Summary description of project

In 2015, the Coquille Indian Tribe was awarded a TMG Comprehensive Planning Grant that resulted in the development of a CIT Empire Comprehensive Plan in July 2018. Included in that plan, were the identification of next steps that would be included in the development of an overall comprehensive Kilkich Area Master Plan, including land use designations, market and financial analysis efforts, utility services, roadway improvements, permitting, subdivision design and engineering. Utilizing funds from the Integrated Land Use Transportation Planning grant would meet our next steps by identifying specific area planning for both our North and South parcels, implementing measures and the incorporation of transportation efficient land use planning (housing, employment, and governmental services). The creation of this plan would support our strategic master planning process and provide direction for expansion of housing opportunities and our need for future government planning provisions.

Explain how your proposed project addresses a need and supports TGM objectives

The goal of this project is to develop a comprehensive Kilkich Area Master Plan that will support and align with goals and objectives included in the awarded 2015 TMG Comprehensive Planning Grant which resulted in the 2018 Empire Comprehensive Plan. Included in the overall area of Kilkich are our North and South parcels which are held by the Tribe in trust and were acquired in 1993. Both parcels lie south of the City of Coos Bay between and east of Cape Arago Highway. The North Parcel encompasses much of first and second creeks running approximately from Marshall Avenue to the north, and to Grinnell Lane to the south. The South Parcel includes the Fourth Creek and Tarheel Reservoirs and the Coquille Indian Tribes Kilkich community.

Coquille Indian Tribal lands held in trust are not zoned under Coos Bay, North Bend, or Coos County land use regulations. The development of a Kilkich Area Master Plan (which includes both the North and South Parcels) will support the Coquille Indian Tribe's strategic planning process by aligning the goals and objectives associated with the improvements needed to develop a safe transportation system and promote and provide dynamic programs and services through sustainable economic development. This transportation system will provide a variety of transportation options and will support effective management of overall land use. There are a variety of individuals who live in our local communities (including our Tribal reservation) that are in need of services that would increase mobility options and support safe and convenient public transportation opportunities. The needs included in this proposed project relate to pedestrian system upgrades including the creation of a multi-use path along Cape Arago highway, additional pedestrian facilities along all on-site roadways, and a protected mixed-use path that needs developed along Libby Lane.

This proposed project will also support and provide direction for the development of plans associated with a livable community that consists of a variety of housing types. As noted in our 2018 Comprehensive Plan, a total of 282 acres of the Empire Parcels have been identified as developable lands after the removal of specific environmental constraints (stream riparian corridors, wetlands and areas sloped greater then 15%). The majority of those developable acres included in both the North and South Parcels have been assigned for residential land uses, including 206 net acres that have been designated as Residential Multifamily (RM) areas which would allow the development of single-family detached units, apartments and condominiums. The increase in housing opportunities relates directly to economic vitality and opportunities for growth. We have estimated that based off the average population for Coos Bay, the Empire Parcels have the potential to house between 2,445 and 10,060 people (based off average household size).

The development of specific area planning for our North and South parcels would include goals and objectives related to the protection of valuable natural resources, which is always a forefront in any master planning process due to the Tribe's Core Values - "practicing responsible stewardship of Tribal resources," and "considering the impacts to our people, land, water, air and all living things." Proposed land uses and environmental effects in the Kilkich Area Master Plan would include the protection of watersheds, nearby estuaries and wildlife habitats that all relate to the cultural significance of Coquille Indian Tribe properties.

The Kilkich Area Master Plan for both our North and South parcels would support the overall development of a Transporation network that would integrate current local and regional transportation systems. This development and increase in resources would allow new residential areas to be designed and built. This would provide an increase to livable spaces and the ability to supply housing to individuals or family groups who want to move here or are looking for additional housing options that accommodate their income levels and household size. The expansion to housing opportunities would support the economic vitality that is needed to grow our local communities and would provide the sustainability for those wanting to live here permanently.

Explain how your proposed project is timely and urgent

This application demonstrates a significant amount of timeliness and urgency through supporting the Tribe's efforts in their strategic master planning process. The 2018 Empire Comprehensive Plan included two conceptual residential subdivision layouts, one in Subarea A which id north of First Creek (North Parcel) and a second in Subarea E- East (South Parcel). This plan references suggested development efforts in the North Parcel as a top priority for the Coquille Indian Tribe and in advancing these efforts, the Tribe should undertake certain initiatives which will be completed through land use designations, market and financial analysis, utility services, permitting, subdivision design, roadway improvements and project funding. These initiatives will be included in the Kilkich Area Master Plan and will allow the Tribe to support the community it its entirety by increasing transit needs for residents of the Kilkich community and transit service in both parcels.

What are your proposed tasks and deliverables

Task 1: Review existing 2018 Empire Comprehensive Plan for the Coquille Indian Tribe's Empire property including land use inventory and the identification of opportunities and constraints related to housing, public access, public safety, multimodal Transporation, circulation and environmental resource protection and utility connections including power, water, sewer and communication. This task will also include the examination of current planning efforts and evaluation criteria, including information related to the expansion of services. This task will be developed with our community partners including the cities of Coos Bay, North Bend and Coos County. Project work will be completed directly with our Tribal Administration team and staff members from our Project Management and Planning Department.

Task 2: Incorporating the need for energy resiliency into the Kilkich Area Master Plan. This would include the resources and data needed for the Tribe to focus on the need for energy resilient type projects relating specifically to the increase in community development.

Task 3: Undertake site specific market analysis for the North and South Parcel subdivisions. Due to differences between the two areas (site attributes, grade and demographic attributes of future resides),

the market analysis should evaluate each of these parcels separately). Key outcomes of this analysis should include demographics of likely residents, recommended housing unit numbers, types, sizes and attributes, target rental rates and revenue Information (design/engineering costs, grading, site prep, infrastructure, and utilities).

Task 4: Prepare a detailed plan for the development of a Transporation system that connects land uses to access roads outside of properties and is supportive of individuals traveling by foot, by bicycle and on transit. This includes the identification of upgrading multi use pathways, pedestrian facilities along all onsire roadways and a mixed used path or protected shoulder along Libby Lane that would connect a baseball field area to Wallace Road or Wilshire Lane. We would conduct community outreach and information opportunities for staff and Kilkich residents. This work would be completed within a 90-day timeframe.

Task 5: Prepare maps and complete a phasing plan based on Tribal Council direction including funding options for the completion of project details and identify funding sources. Include estimated costs for design/permitting and construction. This work would be completed within a 90-day timeframe.

How will the project approach lead to a successful project?

The Kilkich Area Master Plan will be completed by an external consultant but direction and guidance of the approved plan with be given through Tribal Council and those who have been identified to lead and guide the facilitation of this project. Meetings and workshops focusing on this work will be completed, including those relating to the Tribe's Stategic Plan.

- WHEREAS, the Coquille Indian Tribe ("Tribe") is a federally recognized Indian tribe pursuant to the Coquille Indian Restoration Act of June 28, 1989, 25 U.S.C. § 715, et seq. ("the Act"); AND
- WHEREAS, the Tribe is governed by the Coquille Tribal Council pursuant to the Tribal Constitution adopted by eligible voters of the Tribe on August 27, 1991, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on September 9, 1991; and the Tribal Council is empowered to establish Tribal policies, enact Tribal laws and act for the Tribe; AND
- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council has adopted the Tribal Government Relations Ordinance, codified as Coquille Indian Tribal Code Chapter 190, which sets forth uniform standards and guidelines for certain Tribal government operations and activities; AND
- WHEREAS, the Tribal Government Relations Ordinance Section 190.155 requires the Tribal Council to approve all grants or funding agreements transferring \$100,000 or more to the Tribe, and requires that such approval be performed by resolution; AND
- WHEREAS, the Oregon Department of Transportation, issued a notice of funding opportunity for FY 2023, Transportation and Growth Management Program Grant ("TGMP Grant") with applications due for submission on July 27, 2023; AND
- WHEREAS, the TGMP Grant will support the development of an integrated land use and transportation plan that will implement measures to encourage a more livable, affordable and accessible community; AND
- WHEREAS, the TGMP Grant requires grant recipients to provide a 12% match, and the Tribe now wishes to express its commitment to provide those matching funds; NOW


