The Oregon Health Authority, Public Health Division, EMS & Trauma Systems (EMS & TS) program has permanently amended Exhibit 2 (National Guideline for the Field Triage of Injured Patients) in Oregon Administrative Rules chapter 333, division 200 to align with the revised, 2021 National Guideline for Field Triage of Injured Patients and the 2022 Resources for Optimal Care of the Injured Patient.

Two Triage Categories

- 1. Red Criteria: High Risk for Serious Injury
- 2. Yellow Criteria: Moderate Risk for Serious Injury

How to Use Guidelines

The items in each category are sorted from top to bottom and from left to right according to risk.

Mental Status & Vital Signs

When using these guidelines, abnormal Mental Status & Vital Signs findings must be based on the suspicion of trauma being the mechanism of injury.

What's New in Red Criteria/High Risk for Serious Injury

- Active bleeding requiring a tourniquet or wound packing with continuous pressure
- Suspected fracture of two or more proximal long bones includes reference to humerus or femur
- Mental Status & Vital Signs:
 - o Broken into 4 categories: all patients, age 0-9 years, age 10-64 years, and age 65 and older
 - o For all patients: a motor Glasgow Coma Score of less than 6, respiratory distress or need for respiratory support, and room-air pulse oximetry of less than 90%
 - o For patients age 0-9 years: systolic blood pressure less than 70 plus 2 times age in years
 - o For patients age 10-64 years and patients 65 years and older: heart rate greater than systolic blood pressure

What's New in Yellow Criteria/Moderate Risk for Serious Injury

- High-Risk Auto Crash:
 - Need for extrication for entrapped patient
 - o Child (Age 0-9) unrestrained or in unsecured child safety seat
- Rider separated from transport vehicle with significant impact (e.g., motorcycle, ATV, horse, etc.)
- Falls from height greater than 10 feet (all ages)
- Suspicion of child abuse
- Special, high-resource healthcare needs

Patient Transport

- Red Criteria: Patients meeting any one of the above RED criteria should be transported to the highest-level trauma center available within the geographic constraints of the regional trauma system.
- Patients meeting any one of the YELLOW CRITERIA WHO DO NOT MEET RED CRITERIA should be preferentially transported to a trauma center, as available within the geographic constraints of the regional trauma system (need not be the highest-level trauma center).
