

EMPLOYMENT SERVICES



- One-on-one supported employment services specific to individual and community needs
- 588 job seekers gained employment

SOBERING SERVICES



- Transportation and stabilization services that protect the health and safety of the downtown community
- Harm reduction for individuals experiencing public intoxication




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Service Continuum Model



Peers connecting patients to healthcare



The **Community Health Outreach Workers (CHOW) team** employs “peers” to bring individuals who are newly enrolled in OHP into our Primary Care Home and OTRC, where patients can find barrier-free access, team-based care, integrated mental health and addiction treatment, and additional wellness resources. \

Members of the **CCC Health Improvement Projects (CHIPs) team**, also known as our Health Resilience Specialists, are embedded in the four main care teams at CCC’s [Old Town Clinic](#) (OTC). CHIPs team member work closely with high hospital utilizing OTC patients providing intensive case management and addressing social determinants of health.

For those already living in [our housing](#), CCC’s **Housed + Healthy team** provides a direct pipeline from housing to CCC health care.

HOUSING CHOICE: Different Housing for Different Needs

- 1700 units total
 - 1078 units recovery housing
 - 608 units Housing First/low-barrier housing
 - 300 scattered site Permanent Supportive Housing units
 - Additional 300 units in the pipeline

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TRANSITIONAL RECOVERY COMMUNITY HOUSING

FY 15-16

- **531 residents served in 204 short term units (339 exits)**
 - **36% chronically homeless**
 - **72% successfully completed A & D treatment**
 - **67% exited to Permanent Housing (227 residents)**
 - **Average of 88% still housed and in recovery 12 months post exit**
 - **38% exit with employment**
 - **10% exit with other income**
- **Permanent Recovery Housing: 89% remain 12 months or longer**
 - **37% employed and 44% with other income**



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Targeted Supportive Programming

8x8 Recovery Program

▶ 6-12 month program supporting chemical dependency treatment and early recovery efforts of participants.

Employment Recovery Program

▶ 12-24 month program that assists individuals in early recovery by helping them overcome the barriers to employment created by addiction & homelessness.

Mentor Program

▶ 6-12 month program focusing on individuals exiting detoxification services by providing transitional housing, recovery mentor services, and support through the treatment process.

Parole Transition Program/Re-Entry

▶ 3 – 9 month transitional program for individuals exiting corrections on probation or parole.

Family Alcohol & Drug Free Network

▶ 12 -24 month program focusing on families with children who are exiting treatment & foster care system.

Veterans

▶ 12 – 24 month program offering transitional housing & support to veterans.

FAMILY HOUSING

Goals and Services

Building safe, supportive, alcohol and drug-free communities

Family Mentors provide case management and role modeling to promote residents' on-going recovery and self-sufficiency

Employment Specialist assists residents to find employment and further their education

152 Units of Family Alcohol and Drug Free Housing

- **Most families enter FAN at or below poverty level**
- **100% are recovering from addiction**
- **59% of FAN parents have mental health issues and many have their own trauma history. For many, addiction is a multi-generational problem**
- **At entry, 85% of families are involved with child welfare**
- **Many children have experienced neglect or abuse**
- **Many children are drug-affected and have delays**

Community Safety

Partnerships with Parole and Probation

Case Management and Peers supporting clients to meet demands of parole and probation, reunite with family, build support network, and obtain long term stable housing

Employment Specialist assists clients to find employment and further their education

181 Units of Re-Entry Housing-

Funded by Multnomah County Community Corrections

- **Clients entering below poverty level**
- **85% come in with Substance Use and/or Mental Health Diagnosis**
- **Provide both Transitional Housing and Stabilization Services**



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Essential Recuperative Care Program Model

- Intensive, trauma-informed and person-centered case management, including daily client monitoring.
- Dedicated access to medical care and ancillary services at CCC's Old Town Clinic.
- Secure transitional housing, including personal hygiene supplies, food boxes and nutritional support.



CEP-Community Engagement Program

- Housing first model that serves chronically homeless and dually-diagnosed adults
- multi-disciplinary specialty addiction treatment team.
- harm-reduction model with a focus on IDDT, MI, Seeking Safety, and CBT as EBP foundation
- Outreach, case management, and treatment to chronically homeless individuals who struggle with addiction and mental illness.
- team is comprised of both alcohol and drug and Dually-credentialed counselors, housing specialist who supports client in utilizing community resources to obtain housing and two peer support specialists to engage clients in community integration. Part-Time Money Manager and Partners with Old Town Clinic PMHNP
- CEP is a time-unlimited outpatient program with a focus on building long-term rapport to support clients in achieving their self-identified goals, to include obtaining and maintaining permanent housing, reducing emergency room visits, and reducing police contact

Supported Employment (IPS) Principles

Supported Employment (SE) is a SAMHSA-recognized evidence-based practice (EBP)

- **Competitive employment is the goal**
- **Eligibility based on consumer choice**
- **Rapid job search**
- **Service integration**
- **Long term support**
