Overview of Tribal Government Consultation



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Consultation law

ORS 182.162-168

NHPA, NEPA, EO 13175

- Requires agencies to develop and implement policy on relationships in cooperation with tribes
- Provides tribes an opportunity to identify concerns regarding natural and cultural resources, and participate in the resolution of adverse effects

Note the difference: Government-to-Government Consultation vs public/community engagement





Key Takeaways

- Tribal consultation is a government-to-government process and happens separately from any public engagement/process
- The Tribes are interested more than natural and cultural resources.





Tribal Consultation for RMPP & I-205 Tolling

- Tribal Consultation Plans were drafted early, with feedback from tribes and utilized as part of both projects.
- Tribal consultation has involved meetings between agency officials and tribal councils, coordination with tribal government staff, and formal correspondence.
- Intertribal tolling meetings have been used to continue tribal coordination in between project key milestones to keep the tribes informed and engaged.






Tribal Consultation on Draft Rule

- ODOT is proposing an exemption for tribal members and tribal government vehicles of specified federally recognized tribes recognizing tribes as sovereign nations and rights to access their ancestral lands.
- Tribal consultation has involved meetings between agency officials and individual tribal councils, as well as coordination with tribal government staff, and formal correspondence.
- Intertribal tolling meetings have been used to continue tribal coordination to keep the tribes informed and engaged. These meetings are not considered tribal consultation.

Overview of Indigenous Community Member Engagement

- Community Engagement Liaison focus groups for Indigenous community members
- Relationship building and information sharing with community-based organizations that serve indigenous community members, including NAYA (Native American Youth and Family Center)
- Identifying opportunities to participate in events led by Indigenous community organizations, including Indigenous Marketplace






What We're Hearing from Indigenous Community Members

- Indigenous community members travel across state lines from Southwest Washington to the Portland metro area to access social, healthcare and cultural services
- Concerns about tolling inhibiting travel autonomy on indigenous land




Proposed Changes to the Toll Project Equity Framework

- Include tribal governments (Federally Recognized Tribes) in the definition of Equity Framework communities.
- Include tribal governments in addition to historically excluded and underserved communities when referenced in the document.
- Acknowledge and recognize the sovereignty of tribal nations and the government-to-government consultation process.

Implementation Plan Overview

Reader friendly, action-oriented plans are due to the Governor on December 15th.

- Includes an equity implementation plan and a diversion mitigation plan.
- Describes ODOT's process for incorporating partner and public input into toll program decision-making processes.
- Outlines future milestones and decisions.
- Forecasts how ODOT will continue to provide opportunities for input and collaboration

- Describe how input from equity communities and regional partners has shaped toll program development.





Equity Implementation Plan – EMAC's Contributions

This plan cites EMAC's contributions to Oregon Toll Program equity strategy to-date, including:

- Equity Framework
- Shaping an Equitable Toll Program: Recommendations to the OTC
- EMAC-ODOT Accountability Workshop #1
- Input on low-income toll program





Equity Implementation Plan – Topic Areas

- 1. Understanding the equity needs of our community
 - Describes how ODOT engages partners and the public to reflect their input in the program.
- 2. Development of our Low-Income Toll Program
 - Describes how ODOT will establish a first-of-its kind low-income toll program and how ODOT is prioritizing equity as the statewide toll rules are developed.
- 3. Long-Term Equity Accountability
 - A plan for developing a long-term monitoring and accountability process or structure.





Diversion Mitigation Plan

- **Purpose:** Present ODOT's approach to limiting vehicle diversion from the tolled highways onto the local road network.
- Three Topic Areas:
 - 1. Toll Program, project design and mitigation for diversion impacts
 - 2. Oregon Toll Program Adaptive Traffic Management Framework
 - 3. Projects that complement the toll program


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
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

Summer Engagement Summary






Summer 2023 Tabling Approach

- **Purpose:** Raise awareness and understanding of the Oregon Toll Program and hear from communities across the region.
- Held 28 informational tabling events across Portland metro region and engaged 4,712 individuals.
- Tabling events shared information on the Oregon Toll Program.
- Focus on Equity Framework Communities & CBO engagement.
- Partnership with **CELs Program.**

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Key Takeaways from Tabling

- We are **building rapport** with the community.
- Feedback is more **neutral or positive** when you go to the community.
- Don't assume people know anything about tolling.
- People want to know more.
- The "Oregon Toll Program" framing is helpful.
- There is **no "one" message**.
- Tabling engages **new community members**.







I-205 Toll Project: Next Steps





What's next for the I-205 Toll Project?

- A supplemental Environmental Assessment will be released in 2024.
 - The I-205 Toll Project has an updated scope
 - The public will have the opportunity to comment on the analysis
- The engagement team will continue doing outreach in the project area leading up to the supplemental EA's release.





Regional Mobility Pricing Project Tolling Options Engagement Summary





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
Online Tolling Options Survey Overview

Context: ODOT is currently analyzing toll options to meet traveler and regional needs.

Online survey: Designed to gauge understanding of options and gather input on trade-offs. Available 9/26 to 10/9.

Outcome: 8,700 survey responses with 20% from people of color.

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Online ad for survey in Chinese. Survey was available in English, Spanish, Chinese, Vietnamese, and Russian.





Survey Outreach and Engagement

Online and Print Ads	335,000 impressions and circulation
Tabling events	470 people engaged at 7 events
Email notifications	16,600 recipients
Social media posts	145,700 views
CBO emails	209 recipients
CEL engagement	5 languages

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Summary of Key Findings


- Respondents of color and from Clackamas County more frequently said they drive on I-5 or I-205 daily.
- Most respondents said I-5 and I-205 traffic is a problem, but one they live with.
- Respondents **generally understand all options** to the same degree, with about half of respondents finding the options easy to understand.
- Preference for having some hours during the day with no tolls.
- Interest in minimizing drivers rerouting to nearby roads.
- Most respondents said they don't consider it reasonable to pay for a faster trip, without having information about trip costs and time savings.
