

Overdose-Related Services & Projects Summary by Oregon County

Document Overview

This document provides county-specific snapshots of overdose-related services and projects across Oregon. This information supports Oregon Health Authority (OHA) overdose-prevention funding decisions and county-level public health agencies' planning and intervention efforts.

Statewide Public Campaigns and Resources

These public campaigns and resources are implemented and available statewide.

Heal Safely Campaign

Prescription opioids come with risks and serious side effects and should be a last resort when managing pain. [Heal Safely](#) offers communities throughout Oregon and Indian Country access to information and resources that support safer healing after injury or surgery.

Health Safely instills that everyone deserves safe, effective options that will help them rest, recover and get back to daily life.



Reverse Overdose Oregon Campaign

[Reverse Overdose Oregon](#) is a statewide campaign that gives employers the tools to train their teams on how to use naloxone—the life-saving medication that reverses opioid overdose—as part of workplace safety and preparedness.

By providing naloxone training and resources to employers, Oregon Health Authority is expanding the pool of first responders to overdose and empowering everyday people to save the lives of coworkers and community members who accidentally overdose from prescription painkillers or illicit opioids.



Save Lives Oregon Resource Hub

[Save Lives Oregon](#) began in 2020, when the COVID-19 pandemic heightened the overdose crisis and left many families, neighborhoods and communities struggling. In response, a resource hub was launched to provide more life-saving supplies such as naloxone to organizations and tribal communities on the front lines of harm reduction.

With continued support and a growing understanding of the power of harm reduction to save lives, Save Lives Oregon are reducing drug-related stigma and increasing access to programs that support the health and dignity of people who use drugs



Measure 110 Behavioral Health Resource Network

In November 2020, Oregon voters passed by referendum [Measure 110](#), or the Drug Addiction Treatment and Recovery Act. As a part of Measure 110, Behavioral Health Resource Networks (BHRNs) were established in Senate Bill 755. A BHRN is an entity or group of entities working together to provide substance use services in Oregon. They serve people with substance use disorders or harmful substance use. At least one BHRN must be established in every county and Tribal area. Services provided by the BHRNs must be free of charge to the client. BHRNs must bill insurance for services where possible before using grant funds. Each BHRN must provide trauma-informed, culturally specific and linguistically responsive services.

Services include but are not limited to:

- Screening for health and social service needs.
- Screening and referral for substance use disorder.
- Access to an individualized intervention plan.
- Case management.
- Low-barrier substance use disorder treatment.
- Harm reduction services.
- Peer-supported services.
- Housing.
- Mobile and virtual outreach.
- Referral to appropriate outside services.

Removal of X-Waiver Requirement Update

Prior to 2023, a special Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA)-approved [X-waiver](#) certification from Substance Abuse Mental Health Services Administration ([SAMHSA](#)) was required for clinician to prescribe buprenorphine. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) moved to [repeal X-waiver requirements](#) and as part of the [omnibus bill](#) to expand universal access to MOUD treatment. [Effective now](#), any clinician with a current DEA registration may prescribe buprenorphine for OUD.

There are no limits on the number of patients a prescriber may treat. However, the simultaneously passed Medication and Access and Training Expansion Act, requires all clinicians applying for or renewing their DEA license to complete a one-time, 8- hour training on treating and managing patients with SUD. Certain providers, such as those board certified in addiction medicine or recent graduates with applicable curriculum, will not have to complete any additional training. This requirement becomes effective in June 2023.

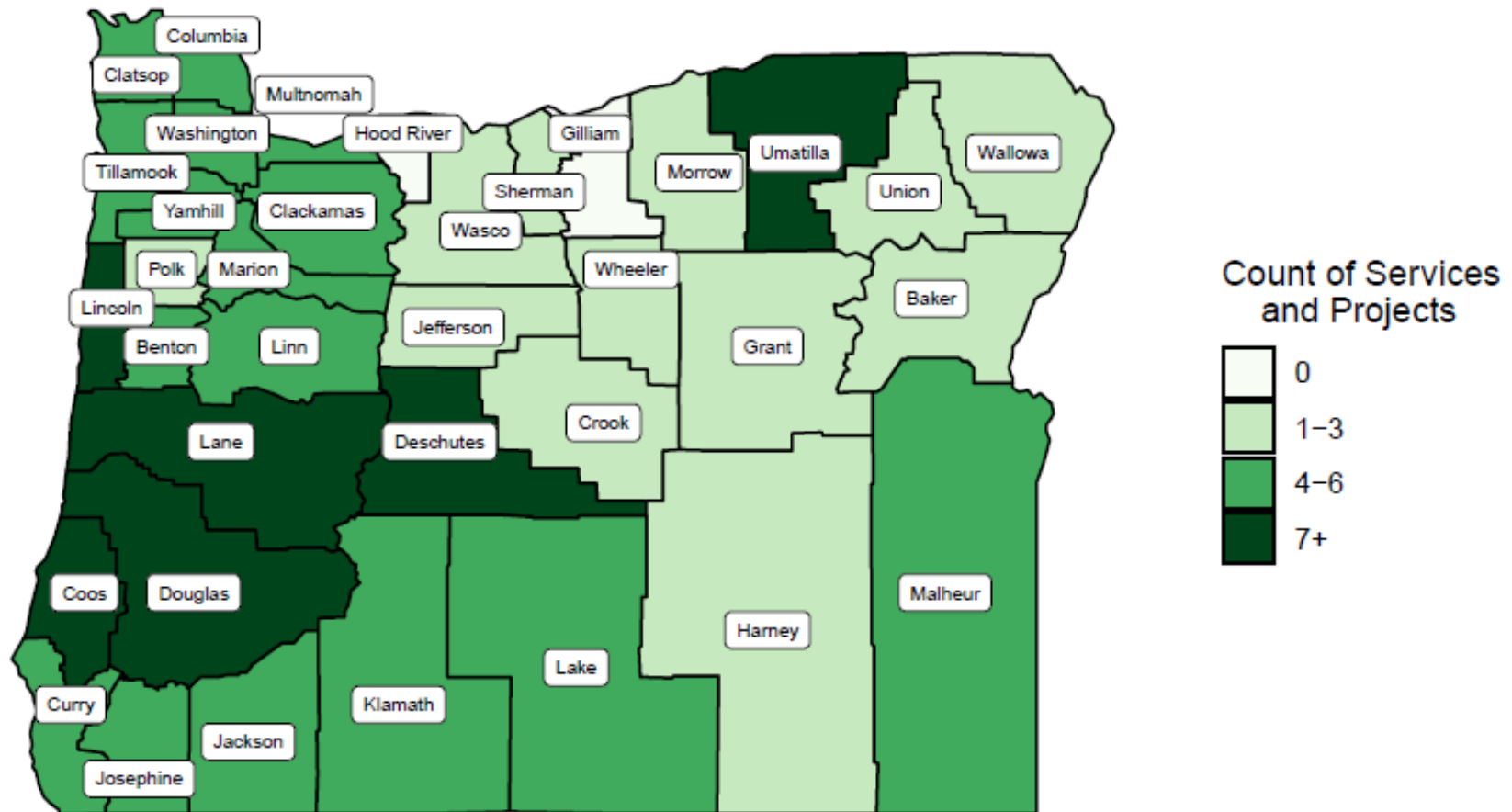

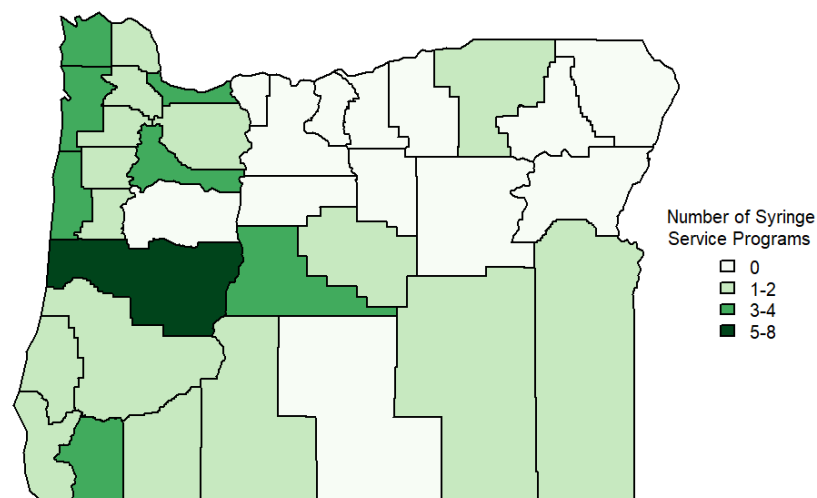

Syringe Service Programs (SSP)

[SSPs](#) are community-based programs for people who inject drugs. SSPs provide a variety of services including free sterile needles and syringes, safe disposal areas, naloxone distribution and overdose education, and access to prevention services such as HIV and hepatitis C testing. Many also provide referrals to services or link with peer programs to offer services. These programs are important in efforts to prevent overdose, HIV and hepatitis C transmission, and hospitalizations for bacterial infections.

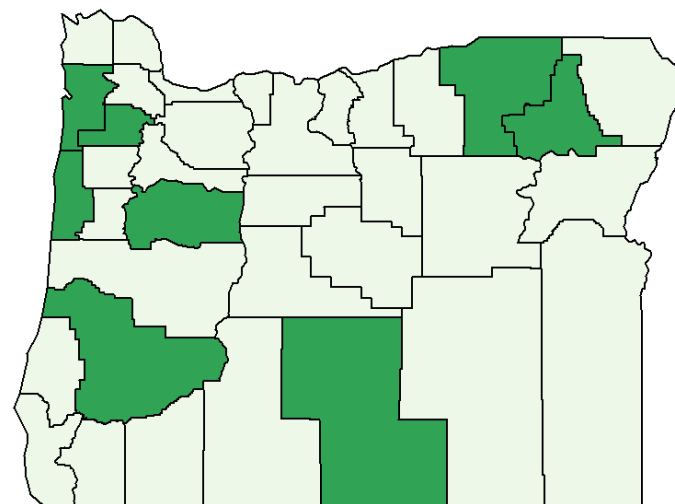

Health Resources & Services Administration (HRSA) Rural Communities Opioid Response Program (RCORP)- Planning and Implementation Awardees

[RCORP-Planning](#) aims to strengthen the capacity of multi-sector networks to develop plans to begin and sustain services to prevent, treat, and help people recover from SUD and/or OUD in rural communities. From funding year 2018 to 2020, HRSA awarded \$53 million nationally to 265 grantees.

[RCORP-Implementation](#) aims to strengthen and expand SUD/OUD prevention, treatment, and recovery services to enhance rural residents' ability to access treatment and move towards recovery. From funding year 2019 to 2022, HRSA awarded \$248 million nationally to 248 grantees.



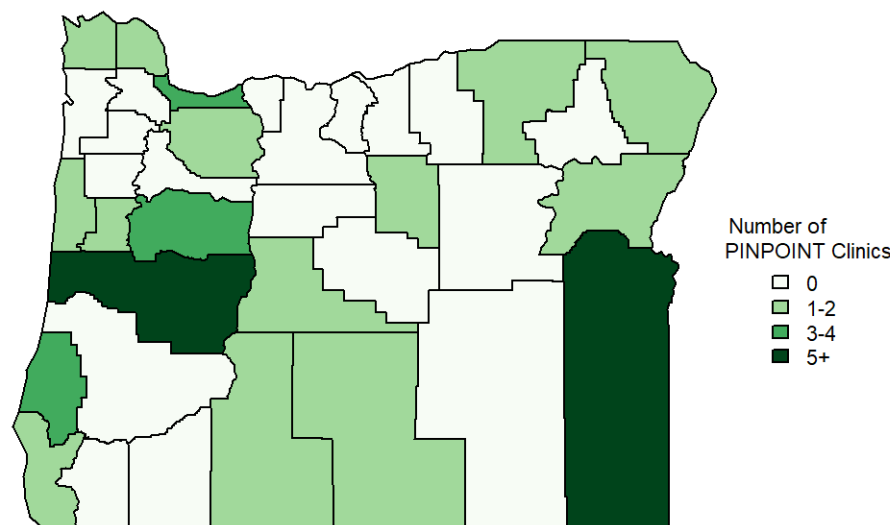

Oregon Rural Practice-based Research Network (ORPRN), funded under CDC's Overdose Data to Action (OD2A) grant and in collaboration with Synergy Health Consulting, Comagine Health, and the National Resource Center for Academic Detailing (NARCAD), [use practice facilitation and academic detailing strategies](#) to improve pain management, opioid prescribing practices, and the treatment of OUD in primary care clinics across Oregon.

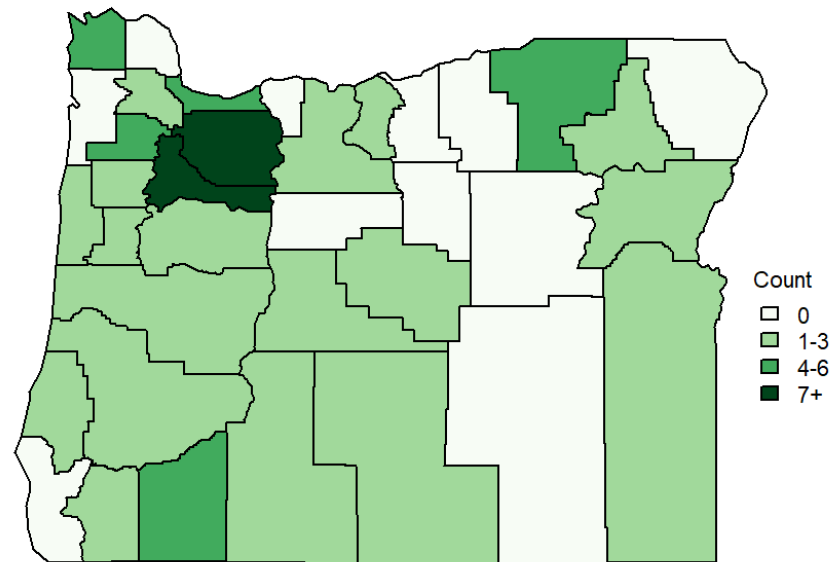

Overdose Detection and Mapping Application Program (ODMAP)

[ODMAP](#) provides near real-time suspected overdose surveillance data across jurisdictions to support public safety and public health efforts to mobilize an immediate response to a sudden increase, or spike in overdose events. It links first responders and relevant record management systems to a mapping tool to track overdoses to stimulate real-time response and strategic analysis across jurisdictions.

Each agency wishing to participate, signs a data sharing agreement which is designed to protect the data within the system. Once signed, they can begin uploading data in real time and access to the ODMAP dashboard, which allows users to view nationwide data. This tool is only available to government (state, local, federal, or tribal) agencies serving the interests of public safety and health. ODMAP is funded by the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy's (ONDCP) High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas (HIDTA) program and there is no cost to agencies who utilize it.

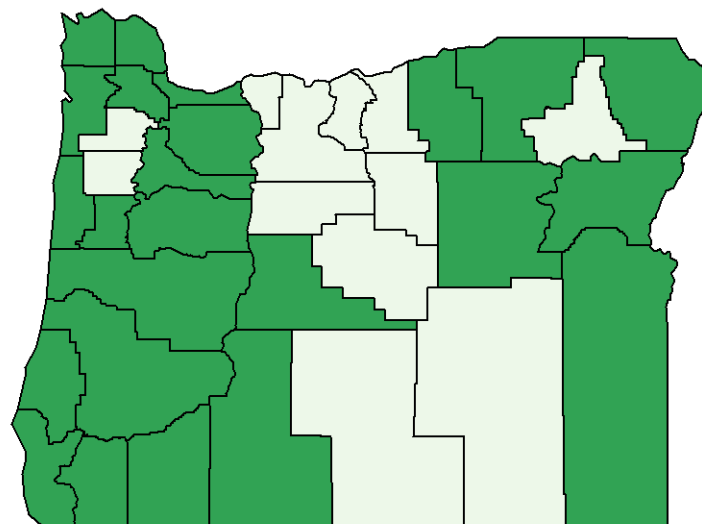

Peer Recovery Initiated in Medical Establishments + HCV/HIV Testing and Linkage to Care (PRIME+)

[The PRIME+ Program](#) merged and adapted two peer-based models: The Oregon HOPE study (see [page 19](#)) and the Peer Recovery Initiated in Medical Establishments (PRIME) program originally funded by House Bill 4143 in 2018. PRIME+ was initially piloted in three counties with funds from the CDC. The program has been expanded to 24 of 36 Oregon counties and is now funded by the State Opioid Response (SOR) grant from the SAMHSA.

The PRIME+ Program connects Peer Support Specialists with people who are at risk of or receiving treatment for overdose, infection, or other health issues related to substance use. PRIME+ peers engage people who may be out of treatment and who are at varying stages of change using a harm reduction approach. PRIME+ peers provide linkage to SUD treatment, recovery support, and physical healthcare; support for infectious disease testing and treatment (particularly hepatitis C); access to community resources to meet basic needs; access to harm reduction supplies; and emotional and crisis support. Program sites share and learn from one another, attend state-wide trainings and learning collaborative sessions, and engage with a wide range of community service providers.



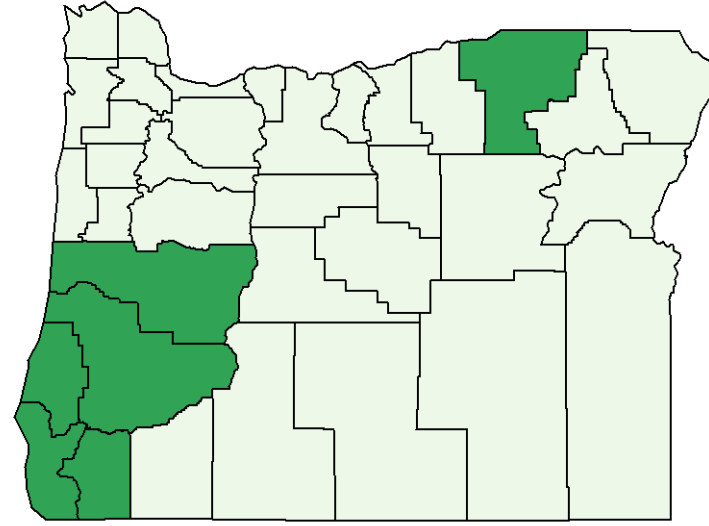

The Oregon HIV/HCV and Opioid Prevention and Engagement (OR-HOPE)

The OR-HOPE study is part of the National Rural Opioids Initiative to address OUD, HCV, and HIV (funded by National Institute on Drug Abuse starting in 2017). The study conducted community assessments and developed a peer-based intervention in rural Oregon that includes longitudinal participant surveys and qualitative interviews to understand rural drug use and the impact of the peer intervention. Peers engage people who use drugs through community and syringe service program settings and provide hepatitis C/HIV testing, harm reduction tools, and linkage to substance use disorder and hepatitis C treatment. OR-HOPE includes a randomized controlled trial of peer-facilitated telemedicine hepatitis C treatment that includes local peer specialists connecting people to access telemedicine treatment with Oregon Health and Science University (OHSU), supporting treatment adherence, and addressing barriers. OHA collaborates with OHSU, Comagine Health, HIV Alliance, Bay Area First Step, and Oregon Washington Health Network.

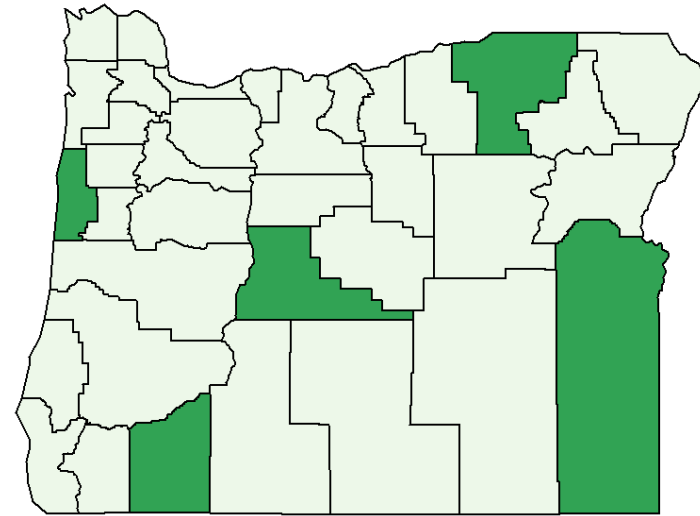

Nurture Oregon

[Nurture Oregon](#) is an integrated care model providing pregnant people who use substances with peer recovery support services, prenatal and postpartum care, substance use and mental health treatment, and service coordination. The original model (Project Nurture) was piloted in three sites in Portland, Oregon beginning in 2015 and was associated with increased prenatal visits, reduced placement of children in foster care, and cost savings. Oregon Health Authority Health Systems Division (OHA HSD) Behavioral Health unit is building on lessons learned from the pilot to expand and adapt this program for sustainable implementation in rural and frontier communities. The expansion project, Nurture Oregon, includes five rural and frontier counties. Enhanced elements have been incorporated such as regular cross-site training and coordination, trauma-informed mental health counseling, case management, and the opportunity for recovery peers to receive certification to provide doula services. Nurture Oregon includes a collaboration with Oregon Department of Health Services (ODHS) Child Welfare in developing training and materials for Child Welfare workers to facilitate coordination related to Comprehensive Addiction Recovery Act Plans of Care. The expansion project is being formally evaluated by OHSU. OHA is collaborating with Comagine Health to support sites in creating integrated sustainable models to best fit available resources in rural/frontier communities.

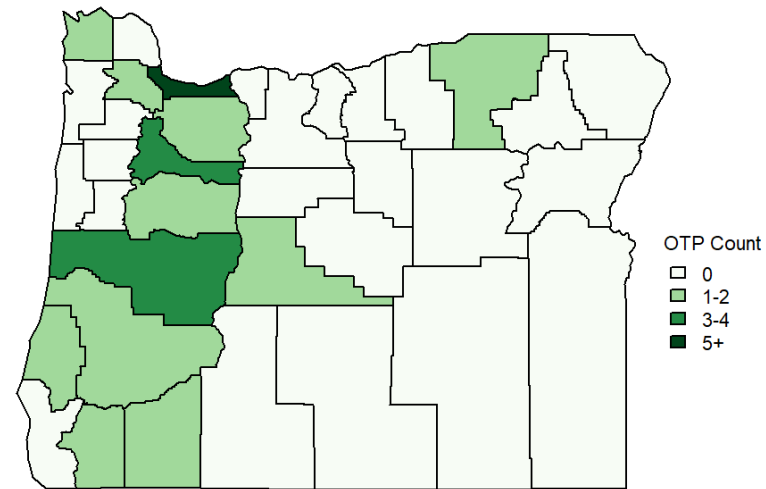

OTPs provide MOUD for people diagnosed with an OUD. MOUD patients also must receive counseling, which can include different forms of behavioral therapy. [SAMHSA's Division of Pharmacologic Therapies \(DPT\)](#), part of the SAMHSA Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT), oversees the certification of OTPs. OTPs must be certified by SAMHSA and accredited by an independent, SAMHSA-approved accrediting body to dispense opioid treatment medications. All OTPs also must be licensed by the state in which they operate and must register with the DEA.



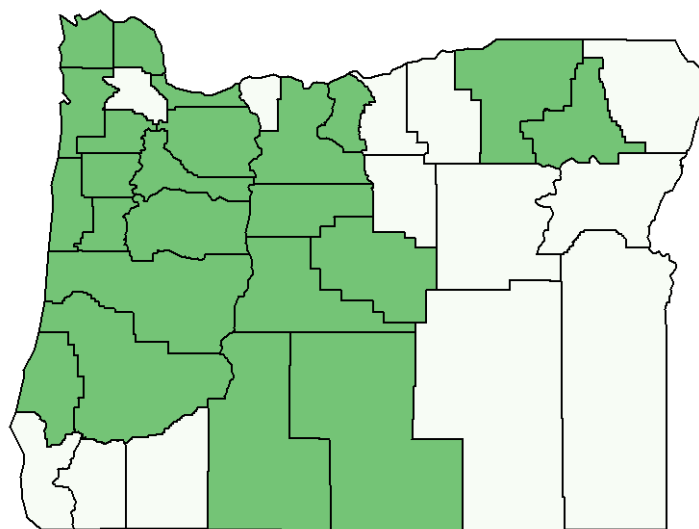

As part of Oregon's OD2A funding from the CDC and SAMHSA's SOR funding, OHA Injury and Violence Prevention Program (IVPP) funded LPHAs in 11 regions to support local overdose prevention efforts. Eleven regional partnerships, covering 23 of 36 counties, are awarded \$1.4 million, each funding year, to improve local systems for preventing and responding to opioid and other drug overdoses. The grant funding for this current work began on October 1, 2020 and continues through August 31, 2023.
