## From the President

**John Reslock, O.D.**

I would like to tell you about a colleague and friend of mine. In 1973 I bought the practice of Dr. Robert Ley, O.D. in Coquille, OR. He is not only one of the finest gentlemen I've ever met, but he is also a master musician who volunteered for years as the pianist for the local theater group. What impressed me most about him was his response to the passage of our DPA legislation in 1975. He had already sold his practice, but he was one of the first to sign up for the DPA class which was over 100 hours long. His philosophy was even though he might only practice one or two more years, DPA certification was good for our profession and even better for patients because it would improve patient care.

We need to follow Dr. Ley's example and continue to advance our profession. We need to strive to upgrade the standard of care to the citizens of Oregon. As optometric physicians we have been given the opportunity to use Nontopical Therapeutic Pharmaceutical Agents for our patients. This requires completion and passing of an approved didactic course or a passing score on the

2002 or later TMOD section of the NBEO exam. Of our 655 active licensees, 367 have an active AT license. There are roughly 80 others that have taken either the 23-hour didactic course or the 7-hour injection lab. Recently, in order to benefit the citizens of Oregon, the Board has given optometric physicians a deadline, which is their license renewal due

date in 2009, to become certified to use Topical and Nontopical Therapeutic Pharmaceutical agents under the new AT certification. The choice to add the 7-hour injection lab will be optional. Doctors who choose to exercise this option may obtain the new ATI certification. In other words, by the year 2009 the citizens of Oregon who choose an optometric physician for their primary eye care may be given the same level of care from every provider. There are roughly 200 optometric physicians who have not started upgrading their license yet. Since 18 hours of continuing education are required yearly for renewal anyway, the AT course work would serve two purposes. Optometry is the finest profession in the world, so let's follow Dr. Ley's example.

My term on the Board of Optometry will be expiring in September of this year. It has been an honor and a privilege to serve on the Board for the last 10 years. I've been proud of the fact that we have had few complaints to resolve, especially when you consider how many patients are attended by optometrists. The rest of the medical profession would be proud to claim the track record we have established. We may not be able to satisfy all the people all of the time, but I hope we keep doing the best we can by

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improving our skills and education, which is perhaps the best option. I would like to thank David Plunkett and his staff for resolving many of the issues before they come to the Board. I would also like to thank the rest of the current and previous members of the Board for their time, dedication, insights and thoughtful consideration in Board affairs.

## From the Executive Director

Occasionally the Board is made aware that a physician is practicing at a location for which he or she does not have a license. In Oregon, an optometrist must notify the Board of each practice location prior to practicing at that location and immediately after termination of practice at that location. A license certificate specific to the practice location must be displayed by each optometrist (unless the physician has a multiple-site license). This also applies to those situations in which a doctor is temporarily working in a location, even if only for a day. The work may be for any number of reasons which might include illness on the part of another physician, vacation coverage, and so on, but any work which constitutes the practice of optometry falls under this requirement. A physician is also required to report his or her practice location when working on a volunteer basis at a registered non-profit facility; however, the license fee may be waived (see OAR 852-50-021). Failure to notify the Board in writing of any changes in practice location may result in an

assessment of a fee of \$50.00 for the first failure and up to \$200.00 for subsequent failures. Please read OAR 852-050-0016 to become familiar with the requirements under Oregon Administrative Rules regarding this issue.

On a different note, the Board continues to be concerned that there are optometrists that have taken all of the advanced therapeutics course work that are not yet certified by the Board. We expressed this concern in the December 2004 newsletter and is one which I will repeat. The concern is twofold. First, since the only things remaining for certification for these optometrists are taking the CPR course and submitting an application to the Board, the process could be completed rather quickly. These doctors could then be using advanced therapeutics in their practices. The second concern is that doctors may be using advanced therapeutics in their practices without completing the certification process. This could be a potential problem for the individual optometrist and the profession. Please make sure that this does not occur. In an effort to facilitate a review of those AT-certified optometric physicians, we have listed on Pages 6-7 of this newsletter all of the practitioners that have been "AT" certified by the Board. If your name is not on this list, and you think that you have been certified by the Board, please contact the Board office immediately for verification. Otherwise, we would encourage optometric physicians to complete their certification process as soon as possible. This is even more important now that "AT" certification will be required for Oregon license renewal in 2009.

## Minimum Licensing Standard Raised

An administrative rules hearing was held by the Board on March 17, 2006 to consider proposed changes to OAR 852-020, 852-050 and 852-080. These changes were adopted and will become effective April 1, 2006. The text of the rules may be read on the Board's website at [www.oregonobo.org](http://www.oregonobo.org). The results of these administrative rules changes are significant and should be noted by all Oregon licensees as they may affect your license renewal and scope of practice.

On April 1, 2006, all optometrists who have been certified to use, administer, and prescribe from the nontopical formulary and have received the "AT" designation following their license number will be issued new licenses with the designation "ATI" following the license number. This new designation indicates: "Topical and Nontopical Therapeutic Pharmaceutical Agents with injections". This will occur automatically --- you do not need to do anything.

After April 1st, applicants for nontopical TPA certification may choose to be certified with either an "AT" designation, which permits the use, administration, and prescription from the nontopical formulary without injections, or the "ATI" designation which includes the injections endorsement.

Beginning April 1, 2006, the course requirements for the "AT" certification include completion of

an approved didactic course of at least 23 hours or a passing score on the 2002 or later TMOD section of the NBEO examination, and a CPR certification based on the American Heart Association's BLS Healthcare Provider course, or its equivalent as determined by the Board.

In order to be "ATI" certified, the applicant must additionally show proof of completion of an approved injection lab which is at least 7 hours in length, or equivalent coursework, as determined by the Board.

Effective with year 2009 license renewal, beginning January 1, 2009, all active status licensees practicing optometry in Oregon shall have obtained certification to use "topical and nontopical therapeutic pharmaceutical agents" as a condition of license renewal (AT license).

The Board recommends that physicians complete their training while courses are available, and apply for the certification of their choice prior to the 2009 deadline. The 23-hour AOT Didactic Course and the 7-hour AOT Injection Lab can be used to meet your annual 18-hour COE requirement.

## New Board Contact Information

## Ethics/Oregon Law and Administrative Rules Course -

Starting last license renewal (2005) and every other year thereafter, each active status licensee must prove attendance at one hour of either a Board approved ethics course or Oregon Law and Administrative Rules course as a condition of renewal. New licensees are required to meet this requirement in the first year that continuing education is due with their license renewal. If you are not sure when your next credit is due, please contact the Board office.

There have been several sources for obtaining this credit during the past two years. Approved courses have been offered at conferences

both within Oregon and in other states as the value of reviewing issues of ethics in the practice of optometry is acknowledged.

For doctors who are unable to attend a course in person, Pacific University School of Optometry offers two ethics courses online. A link to the Pacific University online education is provided at the Board's website at [www.oregonobo.org](http://www.oregonobo.org).

As continuing education providers make Board-approved courses available, they will be posted on the Board's website at the link: "Continuing Education Reviewed by the Board". COPE approved courses that are categorized "Ethics" are also acceptable.

## Nontopical TPA Update

To date, four hundred forty-eight optometrists have taken either part or all of the approved coursework which is required for certification to use, administer, and prescribe the agents included in the non-topical formulary. In total, three hundred eighty-one Oregon licensed optometrists were "AT" certified by the Board at the end of February 2006.

Students from four colleges of optometry, (Pacific University College of Optometry, Northeastern State University College of Optometry, Southern College of Optometry, and University of Alabama Birmingham College of Optometry) are graduating optometry students that have completed all the required training and are automatically eligible for "AT" certification upon licensure in Oregon.

With the adoption on March 17, 2006 of changes to OAR 852-080, all the doctors who have previously been issued licenses with "AT" certification will be issued new licenses with "ATI" certification. This designation denotes certification to use, administer and prescribe the non-topical formulary including injections. As of April 1, 2006, a physician may choose to become certified to use, administer and prescribe the non-topical formulary without injections which will be designated "AT". Beginning with license renewals in January 2009, all active status optometrists will be required to have obtained "AT" certification. In order to be "AT" certified, a doctor must complete an approved didactic course of at least twenty three hours in duration or pass the 2002 or later TMOD of the NBOE examination, and acquire CPR certification through an American Heart Association Healthcare Provider level course or its equivalent as determined by the Board. To acquire an "ATI" certification to perform injections, a physician must complete an approved injection lab of at least 7 hours in addition to the didactic course and CPR requirement.

The Oregon Optometric Physicians Association in conjunction with Pacific University College of Optometry continues to sponsor approved injection lab course work for certification. In addition, an administration of the twenty-three hour didactic course is scheduled for September 7-9, 2006 in Milwaukie, OR at the Monarch Hotel & Conference Center. Interested persons may register at the OOPA website ([www.oregonoptometry.org](http://www.oregonoptometry.org)) or contact the OOPA office for details of these courses. A passing score on the 2002 or later TMOD exam

will substitute for the didactic course. As an alternative to the TMOD, the Board has approved the 28-hour AOT course offered in the state of Washington, including the didactic and lab portions to satisfy the Oregon didactic requirement. None of the Washington course will meet Oregon's seven-hour injection lab requirement. The Board recommends that doctors complete their training while the courses are available and to immediately apply for certification with the Board.

## **Improving Doctor - Patient Communications**

The Board often responds to requests from individuals who have complaints about optometrists which stem from poor communications and which may have been avoided with a bit of patience, improved use of listening skills, and attention to genuine disclosure for the patient's benefit.

In a recent circumstance, a patient was led to believe that a physician was a member of a particular insurance panel. When she was inquiring before making her appointment, the patient was told that the office could bill her insurance company. While this was true, there was no mention of the fact that the physician was not a member of the panel for that company and the patient mistakenly believed that her full insurance benefits would apply to her care at this office. In fact, the patient faced a higher co-payment than she had anticipated since the doctor was not a preferred provider on her plan. The Board recommended to the physician that the amount of the

additional payment be refunded to the patient, and the situation was resolved. If a more complete disclosure had been made at the onset, this complaint would have been avoided.

Another example is when patients are confused or misled by the contact lens examination policy in an optometrist's office. The Board has investigated several complaints in which the patient was led to believe that the purchase of contact lenses from the physician was a required component of the contact lens examination. In these circumstances, the printed contact lens examination policy did not allow for the patient to purchase their lenses outside of the physicians office. In some circumstances, the cost of the examination included the purchase of up to a one-year supply of lenses. In fact, it is not permitted in Oregon to bundle the purchase of contact lenses together with the cost of a contact lens examination in such a way as to prohibit the patient from purchasing those lenses from another vender. OAR 852-020-0031(1) states that a doctor of optometry shall immediately release a signed, written prescription to the patient at the time at which he or she would provide spectacles or contacts without additional examination. OAR 852-020-0029(4) goes on to state that the prescriptions shall be written in a manner that allows the patient to have the prescription filled by an office or outlet of their choice. Federal Trade Commission regulations and Oregon Administrative Rules require that a written prescription be released to a patient whether or not the prescription is filled at the time of the completion of the

examination. In the instances of the complaints which have come before the Board, the physicians were instructed to clarify and simplify their written contact lens examination policy, and to differentiate between the cost of the examination and any other "packages" which might be offered to the patient in order to make known the choices available to the patient.

Many times conflicts may be avoided or resolved by careful listening on the part of the physician and their staff and by providing a courteous and patient response.

## Not All "COPE" Courses Are Equal

The Board has approved continuing education courses which are reviewed by COPE in all categories except "Practice Management" and "Jurisprudence" which are optometric business management-type courses. These courses will not satisfy the Board's continuing education requirements for license renewal. Ethics courses which are approved by COPE are the exception; they will be accepted.

Several doctors have reported courses related to Medicare guidelines and HIPPA with their renewals because COPE had approval the courses. While these courses are, no doubt, beneficial to the practitioner, only clinical courses are accepted for the Oregon continuing education requirement. If you have any question about whether a course

falls in an acceptable category, you may contact the office of the Board.

## Investigation Activities

In 2005, The Board reviewed 38 complaint cases; 36 were resolved and closed. Six of the cases resulted in discipline as follows:

◆ David Robinson, O.D. - One case involving unprofessional conduct, or gross ignorance or inefficiency in the profession for failure to notify the Board in writing of the place or places of practice before engaging in that location and immediately upon termination at that location; failure to respond to the Board's request for information as required; failing to make full payment to the Board of all Board assessed fees, fines and penalties; failing to retain or make appropriate transfer of the care of patient records; failure to notify the Board of the location of patient records for those locations that the licensee is no longer working. A civil penalty was assessed of \$2,000.

◆ Francis Iwamoto, O.D. - One case involving practicing optometry in the State of Oregon without having at the time a valid unrevoked license as an optometrist. A civil penalty was assessed of \$10,000.

◆ Gary Kitzrow, O.D. - Four cases involving unprofessional conduct for failure to complete the terms of an agreement entered into with the Board and failure to respond to the Board's letters. A Stipulated Agreement was reached, the terms of which have now been fulfilled.

## Patient Records

Patient records are the responsibility of the optometric physician. When an optometrist leaves a practice location, the patient records must remain in the doctor's possession unless their custody is transferred to another optometrist who is licensed in Oregon. It is not sufficient to leave the records in the possession of an optical company. You must make arrangements for the transfer of patient records to another optometric physician or implement a protocol for the maintenance of those records yourself until the retention time expires.

The transfer of the patient records must be reported in writing immediately to the Board. Failure to maintain complete records or failure to transfer the care of patient records in accordance with the Administrative Rule shall be considered unprofessional conduct. The Board has authority to assess a civil penalty against the optometric physician, even if he or she is no longer practicing optometry.

## License Fee Increase

Just a reminder that the license renewal fee for active status licensees will increase July 1, 2006 from \$210 to \$235 per year. This fee increase was set last June after an administrative rule hearing on the Board's budget for the 2005-2007 biennium.
