SERV-OR FAQs: Updates on SB 1529

Many of you may have been following **Senate Bill 1529** in the current legislative session. As amended and passed, this bill would allow the State Public Health Director, subject to the approval of the Governor or designee, to deploy volunteer health care providers registered with SERV-OR in order to confront public health threats. This may allow SERV-OR to respond to many public health threats that do not rise to the level of needing a fuller Governor's emergency declaration. This may be a valuable option when the Governor's emergency orders that have permitted SERV-OR deployments in response to COVID end on March 31st. As of 3/3/22, the bill has passed both houses and awaits a signature.

Volunteer Activity Self-reporting NEW

SERV-OR has developed a new volunteer activity self-report portal for certain deployments. Self-reporting allows for more efficient, accurate, and detailed data collection since volunteers can report the true number of hours they serve without an intermediary. Not all deployments will require self-reporting, and your Mission Assignment will specify when SERV-OR requests that volunteers enter their own hours. You may also receive emailed requests for self-reporting after you have completed a volunteer shift. The volunteer self-report portal can be found here and should be accessible at that address for the foreseeable future for your convenience.

A New SERV-OR Database System is on the Horizon NEW

As the change in mask requirements is coming up during this month, here are some talking points to help with your conversations as providers:

- After 11:59 p.m. on March 11, California, Oregon, and Washington will be adopting new indoor mask policies and moving from mask requirements to mask recommendations in schools.
- State policies do not change federal requirements, which still include masks on public transit.

Stories of Service: Jon Schnebly, Pharmacist - Volunteering, A Rural Perspective NEW

Jon Schnebly's smile, humor, and humble manner showcase how much he cares about what he does as a volunteer. His long career as a pharmacist has provided him with a unique vision of collaboration and teamwork. He has worked in many hospital systems over the decades and then started his own company as a hospital consultant before retiring in 2020. He has kept his pharmacist license active and has been an asset to Klamath County during the pandemic.

As a volunteer, he went to Boardman to prepare vaccines for a drive-through COVID clinic. At Sky Lakes hospital, he has given "a couple of thousand COVID-19 vaccinations." He continues to work with Klamath County Public Health to give COVID and flu vaccinations for people who are homebound or live in assisted living facilities. He has even called local friends and businesses and added another 30 people for COVID vaccinations through these personal contacts.



He noted "In rural America, we rely on family and friends and less on institutions. We do what we can with what we have. Recently, I went to a nursing home that has 8 patients – this is a family affair and the staff is part of the family. I had time to sit and talk with the patients. I have been in living rooms where the whole family got shots – I gave 14 people flu and COVID shots once. The first person drove 20 miles to get his COVID shot. I will keep doing this until they don't need me anymore." Jon makes a difference as a volunteer in Klamath County!

NACCHO Funding for Medical Reserve Corps COVID-19 Respond, Innovate, Sustain, and Equip (RISE) Awards NEW

The MRC COVID-19 RISE awards are intended to provide resources to the MRC network to support COVID-19 response efforts. These awards will prioritize building capacity for the MRC to respond, innovate toward evolving requirements, sustain staffing requirements, and equip MRC units or state coordinators with the resources needed to support their mission.

Awards are available at three tier levels, with approximately 350 total awards available to MRC units and MRC state coordinators:

Tier 1: \$25,000

• Tier 2: \$50,000

Tier 3: \$75,000

The expected announcement date for the awards is April 1st.
