Staffing

- Our SBHC Systems Development Specialist is expected to join our team on Monday, May 13.
- We should be bringing a new SBHC Administrative Support Specialist soon.
- We are recruiting for our State School Nurse Consultant position.





Budget 2019-2021

- Beginning July 1, 2019 we anticipate being able to fund all SBHCs at \$60,000/year.
- We will likely have planning grants in 2019 2021.
- Legislative decisions may bring new initiatives to our office.





Additional funding for FY2019

- SPO released a memo in early March regarding the release of awards related to:
 - Parity increase to base funding formula
 - iPad upgrades for identified sites
 - Clinic supplies and youth friendly engagement activities
 - Professional development and training for SBHC staff.
- All funds must be "spent" by June 30, 2019
 - items/trainings/supplies etc. fully paid out by June 30, 2019
 - Items/training/supplies etc. are all received/completed by June 30, 2019

SBHC State Contracts

- All LPHAs have made a determination on whether to keep or decline the SBHC contracts for their non-county medical sponsor.
 - 11 of 25 counties chose to decline contracts for their non-county medical sponsors.
 - We will have 14 grant agreements directly with medical sponsors for 2019-21 biennium.
- Grant Agreements are in Contracts Office and DOJ for approval.
 We're on schedule!
- All LPHAs will be asked to confirm or change their contract decision in the next biennium 2021-23



2019-2021 SBHC Mental Health Expansion Grants - Requirements

• Clarifications:

- Prioritize school-aged clients (5-21)
- Strategy to provide services, regardless of ability to pay
- Support billable services, as well as PEO and direct service without reimbursement (pre-engagement treatment)

Partnerships:

- Work with Medical Sponsor Agency (if different)
- Work with SBHC host school





2019-2021 SBHC Mental Health Expansion Grants - Requirements

- Engagement with SPO:
 - Report extended vacancies in grant-funded positions within 20 calendar days
 - Participate in SBHC Orientation in fall 2019
- Continued from previous biennia...
 - Only State certified SBHCs eligible for funding
 - Support MH/BH FTE (not supplant existing capacity)
 - Submit encounter data
 - Submit reports

Operational Profile Changes

- Programming changes to the Operational Profile
 - Added:
 - Primary contact info for Mental Health and Dental agency (as appropriate);
 - New staff roles and credentials
 - An OPTIONAL login to access the Operational Profile will be available for outside Mental Health agencies to submit financial data for the revenue generated by third party billing.
 - Updated OP manual will be available in July
 - Webinar training in August (date TBD)
 - Be on the look-out for an email announcement with registration
 - <u>Strongly</u> encourage at least one person from each System on the webinar, *especially* the person responsible for updating the OP.

Operational Profile Deadlines

- SBHCs update and confirm entries by <u>10/1/2019</u>
 - Information must be updated for <u>2019-20 Service year</u>
 - Hours of operation, services provided on-site or referral;
 - Staff shift hours, contact info, roles, credentials, YAC, PCPCH;
 - Mental Health agency primary contact & Dental agency primary contact.
 - Entries for <u>2018-19 Service year</u>
 - Financial funding/revenue entry (separate access and entry for Mental Health if services provided by an outside agency)
 - KPM chart audit entry





Satisfaction Survey and Encounter Data Deadlines

- Satisfaction surveys
 - 6/30/19 deadline to mail surveys or sync iPad
- Year-end encounter data report
 - 7/15/19 deadline for visits between 7/1/18 and 6/30/19
 - Loretta will send secure emails in mid-June to SBHCs submitting data that are not on Epic/OCHIN.





Key Performance Measure Data Deadlines

- Choose Optional KPM for 2019-21 Biennium
 - 6/1/19 deadline to make selection in Operational Profile.
 - You can either choose the same Optional KPM or bravely pick a different one!
 - Be on the look-out for upcoming email reminder!
- KPM chart audit submission
 - 10/1/19 deadline for Operational Profile entry
 - Audit for visits occurring between 7/1/18 and 6/30/19
 - Submit chart audit process and audit tracking sheet to Loretta. Operational Profile entry is LOCKED until audit process and tracking sheet are approved.





Well Visit KPM Definition

- Effective January 2019, OHA updated the definition of the Adolescent Well Visit CCO Metric.
- Deletion of 5 ICD-10 codes: Z02.79, Z02.81, Z02.83, Z02.89, Z02.9
- Addition of 2 ICD-10 codes: Z76.1 and Z76.2
- For the 2018-19 KPM audit, we'll ACCEPT all 7 codes (the 2 new ones and the 5 deleted ones) to count as being compliant for the Well Visit KPM.
- This summer, official changes will be made to the KPM Guidance Document to reflect these code changes effective 7/1/2019.





VFC billing policy update

- Effective January 1, 2020
- For patients receiving VFC vaccine (codes M, N, A, F)
- Vaccine administration fees must not be billed after the service date.
- Fee must be waived if patient is unable to pay when the service is received.
- This only applies to the 21.96 administration fee and not to other fees associated with the office visit.



VFC billing policy update

- Effective January 1, 2020
- For patients receiving FC vaccine (codes M, N, A, F)
- Vaccine administration fees that the service date.
- Fee must be waved if patient is mable to bay when the service is received.
- This only applies to the 1.96 administration tee and not to other fees associate with the office vision.



Host a flu clinic at your SBHC!





Flu vaccine for vulnerable populations

- Supports activities that achieve increased public health preparedness skills, and/or provide access to influenza vaccine for underserved communities
- See all comers, no eligibility screening required
- 6,000 prefilled syringes still available for the next flu season
- Provide us with an after-action report at the end of your event, or the end of the season, whichever comes first







Oregon and United States Suicides Rates, All Ages







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

Postvention Legislation

- SB 561 (2015): Requires each Community Mental Health Provider (or Local Mental Health Authority) to:
 - Report youth (24 and younger) suicides in their county jurisdiction to OHA within seven days of the death
 - Develop a Communication Protocol: Work with community partners to identify local pathways and establish a protocol for information-sharing
 - Develop a Response Protocol: Work with community partners to develop an overall community protocol for response to suspected youth suicide. Includes immediate response, mid-term postvention and longterm postvention
- OHA will provide technical assistance in preparing information sharing protocols and postvention, intervention and prevention in the community


Postvention Legislation


- <u>SB 485</u> (2019):
 - Would require public schools districts, public universities, private postsecondary institutions of education and any facility that provides services or resources to runaway or homeless youth to participate in the postvention planning process as required by SB 561
 - Supported by the Oregon Alliance to Prevent Suicide
 - Passed out of Senate and has been referred to House Committee on Education





