Specialized Behavioral Transition/Independent Living: Eastern Oregon Academy's Transition/Independent Living program provides Behavioral Rehabilitation Services (BRS), Vocational Training and Independent Living programming for male adolescents from the ages of twelve to twenty-five. Within the BRS program, EOA provides such services as therapeutic work experience, independent living training, milieu therapy, cultural activities, therapeutic recreational activities, transition/aftercare planning and evidenced based skills training Aggression Replacement Training (ART), Dialectical Behavioral Training (DBT), Changing Offender Behavior (COB), conflict resolution, etc. The Vocational Training and Independent Living program provide vocational training in the areas of carpentry, general maintenance, restaurant/culinary, and landscaping. Youth are also able to obtain their GED or participate in a credit recovery program. EOA partners with various community teams to ensure that each youth's academic, medical and mental health needs are met.

BRS Level 3-Buckman Annex II: The Buckman Annex II Responsible Living and Community Transition Program is a 120 day program with a 90 day aftercare component, consisting of two phase. Clients who successfully graduate from other residential programs now have the opportunity to experience life on their own prior to achieving complete independence. The RLP will be used to accommodate up to 6 clients who have completed the core of level 4 programs and have successfully demonstrated that they are ready to actively practice living on their own. Tenants will have access for support and minimal supervision from the Annex II staff while they reside at the RLP. One of the purposes for the RLP is to separate from residential, or Institutional living, and to demonstrate their ability to live a successful, healthy independent life.

There are 2 Phases to the program: Phase 1 of the RLP is a setting where the tenants will actively cook, clean, pay bills and maintain their daily routines all with aide from the Annex II staff.

The 1st Phase is divided into 3 stages. The 1st stage is the Orientation period, for two weeks there will be no outside activity other than job search and work.

The 2nd stage will be the Maintenance Stage and can last for 4 months; during this time the client will demonstrate their ability to maintain themselves safely in the community.

The 3rd stage will be Transition to Independence, during this time the client will be responsible for apartment searching and reporting to staff how they have been using their community time.

It is the intent that this model provides a number of benefits: an additional layer of practical learning, a referral source for the client's future apartment placement, a layer of community safety, and an insight for the individual who is moving towards community transition and ultimately, independence.

The final piece of the program is called Phase 2 and will consist of community contact with the client by RLP staff. In Phase 2 of the program clients have moved into their own apartment and will have access to support services from the Annex II staff for approximately 3 months this will be determined on a case plan basis, and will consist of home visits, weekly reviews, weekly group, and daily monitoring of the client.

Mission Statement: Opening doors to new possibilities by strengthening children and families and improving communities.

The Next Door Treatment Services: provide quality care, treatment and education by means of a well trained professional staff that embraces the core values and incorporates the best evidence based practices in meeting the needs of youth offenders and their families.

The goal is that youth will be encouraged and motivated to reach their highest level of ability, success and independence and return to the community. To guide and direct the implementation of this mission and the treatment process **five core values** have been incorporated into every aspect of the programs: Safety, Respect, Responsibility/ Accountability, Competency/Skill Development and Helpfulness.

BRS Proctor/Day Treatment and Alternative School - Klahre House: A residential treatment program offering day treatment and educational services in a proctor setting. Individual, group and family treatment and skill building are provided by qualified professional staff and Proctor Parents. The program provides a highly structured, therapeutic environment that emphasizes individual treatment planning, experiential growth, academic progress and behavior change as well as support for the families of the youth in care.

Assessment and Service Planning: All youth are assessed to determine; medical, education, behavioral treatment, mental health, family, spiritual, cultural and social needs at the time of intake. The youth, his/her family and the appropriate treatment partners, agency representatives and significant persons who will take part in treatment are invited and encouraged to participate in the development of a holistic service plan within 45 days of intake. The Master Service Plan will establish goals based on the assessment and input from the members of the team and reviewed every 90 days by the team with progress being noted and changes made as necessary.

Education: An on-site fully accredited alternative school provides educational opportunities that may lead to a high school diploma or a GED. Youth may also attend public school or the community college. Youth at the Klahre House attend structured classes where they obtain credit in Math, Science, History, Language Arts, Reading, Physical Education, Social Studies, Art, Computer Resources and other electives. Youth are provided an opportunity to work at their own pace and level of ability while being encouraged to be successful.

Day Treatment: A variety of treatment groups and individual counseling and skill building activities are provided based on identified criminogenic factors or issues that have resulted in the youth's placement in this level of care. All treatment services are evidence based practices that have been found to reduce recidivism. Issues of alcohol and substance abuse, sexually aggressive behaviors, and other socially challenging behaviors are addressed. Each child is also assessed for mental health issues and appropriate therapy and medication management provided. Most youth receive about 3 hours of counseling and skill building in the day treatment environment every day.

Sexually Aggressive Youth Treatment: Youth entering the program in needs of specialized sex offender treatment will undergo an initial evaluation which will include a risk assessment and a polygraph. All youth in the sex offender program will be assessed on a regular basis to insure their progression in treatment. The current treatment consists of individual, family and group counseling and treatment utilizing the best practices available. The average length of stay of youth in the sex offender program is currently about 14 months. Youth found to present to high a risk to the community will be referred to a higher level of care.

Mental Health: Each youth is assessed for mental health issues at intake. The onsite therapist, (Qualified Mental Health Professional) is available to complete a thorough mental health assessment and provide outpatient individual, group and family therapy if determined necessary. Psychiatric care and medication management is provided by the contracted child psychiatrist MD. Youth who enter the program that have a current prescription for a psychiatric disorder, (DSM IV-R), will be seen by the doctor as soon as possible for psychiatric medication review. Youth who are not currently on medication may be referred based on the therapist's recommendation.

Proctor Homes: Proctor Parents are highly trained and professional treatment providers who work collaboratively as an essential member of the treatment team providing services to program youth and their families. Proctor parents provide supervision, skill building, academic assistance, care and support that encourage the change process. The heart of the Klahre House Program is the proctor parents' commitment and relationship to behavioral that change may be difficult given the youth's past life situations. Proctor parents receive 40 hrs of initial training prior to providing care for youth and participate in monthly trainings and support meetings lead by the NDI Proctor Home certification and support staff.

BRS Youth accepted into the Klahre House program must meet BRS requirements and will require BRS authorization prior to placement. Referral materials should include appropriate OYA documentation including the JJIS generated plan, previous treatment history and recommendations, recent psychological or mental health evaluation if available, current medication, a court order along with the current parole/probation requirements. It is very important that youth also have an identified after care resource provided at the time if Intake.

BRS Transition Klahre House: This program provides BRS Basic Services in a proctor model with a focus on transition, to a variety of treatment populations including youth with sexual offense and substance abusing behaviors.

The primary treatment focus will be on relapse prevention, offense specific aftercare and independent living skill acquisition.

The OCP Monitor Program focuses on youth who have a history of chronic law violations, multiple adjustment and behavioral/ emotional difficulties, including family problems, poor peer relations, school failure, minimal school performance, low self-esteem and mental health concerns. Services provided focus on close supervision and monitoring of program youth, including daily collection of data to track youth progress toward treatment targets, monitoring of school performance and peer relationships, implementation of an individualized behavior management plan in the MTFC Foster Home, skills training, counseling, daily contact with MTFC parents, intensive transition services with aftercare resources, and mental health services as needed. MTFC Foster Parents are supervised and supported to provide youth with a supportive reinforcing

placement where youth are encouraged to develop recreational and work skills, and positive interpersonal habits.

The Program is based on 20 years of research and was selected as one of 10 national Blueprint Programs by the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention in 1998. The OCP Monitor Program / MTFC model was featured in reports on Violence Prevention and Children's Mental Health programs by the United States Surgeon General in 2001.

SERVICES

BRS Level 4 Residential: This program provides services to pregnant and parenting females aged 12 to 18, with infants and children up to three years permitted to live with the mother. Available services include anger management, grief and loss, depression management, D&A outpatient services, and relapse prevention, sex abuse, domestic violence, Measure 11, life skills, independent living skills, mental health therapy, psychiatric services, and parenting classes. Average length of stay is one year. Youth who complete the residential component are eligible for transition services, including on-campus apartment living and independent living services. Mentor services are available to young women in the community for up to one year. Educational services include special education, high school completion or GED study, followed by community college, vocational training, or job experience for those who qualify.

Referral must include a copy of the youth's Reformation Plan or case plan, OYA RNA, ERASOR, previous treatment history, social and family history, psychological evaluation if available, court information, and conditions of parole/probation. The program suggests that referrals be made as early in the pregnancy as possible. Babies born to mothers who were in the program during the prenatal period are usually healthier.

BRS Level 3: Parenting program at White Shield Center is a residential treatment facility (located in NW Portland) for teen mothers, ages 12 to 21 and their child(ren). During the year our clients are here at White Shield, they receive an array of services such as, a safe and healthy living environment for them and their children, continued education, counseling and group therapy, job preparation, life skills training, parenting classes and much more. Over the years we have become more and more aware, that while our clients are here, they thrive in this safe and structured environment, but once they leave, many tend to slip through the cracks as they re-enter the communities they came from. In order to continue our support to these young women, who are working hard to become independent, healthy and productive citizens of our community, we have established an aftercare program that tracks them and helps to bridge the gaps to living successful lives.

BRS 3 Transitioning to Independence

Program Information:

Program Overview & Concepts

The BRS 3 *Transitioning to Independence* Programs are intended to be actual “practice” independent living programs, providing youth the opportunity to further develop and demonstrate proficiency at skills learned while in OYA facilities, camps, residential and proctor programs, to support successful transition to independence. The program will be delivered in two phases, described in more detail below. Phase 1 will be the BRS program, with OYA buying room and board plus services as youth find jobs, save money, and learn and practice skills. Phase 2 will be when youth actually move into their own housing in the community, paying their own expenses. OYA will continue to pay the program to provide on-going skills and monitoring as needed.

Programs:

Boys & Girls Aid (Portland):

One Phase 1 bed for a female will be housed at the Pettygrove program in NW Portland. Pettygrove will have Two Phase 2 slots. Program Contact: Michelle Ottaviano 503-542-2365, mottaviano@boysandgirlsaid.org

Referrals:

Criteria:

Youth appropriate for Transitioning to Independence Programs:
Are between the ages of 17.5 and 25 (youth will have to be 18 to go into Phase 2)
Are in OYA custody with a minimum of six (6) months before custody terminates, and
Have completed an OYA YCF program, Camp program, or BRS 4, 5 or Proctor program

Referral and Screening Process:

Programs have been asked to prepare information about the program for youth to review. This information could be in the form of a booklet with photos, a video, a website, or other similar materials. The information will address:

- Description of the program
- Description of the community (demographics, rural, urban, educational, employment, and recreational opportunities)
- Description of the living arrangement possibilities
- Description of the program rules/policies
- Criteria for program graduation/termination

Working closely with his/her JPPO, the youth offender will select program options based on geographic location and other criteria important to the youth offender. It is most desirable for a youth offender to select a program in a community where he/she would like to continue living after graduation from program and termination from OYA custody. Alternatively, if a youth is currently graduating from a BRS 4 or Proctor program, and the Provider also has a BRS 3 program, it may be desirable for the youth to continue with the same provider. The options should be discussed between the JPPO, the youth, and the provider to help the youth make the most appropriate choice.

JPPO's with youth ready to refer to independent living should contact the available programs to get their information, Program Applications and a list of materials for referral packets.

The youth offender will need to complete the Program Application(s), which will be submitted along with the referral packet from the OYA JPPO.

Programs should contact JPPO's within 5 working days of receiving the Referral Packet to let you know if the youth is appropriate for a screening. If appropriate, a screening can be scheduled. Important points about the screening are:
Youth offender should be prepared with questions for the program.

Preferably, the screening interview will be conducted at the Contractor's program site and include a tour of the community if the youth offender is not familiar with the area
Overnight visits are desirable if they can be arranged
It is appropriate to ask a Provider to conduct an initial visit with a youth offender at the youth correctional facility and attend a Multi-Disciplinary Team (MDT) meeting when it would be helpful for the screening process
Video screenings may be conducted when practical for JPPO and/or youth.

Admission Requirements:

The following **must** be submitted as part of the referral packet **OR** brought with the youth on the day of intake:

BRS Authorization

Youth ID, including photo ID, birth certificate and social security card (Youth will be expected to begin job hunting immediately. It will not be acceptable for youth to enter BRS 3 Transitioning to Independence programs and then have to wait to get ID before they can begin working. Intake will have to be postponed until the ID is available)

OYA Case Plan

OYA Risk/Needs Assessment and Graph

JPPO's or a person who can represent them must be present at intake

ERASOR if applicable

Specific Program Requirements:

Transitional Service Plan: Programs are required to develop a Transitional Service Plan (TSP), instead of an Initial Service Plan and Master Service Plan like the BRS 4, 5, and Proctor Programs. The TSP must be started on the first day of placement. This plan should be youth driven, with guidance and suggestions from the JPPO and the program.

The TSP should:

Be strength-based

Identify sources of support

Address independent living skills

Address criminogenic risk/reduction

Addresses behaviors needing remediation

Address on-going treatment needs that will be provided by outside providers

Identify clear, measurable short-term goals (no more than one month duration)

Identify specific tasks/services related to short term goals

Include services program will deliver and identify person(s) responsible for task/service

Include tasks youth offender must complete

Include plan for supervision, free time, check ins, structure, and requirements to move to lower supervision level

Include a plan for any home visits that will occur

Identify payment source, if applicable

Independent Living Assessment: An independent living assessment must be completed on or before the first day of placement so that an immediate Transitional Service Plan can be developed. The program may ask the JPPO to help facilitate this prior to intake. Most programs are using the Casey Independent Living Assessment, which youth may complete on-line.

Youth Support Persons: As youth transition to independence in the community, their support system will transition from being mostly professionals to family and friends in the community. As preparation for moving into a *Transitioning to Independence* program, youth should identify the

people that he/she wants to involve in planning and support. Support people should include those who will have a continuing natural relationship with the youth offender after he/she is terminated from OYA custody. JPPO's should ask youth to submit this information for approval. These people should then be invited to participate in planning meetings with the youth.

Transition Facilitators: When a youth is admitted to a *Transitioning to Independence* program, the program will assign a transition facilitator. The transition facilitator's role may include:

Assist youth offender to identify short and long-term goals

Assist youth offender to develop a plan for pursuing those goals

Identify resources that will assist and support youth offender

Emphasize family and other natural supports

Coordinate formal "helpers"

Communicate youth offender's goals and plans

Oversee implementation of changes to the plan

Track progress across goals

Teach skills of goal setting, planning, resource identification, engagement, and enactment that will help youth offenders lead planful adult lives

Act as counselor

Act as advocate

Service Planning Process

1B Intake Planning Meeting:

Occurs on day of admission,

Includes youth offender, transition facilitator, OYA JPPO and other support persons present as available and appropriate (facility, previous residential placement, family and others as applicable).

Ongoing Service Planning and Transitional Service Plan Review:

Transitional Service Plan will be reviewed and updated monthly in youth offender/support team meetings. It is very important for PO's to be present at these meetings. Video meetings may be scheduled when more convenient. Provider will submit a brief written summary of these meetings, updated TSP, summary of youth's progress and service hours delivered to the JPPO within 5 days following the meeting.

Program Phases:

Phase 1: Practicing for Independence: BRS Authorization Required

Anticipated Duration: This will vary for each youth, depending on their level of readiness. Some youth may come from a BRS 4 program such as the Haag Home where they have already been working and have money saved. They may only need a short time in Phase 1, while they save more money and find an apartment. Other youth, such as youth coming from an OYA facility, may need more time to learn how to function in the community, to obtain employment, and save money for an apartment. We have estimated that youth will spend 4 – 6 months in Phase 1. Any stays longer than 6 months need to be approved in writing by OYA Community Resources. To obtain the exception, send an email to the assigned Community Resources Program Analyst explaining the need, at least one month prior to the 6 month date.

Program Provides:

- Room and board in structured, supervised setting
- 24 hour staff crisis intervention/support
- Support to youth offender in saving money and planning for independence

- Skills training services in areas related to independent living needs and continued reduction of criminogenic risk/need factors
- Opportunities to practice skills in real situations
- Opportunities to practice decision-making
- Assistance in accessing treatment services (mental health, drug and alcohol, sex offender) through Oregon Health Plan or youth offender's own resources
- Coordination of monthly reviews with youth offender and support team to determine progress and goals for the following month
- Clear individualized criteria for movement to Phase 2, with stable employment and money saved as the minimum requirements for Phase 1 graduation

Phase 1 Service Authorization and Payment:

Services will be entered in JJIS and approved through the service verification process as with all other residential services. The services in JJIS are simply called "BRS 3."

Phase 2: Transition to Independence

Anticipated Duration:

- Will vary based on youth need level, with a general guideline of 6 months
- Will be reviewed monthly based on youth progress and goal achievement

Program Provides:

- Support to youth offender in paying own living expenses in community housing
- Continued monitoring based on need
- Continued skills training based on service needs
- 24 hour staff crisis intervention/support
- Coordination of monthly reviews with youth offender and support team to determine progress and goals for following month
- Assistance in accessing treatment services through community providers or youth offender's own resources
- Regular visits to the housing site by support staff
- Daily telephone contact with high-risk youth offenders
- Availability to assist with difficulties or situations with youth offender's employer
- Regular contact with landlords or resident managers by support staff
- Weekly support or "problem-solving" groups for youth offenders living independently
- Clear criteria for completion, including determination that housing is stable
- Support to youth offender in demonstrating stability to maintain independently in community.

Other Program Components:

- Cognitive-based programming focusing on relapse prevention and more sophisticated practice opportunities for skills already acquired in OYA YCF or higher level BRS program
- Youth offenders shall be incrementally prepared for independent living while in a supported environment by reducing rules and structure and increasing responsibilities and autonomy (*for example: phase out of level systems, drop curfews, expect youth offender to perform own daily living tasks and assume increasing financial responsibility*).
- Community service element – framed to youth offenders as "giving back to the community"
- Incorporate training and use of technology into offender services. Examples include monitoring youth offender finances through on-line access to account, using daily planners available on cell phones, on-line support meetings or private group blog, and providing technology training for youth offenders

- Family involvement at whatever level family is willing and capable of being
- Crisis/relapse management. Each youth offender will have a crisis/safety plan as part of their transition plan. This will be reviewed and updated with them regularly to anticipate high risk situations. As problems and situations occur, decisions will be made between the youth, the JPPO and the transition facilitator about the best plan for intervention or consequences. Youth offenders must be held accountable, at the same time, youth must be allowed to experience natural consequences when possible. There may be times when youth offenders will need to return temporarily to a more restrictive setting.
- Begin to normalize social interactions. Youth offenders in Phase 1 will have to abide by rules of OYA and program regarding friendships and social interactions, which are necessarily restrictive because of OYA's and the Contractor's responsibility and liability for the youth offender's and the community's safety. A major incentive for youth offenders to move to Phase 2 and transition into their own community housing is the ability to function more normally as long as they continue to abide by the rules of their probation or parole. Youth offenders in Phase 2 will be considered to be living independently in the community rather than in a "program".
- Medication management.
 - Phase 1: Contractor is responsible for administering medications, following OYA and DHS Licensing rules.
 - Phase 2: Youth may gradually be given responsibility for managing their own medications, depending on level of responsibility and personal issues with medication. Medication management should be a written part of a youth offender's Transitional Service Plan.

Phase 2 Service Authorization and Payment:

Services for Phase 2 will be authorized similarly to Community Reintegration Services, by using a *Transitioning to Independence Phase 2 Service Authorization Voucher*, which should be completed and signed by the JPPO at each 30 day TSP review meeting. At the end of each month, programs will submit a *Transitioning to Independence Phase 2 Activity Log* to the JPPO for approval. The JPPO should use the same process as is used for Community Reintegration services to enter the services in JJIS and verify for billing. The difference is that you will only need to enter the total number of hours, not the breakdown of individual services, as these services will all be paid at the same rate. Services will be found in JJIS under "*Transition to Independence Phase 2.*"

BRS 3 Step Down

A. GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF PROGRAM:

Contractor shall provide continuing residential services to youth who have been in BRS Enhanced, BRS Basic or BRS Beginning Transition services but who are ready to practice acquired pro-social skills in community settings with less structure.

B. PROGRAM CATEGORY:

Behavior Rehabilitation Services – Level 3

C. POPULATION TO BE SERVED:

The Contractor shall offer services to male youth offenders who have the following characteristics:

are between the ages of 12 and 25 with a preferred age range of 12-18;

These youth may not be eligible for independent living services; and

youth who are ready for graduated practice in the community and continue to need program support.

D. MINIMUM DIRECT CARE STAFFING LEVELS (based upon a 14 bed facility):

None - Proctor Program

E. MINIMUM WEEKLY BRS SERVICE LEVEL REQUIREMENTS

The Contractor shall offer 7 hours of counseling and skill building per week for each youth offender, based on the Service Plan, to include at a minimum:

1 hour of either individual counseling or skill building;

5 ½ hours of individual or group counseling, skill building or consultation; and

½ hour social environment support or parent training.

F. SPECIAL PROGRAM DEFINITIONS:

For purposes of this Program only, the following paragraph f is added to Section 1.2.10, entitled

“ Behavior Rehabilitation Services – Definitions”:

f. Social Environment Support: Support, face to face or by phone, provided to the youth offender and his/her social network (e.g., family, antisocial and pro-social peers in the community, neighborhood hangouts, school and/or job). This can involve assisting youth offenders in developing trusting relationships with responsible people in the community who are in a position to exert a positive influence.

BRS Level 3 Shelter Assessment & Evaluation: This program serves boys and girls, ages 11-17, in need of staff secure residential services and/or to provide Individualized Service Plans to youth requiring stabilization and assessment services. The program provides an environment for youth that cannot presently live safely in the community to receive services aimed at developing personal responsibility, accountability, and skills development, and to provide opportunities to develop a case plan for future services.

Youth receive structured 24-hour supervision in a staff secure setting, with anticipated length of stay of 30-90 days. The aftercare goal is for the youth to transition to a longer term residential or foster/familial placement. The Shelter Program is designed around an evidence-based cognitive-behavioral restructuring model, a model proven highly effective in reducing juvenile recidivism. This model educates youth of the connection between their thoughts, attitudes, and emotions to their behaviors; to identify "thinking barriers" and substitute responsible thinking, and to increase pro-social thinking and skills through modeling and role-play practices. Each youth accepted into the Shelter Program is assigned a counselor who assesses the youth's individual needs based on the Juvenile Crime Prevention Risk Assessment and/or the Oregon Youth Authority's Risk/Needs Assessment. An individualized service plan is created for each youth in the specific risk areas targeting Attitudes, Values, and Beliefs; Substance Use; Family Functioning, Behavior Issues, Peer and other Relationships, and School Issues. Each youth is given specific goals to strive for during their time in

program. As needed, a Mental Health Therapist provides psycho-social assessments and a Substance Abuse Counselor provides Drug & Alcohol Assessments to facilitate placement and transition to residential programs or community settings after youth leave the Shelter Program. The Shelter Program utilizes evidence-based curriculum, including Thinking, Feeling, Behaving, Aggression Replacement Training (ART), Efficacy, Skill-Streaming, Charting a New Course, and the Change Company's Interactive Journals. Additionally, youth attend school, have daily recreational activities, and, as applicable, also have weekly counseling sessions with a Mental Health Specialist and/or weekly individual and group counseling (Pathways curriculum) with a Certified Substance Abuse Counselor.
