New Way to do SSI Wage Reporting With Social Security

Social Security has expanded its online wage reporting service to allow people who receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits, and people who receive both Social Security Disability (SSDI) and SSI benefits, and their representative payees to report wages securely online. This capability had been available only to SSDI beneficiaries and their representative payees. The service is available through our existing my Social Security portal.

Wage reporters can still use the SSI Telephone Wage Reporting and SSI Mobile Wage Reporting applications. This new option allows them to avoid visiting a field office to report their wages in person and allows them to print or save a receipt of their report. However, users must still contact an office to report when they first start working for each new employer. It's also important to note that representative payees are able to report wages, but won't have access to beneficiaries' or recipient's other information. You and your clients can visit www.socialsecurity.gov today to learn more about this convenient new online service.

Getting Ready for Open Enrollment

The Target Center has numerous resources available to make open enrollment a breeze:) Here is a timeline of what those who provide insurance assistance might want to consider.

July-August

Assess staff workload and develop a scheduling plan. Conduct staff training and build enrollment staff capacity. Build enrollment partnerships and educate community partners.

July-October

Schedule and conduct 'Account Tune-Ups' with clients.

September-October

Evaluate and/or learn about available health plans. Share key outreach and enrollment messages with clients.

November 1-December 15

Enrollment begins November 1!





End HIV Oregon Sponsorship Program Summary

On World AIDS Day 2017, the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) launched a new funding opportunity to support activities to help OHA and our community partners achieve our collective End HIV Oregon goals.

Specifically, the End HIV Oregon Sponsorship Program seeks to fund small projects, of \$10,000 budget or less, that aim to further one of four goals:

- Increase HIV testing 1)
- 2) Support effective prevention of HIV and other co-occurring sexually transmitted infections (STI)
- Ensure that people with HIV receive and maintain effective treatment 3)
- 4) Promote health equity and reduce HIV-related stigma

This funding opportunity prioritizes organizations that serve diverse communities. OHA seeks to develop new partnerships and help small organizations, particularly those working with communities experiencing health disparities, to increase capacity to deliver HIV/STI prevention and care services.

As of April 2018, 7 projects have been awarded End HIV Oregon Sponsorship funds:

The African-American AIDS Awareness Action Alliance (A^6) – This project aims to increase HIV knowledge and testing among African Americans in the greater Portland area, within the context of a holistic health literacy campaign. This work builds on successful efforts by faith houses within the African American community to reduce stigma and eliminate HIV myths.

The Association of Centers for Independent Living (AOCIL) – The purpose of this project is to improve access to HIV/STI information, resources, and testing for people living with disabilities. AOCIL will conduct a brief assessment, developing an intake protocol that includes HIV/STI, and integrate HIV/STI information and referral into existing systems at the 7 Centers for Independent Living statewide.

Edùcate Ya - Bilingual volunteers will offer rapid HIV testing and culturally sensitive preventive health and HIV/STI prevention information to Latinx adults, families, and youth living in urban and rural communities.

Hepatitis HIV AIDS Awareness Project (hHAAP) – The purpose of this project is to provide culturally-specific prevention education to Black/African American and Spanishspeaking men in Oregon prisons, in order to increase HIV prevention behaviors and HIV, hepatitis C, and STI testing.

END HIV Oregon Sponsorship Awards Continued

Let's Kick A*S*S (AIDS Survivor Syndrome) - The purpose of this project is to expand online, telephonic, and in-person social support resources for people living with HIV (PLWH), particularly long-term survivors. LKA will develop and implement a Webinar series, storytelling workshops, and an interactive on-line calendar to build community connections for people living with HIV.

NAMI Lane County – In partnership with The Alliance, this project will provide two evidence -based, peer-led support groups for (1) LGBTQ individuals and (2) people living with HIV. Two HIV+ peers will receive training in the NAMI model and will facilitate the group for HIV+ individuals.

Partnership Project - This project aims to increase HIV testing and linkage to care among partners of people living with HIV and Transgender Health Program patients.

Quest Center for Integrative Health - This project will determine the feasibility and viability of offering opt-out HIV screening across all their services in a behavioral health home setting. The conclusion of this program will provide Quest Center and Oregon Health Authority with quantifiable sets of data, which will create a greater set knowledge of how to conduct high-quality and effective HIV screening in a non-traditional settings
