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Why Regulate Cigarette Smoking and Tobacco Use In Outdoor Areas

Health

 Protect public from the negative health consequences of exposure to secondhand smoke outdoors



Environmental

 Protect the park environment from the risk of cigarette-causing fires and litter

Policy

 Philosophy behind parks is contradicted by allowing tobacco use



Health Reasons:

- Second Hand Smoke (SHS)
 - Exposure to SHS is harmful- especially to children
 - No level of SHS is risk-free
 - Contains 4,000 chemicals listed as a Group A carcinogen
 - •Exposure to SHS negates the positive effects of engaging in healthy outdoor activities
 - •SHS exposure in outdoor areas can rival amounts in indoor spaces



Environmental Reasons:

Litter



- Most prevalent form of litter on Earth
- Cost money and man-power to clean up
- Not readily biodegradable
- Ingestible by children, wildlife, and pets
- Cigarette Packaging

Policy Reasons:

- Tobacco use in parks and recreation areas contradicts basic philosophy of recreation departments:
 - •Promoting healthy outdoor living, environmental awareness, fitness and recreational activities
- Adult smoking sends the wrong message to youth

•Children tend to perceive that smoking is acceptable when they view adults smoking in public

State and Local examples

Over 1,200 localities restrict smoking in outdoor areas such as public beaches, stadiums, parks, and sidewalks.


Enforcement concerns

Preemption

A legal concept where a higher level of government (state or federal) has the authority to limit, or even eliminate, the power of a lower level of government to regulate a certain issue.

- Assess community readiness
- Develop and present recommendation
- Implementation
- Evaluation

Identify Reasons to Change

- Environmental Impact
 - * Litter
 - * Release of Toxins
- Positive Role Modeling
 - * Setting healthy examples for youth
- Social Impact
 - * Most park users don't smoke
- * Health Implications
 - * Reduce triggers for COPD, Asthma Attacks

Identify Partnerships

Who do you need at the table?

- * Educators
- * People who smoke
- * Healthcare
 - * Hospital Staff
 - * Health Department
- * Law Enforcement
- * Youth
- * Parents
- * Youth Activities Coordinator
- * Faith Based
- * Tribes

Research Surrounding Communities


Look at what other communities have in place regarding tobacco free parks.

- * Policy v. Ordinance
- * Partial Park v. All Park
 - * Partial Parks: X Feet from play structures, bleachers at ball fields, etc
- * Tobacco v. Smoke Free
- * Enforcement

Assess Community Readiness

- What information do you want to know?
- * How are you going to survey a valid representation of your community?
- Survey Options
 - * On-Line
 - * Person-to-Person
 - * Dot Activity

Community Readiness Parks and Recreation Survey




Example Survey

Community Readiness: Person-to-Person and On-Line Survey



Develop & Present Recommendation

- Compile information from researching other communities and community input.
- Consider all options/variations
 - * Ideal v. Acceptable
- Take into consideration what you know about your community.

Implementation

- Present to decision making body regarding park policy.
- If Approved:
 - * Educate community on change
 - * Create positive signage

Evaluation

- Evaluate at 6 months and 1 year after implementation.
- Make changes as needed.

Minneapolis Parks Overview One of the Premiere Park Systems in the United States

- -Over 14 million annual visitors
- -\$58 Million budget
- -6,700+ acres of land and water
- -182 park properties
- -50 community center
- -55 mile Grand Rounds Scenic Byways
- -7 golf courses
- -Independent Police and Public Works
- -Regional Park System
 - Mississippi River
 - Chain of Lakes
 - Minnehaha Falls


Consequences of Tobacco Use in Public Parks

- Negative influence for Youth Lifestyle
- Harmful to aquatic life 1
- Decreased air quality 2
- Maintenance cost 3
 - 25%-60%+ of waste in parks are tobacco related
- Visual quality of parks
- · Negative experience for park users

Challenges to Tobacco-Free Policies

It's a POLITICALLY CHARGED ISSUE

- -Over complicated in a complicated system-
 - -Anecdotal evidence is over relied on-
 - -Proponents are vilified or trivialized-
 - -lt's easier not to act-

- 100' around playgrounds, pools, buildings
- 50' around athletic fields
- Events
- Some gardens, venues, and specific sites

Next Steps

- Current Policy leaves out bodies of water and trails
- Enforcement clarification
- Education
- Strengthening of policies

What Can Proponents Do?

- Staff are extremely influential!
- Be loud and persistent about benefits!
- Get political too!
- Build coalitions!
- Use personal connections and personal time!
