CHAPTER	

AN ACT

Relating to revenue; creating new provisions; amending ORS 319.020, 319.330 and 836.055 and section 7, chapter 700, Oregon Laws 2015; repealing sections 6 and 8, chapter 700, Oregon Laws 2015; prescribing an effective date; and providing for revenue raising that requires approval by a three-fifths majority.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. ORS 319.020, as amended by section 4, chapter 700, Oregon Laws 2015, and section 41, chapter 750, Oregon Laws 2017, is amended to read:

319.020. (1) Subject to subsections (2) to (4) of this section, in addition to the taxes otherwise provided for by law, every dealer engaging in the dealer's own name, or in the name of others, in the first sale, use or distribution of motor vehicle fuel or aircraft fuel or withdrawal of motor vehicle fuel or aircraft fuel for sale, use or distribution within areas in this state within which the state lacks the power to tax the sale, use or distribution of motor vehicle fuel or aircraft fuel, shall:

- (a) Not later than the 25th day of each calendar month, render a statement to the Department of Transportation of all motor vehicle fuel or aircraft fuel sold, used, distributed or so withdrawn by the dealer in the State of Oregon as well as all such fuel sold, used or distributed in this state by a purchaser thereof upon which sale, use or distribution the dealer has assumed liability for the applicable license tax during the preceding calendar month. The dealer shall render the statement to the department in the manner provided by the department by rule.
- (b) Except as provided in ORS 319.270, pay a license tax computed on the basis of 34 cents per gallon on the first sale, use or distribution of such motor vehicle fuel or aircraft fuel so sold, used, distributed or withdrawn as shown by such statement in the manner and within the time provided in ORS 319.010 to 319.430.
- (2) When aircraft fuel is sold, used or distributed by a dealer, the license tax shall be computed on the basis of [nine] 11 cents per gallon of fuel so sold, used or distributed, except that when aircraft fuel usable in aircraft operated by turbine engines (turbo-prop or jet) is sold, used or distributed, the tax rate shall be [one cent] three cents per gallon.
- (3) In lieu of claiming refund of the tax paid on motor vehicle fuel consumed by such dealer in nonhighway use as provided in ORS 319.280, 319.290 and 319.320, or of any prior erroneous payment of license tax made to the state by such dealer, the dealer may show such motor vehicle fuel as a credit or deduction on the monthly statement and payment of tax.
- (4) The license tax computed on the basis of the sale, use, distribution or withdrawal of motor vehicle or aircraft fuel may not be imposed wherever such tax is prohibited by the Constitution or laws of the United States with respect to such tax.

Enrolled House Bill 2434 (HB 2434-A)

SECTION 2. ORS 319.330, as amended by section 5, chapter 700, Oregon Laws 2015, is amended to read:

- 319.330. (1) Whenever any statement and invoices are presented to the Department of Transportation showing that motor vehicle fuel or aircraft fuel has been purchased and used in operating aircraft engines and upon which the full tax for motor vehicle fuel has been paid, the department shall refund the tax paid, but only after deducting from the tax paid [nine] 11 cents for each gallon of such fuel so purchased and used, except that when such fuel is used in operating aircraft turbine engines (turbo-prop or jet) the deduction shall be [one cent] three cents for each gallon. No deduction provided under this subsection shall be made on claims presented by the United States or on claims presented where a satisfactory showing has been made to the department that such aircraft fuel has been used solely in aircraft operations from a point within the State of Oregon directly to a point not within any state of the United States. The amount so deducted shall be paid on warrant of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services to the State Treasurer, who shall credit the amount to the State Aviation Account for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the state aviation law. Moneys credited to the account under this section are continuously appropriated to the Oregon Department of Aviation.
- (2) If satisfactory evidence is presented to the Department of Transportation showing that aircraft fuel upon which the tax has been paid has been purchased and used solely in aircraft operations from a point within the State of Oregon directly to a point not within any state of the United States, the department shall refund the tax paid.
- SECTION 3. (1) The amendments to ORS 319.020 by section 1 of this 2021 Act apply to aircraft fuel sold, used or distributed on or after January 1, 2022.
- (2) The amendments to ORS 319.330 by section 2 of this 2021 Act apply to aircraft fuel sold, used or distributed on or after January 1, 2022.
- **SECTION 4.** Section 7, chapter 700, Oregon Laws 2015, as amended by section 80a, chapter 750, Oregon Laws 2017, section 1, chapter 485, Oregon Laws 2019, and section 26, chapter 491, Oregon Laws 2019, is amended to read:
 - Sec. 7. (1) The following amounts shall be distributed in the manner prescribed in this section:
- (a) Any amount of tax on aircraft fuel usable in aircraft operated by turbine engines that is computed on a basis in excess of one cent per gallon and any amount of tax on all other aircraft fuel that is computed on a basis in excess of nine cents per gallon, under ORS 319.020 (2); and
- (b) Any amount of tax on aircraft fuel usable in aircraft operated by turbine engines in excess of one cent per gallon and any amount of tax on all other aircraft fuel in excess of nine cents per gallon, that is deducted before the refunding of tax under ORS 319.330 (1).
- (2)(a) Applications for distributions under [subsections (5) and (6)] **subsection** (5) of this section may not be approved unless the applicant demonstrates a commitment to contribute at least five percent of the costs of the project to which the application relates. The Oregon Department of Aviation shall adopt rules for purposes of this paragraph.
 - (b) The department may adopt rules that:
 - (A) Set higher minimum contribution commitment requirements; or
 - (B) Establish maximum grant amounts.
- (3)(a) The State Aviation Board shall establish a review committee composed of one member from each of the area commissions on transportation chartered by the Oregon Transportation Commission.
- (b) The review committee shall meet as necessary to review applications for distributions of amounts pursuant to this section. In reviewing applications, the review committee shall consider:
 - (A) Whether a proposed project:
- (i) Reduces transportation costs for Oregon businesses or improves access to jobs and sources of labor in this state;
 - (ii) Results in an economic benefit to this state;
- (iii) Connects elements of Oregon's aviation system in a way that will measurably improve utilization and efficiency of the system;

- (iv) Is ready for construction or implementation; and
- (v) Has a useful life expectancy that offers maximum benefit to this state; and
- (B) How much of the cost of the proposed project can be borne by the applicant from sources other than Oregon Department of Aviation funds or the Connect Oregon Fund.
- (c) The review committee shall recommend applications to the State Aviation Board for approval.
- (4)(a) Five percent of the amounts described in subsection (1) of this section are appropriated to the Oregon Department of Aviation for the costs of the department and the State Aviation Board in administering this section.
- (b) The remaining 95 percent of the amounts described in subsection (1) of this section shall be distributed pursuant to subsections (5) [to (7)] and (6) of this section.
- (5)(a) [Fifty] Seventy-five percent of the amounts described in subsection (4)(b) of this section shall be [prioritized in the following order and] distributed for the following purposes:
- [(a)] (A) [First,] To assist airports in Oregon with match requirements for Federal Aviation Administration Airport Improvement Program grants.
- [(b)] (B) [Second,] To make grants for emergency preparedness and infrastructure projects, in accordance with the Oregon Resilience Plan or the Oregon Aviation Plan.
 - [(c)] (C) [Third,] To make grants for:
- [(A)] (i) Services critical or essential to aviation, including, but not limited to, fuel, sewer, water and weather equipment;
- [(B)] (ii) Aviation-related business development, including, but not limited to, hangars, parking for business aircraft and related facilities; or
- [(C)] (iii) Airport development for local economic benefit, including, but not limited to, signs and marketing.
 - (D)(i) To assist commercial air service to rural Oregon.
- (ii) The Oregon Department of Aviation may adopt a definition of "rural Oregon" for purposes of this subparagraph.
- (b) The State Aviation Board may establish by rule priorities for the distributions made pursuant to this subsection.
- [(6) Twenty-five percent of the amounts described in subsection (4)(b) of this section shall be distributed for the purpose of assisting commercial air service to rural Oregon.]
- [(7)] **(6)** Twenty-five percent of the amounts described in subsection (4)(b) of this section shall be distributed to state-owned airports for the purposes of:
- (a) Safety improvements recommended by the State Aviation Board and local community airports.
 - (b) Infrastructure projects at public use airports.
- [(8)(a)] (7)(a) Not later than September 15 of each year, the State Aviation Board shall submit the reports described in paragraph (b) of this subsection, in the manner provided in ORS 192.245, to the interim committees, as applicable, of the Legislative Assembly related to air transportation.
- (b) [The State Aviation Board shall submit reports, in the manner provided in ORS 192.245 and paragraph (b) of this subsection, that] The reports required under this subsection shall describe in detail the projects for which applications have been submitted and approved, the airports affected, the names of the applicants and the persons who will perform the work proposed in the applications, the progress of projects for which applications have been approved and any other information the board considers necessary for a comprehensive analysis of the implementation of this section.
 - [(b) The reports described in paragraph (a) of this subsection shall be submitted:]
- [(A) Not later than February 10 of each year to the committees of the Legislative Assembly related to air transportation; and]
- [(B) Not later than September 30 of each year to the interim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to air transportation.]

<u>SECTION 5.</u> The amendments to section 7, chapter 700, Oregon Laws 2015, by section 4 of this 2021 Act apply to applications for distributions submitted on or after the effective date of this 2021 Act.

SECTION 6. Sections 6 and 8, chapter 700, Oregon Laws 2015, are repealed.

SECTION 7. ORS 836.055 is amended to read:

836.055. (1) In operating an airport or air navigation facility owned or controlled by the state, the Oregon Department of Aviation, as authorized by the State Aviation Board, may enter into contracts, leases and other arrangements, for a term not exceeding 30 years [with any persons] for noncommercial arrangements or 50 years for commercial arrangements:

- (a) Granting the privilege of using or improving [such] the airport or air navigation facility, or any portion or facility [thereof] of, or space [therein] in, the airport or air navigation facility, for commercial purposes;
- (b) Conferring the privilege of supplying goods, commodities, things, services or facilities at [such] **the** airport or air navigation facility; or
- (c) Making available services to be furnished by the department or its agents at [such] the airport or air navigation facility.
- (2) In each [such] case the department may establish the terms and conditions and fix the charges, rentals or fees for the privileges or services, which shall be reasonable and uniform for the same class of privilege or service and shall be established with due regard to the property and improvements used and the expenses of operation to the state; provided, that in no case shall the public be deprived of its rightful, equal and uniform use of the airport, air navigation facility, or portion or facility [thereof] of the airport or air navigation facility.

SECTION 8. The amendments to ORS 836.055 by section 7 of this 2021 Act apply to contracts, leases and other arrangements entered into on or after the effective date of this 2021 Act.

SECTION 9. This 2021 Act takes effect on the 91st day after the date on which the 2021 regular session of the Eighty-first Legislative Assembly adjourns sine die.

CHAPTER	

AN ACT

Relating to tall structure evaluation fee; amending ORS 836.530.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. ORS 836.530 is amended to read:

836.530. (1) In addition to any other rulemaking authority, the Director of the Oregon Department of Aviation may adopt rules:

- (a) To define physical hazards to air navigation and determine whether specific types or classes of objects or structures constitute hazards. Rules defining physical hazards and determining whether specific types or classes of objects or structures constitute hazards may be adopted only after a fact-finding process and must be supported by substantial evidence.
- (b) Establishing standards for lighting or marking objects and structures that constitute hazards to air navigation.
- (c) Establishing standards for mitigating physical hazards to air navigation by altering the height or location of objects and structures.
- (d) Establishing standards for mitigating hazards to air navigation by altering approach surface standards or installing navigational aids.
 - (e) Establishing a fee to cover the costs of tall structure evaluations.
 - (2) In accordance with the rules adopted under this section, the director shall do the following:
 - (a) Determine whether specific objects or structures constitute a hazard to air navigation.
- (b) Determine responsibility for installation and maintenance of lighting or marking and for alteration of the height or location of specific objects or structures that constitute hazards to air navigation.
- (c) Issue orders to require that specific objects or structures determined to be hazards to air navigation be marked or lighted in accordance with rules adopted under this section.
- (d) Make recommendations to the Federal Aviation Administration to require that airports alter approach surface standards or install navigational aids for the purpose of mitigating hazards to air navigation.
- (3) Rules and standards adopted under this section are limited to and may not be more restrictive than current federal norms, including but not limited to, regulations and circulars, pertaining to objects affecting navigable airspace.
- (4) Any person or entity required to comply with an order issued under this section may contest the order as provided under ORS chapter 183.

SECTION 1. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the following amounts are established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, as the maximum limits for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Oregon Department of Aviation, for the following purposes:

- (5) Aviation system action program \$ 9,719,459

SECTION 2. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the following amounts are established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, as the maximum limits for payment of expenses from federal funds collected or received by the Oregon Department of Aviation, for the following purposes:

- (1) Operations...... \$ 2,082,276
- (2) General aviation entitlement grant program...... \$ 4,336,856

SECTION 3. This 2021 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2021 Act takes effect July 1, 2021.

SECTION 2. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the following amounts are established for a six-year period beginning July 1, 2021, as the maximum limits for payment of expenses from federal funds collected or received by the state agencies listed, for the acquisition of land and the acquisition, planning, constructing, altering, repairing, furnishing and equipping of buildings and facilities:

SECTION 3. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$445,905,100 is established for a six-year period beginning July 1, 2021, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Higher Education Coordinating Commission, for expenditures of proceeds from state bonds issued for the benefit of a public university, pursuant to agreements between the commission and a public university.

SECTION 4. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$56,496,994 is established for a six-year period beginning July 1, 2021, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Higher Education Coordinating Commission, for expenditures of proceeds from state bonds issued for the benefit of a community college, pursuant to agreements between the commission and a community college.

Enrolled Senate Bill 5506 (SB 5506-A)

<u>SECTION 5.</u> The project approvals and expenditure limitations in sections 1, 2, 3 and 4 of this 2021 Act and the expenditure limitations established by the Emergency Board during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, for capital construction or acquisition projects, expire on June 30, 2027, unless otherwise noted.

AN ACT

Relating to state financial administration; creating new provisions; amending sections 196 and 299, chapter 669, Oregon Laws 2021; and declaring an emergency.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (5), chapter 427, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Department of Justice, for crime victim and survivor services, is increased by \$2,000,000 for distribution to nonprofit entities to assist survivors of domestic and sexual violence and human trafficking in maintaining or acquiring housing.

SECTION 2. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 3, chapter 557, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds other than those described in section 2, chapter 557, Oregon Laws 2021, collected or received by the Judicial Department, is increased by \$275,752 for an Elder Justice Innovation grant.

SECTION 3. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 4, chapter 556, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds other than those described in sections 2 and 6, chapter 556, Oregon Laws 2021, collected or received by the Housing and Community Services Department, is increased by \$1,681,331 for housing counseling services.

SECTION 4. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 5 (2), chapter 603, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses, other than expenses described in sections 6 and 14, chapter 603, Oregon Laws 2021, from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds, corporate activity tax funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Department of Education, for operations, is increased by \$1,668,814 to support the implementation of a comprehensive educator professional learning system.

SECTION 5. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 6 (3), chapter 603, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of grants-in-aid, program costs and purchased services from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds, corporate activity tax funds and federal funds, collected or re-

ceived by the Department of Education for programs other than those specified in sections 5 and 14, chapter 603, Oregon Laws 2021, for the Educator Advancement Council, is increased by \$3,488,205 for increases to Regional Educator Network Capacity grants.

SECTION 6. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Education by section 1 (1), chapter 603, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for operations, is increased by \$1,416,158, for procurement staff.

<u>SECTION 7.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Oregon Health Authority by section 1 (1), chapter 668, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for health systems, health policy and analytics, and public health, is increased by \$3,000,000 to temporarily increase behavioral health residential treatment provider rates.

SECTION 8. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 5 (1), chapter 668, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds, excluding federal funds described in section 2, chapter 668, Oregon Laws 2021, collected or received by the Oregon Health Authority, for health systems, health policy and analytics, and public health, is increased by \$9,000,000 to temporarily increase behavioral health residential treatment provider rates.

SECTION 9. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Oregon Health Authority by section 1 (1), chapter 668, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for health systems, health policy and analytics, and public health, is increased by \$2,400,746 to expand the duration of Medicaid postpartum coverage to 12 months.

SECTION 10. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 5 (1), chapter 668, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds, excluding federal funds described in section 2, chapter 668, Oregon Laws 2021, collected or received by the Oregon Health Authority, for health systems, health policy and analytics, and public health, is increased by \$6,390,858 to expand the duration of Medicaid postpartum coverage to 12 months.

SECTION 11. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (4), chapter 606, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and Medicare receipts and including federal funds for indirect cost recovery, Social Security Supplemental Security Income recoveries and the Child Care and Development Fund, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 2, chapter 606, Oregon Laws 2021, collected or received by the Department of Human Services, for vocational rehabilitation services, is increased by \$3,600,000 to increase provider rates for employment services.

SECTION 12. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Human Services by section 1 (6), chapter 606, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for aging and people with disabilities programs, is increased by \$9,093,426 for compensation changes driven by collective bargaining for workers who are not state employees.

SECTION 13. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 3 (6), chapter 606, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds, excluding federal funds described in section 2, chapter 606, Oregon Laws 2021, collected or received by the Department of Human Services, for aging and people with disabilities programs, is increased by \$16,809,247 for compensation changes driven by collective bargaining for workers who are not state employees.

SECTION 14. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Human Services by section 1 (7), chapter 606, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for intellectual/developmental disabilities programs, is increased by \$10,906,574 for compensation changes driven by collective bargaining for workers who are not state employees.

SECTION 15. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 3 (7), chapter 606, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds, excluding federal funds described in section 2, chapter 606, Oregon Laws 2021, collected or received by the Department of Human Services, for intellectual/developmental disabilities programs, is increased by \$21,342,327 for compensation changes driven by collective bargaining for workers who are not state employees.

SECTION 16. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Emergency Board by section 1b (1), chapter 669, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for allocation to state agencies for compensation changes driven by collective bargaining for workers who are not state employees, is decreased by \$20,000,000.

SECTION 17. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (6), chapter 427, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Department of Justice, for the General Counsel Division, is increased by \$2,310,592 for legal services to state agencies.

SECTION 18. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (4), chapter 427, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Department of Justice, for the Criminal Justice Division, is decreased by \$940,753 due to the withdrawal from the federal High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area program.

SECTION 19. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Justice by section 1 (3), chapter 427, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for the Criminal Justice Division, is increased by \$1,157,838 to increase statewide criminal analytical support.

SECTION 20. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 3 (1), chapter 470, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds collected or received by the Department of State Police, for patrol services, criminal investigations, gaming enforcement and the office of the State Fire Marshal, is increased by \$3,039,868 for expenditure of funds received through the equitable sharing program.

SECTION 21. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of State Police by section 1 (1), chapter 470, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for patrol services, criminal investigations, gaming enforcement and the office of the State Fire Marshal, is increased by \$11,323,221 for costs incurred during the 2021 fire season.

SECTION 22. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Oregon Youth Authority by section 1 (1), chapter 430, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for facility programs, is decreased by \$188,357, for the transfer of positions between programs to establish new Diversity, Equity and Inclusion positions.

SECTION 23. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Oregon Youth Authority by section 1 (2), chapter 430, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for community programs, is decreased by \$191,677, for the

transfer of positions between programs to establish new Diversity, Equity and Inclusion positions.

SECTION 24. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Oregon Youth Authority by section 1 (3), chapter 430, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for program support, is increased by \$380,034, for the transfer of positions between programs to establish new Diversity, Equity and Inclusion positions.

SECTION 25. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 3 (1), chapter 430, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds collected or received by the Oregon Youth Authority, for community programs, is decreased by \$13,293, for the transfer of positions between programs to establish new Diversity, Equity and Inclusion positions.

SECTION 26. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 3 (2), chapter 430, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds collected or received by the Oregon Youth Authority, for program support, is increased by \$13,293, for the transfer of positions between programs to establish new Diversity, Equity and Inclusion positions.

SECTION 27. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Judicial Department by section 1 (2), chapter 557, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for operations, is increased by \$2,432,008 for the reorganization of the office of the State Court Administrator.

SECTION 28. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Public Defense Services Commission, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$380,436 to implement the provisions of chapter 400, Oregon Laws 2021.

SECTION 29. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Public Defense Services Commission by section 1 (3), chapter 444, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for the Appellate Division, is increased by \$259,969 for the Juvenile Appellate Section.

Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (2), chapter 560, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Oregon Business Development Department, for infrastructure, is increased by \$1,500,000, for the expenditure of moneys transferred by the Public Utilities Commission to the Broadband Fund established by section 4, chapter 17, Oregon Laws 2020 (first special session), for the planning and development of broadband infrastructure.

SECTION 31. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 5, chapter 426, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds, other than those described in section 3, chapter 426, Oregon Laws 2021, collected or received by the Employment Department, is increased by \$5,172,629 for services to adult and dislocated workers.

SECTION 32. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 4, chapter 556, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds other than those described in sections 2 and 6, chapter 556, Oregon Laws 2021, collected or received by the Housing and Community Services Department, is increased by \$39,769,368 for the Homeowner Assistance program.

SECTION 33. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 1 (1), chapter 640, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission, for administrative expenses, is increased by \$504,000.

SECTION 34. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 4, chapter 504, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Board of Medical Imaging, is increased by \$202,000, to address increasing investigatory workload, increased board stipends and other miscellaneous costs.

SECTION 35. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 1, chapter 311, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Real Estate Agency, is increased by \$151,083, for the eLicense information technology replacement project.

SECTION 36. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 1, chapter 348, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the State Board of Tax Practitioners, is increased by \$72,100, for operating expenses.

SECTION 37. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the State Forestry Department by section 1 (2), chapter 605, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for fire protection, is increased by \$46,298,469 for costs associated with the 2021 fire season.

SECTION 38. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (2), chapter 605, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and including federal funds from the United States Forest Service for fire protection and for research projects, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 2, chapter 605, Oregon Laws 2021, collected or received by the State Forestry Department, for fire protection, is increased by \$78,218,491 for the processing of payments of costs from the 2021 fire season.

SECTION 39. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Emergency Board by section 5 (1), chapter 605, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for allocation to the State Forestry Department for fire protection expenses, is decreased by \$6,146,267.

SECTION 40. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 1 (1), chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Oregon Department of Aviation, for operations, is increased by \$766,259.

SECTION 41. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 1 (3), chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Oregon Department of Aviation, for pavement maintenance, is increased by \$379,730.

Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (9), chapter 442, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and federal funds received as reimbursement from the United States Department of Transportation, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 2, chapter 442, Oregon Laws 2021, collected or received by the Department of Transportation, for driver and motor vehicle services, is increased by \$5,248,462.

SECTION 45. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (4), chapter 425, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and federal funds received from charges, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 2, chapter 425, Oregon Laws 2021, collected or received by the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, for the Chief Human Resources Office, is increased by \$1,669,855 to address the increased costs of statewide training expenses and to support newly independent state agencies.

SECTION 46. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (7), chapter 425, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and federal funds received from charges, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 2, chapter 425, Oregon Laws 2021, collected or received by the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, for the Enterprise Goods and Services Division, is increased by \$2,127,233 to address staffing needs associated with the out-of-state workforce, the modernization of the electronic procurement system and the establishment of newly independent state agencies.

SECTION 47. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 3, chapter 505, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds collected or received by the Secretary of State, is increased by \$4,558,640 for the Oregon Centralized Voter Registration system replacement project.

SECTION 48. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (1), chapter 505, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Secretary of State, for the Administrative Services Division, is increased by \$964,248, for server room upgrades and position actions.

SECTION 49. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (5), chapter 505, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal

funds, collected or received by the Secretary of State, for the Corporation Division, is increased by \$694,248, to accommodate increased bank card transaction and service fees.

SECTION 50. SECTION 116. SECTION 117. SECTION 124. SECTION 145. SECTION 206. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$12,400,000 is established for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses by the Oregon Health Authority from Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act Coronavirus Relief Fund moneys received by the Oregon Department of Administrative Services and transferred to the Oregon Health Authority, for COVID-19 pandemic response activities and behavioral health workforce incentives.

SECTION 207. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Oregon Health Authority by section 1 (1), chapter 668, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for health systems, health policy and analytics, and public health, is increased by \$397,478 for health equity program and data support.

SECTION 208. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Oregon Health Authority by section 1 (3), chapter 668, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for central services, state assessments and

enterprise-wide costs, is increased by \$3,417,283 for human resources program capacity and the transfer of funds between programs for health equity data support.

SECTION 209. SECTION 212. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 6 (4), chapter 603, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of grants-in-aid, program costs and purchased services from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds, corporate activity tax funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Department of Education for programs other than those specified in sections 5 and 14, chapter 603, Oregon Laws 2021, for all other grants, is increased by \$26,058,151 for the High School Success and College and Career Readiness Program.

SECTION 215. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Education by section 2 (5), chapter 603, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for distribution as grants-in-aid, for program costs and to purchase services, for other early learning programs, is increased by \$3,776,917 for the Early Childhood Suspension and Expulsion Prevention Program.

SECTION 216. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Department of Justice, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$314,528, for the Criminal Justice Division, to implement chapter 541, Oregon Laws 2021.

SECTION 217. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Judicial Department by section 5, chapter 557, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, is decreased by \$51,710 for the Council on Court Procedures.

Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$26,323,860 is established for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses by the Oregon Department of Administrative Services from American Rescue Plan Act Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund moneys received by the Oregon Department of Administrative Services for Enterprise Information Services to support broadband investments and cybersecurity modernization.

SECTION 225. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Department of Justice, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$11,250,000, for crime victim and survivor services, for supplemental funding of the federal Victims of Crime Act grants.

SECTION 226. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Department of Justice, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$10,000,000, for crime victim and survivor services, for deposit into the Oregon Domestic and Sexual Violence Services Fund established under ORS 147.453.

SECTION 227. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (5), chapter 427, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Department of Justice, for crime victim and survivor services, is increased by \$10,000,000, for the Oregon Domestic and Sexual Violence Services Fund established under ORS 147.453.

SECTION 228. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$15,000,000 is established for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for

payment of expenses by the Department of Justice, from American Rescue Plan Act Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund moneys received by the Oregon Department of Administrative Services and transferred to the Department of Justice, for crime victim and survivor services, for community violence prevention grants.

SECTION 229. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Oregon Military Department by section 1 (3), chapter 662, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for emergency management, is decreased by \$8,654,366, for the establishment of the Oregon Department of Emergency Management.

SECTION 230. SECTION 235. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$68,337,111 is established for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, and reimbursements from federal service agreements, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in this section, collected or received by the Oregon Department of Emergency Management, for the 9-1-1 emergency program.

<u>SECTION 236.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Oregon Department of Emergency Management, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$757,611, for preparedness and response.

SECTION 237. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$5,673,745 is established for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, and reimbursements from federal service agreements, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in this section, collected or received by the Oregon Department of Emergency Management, for preparedness and response.

<u>SECTION 238.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$37,092,457 is established for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for

moneys deposited into the Watershed Conservation Operating Fund established under ORS 541.945, for activities and projects to implement Article XV, section 4b, of the Oregon Constitution, is increased by \$1,213,188.

SECTION 309. The allocation made by the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board to the Department of State Police under section 1, chapter 680, Oregon Laws 2021, from moneys deposited into the Watershed Conservation Operating Fund established under ORS 541.945, for fish and wildlife activities and projects to implement Article XV, section 4b, of the Oregon Constitution, is increased by \$249,144.

SECTION 310. The allocation made by the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board to the State Department of Fish and Wildlife under section 2, chapter 680, Oregon Laws 2021, from moneys deposited into the Watershed Conservation Operating Fund established under ORS 541.945, for activities and projects to implement Article XV, section 4b, of the Oregon Constitution, is increased by \$118,337.

SECTION 311. The allocation made by the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board to the Department of Environmental Quality under section 4, chapter 680, Oregon Laws 2021, from moneys deposited into the Watershed Conservation Operating Fund established under ORS 541.945, for activities and projects to implement Article XV, section 4b, of the Oregon Constitution, is increased by \$224,550.

SECTION 312. (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Emergency Board, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$50,000,000, to be allocated to the State Forestry Department for cash flow needs.

(2) If any of the moneys appropriated by subsection (1) of this section are not allocated by the Emergency Board prior to December 1, 2022, the moneys remaining on that date become available for any purpose for which the Emergency Board lawfully may allocate funds.

SECTION 317. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Higher Education Coordinating Commission by section 1 (7), chapter 660, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for Oregon Health and Science University education and other programs, is increased by \$45,000,000 to support expanded capacity for health care education and pathway programs and to provide tuition assistance and loan repayment to learners from underrepresented communities.

SECTION 318. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Corrections by section 1 (1), chapter 468, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for operations and health services is decreased by \$74,716,564.

SECTION 319. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 95, chapter 669, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium

ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses by the Department of Corrections from Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act Coronavirus Relief Fund moneys received by the Oregon Department of Administrative Services and transferred to the Department of Corrections, for the purpose of expenditures and activities to respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency, is increased by \$74,716,564.

<u>SECTION 320.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Department of Justice, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$2,750,000, for crime victim and survivor services for grants to court appointed special advocate programs.

SECTION 321. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Oregon Business Development Department, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$835,000, for distribution to the Crescent Sanitary District for the retirement of debt related to its sewer collection and treatment system project.

Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 5 (1), chapter 668, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds, excluding federal funds described in section 2, chapter 668, Oregon Laws 2021, collected or received by the Oregon Health Authority, for health systems, health policy and analytics, and public health, is increased by \$2,900,000 for increasing provider rates for applied behavior analysis.

SECTION 367. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Oregon Health Authority by section 1 (1), chapter 668, Oregon Laws 2021, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, for health systems, health policy and analytics, and public health, is increased by \$5,000,000 for the Healthy Homes Program.

SECTION 368. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Oregon Health Authority, for the biennium ending June 30, 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$15,000,000 for distribution to Seeding Justice for advancing reproductive health equity.

SECTION 369. Summary of Emergency Board Action

June 2022

The Legislative Emergency Board met on June 3, 2022 and considered an agenda of 69 items. The Emergency Board approved seven allocations from the Emergency Fund and eight allocations from special purpose appropriations made to the Emergency Board. A total of \$8.5 million was allocated from the Emergency Fund and \$248.7 million was allocated from special purpose appropriations. Additional details on these actions are described below. After the Emergency Board actions, the balance in the general purpose Emergency Fund is \$41.5 million. An additional \$171.1 million remains in various special purpose appropriations, including \$100 million for caseload costs or other unbudgeted expenses of the Oregon Health Authority and the Department of Human Services. Unused special purpose appropriations become available for any lawful use (including the original purpose) by the Emergency Board on December 1, 2022.

The agenda included 23 items that requested additional 2021-23 biennium authority to spend Other Funds and Federal Funds. The Emergency Board approved expenditure limitation increases of approximately \$437.3 million Other Funds and \$332.7 million Federal Funds. The Emergency Board also authorized the establishment of 107 positions (45.32 FTE).

The agenda included nine agency reports, which the Emergency Board acknowledged receiving, six of which were on a single consent agenda item. The Emergency Board heard 27 requests for the submission of federal grant applications, 21 of which were approved on consent.

The following is a summary of significant Emergency Board actions taken at the June 2022 meeting, with a record of all actions available in the June 3, 2022 Emergency Board Certificate.

Education

- Allocated \$19,000,000 from the special purpose appropriation made to the Emergency Board to the Higher Education Coordinating Commission for the implementation of the Oregon Tribal Student Grant Program.
- Approved, retroactively, the submission of a federal grant application by the Department of Education to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, in the amount of \$5,400,000 over a period of

five years, to support the development, implementation, and evaluation of a sustainable infrastructure for school-based mental health, promote healthy social and emotional development of school-aged youth, and prevent youth violence in school settings.

Human Services

 Allocated \$30,000,000 from the special purpose appropriation made to the Emergency Board to the Oregon Health Authority for the Oregon Essential Workforce

- Health Care Program, and increased the Federal Funds expenditure limitation by \$45,000,000, to implement the program.
- Allocated \$42,500,000 from the special purpose appropriation made to the Emergency Board to Oregon Health Authority, and increased the Federal Funds expenditure limitation by \$112,000,000, for increasing behavioral health provider rates.
- Allocated \$5,000,000 from the special purpose appropriation made to the Emergency Board for the state's natural disaster prevention, preparedness, response and recovery activities to the Department of Human Services, for drought response efforts, with the understanding the Department of Administrative Services will unschedule \$4,000,000 of the amount until the agency provides the Legislative Fiscal Office and Chief Financial Office a spending plan.
- Acknowledged receipt of various reports from the Department of Human Services required by budget notes related to recent investments in long-term care capital improvement and emergency preparedness, long-term care workforce development and training, and foster care respite services, as well as barriers to mental health for individuals served by the Aging and People with Disabilities and the Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities programs.

Public Safety

- Increased the Federal Funds expenditure limitation for the Department of Justice by \$35,110,718 for a federal Victims of Crime Act grant.
- Allocated \$357,161 from the Emergency Fund to the Department of Justice and authorized the establishment of three limited duration positions (1.42 FTE) for the administration of a community-based violence prevention program.
- Allocated \$63,050 from the Emergency Fund to the Oregon Military Department, and increased the Federal Funds expenditure limitation by \$189,150, for capital improvements to install new computer

- fiberoptic cable at the Senator Jackie Winters Oregon National Guard Youth Challenge Campus.
- Increased the Other Funds expenditure limitation for the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training by \$429,930 to accommodate an increase in expenditures from the Fund.

Judicial Branch

- Approved, retroactively, the submission of a federal grant application by the Oregon Judicial Department to the U.S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance, in the amount of \$2,000,000 over a period of four federal fiscal years, to improve, expand, and enhance adult drug courts.
- Acknowledged receipt of a report from the Public Defense Services Commission on the agency's reorganization.
- Acknowledged receipt of a report from the Public Defense Services Commission on a financial update and authorized transfers between appropriations to align General Fund appropriations with expenditures in support of the agency's legislative approved programs.
- Allocated \$413,011 from the Emergency Fund to the Public Defense Services Commission for a one fiscal year contract extension with the Oregon Judicial Department for information technology support.
- Allocated \$100,000,000 from the special purpose appropriation made to the Emergency Board to the Public Defense Services Commission for public defense services.
- Allocated \$94,155 from the Emergency Fund established to the Public Defense Services Commission to fund the administrative reclassification of a Procurement Analyst 1 position to a Manger 2 position.

Natural Resources

 Allocated \$1,192,241 from the special purpose appropriation made to the Emergency Board for the state's natural disaster prevention, preparedness, response

- and recovery to the Department of Agriculture for the suppression of grasshoppers and crickets.
- Approved, retroactively, the submission of a federal grant application by the Department of Agriculture to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, in the amount of up to \$62,000,000 over a period of eight years, for Climate Smart Commodities.
- Increased the Federal Funds expenditure limitation for the Department of Forestry by \$1,115,923 for the expenditure of federal grant awards for Topographical Data and Habitat Conservation Plan Development.
- Allocated \$50,000,000 from the special purpose appropriation made to the Emergency Board to the Department of Forestry for cash flow needs.
- Increased the Federal Funds expenditure limitation for the Department of Forestry by \$17,000,000 for expenditure of federal grant funds awarded by the U.S. Forest Service for the Forest Legacy Program.
- Allocated \$1,957,075 from the Emergency Fund to the Department of Forestry, and increased the Other Funds expenditure limitation by \$315,000, for payment of premium costs associated with the state's 2022 catastrophic wildfire insurance policy.
- Approved, retroactively, the submission of a federal grant application by the Department of Environmental Quality to the U.S.

Relating to airport infrastructure resilience; and declaring an emergency.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. (1) The Oregon Department of Aviation shall conduct a study developing a plan for strategic investment for airports in this state.

- (2) In conducting the study, the department shall consult the following stakeholders:
- (a) The State Resilience Officer;
- (b) The Oregon Department of Emergency Management;
- (c) The Department of Transportation; and
- (d) The Oregon Airport Management Association.
- (3) The plan for strategic investment developed under this section must include, but need not be limited to, the following components:
- (a) Development of a tiered system of designation of the following categories for airports of geographic or functional significance:
- (A) Tier 1 facilities that can be, and should be, prepared for providing event assistance, limited response support and immediate post-event flight activities.
- (B) Tier 2 facilities that can be, and should be, prepared for providing event assistance, limited response support and return to flight activities within one month post-event.
- (C) Tier 3 facilities that can be, and should be, prepared for providing event assistance, including limited response support, and return to flight activities within three months postevent.
 - (D) Special function facilities as outlined in state plans related to resilience.
- (b) Priorities for preplacement of standardized critical equipment and a process for standardization of equipment.
- (c) Identification of potential partnerships for mission-specific activities in support of Oregon's statewide resilience posture.
- (d) Identification of baseline equipment for designated response and recovery facilities, including at least the following:
 - (A) Generators.
 - (B) Resilient fuel distribution and storage.
 - (C) Shelters.
 - (D) Communications equipment.
 - (E) Potable water and sanitation facilities.

Enrolled House Bill 3058 (HB 3058-A)

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(4) The Oregon Department of Aviation shall submit a report in the manner provided by ORS 192.245, and may include recommendations for legislation, to the interim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to transportation no later than January 1, 2024.

SECTION 2. Section 1 of this 2023 Act is repealed on January 2, 2024.

- SECTION 4. (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Emergency Board, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$75,000,000, to be allocated to state agencies for compensation changes driven by collective bargaining for workers who are not state employees.

- (2) If any of the moneys appropriated by subsection (1) of this section are not allocated by the Emergency Board prior to December 1, 2024, the moneys remaining on that date become available for any purpose for which the Emergency Board lawfully may allocate funds.
- <u>SECTION 9.</u> (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Emergency Board, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$6,170,768, to be allocated for expenses related to public defense.
- (2) If any of the moneys appropriated by subsection (1) of this section are not allocated by the Emergency Board prior to December 1, 2024, the moneys remaining on that date become available for any purpose for which the Emergency Board lawfully may allocate funds.

is increased by \$4,300,000, for disbursement to Oregon Worker Relief as the fiscal agent under section 1, chapter 88, Oregon Laws 2022.

SECTION 266. AGENCY SUMMARY NARRATIVE

Founded in 1921 as the first government aviation agency in the United States, the Oregon Department of Aviation (ODAV) is chartered to promote, develop, and improve Oregon's aviation system. ODAV's mission is to provide infrastructure, financial resources, and expertise to ensure a safe and efficient air transportation system.

ODAV is committed to the development and realization of its strategic plan by addressing statewide aviation issues, participating in multi-model coordination, carefully coordinating, and managing aviation-related legislation, and providing assistance to aviation constituents, airport owners/sponsors and aviation system users throughout Oregon.

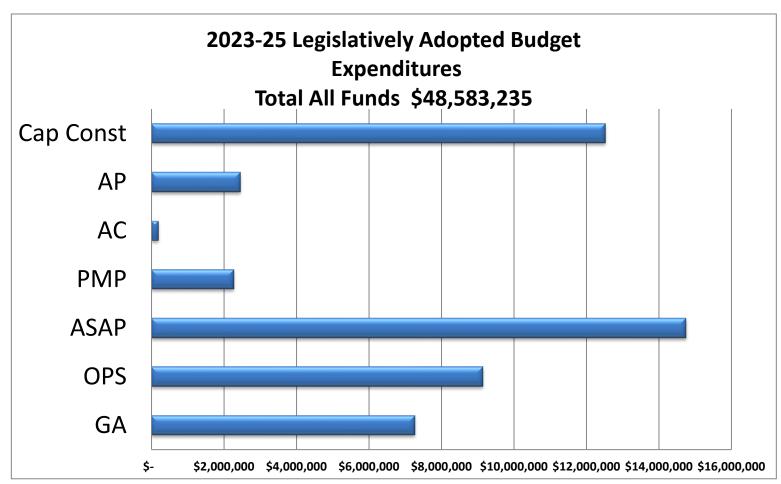
A seven-member Aviation Board provides policy direction to the Director and the Department in administering the laws of the state related to the development, management, education, and promotion of Oregon's aviation system. The Director and seven-member Aviation Board are appointed by the Governor and subject to the approval of the Oregon State Senate.

In coordination with Business Oregon, ODAV and the Board support efforts to harness the economic potential of over 400 aviation related businesses throughout the state. Through a grant funded by the FAA, the Department of Aviation commissioned a study of the economic impact of Oregon's airports on the state's economy. The study by the consulting firm, Mead and Hunt, found that airports and their aviation businesses in Oregon provide over 73,000 jobs and has a \$24.2 billion impact on the state's economy.

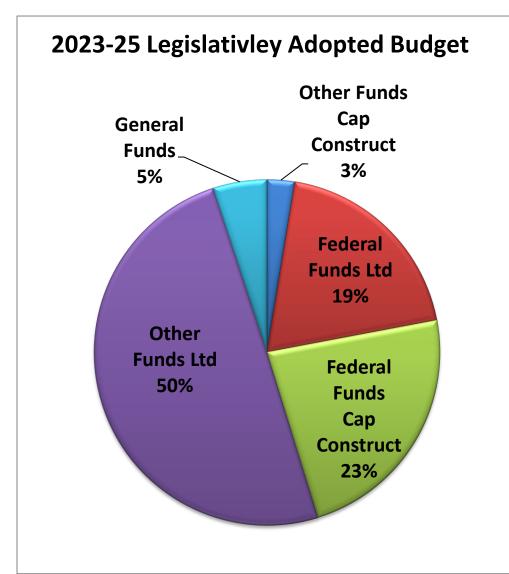

Other Funds Ltd:

The largest OF Expenditure (over \$14M) for the Agency is for Aviation System Action Program (ASAP) Grants. This program was established as a result of HB 2075 in the 2015 session that increased Jet Fuel and Avgas tax revenue by 2 cents per gallon. This program provides funding for grants to airports throughout the state for economic development, FAA grant match, emergency preparedness and commercial air service to rural Oregon.

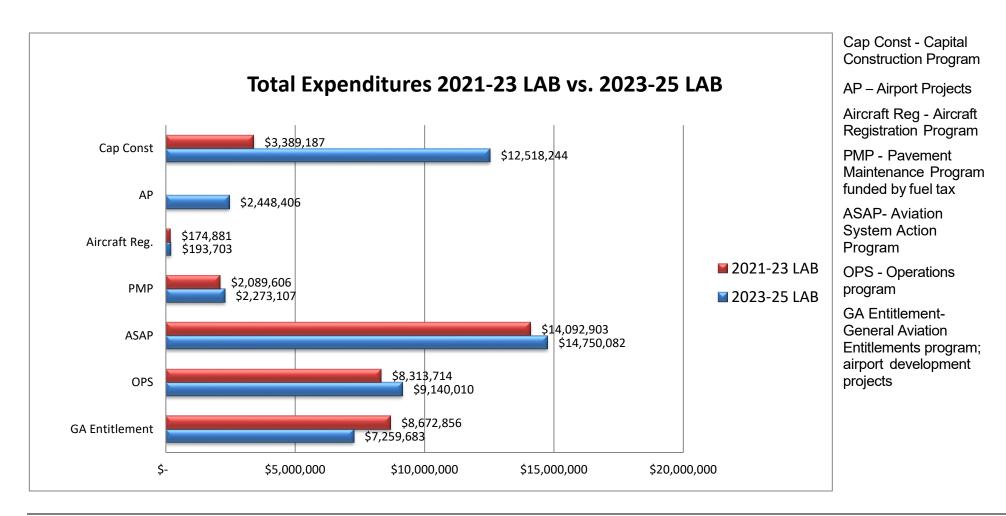
Federal Funds Ltd and Federal Funds Cap Const: Grants received from the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) for planning and airport projects that address safety, operations, and infrastructure development at National Plan of Integrated Airports System (NPIAS) state owned airports in Oregon. There are fifty-five airports in Oregon that are part of the FAA's NPIAS including 12 owned by the state. Each of the state owned NPIAS airports can receive Non-Primary Entitlement funds up to \$150,000 per year from the FAA. The money is not made available until required for projects. Non-Primary Entitlement funds are available for 4 years and if not used within 4 years are returned to the FAA. These funds are reimbursable if conditions imposed by 39 federal grant assurances are not met.

Other Funds Cap Const: These are the required matching funds for FAA funded capital construction projects.

General Funds: These are budgeted for a runway rehabilitation project at Cape Blanco State Airport.

Legislatively Adopted Budget (LAB) for the 2023-25 biennium reflects standard inflationary increases with the exception of Attorney General fees and State Government Service Charges. These budget items align to the standard inflation rates and assessments set by the Department of Administrative Services. The LAB also reflects existing salary packages approved by the legislature. In addition, it includes Policy Option Packages proposed for the 2023-25 biennium.



Mission Statement

- · Advocacy for airports, pilots, and aviation related businesses.
- Facilitation of state and federal aviation funding programs.
- Oversight of aviation policy and assets as part of the emergency management system.

- Manage initiatives and programs to enhance aviation, e.g., public/private partnerships, aviation education.
- Manage aviation and aviation related land use administrative rules.
- Own and operate 28 state airports and facilities.
- Collect, Monitor and Distribute revenue from two cent increase on Jet Fuel and Avgas tax, provide grants for economic
 development, FAA grant Match, emergency response, to extend commercial air service to rural Oregon and for safety
 improvements at state owned airports.

Agency Two Year Plan

Process Improvement Efforts

The Department of Aviation made a number of process improvements during the current biennium and is committed to the development and realization of its strategic plan:

The agency has worked to implement the Legislatively Adopted Areas of Focus for state government.

- Primary Focus Areas for the Agency include:
 - o A Thriving Oregon Economy
 - Statewide Capital Improvement program (SCIP) in partnership with the Federal Aviation Administration and federally funded airports in the state
 - Support for the up-and-coming Uncrewed Aircraft Systems Industry in Oregon and the three FAA test sites in the state.
 - Excellence in State Government
 - Support for the Oregon Airport Managers Association (OAMA)
 - Support for the Oregon Pilots Association (OPA)
 - Participation and providing expertise in public use Airport Master Plans
 - Participating in multi-modal coordination
 - Actively working with Business Oregon and Regional Solutions teams on aviation issues
 - Participation in the Oregon Freight Advisory Committee (OFAC)
 - Modal Review of Connect Oregon projects
 - Providing expertise and assistance on aviation-related legislation, Uncrewed Aircraft Systems legislative issues and UAS Stakeholders group participation
 - Safer, Healthier Communities
 - Removing Obstructions at state owned airports to provide safer access to runways for departures and arrivals
 - Evaluation of tall structures statewide in coordination with local communities and the FAA to help make airports safer and raise awareness of the importance of obstruction removal and avoidance.
 - Preserving airport pavement through the Pavement Maintenance Program (PMP)
 - Providing Citizen Centric assistance to aviation constituents, airport owners/sponsors and aviation system users throughout Oregon
 - Responsible Environmental Stewardship
 - Work with airport owners and the FAA on endangered and threatened species at Oregon airports.
 - Work with airport owners to reduce impact of noise around airport communities.

Additional agency-wide process improvements include:

- During 2020 three positions were eliminated due to revenue loss from the pandemic. These positions were re-established during the February 2022 session based on improving Jet Fuel tax forecasts.
- A 2 cent increase to Jet Fuel and Aviation Gas Tax was passed in the 2015 session allowing the agency to distribute the revenue to assist airports in Oregon with match requirements for FAA Airport Improvement Program grants, to make grants for emergency preparedness and infrastructure projects to make grants for services critical and essential to aviation, aviation related business development, airport development for local economic benefit, and for safety improvements at state owned airports and to assist commercial air service to rural Oregon This tax increase was set to sunset in 2022 which would have eliminated the grant program. The agency proposed POP 100 and HB 2434, which passed during the 2021 regular session and eliminated the sunset of this aviation grant program.
- The agency recently conducted a disparity study. This study evaluates if disadvantage business enterprises have equal access to contracting opportunities at the statewide level. This study was conducted in coordination with the FAA and was 90% federally funded.
- The department revised revenue collections to follow executive order 17-09 for aircraft registration including an aging report for past due renewals and a collaboration with the Department of Revenue for a more assertive collection effort to pursue all revenues due to the agency. Results have been a record level of aircraft registration fees collected.
- ODAV abolished the pilot registration requirement and fee in Oregon in 2017 with an agency sponsored Legislative Concept which increased efficiency in the agency and better serves the needs of the pilot community.
- In the 2019 session agency proposed legislation was passed to allow ODAV to select central service providers. The goal of this legislation was to increase agency efficiency and reduce costs.
- Also, during the 2019 session agency proposed legislation was passed to help the agency enforce vehicle pedestrian deviations to increase airport safety.
- ODAV updated the public records request rule and policy to align with DAS.

Agency Programs

Most Aviation programs are funded by Other Funds such as aviation fuel tax and aviation user fees and Federal Funds provided by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). Following are descriptions of our program areas.

Operations Division

The Operations Division oversees the administration, operation, and maintenance of 28 public use airports through four program areas: Statewide Services, Airport Services, Airport Maintenance and Planning. This division also provides the core government services of the Aviation Department covering planning, land use, evaluation of tall structures, inspections of airports and site surveys of proposed new airports.

Statewide Services:

3 FTE

- Lead and manage the agency.
- Coordinate and develop statewide aviation policy.

- Promote aviation related economic development.
- Advocate for safe, efficient aviation system.
- Develop solutions to statewide and regional aviation problems such as citing of airports, noise mitigation, airport and heliport funding.
- Foster strong internal and external relationships.
- Provide public information and outreach services.
- Coordinate agency activities with the Oregon Legislature.
- Provide technical and aviation related support services.
- Manage aviation archives.
- Manage agency budget and finances.

Airport Services:

- 4 FTE Oversee more than 265 leases and other property agreements.
- Advise airport sponsors, provides inspections, planning, engineering, and construction of airport development projects.
- Coordinate tenant relations.
- Provide advice for and administers federal airport development grants.
- Conduct airport safety inspections at public use airports statewide.
- Investigate proposed new airport and heliport sites.
- License and register all Oregon airports and heliports.
- Provide technical advice to airport owners and operators on a variety of airport issues including site surveys, safety, security, and feasibility

Airport Maintenance:

2.33 FTE

- Maintain 28 state-owned airports to applicable federal and state safety standards.
- Routine and preventive maintenance such as mowing, obstruction removal, pavement preservation, and lighting maintenance.

Planning:

4.5 FTE

- Administer grant program for economic development, FAA grant match and emergency preparation.
- Apply for and administers federal airport development grants.
- Develop and oversee contracts for consultant engineers and construction contractors.
- Manage construction projects at state-owned airports.
- Direct planning studies at state-owned airports.
- Develop and implement the Oregon Aviation Plan and related policies.
- Conduct continuous aviation system planning consistent with Federal Aviation Administration requirements and guidelines.
- Provide technical assistance on airport planning and development to local communities and governments.
- Comment on land use and zoning requests that may impact civil aviation.
- Review proposed development that may pose a safety hazard to aviation in Oregon.

Aircraft Registration

This program functions to ensure that revenue for aircraft registered in Oregon is collected. The Aircraft Registration Program manages and administers the AERO II software system that houses aircraft registration information. Revenue from Aircraft Registration fees serve two purposes. First the revenue provides for the agency's match dollars for all FAA Airport Improvement Grants for General Aviation Entitlement and for Capital Construction projects at the state's twelve federally funded airports. The FAA sponsor match amount is 10% of the total project costs. The second purpose for aircraft registration revenue is to help fund search and rescue activities in Oregon. This includes helping to fund a Search and Rescue Coordinator position at Oregon Emergency Management and to reimburse actual search fuel costs to counties.

Aircraft Registration:

1 FTE

- Manages registrations for over 3,500 aircraft per year.
- Front line contact with Oregon's pilots and aircraft owners.
- Provides the front office reception for the agency.
- Funds match for FAA Airport Improvement grants
- Funds Search and Rescue activities in Oregon

General Aviation Entitlements

The General Aviation Entitlement Program administers projects at the twelve state owned airports that are part of the National Plan of Integrated Airport System (NPIAS). This program is used to address safety, operations, infrastructure development at NPIAS airports. Projects are determined based upon a combination of factors including but not limited to pavement condition studies, safety, FAA compliance inspections, FAA design standards, short- and long-range planning goals for each of Aviation's 12 federally funded airports. A five-year capital improvement plan (CIP) is approved by both the Oregon Aviation Board and the FAA. These projects are typically funded by the FAA at 90% of project costs.

General Aviation Entitlement Program:

0 FTE

Aviation System Action Program (ASAP)

The ASAP program established in 2015 by HB 2075 and was made up of 3 programs. As of the passage of HB 2434 (2021) it is now made up of 2 programs.

- Critical Oregon Airport Relief (COAR) program. These grants are distributed to assist airports in Oregon with match requirements for Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Airport Improvement Program grants, emergency preparedness and infrastructure projects in accordance with the Oregon Resilience Plan, services critical and essential to aviation, aviation related business development, and airport development for local economic benefit. As of the passage of HB 2434 (2021) the COAR program also includes grants to assist commercial air service to rural Oregon.
- Rural Oregon Aviation Relief (ROAR) These grants are used to assist commercial air service to rural Oregon. (This program was eliminated in 2021 with the passage of HB 2434)
- State Owned Airports Reserve (SOAR) program funds are distributed towards state-owned airports for the purposes of safety improvements and infrastructure projects at public use airports.

- This program was part of the General Aviation Entitlement appropriation from inception until the 19-21 GB. It was separated into its own appropriation in the 19-21 LAB.
- This program was set to sunset on January 1st, 2022. Agency proposed HB 2434, which passed during the 2021 regular session and removed the sunset.

ASAP: 0 FTE

Airport Projects

The Airport Projects program is a new program that was established in 2022. This program was established due to ODAV receiving general funds from HB 5202 in the 2022 session for three airport projects. Two of these airports, Salem Municipal Airport and Illinois Valley are not owned by the state of Oregon. ODAV passed through funds to these two airports for projects that included upgrades and constructing a new fueling system. The third airport to receive general funds was Cape Blanco State Airport for a runway rehabilitation. This project is managed by ODAV. This is the first time the agency has received general funds for airport projects.

Airport Projects Program:

0 FTE

Pavement Maintenance

Pavement Maintenance Program is a state-funded aid program to assist airports in undertaking pavement preventative maintenance, the most cost-effective means to helping preserve the system's airport pavement and pavement infrastructure as addressed in the Oregon Aviation Plan. The program evaluates airport pavement at 1/3 of the state per year. The year following evaluation, airports with the highest need that agree to have work done get scheduled for pavement maintenance work with contractors hired by ODAV. The PMP contractors perform maintenance projects at approximately 14 airports per year. There are 67 paved public use airports in the state. Some airports do not require pavement maintenance; choose not to participate in the program; or have pavement that needs repair work (more expensive) versus maintenance.

Pavement Maintenance Program:

.5 FTE

Capital Construction Program

Capital Construction projects are necessary for the safe and efficient operation of airports. They are also necessary to maintain design standards and expanded future traffic for the 28 general aviation airports owned and maintained by the Department of Aviation. These airports are in various stages of development. Some require land acquisition to provide protection from incompatible land uses and to allow for expansion and needed improvements. Others require construction projects simply to maintain the airport's safety standards. For the state's 16 non-NPIAS public use airports this program relies on funds from other state grant opportunities or planned improvements as budgeted in state funds. For the states twelve NPIAS Airports funding is provided 90% from the FAA and 10% from Aircraft Registration Revenue. This agency has coordinated a 5-year plan with the FAA for capital projects planned at these NPIAS airports. The Federal funds are Federal Airport Improvement Program (AIP) funds and are either AIP entitlement grant funds or AIP discretionary grant funds. All projects that are completed using any AIP grant funds are subject to all federal policies and grant assurances.

Capital Construction Program:

0 FTE

Environmental Factors:

COVID-19 Leads to Uncertain Funding Available for Aviation in Oregon

The most significant change in the funding of aviation is the effect of COVID-19 pandemic on aviation. Jet fuel tax and avgas tax make up over half of the revenue for ODAV. The majority of aviation fuel in Oregon is consumed by airlines, who experienced reductions in passenger demand by as much as 95% during the peak of the pandemic. As a result, airlines reduced their number of flights by as much as 70%, causing a significant drop in fuel tax revenues. The duration of the reduced flight schedule and the recovery period is expected to have effects well beyond the current biennium. The agency was forced to take drastic program cuts by as much as \$4.2M or 13% from 19-21 LAB and 3 positions or 20% FTE in the 21-23 Legislatively Adopted Budget to lower expenditures to reduced revenue levels. As revenue forecasts begin to improve the agency slowly began increasing its limitation to pre-pandemic levels. The agency was approved to re-establish 3 positions and increase limitations during the February 2022 session. The volatility of the agency's main revenue source makes it difficult for the agency to plan for future investments in aviation.

4 Year Lapse of Connect Oregon Funding

Other significant changes in the funding of aviation include the lapse of Connect Oregon funds for aviation projects. ODOT's Connect Oregon grant program is an initiative to invest in non-highway modes of transportation infrastructure to ensure Oregon's transportation system is strong, diverse, and efficient. Connect Oregon grants have provided over \$97M of funding for aviation over six cycles. This revenue has been leveraged with over \$353M of grant funding from the FAA. The amount of money that aviation leverages with Connect Oregon grants is more than the combination of all other modes of transportation. House Bill 2017, (the transportation package), passed in the 2017 legislative session and dedicated Connect Oregon funds to four specific non-aviation projects. Connect Oregon, once a vital funding source for Oregon aviation, was not available for aviation grants in the 17-19 or 19-21 biennium for the competitive process. It has been made available for aviation grants again in 21-23.

Pilot and Aviation Professional Shortage

The aviation industry worldwide is facing a major shortage of not only pilots but also flight instructors, aviation mechanics, inspectors, technicians, aerospace engineers, air traffic controllers, and other skilled aviation professionals. A 2023 study by Boeing estimates airlines will need to supply more than 649k new commercial pilots and 690k new airline maintenance technicians and over 938K new cabin crew members over the next twenty years. To keep up with the global economic expansion airlines are projected to acquire tens of thousands of new commercial jetliners over the next twenty years and aviation professionals will be in demand to fly and maintain these airplanes. Aviation employers demand job ready employees and there is a skills gap between employers' expectations and the abilities of the available workforce. For pilots, the skills gap is partially attributed to the steep costs associated with obtaining the necessary education and flight training required to obtain a commercial pilot license. Federal legislation passed in 2013 increased the minimum flight hours required for new pilots from 250 to 1,500. Another contributing factor is the lack of exposure to aviation careers among the future generation. The industry needs to get young people excited about aviation careers. The cost and the required hours combined with the lack of exposure have contributed to a substantial decrease in the number of new pilots entering the pipeline. Additionally, the FAA has a mandated retirement age of 65 for commercial pilots which means that existing pilots are exiting their careers faster than the industry can replace them. This shortage has led to bankruptcies of multiple small carriers and the elimination of air service in some cities and is partially responsible for the elimination of air service in Klamath Falls. The shortage will ultimately lead to decreased flight options for consumers as well as increased ticket prices.

Decrease in Gallons of Jet fuel and Aviation fuel sold

There is volatility in the volume of Jet Fuel and Aviation fuel (Avgas) sold in the state that was occurring before the COVID-19 pandemic. Jet fuel gallons sold have not reached the level of 2006 due to a change in business model of the commercial air service industry. Airlines have consolidated flights, cut unprofitable routes, have more efficient engines and fly almost entirely at or near capacity.

Rise in UAS Operations

The proliferation of Uncrewed Aircraft Systems, (UAS) becoming part of the aviation inventory is changing the paradigm of aviation. Low-cost mass produced UAS and the pilots that fly them have exceeded the number of crewed aircraft and pilots in the FAA's database. Jobs previously performed by crewed aircraft are increasingly being done in uncrewed aircraft. This change decreases the demand for crewed aircraft with higher fuel volume consumed in favor of uncrewed aircraft with significantly lower fuel use and cost.

Initiatives and Accomplishments

Initiatives:

- 1. Protect Public-Use Airports:
 - a. Assist jurisdictions with attaining compliance with Airport Planning Rule. (OAR 660-013)
 - b. Advocate for policies and funding favorable for Oregon airports.
 - c. Issue grants to state public use airports through the Aviation System Action Program, (ASAP)
 - d. Assistance with maintaining and strengthening commercial air service in the state increased assistance with raising awareness of the importance of airports as recovery locations for disaster assistance and resiliency.
 - e. Coordinate with counties and FAA to educate policy makers on protecting airports from encroachment due to non-aviation compatible development (this is an FAA grant assurance requirement for acceptance of federal FAA grants).
- 2. Lead change in technology and innovation in aviation:
 - a. Encourage and report on availability of non-leaded aviation fuels as a replacement for 100 Low Lead Avgas.
 - b. Work with the Federal Aviation Administration to advance the use of NextGen and satellite-based navigation, weather, and communications systems in Oregon.
 - c. Report on and provide assistance on Uncrewed Aerial Systems (UAS) development in Oregon. Register all public use UAS and make recommendations to Oregon Legislature on registration of commercial use UAS.
 - d. Implement web-based accessibility for registration programs.
 - e. Develop and mature information systems into state-of-the-art database systems.
 - f. Implement Electronic Airport Layout Plans and make them accessible from the agency website.
 - g. Coordinated with the FAA to standardize database information on state aviation projects and grants.
- 3. Support Communities through Economic Development:
 - a. Support legislation to allow Through-the-Fence/Public-Private Partnership Program at non-commercial public-use airports.
 - b. Support and encourage Oregon aviation Industry cluster that promotes aviation related jobs and businesses.

- c. Support retention and expansion of commercial air services.
- 4. Improve Safety and Operating Condition of State-owned/operated airports:
 - a. Construct required safety improvement projects (Five-Year Capital Improvements Plan).
 - b. Attempt to make each airport financially self-sustainable by allocating costs to users.
 - c. Constructed Control Tower at Aurora State Airport. Operate tower under FAA Contract Tower Program.
 - d. Maintain state-owned/operated airports efficiently and effectively. (Pre-positioned equipment, local agreements).
 - e. Attain sufficient staffing levels for operations and maintenance by increasing revenue or reducing workload.
 - f. Improve security, accessibility, infrastructure, and safety (mishap free separation of vehicle/aircraft).

Accomplishments:

- 1) PMP study: ODAV commissioned a study with FAA grant to evaluate the benefit of the Pavement Maintenance Program.
 - a. Results showed an average of 20.4-year increase in the life of pavement preserved by the PMP.
 - b. This provides cost avoidance of a complete runway renovation cycle averaging \$2-3 million per general aviation runway.
- 2) Awarded over \$20M aviation grants to airports throughout Oregon from the Aviation System Action Program since inception.
 - a. Over \$7.4M of these grants were awarded for FAA Airport Improvement Program grant match. Leveraging each ASAP grant dollar nine times with federal funds.
 - b. Over \$1.6M of these grants were awarded for emergency preparedness in accordance with the Oregon Aviation Plan.
 - c. Almost \$5.3M was awarded for services critical or essential to aviation in Oregon.
 - d. \$6.4M was awarded for state-owned airport improvement projects.
 - e. Over \$600K was awarded for commercial air service to rural Oregon.
- 3) Fully implemented Statewide Capital Improvement program: Partnered with FAA and 49 federally funded airports (all with exception of commercial air service airports) in Oregon to leverage federal grants.
 - a. Helped keep millions of expiring FAA grant funding in the state by helping identify airports that the funds could be transferred to.
 - b. Provided liaison with FAA and airport sponsors to advocate for their projects in the FAA's 5-year statewide Capital Improvement Plan.
 - c. Provided expertise on FAA grant processes to rural airport sponsors when the cities, counties or ports didn't have a dedicated airport manager.
- 4) Completed a Disadvantage Business Enterprise Study with the FAA to evaluate if DBEs have equal access to contracting opportunities at a statewide level.
- 5) Removed ASAP sunset in 2021 through HB 2434 to be able to continue to administer funds through the Aviation System Action Program.
- 6) A Century of the Oregon Department of Aviation. On February 11th, 2021, the Oregon Department of Aviation celebrated 100 years since its founding as the first and oldest Aviation governmental department in the US.

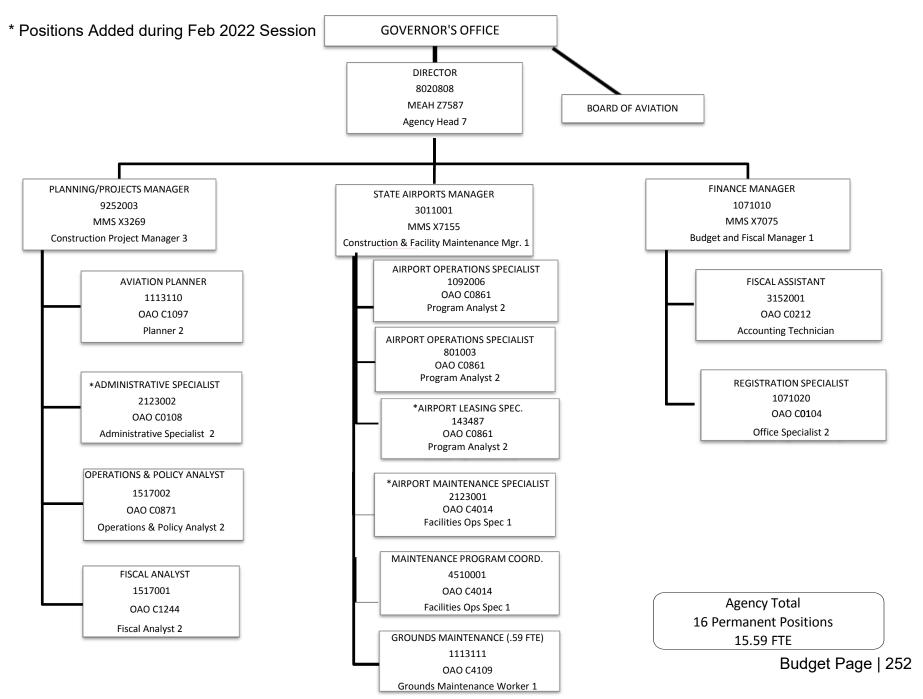

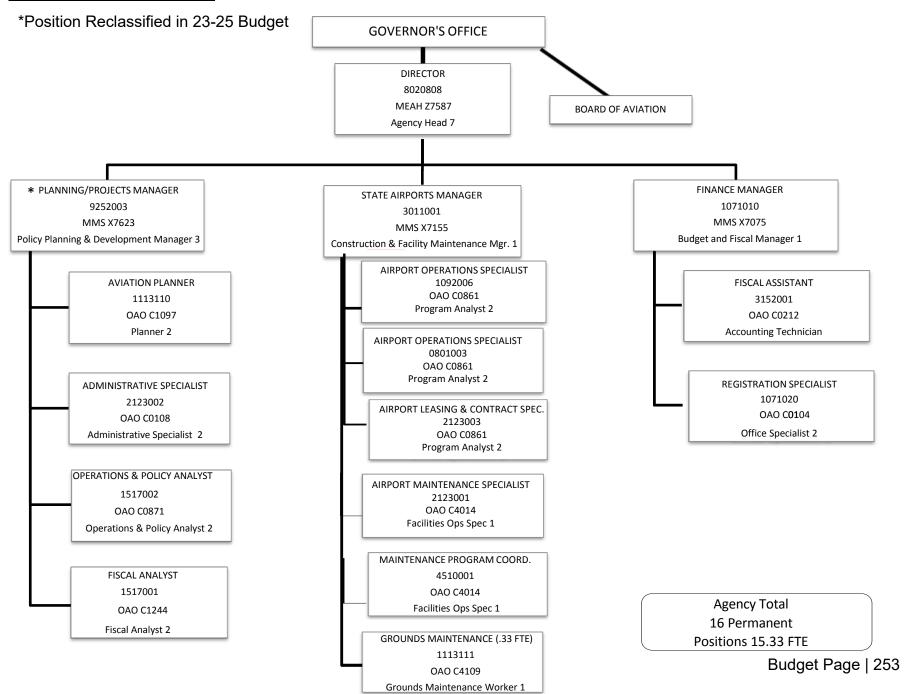

REVENUES

Revenue sources

The Department of Aviation's other fund budget is based on the official Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) revenue forecast, which is updated every six months. Each update considers the new economic data and assumptions impacting aviation revenue. The ODOT revenue forecast model consists of about 150 variables. Most of these econometric equations have a high degree of proven usefulness and accuracy. The input to the model comes from three sources; 1) actual data, 2) Official State of Oregon forecast by DAS, and 3) national variables forecast produced by HIS Global Insights Inc.

The Department of Aviation receives all its revenue from aviation system user fees and taxes. Following is a list of funding sources:

Other Funds

- 3 cent per-gallon tax on jet fuel.
- 11 cents-per gallon tax on aviation gasoline.
- Annual aircraft registration fees
- Aircraft dealer license fees.
- Leases and agreements at state-owned airports.
- Other Revenue.

Federal Funds

- 100 percent of the federal funds received for airport projects are from the Federal Aviation Administration.
- These fees come from federal fuel taxes and federal airline ticket taxes.

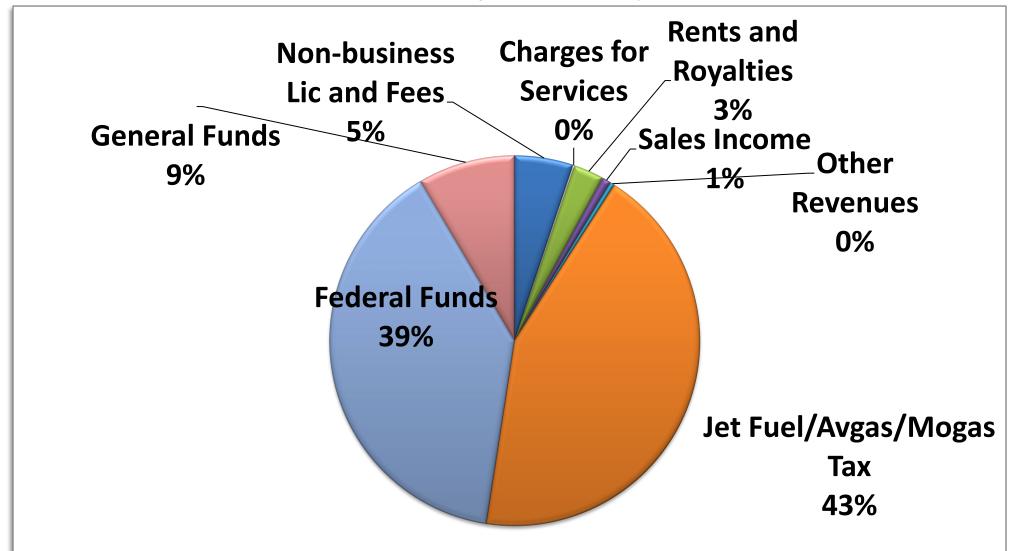
The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) authorizes grants for state aviation system planning and for state system-wide airport planning. FAA grants also fund construction and planning for state-owned airports. FAA grants typically cover 90 percent of project costs and require a 10 percent match coming from state other fund revenue. The FAA also funds airport safety inspections.

- A. Programs funded with each revenue source:
 - o Federal funds are used for purposes listed above.
 - o All other activities are funded by a combination of fuel taxes, registration and license fees, and lease revenue.
- B. General limits on use of funds:
 - Funds are restricted for aviation uses only by federal grants and state law. Grants are authorized by FAA under a reimbursable financial agreement that directs the airport sponsor to comply with 39 FAA grant assurances and commit to keeping the airport open and in compliance with the grant assurances.
 - Revenues from approximately 0.5 cents per-gallon tax on Jet Fuel and approximately 4 cents per-gallon on Avgas funds the Pavement Maintenance Program in accordance with ORS 836.072.

General Funds The general funds in this budget are appropriated for a runway rehab project at Cape Blanco State Airport.

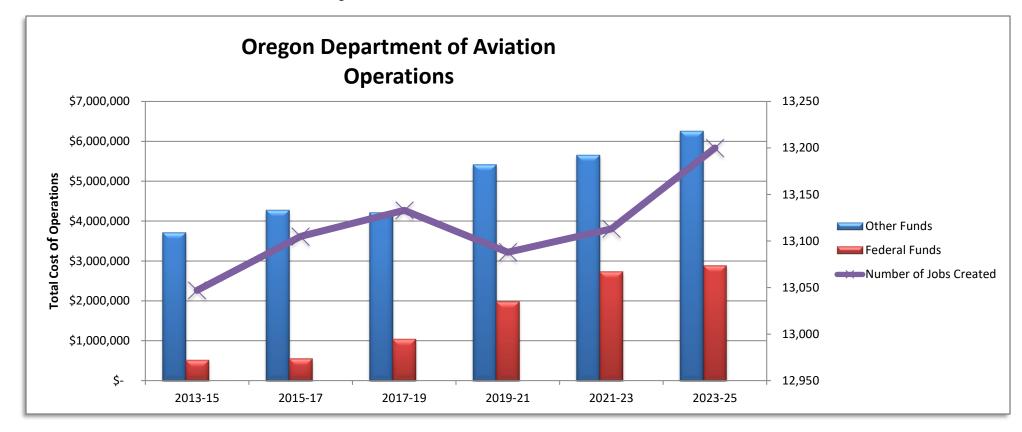

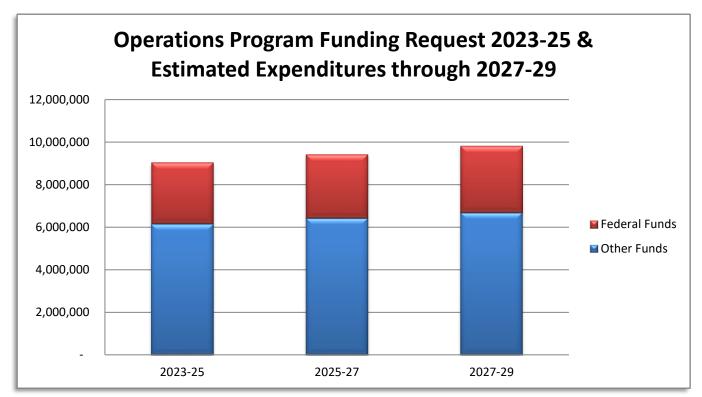

Program Overview

The Operations Division oversees the administration, operation, and maintenance of 28 public use airports through four program areas: Statewide Services, Airport Services, Airport Maintenance and Planning. This division also provides the core government services of the Aviation Department covering airport management, planning, land use, evaluation of tall structures and inspections of airports and site survey of proposed new airports.

Program Funding Request



The above chart represents the proposed costs and performance for the 2023-25 biennium and estimated costs and performance through the 2027-29 biennium. Inflation is calculated at standard inflation rates. Expenditure descriptions: Personal Services, Service and Supplies, and Capital Outlay.

Program Description

The Operations Division is comprised of four program units: Statewide Services, Airport Services, Airport Maintenance and Planning.

Responsibilities:

- Promotes economic development at state owned airports, coordination with FAA and statewide airport sponsors.
- Promotes job growth at state airports via Through the Fence (Public/Private venture).
- Provides employment at airports for private industry (FBOs, mechanics, retail businesses)
- Owns/manages 28 airports including 12 FAA funded (National Plan of Integrated Airport system NPIAS).
- Licenses and inspects 97 public use airports. Registers 360 plus private airports.
- Manages over 300 hangar, land lease and access agreements.
- Coordinates with counties regarding land use around airports.
- Reviews tall structure applications for safety in relation to airports.
- Coordinates Statewide Capital Improvements on behalf of FAA for 55 NPIAS airports.
- Provides aviation expertise and assistance to public and private airports, counties, and local governments in Oregon.
- Provides leadership and assistance to Oregon Pilots Association (OPA), Oregon Airport Managers Association (OAMA), Aircraft Owners,
 Pilots Association (AOPA) and other aviation organizations.
- Provides staff liaison to Oregon Emergency Management for aviation related emergencies and crisis response teams.

Statewide Services: Contains the leadership and management capabilities for the Agency. Develop the statewide aviation policy and plan. Advocates for a safe, efficient aviation system. Develops solutions to statewide and regional aviation problems such as citing of airports, noise mitigation, airport and heliport funding and placement. Fosters strong internal and external relationships both with communities as well as authority and policy leaders. Provides public information and outreach services and coordinate agency activities with the Legislative bodies.

Airport Services: Manages 300 plus leases and other property agreements. Oversee inspections, planning, engineering, and construction on multiple development projects. Coordinates tenant relations for state-owned airports and conducts airport safety inspections on state-owned and other Oregon airports. Investigates proposed new airport and heliport sites, license and register airports and heliports and provide technical advice to airport owners and operators on a variety of airport safety, citing, and feasibility issues.

Airport Maintenance: This program is charged with maintaining 28 state-owned airports to applicable federal and state safety standards, includes routine and preventative maintenance such as obstruction removal, pavement preservation, airport lighting and navigational air maintenance. Keeps airports safe for recreation, emergency operations- medevac, Forest fire fighting bases, disaster relief (Tsunami, cargo delivery).

Planning: This program develops and implements the Oregon Aviation Plan and related policies. Conducts continuous aviation system planning consistent with Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) requirements and guidelines. Administers grant and aid programs for airport development and maintenance. Manages consultant, engineer, and contractor contracts for capital construction projects as well as all other projects at Oregon airports.

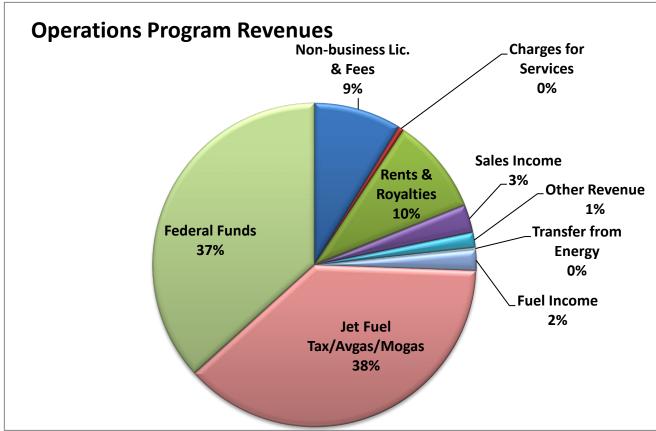

Describe the various funding streams that support the program

The entire Operating Division is funded by State Other Funds and Federal Funds and must operate more like a small business than a government agency. The main source of funding is derived from Jet Fuel Tax revenue. Other revenue sources include but are not limited to, project specific federal funds, Avgas tax, Mogas tax, leases, access fees and fuel flowage fees.

Describe how the 2023-25 funding proposal advanced by the agency compares to the program authorized for the agency in 2021-2023

The 21-23 budget was reduced due to revenue decline related to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Operations division had a reduction of 3 FTE and a decrease to the operation limitation by approximately 9%. During the February 2022 session the 3 positions were restored. At this time limitation was also increased in operations due to an increase in jet fuel forecasts. The 23-25 budget has restored operations to pre-pandemic Page | 265

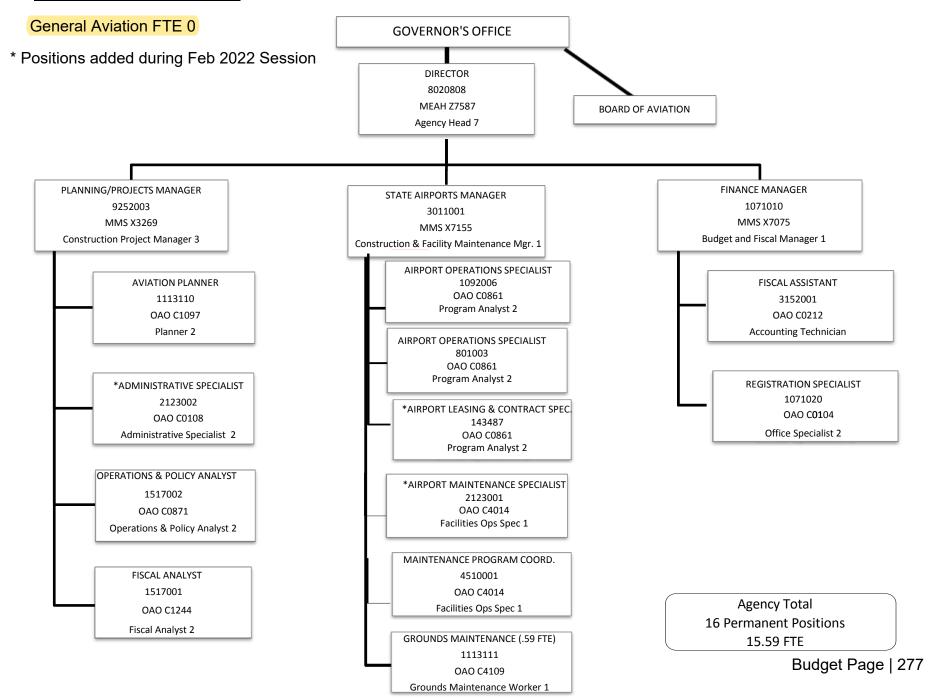

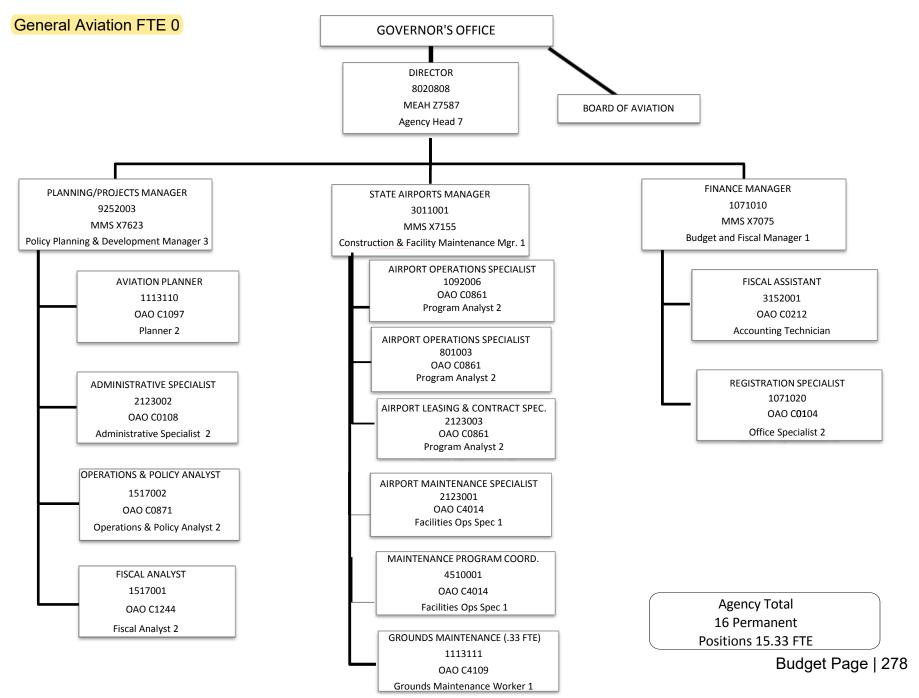
Organization Chart 2021-23

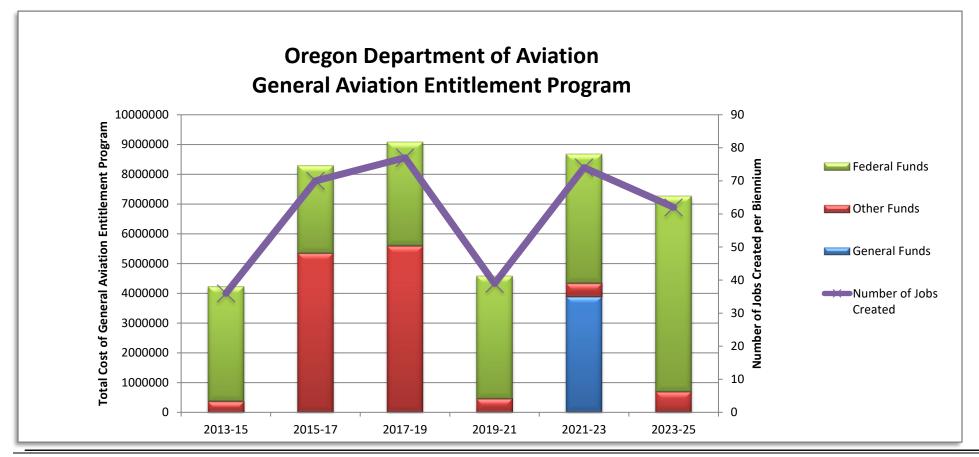

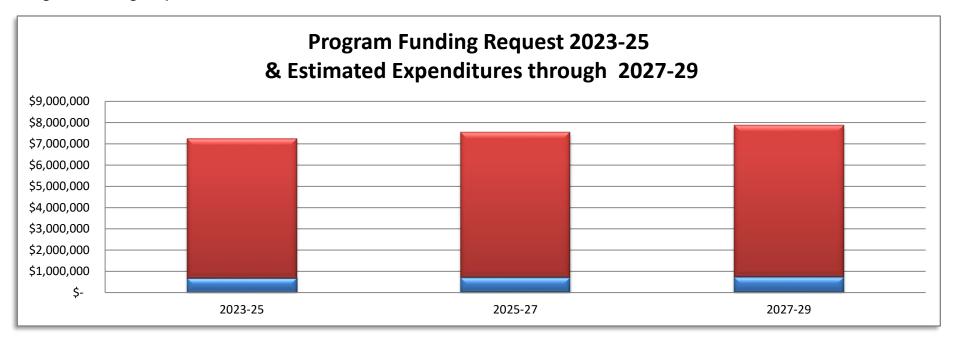
Program Overview

General Aviation Entitlement Program administers FAA funded airport projects that address safety, operational, and development at airports in Oregon. FAA Grants are typically funded at 90% of project costs with remaining 10% paid by airport sponsor (owner).

Prior to 19-21 the GA Entitlement Appropriation also included ASAP. ASAP became its own appropriation in 19-21 and that is why there is a decrease in limitation for the GA Entitlement Other Funds starting in 19-21.

The 21-23 Biennium included general funds that were authorized from HB 5202 in the 2022 session for three airport projects. Two of these airports, Salem Municipal Airport and Illinois Valley are not owned by the state of Oregon. ODAV passed through funds to these two airports for projects that included upgrades and constructing a new fueling system. The third airport to receive general funds was Cape Blanco State Airport for a runway rehabilitation. This project is managed by ODAV. This is the first time the agency has received general funds for airport projects.

PROGRAM UNITS-GENERAL AVIATION ENTITLEMENT

Program Description

The General Aviation Entitlement program has three sections:

- 1. <u>Capital Improvement Planning</u> evaluates on a yearly basis each of the twelve state owned airports that are part of the National Plan of federal Integrated Airport Systems (NPIAS), to address safety, operation, and infrastructure development. The Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) contains all projected construction and capital improvement projects to keep the airports up to minimum standards as set forth by the FAA. The five-year CIP plan is vetted and approved by the FAA on a yearly basis.
- 2. <u>Capital and Construction Project Management</u> services are provided and/or managed by Oregon Department of Aviation (ODAV) to meet federal grant assurance obligations and receive federal funding for qualifying projects. ODAV provides technical services, engineering support and construction management services for all projects that receive Airport Improvement Grant (AIP) funding from the FAA.
- 3. <u>AIP Grant Administration and Management</u> administers grants for capital improvement and construction projects at the twelve state owned airports that are part of the National Plan of Integrated Airport Systems (NPIAS) to address safety, operation, and infrastructure development. If the federal grant assurances are not maintained and adhered to in accordance with the federal agreement and policy, the airport owner is responsible for paying penalties and reimbursement of all AIP funds received within the previous twenty-year period. ODAV is responsible for grant assurance compliance through this program. All projects are determined based upon a combination of factors including but not limited to pavement condition studies, safety and compliance inspections, design standards, and short- and long-range planning goals for each ODAV owned airport. ODAV is obligated by federal grant assurances to maintain all state owned NPIAS airports in accordance with federal grant requirements for at least twenty years after each date of issued grant. In cases where federal AIP grants are used to purchase land, ODAV must maintain grant assurances at those airports in perpetuity or until sold or transferred. It must remain as an airport even if sold. As of 2023, ODAV has federal requirements tied to grant assurances in the amount of approximately 50 million dollars for its 12 NPIAS airports, not including land value payback assumptions, which is calculated at fair market value.

The National Plan of Integrated Airport Systems (NPIAS) identifies nearly 3,400 airports nationally that are significant to national air transportation and thus eligible to receive Federal grants under the Airport Improvement Program (AIP). There are a total of fifty-five NPIAS airports in Oregon, twelve of which are owned and managed by ODAV. Safe management, maintenance, and operation of the twelve-state owned NPIAS airports are governed by the FAA with federal grant assurances and compliance programs. Each non-primary NPIAS airport may receive up to \$150,000 in airport improvement (AIP) grant funds annually for qualifying projects. NPIAS airports must maintain and upgrade infrastructure to a certain level of standards that are set forth by the FAA design guidelines and standards and further set into agreement by Federal Grant assurances. The FAA is required to provide Congress with a 5-year estimate of AIP eligible development that will bring these NPIAS airports up to current design standards and add capacity to congested airports.

Program Performance

The agency's twelve non-primary NPIAS airports can receive up to \$150,000 for each airport per federal calendar year for qualifying projects. Ultimate program performance can be measured by the agency's ability to plan projects properly with the FAA and receive the maximum entitlement per year in the amount of \$1,800,000. To make this possible per year, the agency must also allocate and spend the AIP grant entitlement funds in accordance with all federal and state policies.

Enabling Legislation/Program Authorization

- Plan for development of airports, state airways, airplane industries and aviation. (ORS 835.015)
- Cooperate with other governmental agencies in the development of aeronautical activities. (ORS 835.015)
- Plan, establish, construct, enlarge, improve, maintain, equip, operate, regulate, protect, and police airports and air navigation facilities. (ORS 836.025)
- Improve and maintain state-owned airports pursuant to Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) contract. (ORS 835.025)

PROGRAM UNITS—GENERAL AVIATION ENTITLEMENT

Describe the various funding streams that support the program

A five-year capital improvement plan is approved by both the Oregon Aviation Board as well as the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). These projects are typically funded 90% by federal funds and 10% by other funds. The other fund source for General Aviation Entitlement Projects is Aircraft Registration revenue. ODAV goes before the Oregon Legislature to get authorization (Limitation) to apply for FAA grants for GA Entitlement projects or for individual Capital projects. Funding for safety improvements at state-owned airports, and grants for economic development, FAA grant match, emergency preparedness and commercial air service to rural Oregon is from 2 cents per gallon Jet Fuel tax and Avgas tax.

Describe how the 2023-25 funding proposal advanced by the agency compares to the program authorized for the agency in 2021-23

Policy Option Package

POP 102 General Aviation Entitlement Projects increases the GA Entitlement Limitation by over \$5.8 Million for 15 projects planned at 8 state owned, federally funded airports throughout the state.

General Funds

The 21-23 legislatively adopted budget included approximately \$3.8M in general funds for 3 specific projects that were approved in the 2022 session. This funding was phased out in the 23-25 budget. These projects were the Cape Blanco state airport runway rehab, the Salem Municipal Airport upgrades, and a new fueling system at Illinois Valley. The Salem Airport and Illinois Valley funds were passed through to these airports because they are not owned by the state. The Cape Blanco project is still underway, and this project is now budgeted in the Airport Construction Projects appropriation.

Phase Outs

In addition to the \$3.8M general funds phased out of this program there was approximately \$3.5M federal funds and other funds phased out of this budget due to projects that were completed.

Other Funds and Federal Funds

The 2023-25 funding proposal is over \$2M higher in federal funds and over \$200K higher in other funds as compared to the budget in 2021-23 due to more projects scheduled in 2023-25.

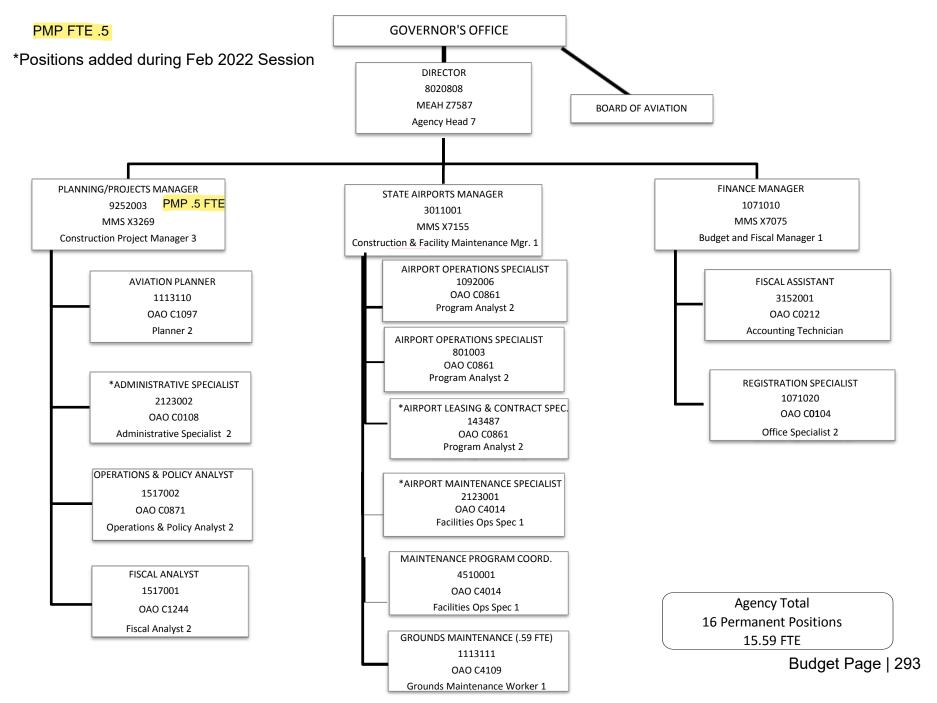

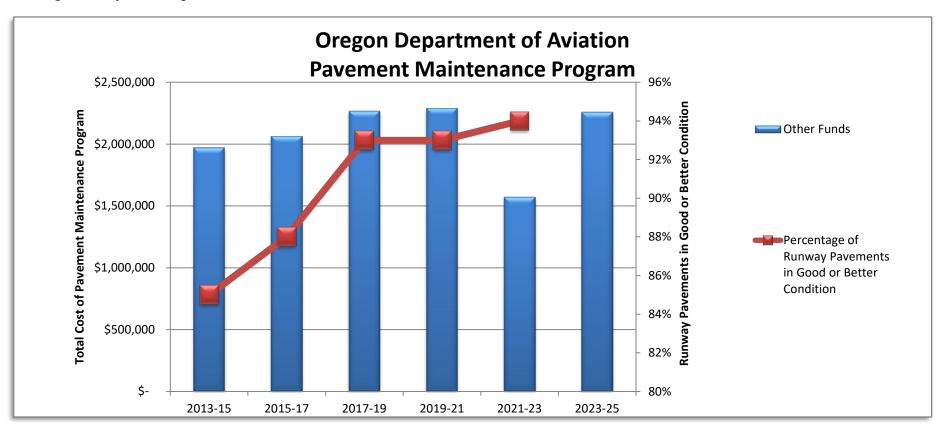

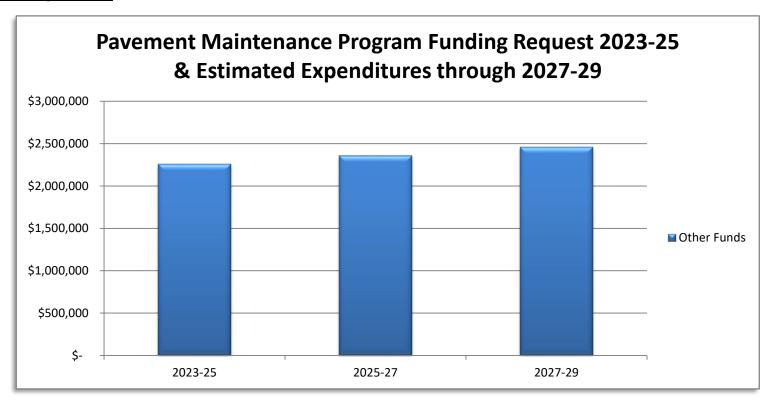

Program Overview

Pavement Maintenance Program is a state-funded aid program to assist airports in undertaking pavement preventative maintenance, the most cost-effective means to helping preserve the system's airport pavement and pavement infrastructure as addressed in the Oregon Aviation Plan. The program evaluates airport pavement at 1/3 of the state per year. The year following evaluation, airports with the highest need that agree to have work done get scheduled for pavement maintenance work with contractors hired by ODAV. The PMP contractors do an average of 14 airports per year. There are 67 paved public use airports in the state. Some airports do not require pavement maintenance, do not participate in the program, or have pavement that requires more expensive repair work.

Program Description

This program consists of two (2) distinct sections:

<u>Pavement Evaluation Program (PEP)</u> evaluates and defines the pavement condition measurements, network definition and technically reviews and analyzes existing pavement at all sixty-seven (67) paved public use airport throughout the state.

<u>Pavement Maintenance Program (PMP) provides</u> the yearly maintenance program development and scope, completes field inspections and analysis, solicits sponsor participation, designs the scope of work for each airport and manages the bidding and construction of the work.

Additionally, this process includes IGA's with the local sponsors and ODAV and any FAA federal share grant management that may be applicable.

The program exists to extend the lifecycle of the state of Oregon's airport assets to enhance the safe and efficient operations of the state of Oregon's public use airport network.

Over the last ten years all sixty-seven eligible paved public use airports have been continuously evaluated and pavement maintenance program construction projects have been completed throughout the state of Oregon. This has extended the life of the pavement assets by approximately 1/3 of the original design lifecycle (average of 7 years).

The scope of the work is then projected on a bi-annual budget basis. Projects include engineering, design and construction of runway, taxiway, and apron resurfacing; new pavement projects, patchwork, apron rehabilitation, sealcoating, crack filling and pavement maintenance items that can extend the life of the existing infrastructure.

Program Justification and Link to Long Term Outcomes

A Thriving Oregon Economy

 - The PMP Program is broken down each year into three smaller regions to allow small contractors to bid for projects. The Pavement program provides cost avoidance to airport communities throughout the state while preserving airport pavement for an average of 20 additional years. This allows communities to dedicate revenue to other community and/or airport needs.

Each Airport Sponsor will receive a complete Pavement Evaluation history every three years. This includes the airport's Pavement Condition Index (PCI) values and prediction of future PCI values and a recommended maintenance plan. ODAV administers the entire grant on behalf of the sponsors.

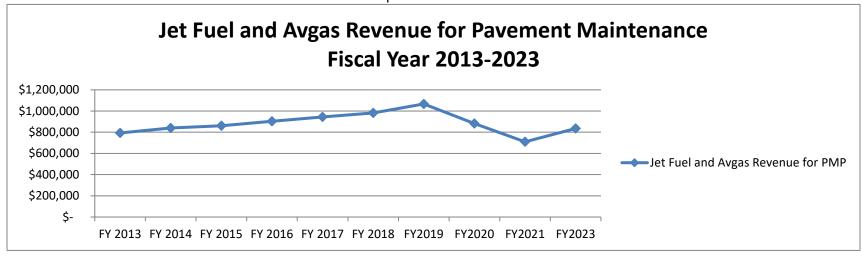
The Pavement Maintenance Program performance is measured by the increase of the life of pavement assets for the overall aviation transportation system for the state of Oregon.

Describe the various funding streams that support the program

The program is solely funded by approximately half of a cent per gallon Jet Fuel tax and approximately four cents per gallon Avgas Tax. PMP utilizes approximately \$1 Million in Avgas and Jet Fuel taxes annually. In addition, local airport owners can utilize FAA non- primary entitlement funds or their operating funds to contribute their match portion. The chart below illustrates the revenue received from Avgas and Jet Fuel taxes. The reduction in FY20 and FY21 is a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.



Describe how the 2023-25 funding proposal advanced by the agency compares to the program authorized for the agency in 2021-23

The 21-23 budget was reduced by over 30% as compared to the 19-21 budget. This reduction was due to revenue shortfalls caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. PMP is funded 100% by Jet Fuel and Avgas tax, which was significantly reduced due to travel restrictions and reductions in travel caused by the pandemic. The PMP limitation was reduced by over \$700,000 other funds in 21-23. During the February 2022 session limitation was increased in PMP due to improved jet fuel tax forecasts. The 23-25 budget proposal has restored the Pavement Maintenance Program to pre-pandemic levels.

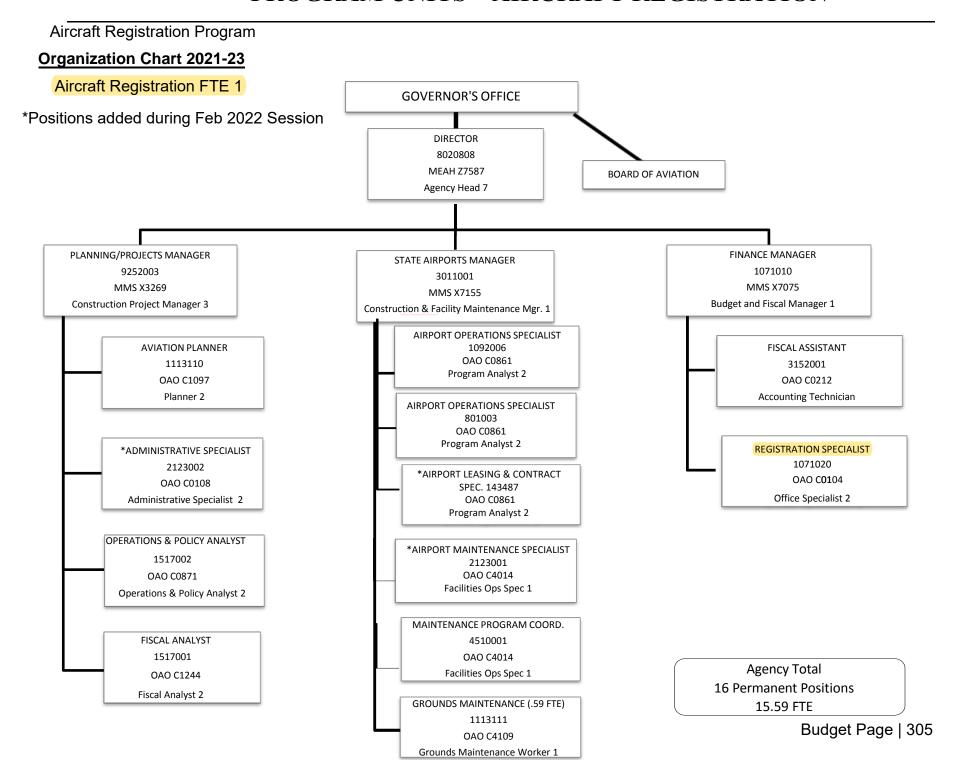

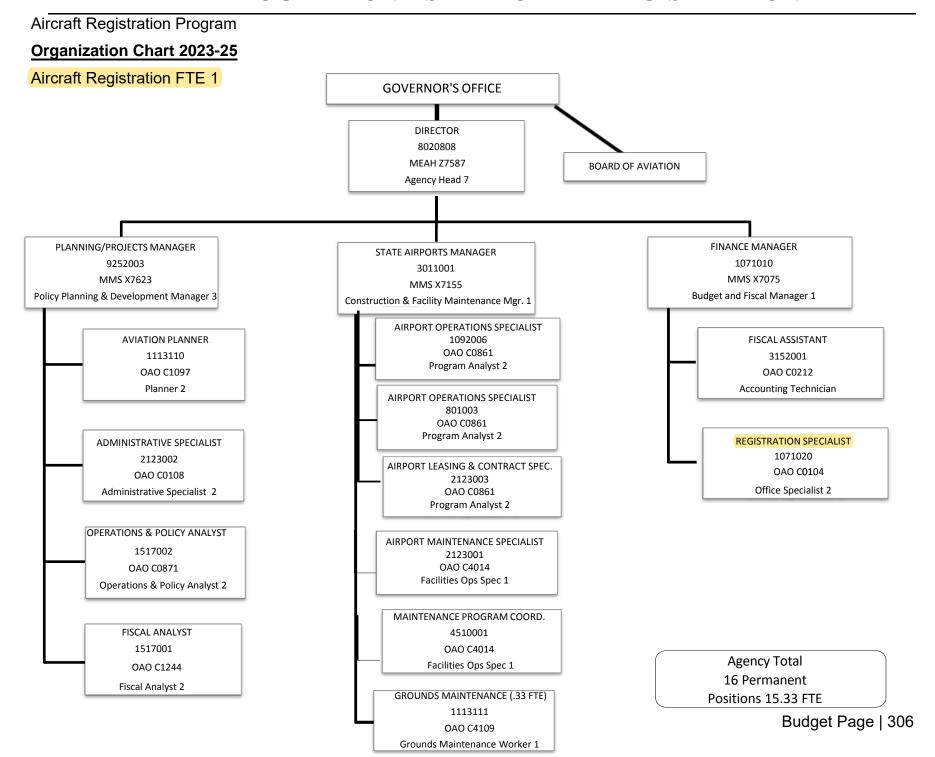

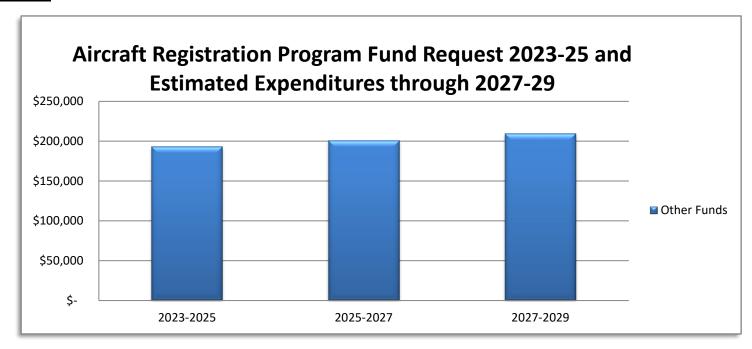

Program Overview

The Aircraft Registration Program registers over 3,500 aircraft per year and is responsible for approximately 5% of the agency's other fund revenues. This division is the front-line contact with Oregon's pilots and aircraft owners. Revenue collected from Aircraft Registration funds a registration Specialist at ODAV and funds the 10% match for FAA grants for ODAV's 12 National Plan of Integrated Airport System (NPIAS) airports. This revenue also helps fund search and rescue missions conducted by the Office of Emergency Management and reimburses fuel to counties for search and rescue activities.

Program Description

The Aircraft Registration program functions to ensure that revenue for aircraft registered in Oregon is collected. This program manages and administers the AERO II software system that houses Aircraft and Registration information. Revenue provides for the agency's federal share match dollars for all AIP General Aviation (GA) Entitlement Grants and AIP Discretionary Grants. The FAA sponsor match amount is 10% of the total project costs. Aircraft Registration revenue provides funding to the Office of Emergency Management for Air Search and Rescue.

Program Performance

Successful program performance is collecting sufficient revenue to provide the 10% match from the state for federally funded projects and to provide funding for Search and Rescue Activities. Success is maintaining and managing registration at or exceeding current levels and contributing to the necessary federal matching funds to receive federal grant funds for eligible Capital Improvement and GA Entitlement Projects. This enables the infrastructure that attracts aviation businesses and creates high paying aviation jobs.

Enabling Legislation/Program Authorization

- ORS 837.040 Persons required to register aircraft; application; timing; late fees; rules.
- ORS 837.045 Fee schedule for registration of aircraft in Oregon.

Describe the various funding streams that support the program

This Other Funds program is funded solely through Aircraft Registration fees. Fees collected are used to pay 10% match to federal grants and to provide funding for Search and Rescue. ODAV has a robust program to identify aircraft owners in Oregon to make sure sufficient revenue is collected. This includes educating airport sponsors and fixed base operators (FBOs). ODAV posts signs at airports to educate aircraft owners on the requirement to register if based in Oregon.

Note: FAA grants are tied to 39 grant assurances. Failure to comply with the grant assurances can result in loss of future grant funding. FAA grants are also reimbursable to the FAA in the event the airport cannot meet them, or the airport was to close. Grant obligations run for 20 years for infrastructure and for the life of the airport for land acquisition.

Describe how the 2023-25 funding proposal advanced by the agency compares to the program authorized for the agency in 2021-23

The 23-25 funding proposal maintains current service level.

Five Pops (103,104,105,106, and 107) are added for capital construction projects at Aurora State, Chiloquin State, Cottage Grove State and Lebanon State Airport. These projects combined will require over \$1.2M of aircraft registration revenue for the 10% FAA grant match.

POP 102 General Aviation Entitlement Projects requires \$587,656 of Aircraft Registration funds for the 10% grant match for 15 projects planned at 8 state owned, federally funded airports throughout the state.

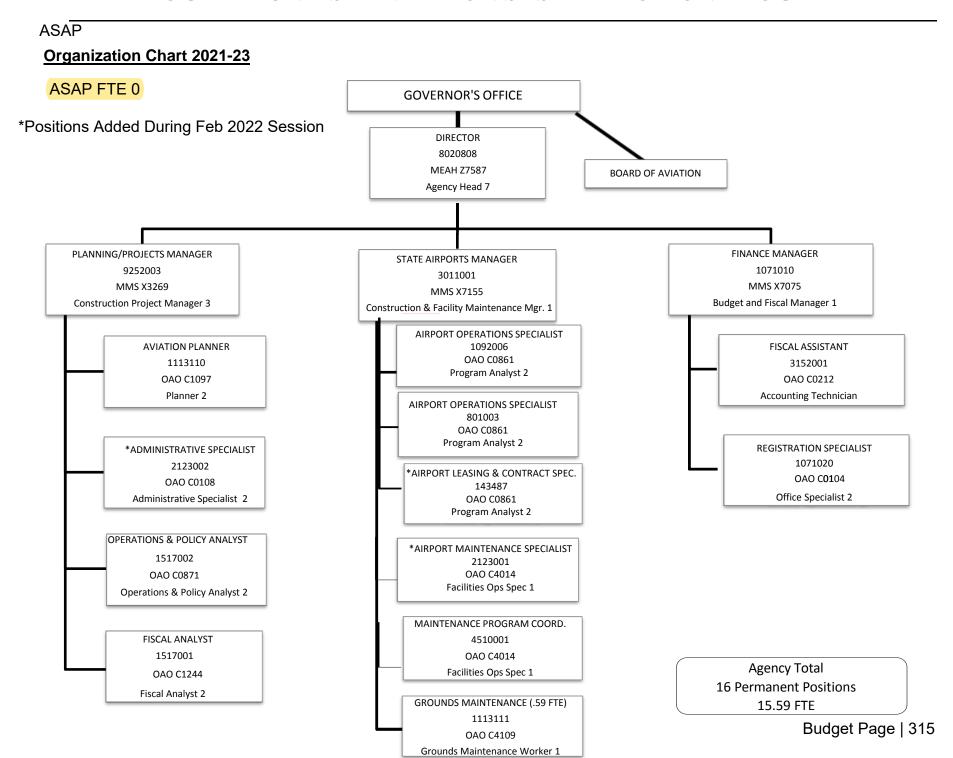

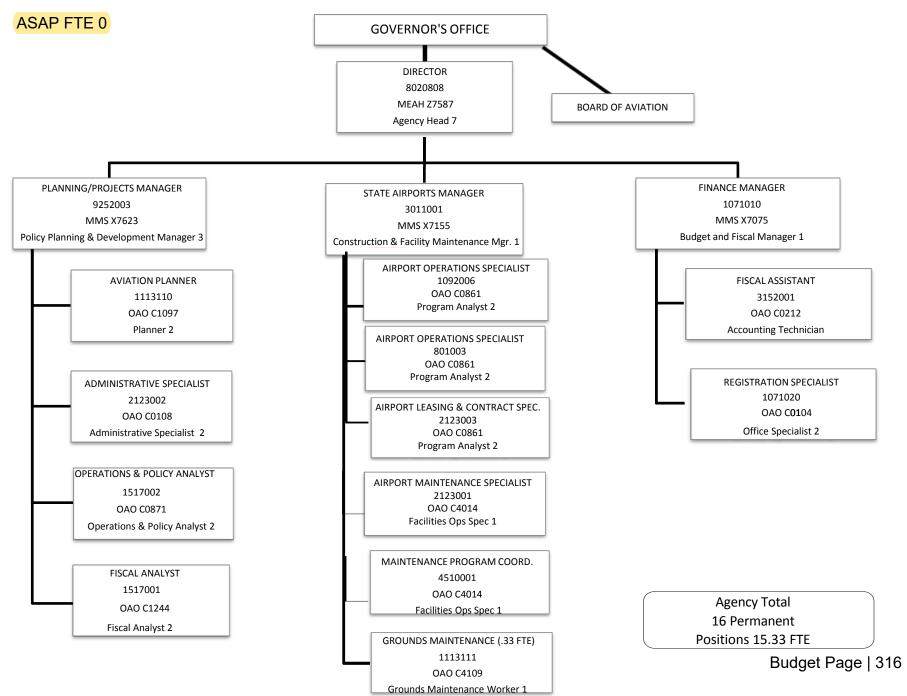

Program Overview

Through a two cent Jet Fuel and AvGas Tax increase passed in the 2015 session the Aviation System Action Program (ASAP) provides grants to airports throughout the state for economic development, FAA grant match, emergency preparedness, and commercial air service to rural Oregon. 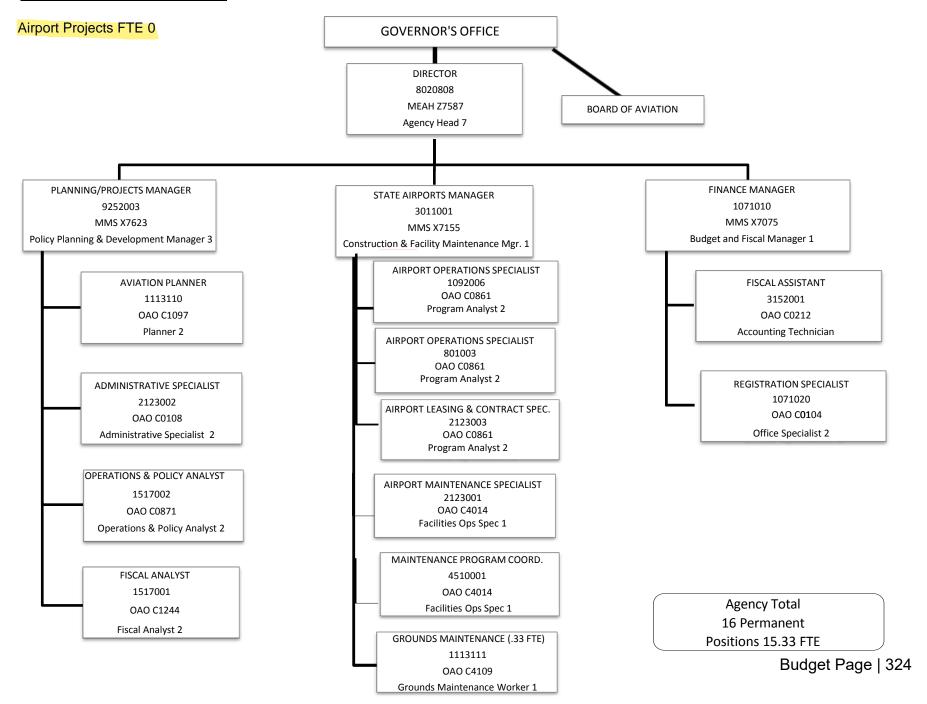

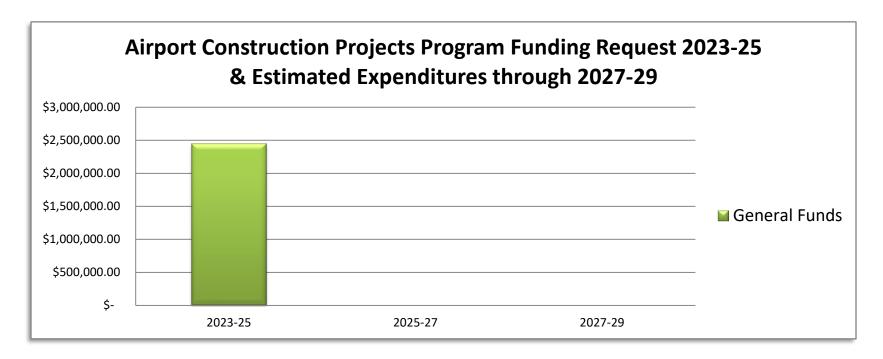

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POLICY PACKAGE #109 Cape Blanco State Airport Capital Construction Runway and Electric Rehab

Request: \$2,448,406 GF

PURPOSE

The Oregon Department of Aviation (ODAV), as owner/operator of Cape Blanco State Airport, requests expenditure limitation to reconstruct the only runway at this airport and construct a new airfield electrical system including an electrical building, runway edge lights and pilot navigational aids. In order to keep the airport in a safe and operational condition, ODAV is seeking to replace the failing 75 year old airport runway. Cape Blanco State Airport is the only coastal Oregon airport that is outside the tsunami inundation zone that can support military cargo aircraft following a major earthquake and can serve as a lifeline for the 10,000 permanent residents of the southern Oregon coast. The engineering phase of the project is underway now and is being funded from general funds made available from HB 5202 during the 2022 session. The construction phase is estimated to cost \$2,448,406 and ODAV anticipates construction to be completed in the summer of 2023.

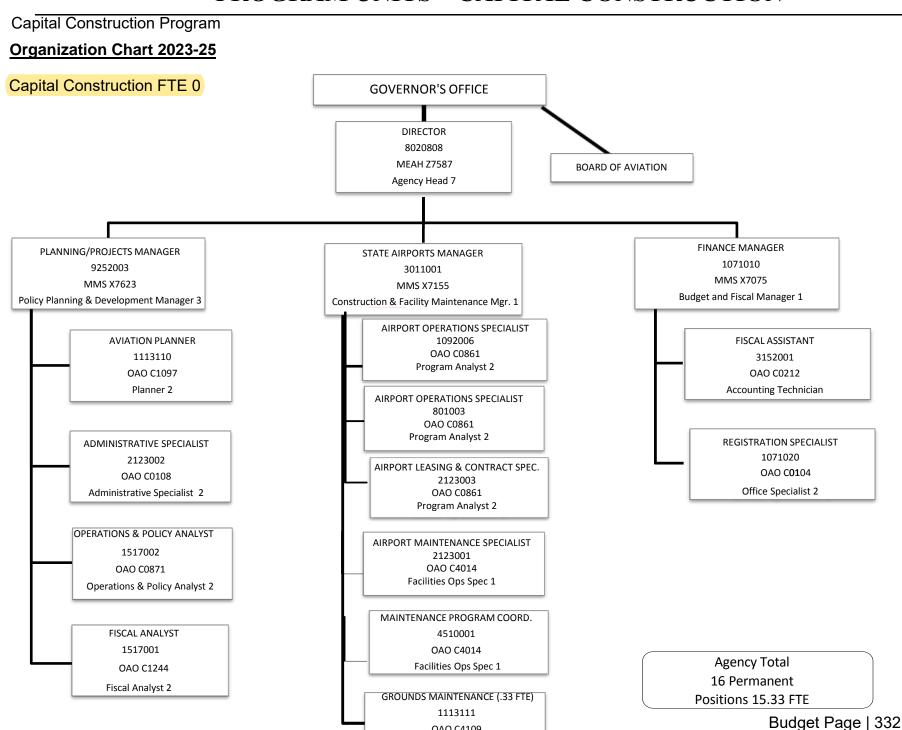

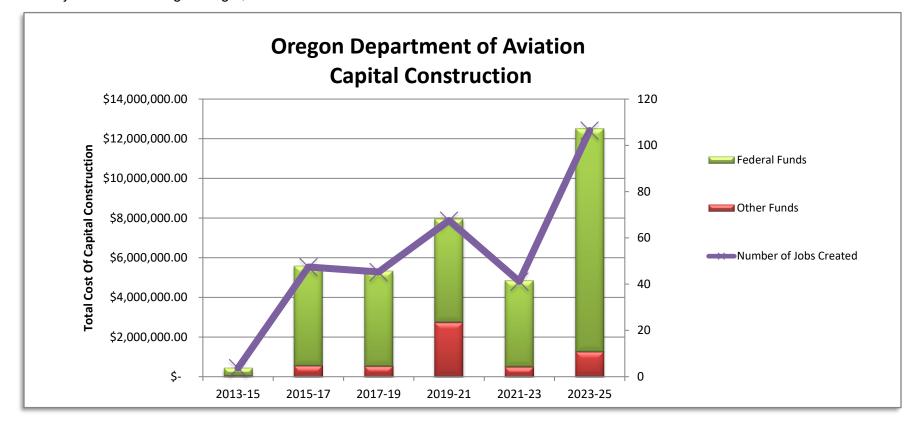

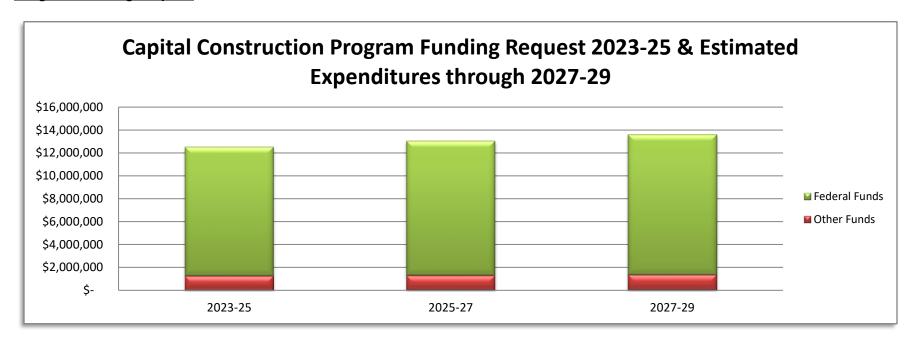


PROGRAM UNITS—CAPITAL CONSTRUCTION

Program Overview

Capital Construction Program exists to develop, improve, and maintain all twenty-eight state-owned public use airports for all designated aviation uses including business, corporate, community access and emergency uses. (Disaster relief, Firefighting, Medevac etc.)

Program Funding Request



The above chart represents the proposal costs and performance for the 2023-25 biennium and estimated costs and performance through the 2027-29 biennium. Inflation factors include standard inflation and personal services. Expenditure descriptions: Personal Services, Service and Supplies, and Capital Outlay.

Program Description

Capital Construction projects are necessary for the safe and efficient operation of airports. They are also necessary to maintain design standards and expanded future traffic for the 28 general aviation airports owned and maintained by the Department of Aviation. These airports are in various stages of development. Some require land acquisition to provide protection from incompatible land uses and to allow for expansion and needed improvements. Others require construction projects simply to maintain the airport's safety standards. For the state's 16 non-NPIAS public use airports this program relies on funds from other state grant opportunities or planned improvements as budgeted in state funds. For the states twelve NPIAS

PROGRAM UNITS—CAPITAL CONSTRUCTION

Airports funding is provided 90% from the FAA and 10% from Aircraft Registration Revenue. This agency has coordinated a 5-year plan with the FAA for capital projects planned at these NPIAS airports. The Federal funds are Federal Airport Improvement Program (AIP) funds and are either AIP entitlement grant funds or AIP discretionary grant funds. All projects that are completed using any AIP grant funds are subject to all federal policies and grant assurances.

The States, territories, and possessions share in the total AIP funds available as set forth by Congress. Each State share of this pot is based on a formula that considers the population and land area of the State. Money from this entitlement goes to general aviation airports and to airports with less than 10,000 passengers per year. Any money left over after the above entitlements are funded can be spent by the FAA at its own discretion. This discretionary fund is subject to set-asides for capital improvement projects. After the entitlements and set-asides are funded, the remaining money can be spent as the FAA sees fit. This is often referred to as pure discretionary AIP money. Even here, there are restrictions. The law requires that 75% of this discretionary money be spent on airport projects that will enhance capacity, safety, security, or reduce noise. It is ODAV's responsibility to plan its capital improvement projects to maximize the possibility to receive the federal funding required to achieve the goals of the airport as set forth in the master plan and design requirements.

The Capital Construction Program also includes two elements tied to the Oregon Aviation Transportation System that are more indirectly related but equally necessary for maintaining approved Capital Construction Program and a safe statewide aviation transportation plan.

SCIP Program - This is a statewide program directed and funded by the FAA in an effort to identify federally eligible project needs of the state. The function of the Statewide Capital Improvement Program (SCIP) is to manage, inventory and backlog all airport capital improvement projects throughout the state of Oregon and coordinate all projects with the individual airport owners and the FAA Regional District Office. The intent of the SCIP is to ensure all approved projects receive available funding. This program is inclusive of all NPIAS airports statewide, not just the airports owned by the state of Oregon. Federal monies spent throughout the state of Oregon over the past five biennia total over \$500 million.

This includes commercial service airports, (PDX, Eugene, North Bend, Redmond, Medford and Pendleton). General Aviation (GA) airports received just under \$200 million over the same time frame. These monies include FAA General Aviation entitlement funds, General Aviation discretionary funds and General Aviation state apportionment grants.

Connect Oregon Aviation Projects Support – Oregon Department of Aviation (ODAV) works in partnership with Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) to provide yearly grant review and administration support regarding aviation projects submitted for the Connect Oregon grant funds available. Connect Oregon grants that have been awarded specifically for aviation projects over the past six cycles total over \$97 million and have leveraged over \$353 million Federal dollars in Oregon. House Bill 2017, (the transportation package), passed in the 2017 legislative session and dedicated Connect Oregon funds to four specific non-aviation projects. Connect Oregon was not available for aviation grants in the 17-19, or 19-21 biennia for the competitive process. It became available for aviation again in 21-23.

Eligible AIP projects include those improvements related to enhancing airport safety, capacity, security, and environmental concerns. In general, sponsors can use AIP funds on most airfield capital improvements or repairs and in some specific situations, for terminals, hangars, and non-aviation development. Any professional services that are necessary for eligible projects — such as planning, surveying, environmental studies, and design — are eligible. Aviation demand at the airport must justify the projects, which must also meet Federal environmental and procurement requirements.

Description of Agency Business/Master Plan and Project Purpose/Problem to be Corrected

Founded in 1921 as the first government aviation agency in the United States, the Oregon Department of Aviation (ODA) is chartered to promote, develop and improve Oregon's aviation system. ODA's mission is to preserve and enhance aviation for Oregon's communities and serves the state of Oregon through its three-fold focus of advocating for the economic growth, infrastructure improvement, and safe operation of aviation in Oregon.

A seven-member Aviation Board provides policy direction to the Director and the Department in administering the laws of the state related to the development, management, education and promotion of Oregon's aviation system.

The Director and seven-member Aviation Board are appointed by the Governor and subject to the approval by the Oregon State Senate.

The Aviation Board supported by the Department of Aviation has initiated the development and growth of an Oregon Aviation Industry Cluster. In coordination with the Oregon Business Council and Business Oregon, ODA is working to harness the economic potential of over 200 aviation related businesses throughout the state through the Business Cluster model of economic development. The agency is working with stakeholders from private industry, education and government agencies to help organize an Executive Steering Committee in order to make the Aviation Industry Cluster self-sustaining.

Project Scope and Alternatives Considered

ODA is housed in a 65 year old building located at the Salem Airport. Numerous assessments over the past twenty years have recommended replacement of the building. The most recent assessment, completed in 2019, affirmed the need to replace rather than repair. The replacement building would be on the existing site, which ODA owns, and be about the same square footage, but with slightly larger hangar space, which would be jointly used as storage of agency equipment and resiliency response equipment. The ballpark estimated cost to replace the building is \$10-12M. ODA is a self-supporting agency, with no general funds, and lacks the financial ability to repair or replace the building.

- 1. What are the key drivers for your agency's facility needs, and how do you measure space/facility demand? Aviation is a multifaceted agency that is responsible for the safety, maintenance, compliance and security at the 28 State owned airports. In addition to this, the ODA also manages capital projects and planning for the 28 airports, which includes grant management and grant compliance. The ODA also manages the State Capital Improvement Plan coordinating with all Federally Funded General Aviation Airports. We also partner with airports and local planning departments to ensure the safety of aviation and the community in developing in and around airports. The agency also provides compliance inspections for all 97 public use airports in Oregon.
- 2. What are the key facility-related challenges over the next 10-years? (Please answer in order of priority) The building is a 60+ year old facility that has exceeded it's usefully life. Due to the age of the facility, there is hazmat remediation that needs to be addressed. The current building sits on state owned land; however, is located at the Salem Airport. There is a reversionary clause where the property returns to the city of Salem if the state vacates it. The property is ideal for Aviation, due to its central location to the states 5 busiest airports and close proximity to I5 and other main roads. Our location at the Salem Airport is also advantageous as it is convenient for the aviation community to have easy access by airplane or car when conducting business with Oregon Department of Aviation.

We need a Facility Conditions Assessment on our building in the next biennium to understand our needs and challenges ahead.

3. What do you need to meet these challenges?

Aviation is a completely Other Funded agency. While we do receive funding from the FAA, this is restricted to capital development at the State owned federally funded airports. FAA funding cannot be used for O&M or capital projects that are not directly runway/taxiway related. In 2003 an analysis was completed on the building by Century West Engineering and several alternatives were discussed. Ultimately, the conclusion that the best long term solution was to build a new building on the current site. The cost in 2003 dollars was estimated at \$1.7 to \$2.2 million. It is estimated that in 2023 dollars the cost would be approximately double, \$10 to \$12 million.

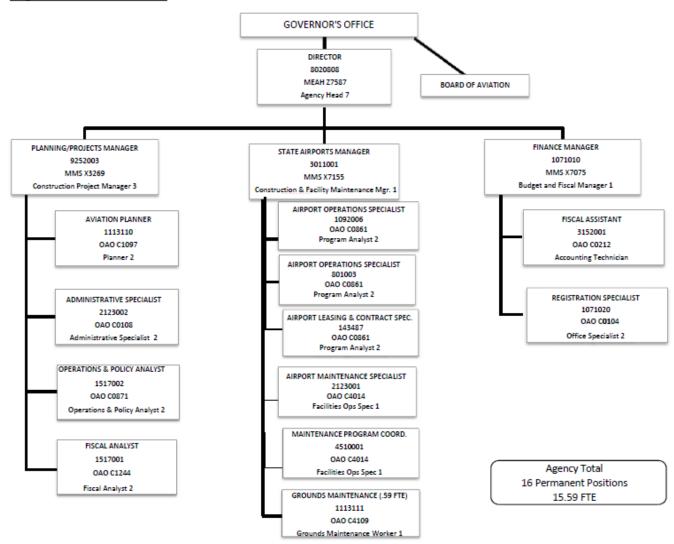

FORMAL/INFORMAL

Formal

<u>For Discrimination</u>. Anyone who is subject to, or aware of, what they believe to be employment-related discrimination may file a complaint with their immediate supervisor or another manager. The complaint should be written unless the complainant, due to a disability, is unable to file written complaint. The complaint should be filed with the agency within 30 calendar days of the alleged act.

Complaints should include the name of the complainant, the name of the persons alleged to have engaged in the prohibited conduct, a specific and detailed description of the conduct that the employee believes is discriminatory, and a description of the remedy the employee desires.

<u>For Harassment</u>. Anyone who is subject to or is aware of harassing behavior should report that information immediately to agency management. If at all possible, the report should be made before the behavior becomes severe. The report may be made orally or in writing to the employee's immediate supervisor or to any other management staff member. If the employee prefers, the report may be given to a manager outside the complainant's work unit. Represented employees may have a union steward accompany the employee during this process during regular work hours.

Informal

All employees with concerns of any kind related to affirmative action, discrimination or harassment are encouraged to bring them to the attention of the Affirmative Action Representative/Business Manager, any manager or the Director.

COMPLAINT INFORMATION (INTAKE, PROCESSING, TIMEFRAME, NEXT STEPS)

All supervisors and managers will report complaints and incidents immediately to the appropriate officials.

Investigation. The recipient of a discrimination or harassment complaint shall promptly forward it to the agency Director and or the HR Representative, who will coordinate, or delegate responsibility for coordinating, the agency's investigation in consultation with the affected employee's supervisors, excluding any supervisor who is potentially part of the problem. The complaint will be given prompt and thorough attention with an impartial investigation. If the complaint is substantiated, immediate and appropriate corrective action will be taken. The affected parties shall be informed that the investigation has concluded and that immediate appropriate corrective action will be taken. All personnel can be assured that complaints will be taken seriously and will be investigated as necessary. They will be dealt with in a discrete and confidential manner to the extent possible.

Nothing in this process precludes any person from filing a formal grievance in accordance with collective bargaining agreement or with the Bureau of Labor and Industries (BOLI) or the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC). Timelines for filing complaints with BOLI and EEOC are different from those established in this policy. Contact them directly for specific guidance on filing a formal grievance with them.

HOW DO EMPLOYEES ACCESS THE COMPLAINT PROCESS?

An employee can access the complaint process from their immediate supervisor, any manager, the affirmative action representative, the director or an HR representative.

E. ROLES FOR IMPLEMENTATION OF AFFIRMATIVE ACTION PLAN

1. ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

2. DIRECTOR/MANAGERS

The Director and managers play a leadership role in dedicating the agency to a policy of equal employment opportunity and conveying a sense of that commitment both within and outside of the organization. The Director has overall responsibility for implementing and monitoring the Affirmative Action Plan and for ensuring compliance with all applicable federal and state laws, rules and regulations. Director and Management Responsibilities:

- Foster and promote the importance of a diverse and respectful workplace.
- Periodically review the Affirmative Action Plan and progress toward meeting the agency's affirmative action objectives.
- Review equal employment opportunity and affirmative action objectives.
- Recognize policy needs and initiate necessary changes.
- Extend Outreach to minority construction contractors and their associations to promote their interest in bidding on statewide aviation projects.

3. AFFIRMATIVE ACTION REPRESENTATIVE

The Affirmative Action Representative is responsible for implementing and maintaining the agency's affirmative action program and is accountable to the Director.

- Develop and disseminate the Affirmative Action Plan, including the agency's Affirmative Action Policy Statement, and monitor progress and prepare annual updates and modifications, as needed;
- Develop and monitor internal and external communication of the agency's Affirmative Action Policy and Affirmative Action Plan to keep staff informed.
- Develop and advise employees and job applicants of discrimination grievance procedures. Accept all sexual harassment and/or discrimination grievances or complaints filed either internally or externally and refer all complaints to Human Resource Representatives for investigation.
- Serve as the agency's liaison with governmental agencies responsible for the enforcement of civil rights and fair employment laws and regulations;
- Assist in implementation and review of the internal monitoring and review system, using standardized reports and statistical data to measure the effectiveness of the agency's affirmative action program, and indicate the need for remedial action;

- Identify the need for, assist in the development of, and in some instances, conduct affirmative action information sessions for managers, supervisors and employees;
- Share information to management staff on the latest developments on affirmative action issues, including legal decision and their possible impact;
- Report to the Director and the Board any policies or practices that have adverse impact on minorities, women and persons with disability, and any other protected or underrepresented group, or present barriers to equal employment opportunity;
- Periodically review personnel policies and procedures to ensure they reflect the agency's affirmative action commitment;
- Periodically audit minimum job requirements, training programs, and promotion and transfer actions to assure non-discriminatory practices;
- Conduct periodic reviews to assure EEO posters, the Affirmative Action Policy Statement, and Alternate Format poster are properly displayed; and
- Assist in conducting "exit interviews" of employees leaving the agency's concerning work climate and affirmative action issues.

4. ALL ODAV STAFF

All ODAV staff are expected to promote and support a positive work
environment for people with diverse backgrounds. They are also expected to
maintain effective work relationships, respect individual differences and treat
everyone with dignity and respect.

5. ACCOUNTABILITY MECHANISMS

F. 2021-23 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION PLAN PROGRESS REPORT

1. ACCOMPLISH IN GOAL ATTAINMENT/PROGRESS FOR 21-23 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION PLAN

• The following was the goals established in the 21-23 Affirmative Action Plan along with a description of goal attainment and progress.

GOAL: To increase the percentage of ODAV's workforce and leadership positions that represent minority groups and people with disabilities over the course of the 21-23 biennium.

PROGRESS MEASUREMENT: To compare the progress of this goal we conducted a Workday analysis of the percentage of all racial categories and people with disabilities in the workforce and management positions in the 21-23 biennium. We then compared these numbers vs. the 19-21 biennium. To conduct this analysis we did a snapshot at the time the report was created.

LEADERSHIP POSITIONS

- Percentage of minority race/ethnic groups represented in leadership: The percentage of minorities in leadership positions has increased from 19-21 to 21-23.
- Percentage of people with disabilities in management positions: The percentage of people with a reported disability in leadership has stayed the same from 19-21 to 21-23.
- **19-21 Data** In 19-21 there were three management positions and one director. There were no minority groups represented and no people with disabilities.
- **21-23 Data** In 21-23 there were three management positions, (but one was vacant) and one director position. The percentage of minority race/ethnic groups represented was over 33% and there were no people with disabilities.

ODAV'S WORKFORCE

- Percentage of minority race/ethnic groups represented in all of ODAV's workforce has increased from 19-21 to 21-23.
- The percentage of people with disabilities in all of ODAV's workforce has stayed the same since 19-21 to 21-23.
- **19-21 Data** In 19-21 there were twelve total staff. 14% were made up of people in racial categories other than white. There were no people with disabilities in the staff.
- **21-23 Data** In 21-23 there were a total of nineteen employees. (14 FTE and 5 Temp) of which 21% represent minority race/ethnic groups and there are no people with a reported disability.

OVERALL PROGRESS: This goal of increasing the percentage of racial categories in leadership and in all ODAV staff positions was achieved. The number of people with disabilities was not increased.

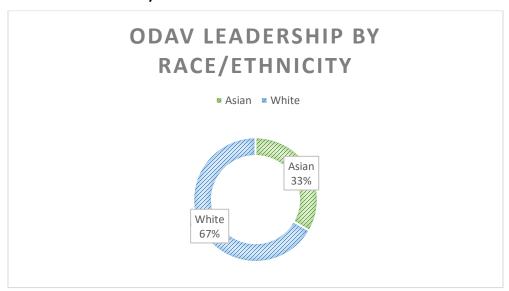

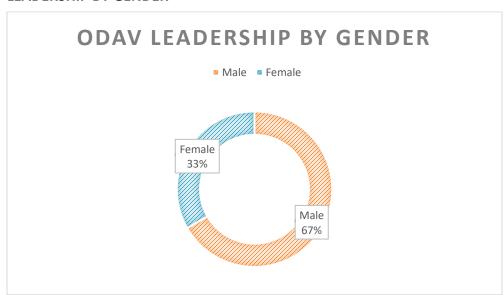

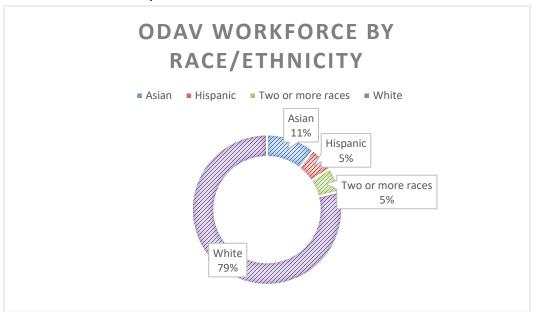

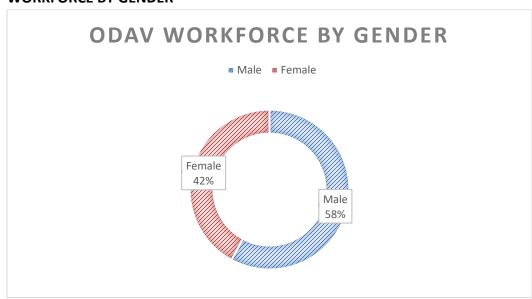

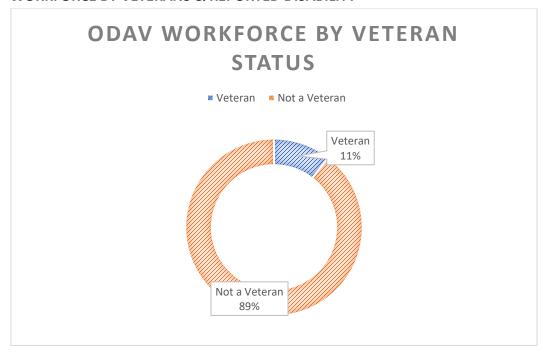
1. WORKFORCE BY RACE/ETHNICITY CATEGORIES

 national origin, disability, age, union membership and activity, or any other factor
 that an employer is prohibited by law from considering when making employment
 decisions. For purpose of this policy, prohibited discrimination includes
 discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation.

J. 2023-2025 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION STRATEGIES

1. RECRUITMENT STRATEGIES

- Encourage minorities to apply for positions in the agency.
- Utilize creative marketing tools that include minority professional organizations and diversity outreach partnerships to advertise vacancies to minorities.
- Attend diversity networking events to meet professionals and promote aviation job opportunities.

- Explore diversity outreach partnerships to increase awareness and promote the benefits of working for ODAV.
- Identify means to strengthen recruitment and retention of minorities including efforts designed to reach agency's affirmative action goals and objectives.
- Post job opportunities on the agency website and consider other methods to increase the reach of job opportunities.

2. SELECTION STRATEGIES

- Periodically review hiring procedures to identify and remove barriers in the attainment of the agency's affirmative action goals and objectives.
- Work to assure that all interview panels have a diverse group of participants to ensure a fair process and consistency in hiring practices.
- Ensuring that interview questions are crafted with an equity lens, meaning that they take into consideration the diverse backgrounds of the potential interview candidates.
- Make hiring decisions in support of agency's affirmative action goals and objectives.
- Continue to conduct a pay equity assessment on all new hires in accordance with HB 2005, the pay equity act to help remove barriers to equal pay.

3. RETENTION STRATEGIES

- Management will strive to support and understand employees' needs.
- Managers will establish individual needs and training requests during annual evaluations, followed by providing training and developmental experiences for employees.
- Each manager will work with their staff to prepare employees for career growth and advancement when appropriate as part of a succession planning process.
 This will include assessing skills, career planning, development training plan and mentorship.
- The agency will pay attention to positions that are shown to have a lack of retention and will take the steps necessary to correct the problem.

4. PROMOTION STRATEGIES

- Developmental opportunities will be encouraged, such as leadership training and detail assignments, for employees interested in participating in assignments that prepare them for high-level positions.
- When position openings occur in the agency, managers will send staff the
 recruitment announcements and encourage staff to apply for new positions.
 The agency will ensure that these promotional opportunities are available
 people of diverse backgrounds.

5. EMPLOYEE ENGAGEMENT

 ODAV will continue to encourage employees to participate in diversity trainings and classes such as the statewide diversity conference.

MANAGEMENT

K. LEADERSHIP EVALUATION

ORS 659A.012 requires agencies to achieve the public policy of the State of Oregon for persons in the state to attain employment and advancement without discrimination because of race, religion, color, sex, marital status, national origin, disability or age, every state agency shall be required to include in the evaluation of all management personnel the manager's or supervisor's effectiveness in achieving affirmative action objectives as a consideration of the manager's or supervisor's performance.

ODAV has incorporated affirmative action objectives as a key consideration for the manager's performance evaluation. Specific examples of the managers' affirmative action objectives and diversity successes and achievement are described below. Management personnel will receive an annual performance evaluation to assess whether they are meeting its affirmative action objectives. Any goals or work plans for future performance will be outlined in the evaluation.

Sample affirmative action duty descriptions:

- Understand Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO), Affirmative Action (AA), Diversity and Cultural Competency principles, and the agency's AA Plan goals and objectives. Develop and implement strategies to meet goals and objectives; and report annual efforts, successes and/or accomplishments during the period.
- Review hiring, transfers, promotional, developmental/rotational or training practices and procedures to identify and remove barriers in the attainment of the agency's affirmative action goals and objectives.
- Make hiring, transfer and promotional decisions in support of agency's affirmative action goals and objectives. Engage in appropriate recruitment efforts designed to reach agency's affirmative action goals and objectives.
- Promote and foster a positive work environment within the agency programs concerning EEO,
 AA, Diversity and Cultural Competencies by ensuring employees are aware and follow agency
 policies and procedures, and address work-related issues and/or concerns immediately and
 take appropriate action if necessary.
- Attend EEO, AA, and other diversity-related training to provide leadership to staff by being aware of diversity and cultural issues. This also includes supporting employees to attend such programs for further professional development.

• Ensure information regarding EEO, AA and Americans with Disabilities (ADA) information is properly displayed on the appropriate boards at the worksites(s).

L. SUCCESSION PLAN

PURPOSE: To reaffirm that it is the policy of the Oregon Department of Aviation (ODAV) to prohibit discrimination and workplace harassment; to clarify conduct that constitutes workplace harassment and to provide an effective complaint procedure for employees who believe they have been the victims of prohibited conduct. This policy is intended to protect employees of whatever stature, customers or clients of the agency, contractors and visitors to the worksite.

POLICY:

- A. <u>Discrimination</u>. It is the policy of ODAV to provide a work environment free from unlawful discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, marital status, national origin, disability, age, union membership and activity, or any other factor that an employer is prohibited by law from considering when making employment decisions. For purpose of this policy, prohibited discrimination includes discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation. This policy applies to all matters relating to hiring, firing, transfer, promotion, benefits, compensation and other terms and conditions of employment.
- B. <u>Workplace Harassment</u>. It is also the policy of ODAV that all employees, customers, clients, contractors and visitors to the worksite enjoy a work environment that is free from harassing behavior. Employees at all levels of the organization are expected to conduct themselves in a business-like and professional manner at all times and refrain from sexual and other harassment.
- C. <u>Penalties</u>. Conduct in violation of this policy will not be tolerated and may result in disciplinary action up to and including dismissal. Managers and supervisors who know or should know of conduct in violation of this policy and fail to report such behavior, or fail to take prompt, appropriate, corrective action, are subject to disciplinary action up to and including dismissal.

GUIDELINES:

A. Workplace harassment is a form of offensive treatment or behavior, which to a reasonable person creates an intimidating, hostile or abusive work environment. This policy prohibits discrimination or harassing behavior based on or because of a person's national origin, age, sex, race, color, disability, religion, a person's sexual orientation or protected activity.

- B. Sexual harassment is a form of workplace harassment. Sexual harassment is defined as unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors and other verbal or physical behavior of a sexual nature when:
 - 1) Submission to such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of an individual's employment or is used as a basis for any employment decision (granting leave request, promotion, favorable performance appraisal, etc.); or
 - 2) Such conduct is unwelcome and has the purpose of effect of unreasonably interfering with an individual's work performance or creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive working environment.
- C. The following are examples of prohibited behavior (it should be understood that the examples are not meant to be all-inclusive and even one instance of such conduct may constitute harassment):
 - 1) Unwelcome touching or closeness of a personal nature, which can encompass leaning over, cornering or pinching;
 - 2) Sexual innuendos, teasing and other sexual talk such as jokes, intimate inquiries, persistent unwanted courting and sexist put-downs or insults.
 - 3) Derogatory remarks, slurs and jokes about a person's national origin, race, color, religion, accent, disability or sexual orientation;
 - 4) Displays of explicit or offensive calendars, posters, pictures, drawings or cartoons which reflect disparagingly upon a class of persons or a particular person;
 - 5) Intimidation or bullying tactics employed against subordinate employees. This may include deliberate and repeated instances of ostracizing or prejudicial treatment amongst peers in work teams.

NON-RETALIATION:

A. This policy prohibits retaliation against employees who bring charges of conduct in violation of this policy or assist in investigating charges, or who report harassing behavior directed at persons other than the employee. Any employee found to have engaged in retaliatory action or behavior will be subject to discipline, up to and including dismissal.

GRIEVANCE/COMPLAINT PROCEDURE:

A. <u>For Discrimination</u>. Anyone who is subject to, or aware of, what he or she believes to be employment-related discrimination may file a complaint with his or her immediate supervisor or another manager. The complaint should be written unless the complainant, due to a disability, is unable to file written complaint. The complaint should be filed with the agency within 30 calendar days of the alleged act.

Complaints should include the name of the complainant, the name of the persons alleged to have engaged in the prohibited conduct, a specific and detailed description of the conduct that the employee believes is discriminatory, and a description of the remedy the employee desires.

B. <u>For Harassment</u>. Anyone who is subject to or is aware of harassing behavior should report that information immediately to agency management. If at all possible, the report should be made before the behavior becomes severe. The report may be made orally or in writing to the employee's immediate supervisor or to any other management staff member. If the employee prefers, the report may be given to a manager outside the complainant's work unit. Represented employees may have a union steward accompany the employee during this process during regular work hours.

All supervisors and managers will report complaints and incidents immediately to the appropriate officials.

- C. <u>Investigation</u>. The recipient of a discrimination or harassment complaint shall promptly forward it to the agency Director, who will coordinate, or delegate responsibility for coordinating, the agency's investigation in consultation with the affected employee's supervisors, excluding any supervisor who is potentially part of the problem. The complaint will be given prompt and thorough attention with an impartial investigation. If the complaint is substantiated, immediate and appropriate corrective action will be taken. The affected parties shall be informed that the investigation has concluded and that immediate appropriate corrective action will be taken. All personnel can be assured that complaints will be taken seriously and will be investigated as necessary. They will be dealt with in a discrete and confidential manner to the extent possible.
 - 1. Nothing in this process precludes any person from filing a formal grievance in accordance with collective bargaining agreement or with the Bureau of Labor and Industries (BOLI) or the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC). Timelines for filing complaints with BOLI and EEOC are different from those established in this policy. Contact them directly for specific guidance on filing a formal grievance with them.

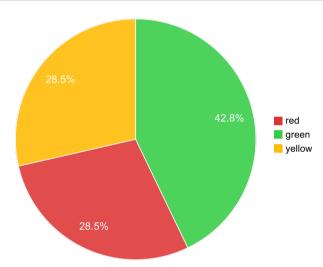

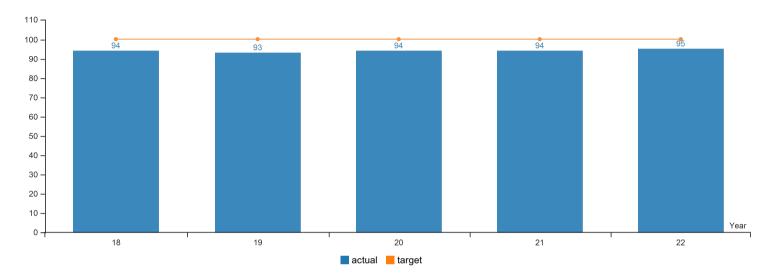

How Are We Doing

Pavement Maintenance Program (PMP) continued in 2022 and has been successful in completing the program work as scheduled. Program work continued to be regionally divided into three smaller contracts to make it easier for DBE/COBID contractors to bid and more efficient to complete the overall program work within the desired schedule constraints especially due to the added environmental oversight that comes with managing construction work at airports where threatened species such as the Streak Horned lark are present.

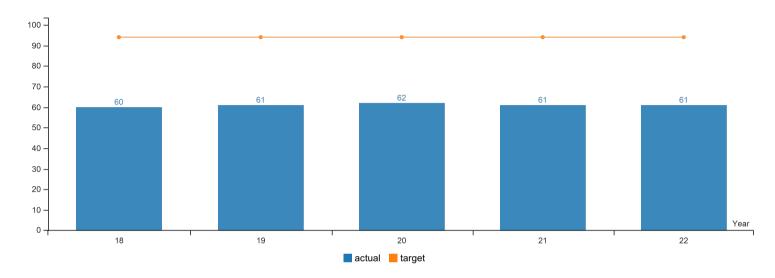
The ten year study of the PMP funded by FAA showed that the PMP extended service life of airport pavement by twenty plus years. FAA standards are that pavement is good for twenty years so this essentially doubles the life of pavement and potentially cost avoids an entire renovation cycle.

Factors Affecting Results

Weather conditions, availability of matching funds for local municipalities and construction scheduling are all factors that may potentially affect results in any given period. Over time heavy emphasis on crack sealing instead of surface treatments has had the effect of decreasing overall pavement condition. We have since put surface sealants ahead of small crack filling and are seeing much better results and performance. A complete PMP study was conducted and ODAV has incorporated recommendations that will enhance pavement preservation.

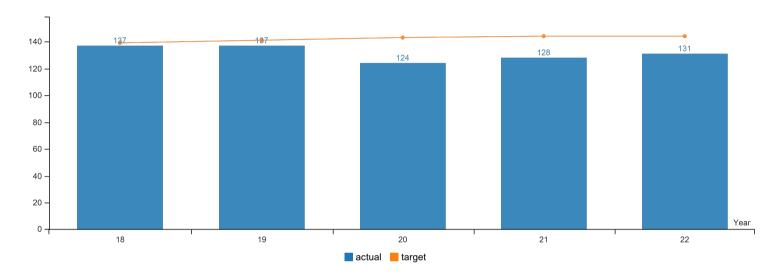
This KPM has had similar scores for the past 5 years. FAA part 77.25 standards require a 20:1 glide slope for visual meteorological conditions (VMC) for public use airports. Federal dollars are available for NPIAS (National Plan of Integrated Airports System) for obstruction removal. Funding for Non-NPIAS airports lags due to declining operations funding for obstruction removal.

Factors Affecting Results

Note that several airports have more than one runway and therefore may have at least one runway that meets this standard. Obstructions are most commonly trees but can also be unchangeable such as hills or mountains. This KPM measures all of the runways at public use airports which is 105. Of these 64 meet this standard.

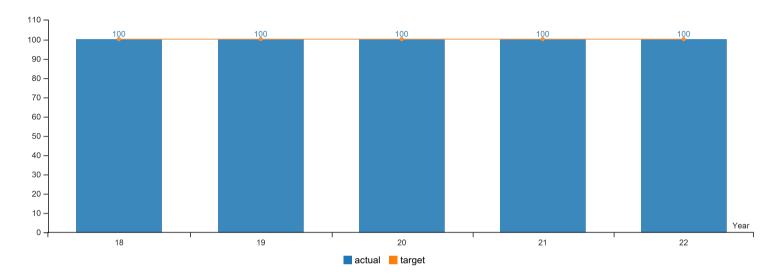
ODAV completed 131 out of 144 inspections. This KPM measures the number of airports that have received inspections the past year in comparison with the total possible inspections. ODA conducts 97 FAA sponsored inspections (5010s) over a three year period. One third of the inspections are conducted annually (32 in 2022). ODAV conducts quarterly self-inspections at 28 state owned airports. The total possible number of inspections is 144 this year.

Factors Affecting Results

All 32 of this year's 5010 inspections were completed. 99 out of the possible 112 quarterly inspections were conducted at state-owned airports. The Owyhee Reservoir State Airport is inaccessible by land, and accounts for 4 missed quarterly self-inspections this year. ODA relies on pilot reports for field conditions at Owyhee.

ODAV continues to make improvements in planning, monitoring and closeout of federally funded airport projects. The Department currently utilizes all available non primary entitlement (NPE) funds to minimize the amount of funds to be returned to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to be used as discretionary dollars at other airports.

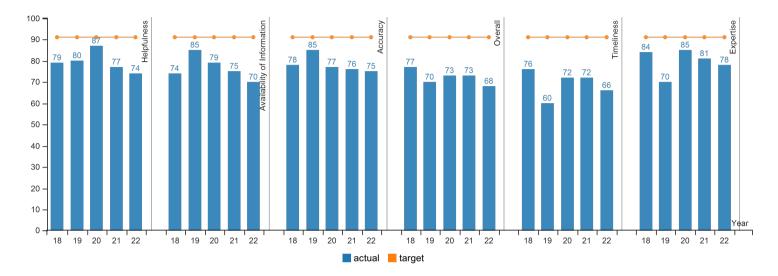
Factors Affecting Results

The state owns 28 airports and 12 of these are part of the National Plan of Integrated Airport Systems (NPIAS). Each non-primary NPIAS airport may receive up to \$150,000 in airport improvement (AIP) grant funds annually for qualifying projects.

In November 2021 a \$1.2 Trillion Infrastructure Bill was signed into law providing \$15B for airport related projects. Of this ODAV is receiving over \$2M per year of Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) grant funds for qualifying airport projects.

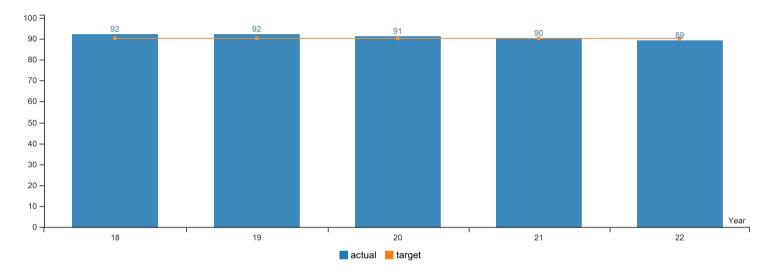
Factors Affecting Results

ODAV was forced to eliminate 3 positions in the areas of planning, administration and operations as well as eliminate outreach from the budget. These reductions were a direct result of revenue loss due to the pandemic. This reduction in staff and outreach has decreased the agency's ability to perform excellent customer service and it is shown in the survey results. ODAV was able to re-establish positions and is re-building and training new employees at this time.

The agency sent out a survey to almost 4,000 stakeholders including pilots, aircraft owners, airport managers, businesses at airports, airport tenants, and others who have signed up to receive notifications from the agency. The survey was entirely conducted using an online program called Survey Monkey. Stakeholders responded from all areas of the state and a variety of customers that the agency serves.

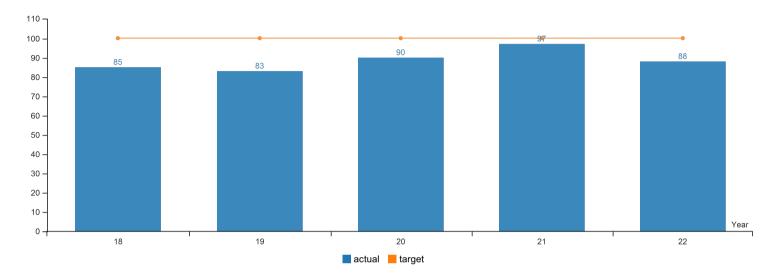
There are a total of 3,413 active aircraft in our aircraft registration database. There are 423 that are expired. The percentage of aircraft registered is 89%. Aircraft Registration fees support the 10% grant match to Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) grants for airport improvements at 12 Federally Funded State Owned Airports throughout the state.

Factors Affecting Results

ODAV works in collaboration with the Department of Revenue to collect delinquent aircraft registration revenue. The agency is continually looking for ways to improve the collection process. The agency's finance team and aircraft registration specialist have worked together to make improvements to the agency's collection policy.
