Your Family Is

Your family is extraordinary in many ways. The things that make your family special can help your child's learning at school and at home. Here are a few examples of things that make your your family extraordinary, and that you can share with your child's teacher and school.

- Things you do for work (For example, tools you use in your job, math or measurements you use at work, or scientific facts that are important to your work)
- Traditions that have been passed down in your family
- Things you teach your child to do at home (For example, teaching them about plants and animals, or how to make their bed or do other chores).
- The language(s) your family speaks
- Your hopes for your child's future
- Things your family enjoys doing when you are together (For example, in the evening, on the weekends, during the summer)
- Your family's values and beliefs, including things you celebrate
- How you take care of children and other members of the family (For example, what you do when your child is sick, or how you help your child sleep better)
