

Trauma Informed Response Training (TIRT)

Non-Competitive Grant Funding Opportunity

About HB2575

HB2575 was passed to help create systems that understand and know how to work with individuals who have experienced trauma.

The Oregon Department of Justice (ODOJ) will partner with Trauma Informed Oregon to deliver the TIRT model curriculum through both day-long regional trainings and four-day statewide TIRT Facilitator trainings.

Questions & Information

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What is the purpose of the funding?

The purpose of TIRT funds is to fund training for groups and agencies that interact with persons who have experienced trauma.

Specifically, the training is intended for law enforcement, district attorneys, sexual assault nurse examiners, emergency communications workers, victim advocates or any other group or agency the law enforcement agency or local government determines appropriate for the training.

What trainings can be funded?

- Costs associated with sending trainees to a full-day Regional TIRT training coordinated by ODOJ CVSSD.
- Costs associated with sending trainees to a four-day TIRT Facilitator training coordinated by ODOJ CVSSD.
- Costs associated with conducting local training(s) led by graduates of the ODOJ CVSSD coordinated TIRT Facilitator training using the provided approved model curriculum.

Who can be funded?

- Law enforcement agencies
- Local government agencies
- Federally recognized Tribal Nations in Oregon

Applications will be available Spring 2024 at Trauma Informed Response Training (state.or.us). Applications will be reviewed on a rolling application deadline until December 31, 2024, or until all funds are allocated.
