## 2014 Enrollment for Newly Eligible Individuals



### Providing coverage to the uninsured

New rules took effect January 1, opening the Oregon Health Plan (OHP) to more low-income adults who, in the past, earned too much to qualify but not enough to afford health insurance. In addition, the Oregon Health Authority implemented a simplified, “fast-track” enrollment process. Since January 1, more than 190,000 newly eligible Oregonians have joined the Oregon Health Plan. Because of our success in enrolling people quickly, Oregon will receive an estimated \$1 billion in additional federal funding in 2014-2015.

Today, more Oregonians have access to the health care they need, when they need it, bringing peace of mind and financial security to individuals and families across the state.

### Fast-track enrollment

In August 2013, Oregon received a federal waiver allowing the state to dramatically streamline the Medicaid (OHP) enrollment for people whose income has already been verified by the state because they are in other benefit programs.

Fast-track enrollment is available to adult Oregonians who meet new 2014 qualifications for OHP and have already qualified for food benefits through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), or health care benefits for their children through the Healthy Kids program. The waiver remains in effect through 2015.

### Enrolling into coordinated care

Under an innovative agreement with the federal government, Oregon will reduce waste and inefficiency in health care and create a more sustainable system. This will allow us to hold down per capita costs while providing better care.

In August 2012, Oregon launched coordinated care organizations (CCOs) to deliver integrated health care services to OHP members. A CCO is a network of all types of health care providers (physical health care, addictions and mental health care and dental care providers) who work together in their local communities to serve people who receive health benefits through OHP. CCOs each have a global budget that grows at no more than 3.4 percent per capita per year. They focus on prevention and helping OHP members manage chronic conditions like diabetes.

Early data from coordinated care organizations show trends toward improved care and a shift of resources away from expensive emergency department (ED) visits and toward

primary care. ED visits have declined by 13 percent from a 2011 baseline; hospital admissions for congestive heart failure have declined by 32 percent; primary care visits have increased by 16 percent; and enrollment in patient-centered primary care homes has increased by 51 percent.

As more people come into OHP over the next several years, they will be enrolled into a sustainable system that is better prepared to serve their health care needs.
