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## **Surgical Technology Certification Options**

ORS 676.870 through 676.890 describe the regulations pertaining to the practice of surgical technology and education requirements in ambulatory surgery centers and hospitals. Recent amendments were made to ORS 676.875 and can be found under 2022 Oregon Laws, Section 65 and in HB 3596 (2023). These regulations, along with Oregon Administrative Rules (OARs) 333-076-0137 [Ambulatory Surgery Centers (ASCs)] and 333-520-0050 (Hospitals), provide for the following:

## **Education Requirement:**

Persons are <u>not eligible</u> to practice surgical technology in a hospital or ambulatory surgery center unless they have the education and certification that matches one of the training paths described below.

**NOTES:** Under the law (<u>ORS 676.880</u>), the education requirements specified do not apply to a licensed health care practitioner if the duties of a surgical technologist are within the licensed practitioners scope of practice, and a hospital or ASC allows the practitioner to perform the duties.
