

Program Comparison: National School Lunch Program (NSLP)/School Breakfast Program (SBP); Summer Food Service Program (SFSP); Seamless Summer Option (SSO)

The purpose of this comparison chart is to assist School Food Authorities (SFAs) and organizations when choosing between the National School Lunch Program (NSLP)/School Breakfast Program (SBP), Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) and the Seamless Summer Option (SSO).

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Required Monitoring by SFA/ Sponsors	 Pre-operational visit before a new or problem site operates the summer program. Existing congregate sites that move to noncongregate meal service for the first time, are required to have a preoperational visit before starting operations. Site visit during the first two weeks of operations, but may be waived sponsors who are in good standing. The site visit and site review may be completed at the same time. Both forms must be completed if this is done. Site review during first four weeks of operation, followed by additional monitoring as needed. 	 Applies to sponsors with more than one approved serving site.
