

Last month United States Conference on HIV/AIDS occurred virtually. It was an incredible experience to be able to "be there" while being here in Portland. If you registered you can login whenever you are able to have access to all the sessions for a year.

There have only been a couple of sessions that are accessible online without registration. One is this opening plenary which provides a variety of speakers speaking to the Black Lives Matter movement and the impact structural racism has on the HIV pandemic. It is a powerful and an important piece to watch and share with others.

The other session that is publicly available is the closing plenary. This plenary provides an opportunity to hear from those working in the federal government including Dr. Fauci talking about their plans to end the HIV epidemic.



Your Client May Be Eligible for an In-Person Appointment



During the pandemic, Social Security has continued to provide service online and by phone while our offices remain closed for walk-in service. Our local office employees are busy answering calls to their office. While we offer many online and phone options to help you, we recognize that in-person assistance is sometimes necessary.

Though walk-in service is not available, we may be able to schedule an in-person appointment in certain situations. We have updated information on our Coronavirus <u>Disease (COVID-19) web page</u> to explain situations involving help with benefits or a Social Security number when we may be able to schedule an appointment. If you believe your client qualifies for an in-person appointment, ask your client to call their local office. They can look up the phone number for their local office by accessing our office locator. Please note that appointments may not be immediately available, depending on local health and safety conditions and staffing.

An in-person appointment may be possible if your client:

- 1. Is without food or shelter, including utilities or is without medical care or coverage and needs to apply for or reinstate benefits.
- 2. Currently receives benefits and has an urgent need for payment to meet expenses for food, shelter, or medical treatment, and cannot receive the payment electronically.
- 3. Is age 12 or older applying for their first SSN card.
- 4. Needs to update or correct their SSN information (e.g., name, date of birth, or citizenship) to obtain income, resources, or medical care or coverage, or other services or benefits (e.g., filing a tax return, applying for housing, seeking an Economic Impact Payment).

The Social Security Administration has begun the initial rollout of its new electronic Consent Based Social Security Number (SSN) **Verification (eCBSV) service.**

The agency is rolling out the service to selected participants through 2020, and plans on expanding the number of users in 2021.

"Our new electronic SSN verification service helps reduce synthetic identity fraud by comparing agency records with data provided electronically by approved participants," said Andrew Saul, Commissioner of Social Security. "This is an important online service that helps us provide participants and their customers fast, secure, and more efficient SSN verifications."

Social Security created eCBSV, a fee-based electronic SSN verification service, to allow select financial institutions and service providers, called "permitted entities" and including subsidiaries, affiliates, agents, subcontractors, or assignees of a financial institution, to verify if a person's SSN, name, and date of birth combination matches Social Security records.

Social Security needs the person's written consent and will accept an electronic signature in order to disclose the SSN verification to the permitted entity. eCBSV returns a match verification of "Yes" or "No." eCBSV does not verify a person's identity.

Social Security is committed to rolling out eCBSV to all selected permitted entities. The participants approved for the initial rollout are:

Capital One Services, LLC Computer Information Development, LLC Discover Financial Services Early Warning Services, LLC Experian Information Solutions, Inc. ID Analytics, LLC SentiLink Corp. Synchrony Financial Zions Bancorporation

Each of the service providers selected can serve up to 20 permitted entities, and with the financial institutions, there is the potential of 124 permitted entities participating in the initial rollout.

This announcement does not affect the existing Consent Based SSN Verification service.
