






PRODUCE SAFETY ALLIANCE GROWER TRAININGS

- One and two day classes






SINCE WE STARTED








WHY IS OREGON NOT DOING INSPECTIONS?

- Unclear at the time who the monetary burden would fall to if FDA funding went away
- Parts of the rule put on hold soon after it came out
- Cooperative Agreement with FDA is for five years (2016 – 2021)





LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY

- Passed in 2017
- ODA has legislative ability to do Produce Safety Rule inspections under FDA authority
- ODA has not adopted this ability into reference

79th OREGON LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY--2017 Regular Session

Enrolled Senate Bill 18

Printed pursuant to Senate Interim Rule 213.28 by order of the President of the Senate in conformance with presession filing rules, indicating neither advocacy nor opposition on the part of the President (at the request of Governor Kate Brown for State Department of Agriculture)

CHAPTER

AN ACT

Relating to State Department of Agriculture regulation of the food supply chain; creating new provisions; and amending ORS 633.006.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. (1) Consistent with the terms of the federal FDA Food Safety Modernization Act (P.L. 111-353) or interstate food safety systems authorized under the federal Act, the State Department of Agriculture may administer and enforce duties, functions and powers that include, but are not limited to:

Other > \$500,000 gross produce sales averaged over the last three years

Small \$250,000 – \$500,000 gross produce sales averaged over the last three years

Very Small \$250,000 - \$25,000* gross produce sales averaged over the last three years *adjusted for inflation

- April 2019 FDA-led inspections began in Oregon
- Common minor issues nationwide
 - Recordkeeping
 - Training on health & hygiene



FDA-LED INSPECTIONS - 2020

- Inspections continue for large farms not visited in 2020
- Small farm inspections will begin April 2020 but large farms will be the priority
- ODA can attend as observers





FDA-led FSMA Produce Safety Rule Inspections

Inspections continue spring 2020

The largest U.S. produce farms, and large foreign farms that export to the U.S., were subject to routine produce farm inspections associated with the Produce Safety Rule starting in spring 2019. Beginning in spring 2020, both large and small produce farms will be subject to routine produce farm inspections.

FDA will continue to prioritize and inspect large farms that were not inspected in 2019. Large farms are those that, on a rolling basis, have sold an average of more than \$500,000 over the last three years.


In spring of 2020 routine inspections will also cover small farms (those that, on a rolling basis, have sold an average of more than \$250,000 and less than \$500,000 in produce over the last three years).

FEEDBACK FROM INDUSTRY

- Listening Session held in January 2019
- Feedback
 - OFRR's
 - OFRR's are helpful
 - OFRR's don't prepare you for an inspection
 - Want ODA to take on inspections
 - Want the Produce Safety Inspection combined with a third party audit to reduce burden of time






IF ODA TOOK ON A REGULATORY PROGRAM

 Inspection program would not be functional until 2021

- Operating under FDA authority
- Hire new staff





IF ODA TOOK ON A REGULATORY PROGRAM

33.3% of covered farms, in one size class reached in one year. Based off FDA 2019 inspection numbers compared with NASS covered farm numbers.

Scenario: 3 ODA inspectors

EXAMPLE: IF ODA INSPECTED IN 2019

- 115 inspections done out of 345 large covered farms
- 38 inspections / person
- 33.3% of covered large farms in OR

FOLLOWING YEAR

- Remaining 66.6% Large inspected as priority
- 33.3% Small inspected
- Numbers of covered farms are provided by National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) 2017 Census of Agriculture

Scenario: 3 ODA inspectors, 8 hours per inspection
