# Program Element #66: Communicable Disease Response

# **OHA Program Responsible for Program Element:**

Public Health Division/Office of the State Public Health Director

1. **Description.** Funds provided under this Agreement for this Program Element may only be used in accordance with, and subject to, the requirements and limitations set forth below, to operate a Communicable Disease prevention and control program in Grantee's service area that includes any of the following components: (a) epidemiological investigations that report, monitor and control Communicable Disease, (b) diagnostic and consultative Communicable Disease services, (c) early detection, education, and prevention activities to reduce the morbidity and mortality of reportable Communicable Diseases, (d) appropriate immunizations for human and animal target populations to control and reduce the incidence of Communicable Diseases, and (e) collection and analysis of Communicable Disease and other health hazard data for program planning and management.

Communicable Diseases affect the health of individuals and communities throughout Oregon. Inequities exist for populations that are at greatest risk, while emerging Communicable Diseases pose new threats to everyone. The vision of the foundational Communicable Disease Control program is to ensure that everyone in Oregon is protected from Communicable Disease threats through Communicable Disease and Outbreak reporting, investigation, and application of public health control measures such as isolation, post-exposure prophylaxis, education, or other measures as warranted by investigative findings. The work in this Program Element is also in furtherance of the Oregon Health Authority's strategic goal of eliminating health inequities by 2030.

This Program Element, and all changes to this Program Element are effective the first day of the month noted in the Issue Date section of Exhibit C of the Financial Assistance Award, unless otherwise noted in the Comments and Footnotes of Exhibit C of the Financial Assistance Award.

#### 2. Definitions Specific to Communicable Disease Response

- **a. Case:** A person who has been diagnosed by a health care provider, as defined in OAR 333-017-0000, as having a particular disease, infection, or condition as described in OAR 333-018-0015 and OAR 333-018-0016 or whose illness meets defining criteria published in the OHA's Investigative Guidelines.
- **b. Case Investigation:** The process of identifying and interviewing confirmed or presumptive Cases to identify Close Contacts who may have also been exposed to disease.
- **c. Case Management:** Communication, information sharing, and collaboration staff serving a client within and between agencies in the community.
- **d. Close Contact:** Please see <u>Investigative Guidelines</u> for definition for a particular disease.
- e. Communicable Disease: A disease or condition, the infectious agent of which may be transmitted to and cause illness in a human being.
- f. Contact: A person identified as having Close Contact with a confirmed or presumptive Case.
- **g. Contact Tracing:** The process of connecting daily with people who have been in Close Contact to Cases to determine if these Contacts develop symptoms consistent with a Communicable Disease.
- **h. Isolation:** Separation of an ill person from other people in order to prevent further spread of illness.
- i. **Outbreak:** A significant or notable increase in the number of Cases of a disease or other condition of public health importance (ORS 431A.005).
- **j. Quarantine:** Separation of people without apparent illness because they were exposed to an infectious person.

- **k. Reportable Disease:** Any of the diseases or conditions specified in OAR 333-018-0015 and OAR 333-018-0016.
- 3. Alignment with Modernization Foundational Programs and Foundational Capabilities. - 4. **Procedural and Operational Requirements.** By accepting and using the Financial Assistance awarded under this Agreement and for this Program Element, Grantee agrees to conduct activities in accordance with the indicated procedural and operational requirements:
  - **a.** Grantee must use all reasonable means to investigate in a timely manner all reports of Reportable Diseases, infections, or conditions. To identify possible sources of infection and to carry out appropriate control measures, the Grantee Director or his/her designee must investigate each report following procedures outlined in OHA's <u>Investigative Guidelines</u> or other procedures approved by OHA. **b.** As part of its Communicable Disease control program, Grantee must, within its service area, investigate the Outbreaks of Communicable Diseases, institute appropriate Communicable Disease control and prevention education measures, and submit required information regarding the Outbreak to OHA in Orpheus (in Opera for COVID-19 Cases and ARIAS for COVID-19 Contacts) as prescribed in OHA CD Investigative Guidelines available at:

For a Grantee not conducting disease investigation, to the extent possible, Grantee must work with the relevant Tribe(s) and/or Local Public Health Authority or Authorities in their service area to coordinate disease investigation activities.

c. COVID-19 Communicable Disease Response: Grantee must conduct activities related to public health COVID-19 response in accordance with procedural and operational requirements in this Program Element.

Grantee must conduct COVID-19 outreach and education in a manner that fulfills the needs and priorities of Grantee clients and community served. Grantee must maintain ongoing coordination with the local public health authority and other organizations as needed to ensure the needs of Grantee clients and community served are met.

**d. COVID-19 Response Activities.** In partnership with OHA, the Northwest Portland Indian Health Board (NPAIHB), and the local public health authority, Grantee must ensure that Grantee clients and community served have access to COVID-19 testing, outreach and education, and isolation supports, as applicable and resources are available.

### (1) Testing

Provide access to testing through a Grantee clinic <u>or</u> by maintaining ongoing coordination with the local public health authority, and other healthcare partners to ensure access for Grantee clients and community served.

### (2) Case Investigation

Ensure access to Case Investigation; Case Investigation must be led by the LPHA.

### (3) Isolation, Social Services and Wraparound Supports

- (a) Grantee must facilitate efforts, as able and appropriate, to link individuals needing isolation supports such as housing and food. Grantee will use existing resources when possible such as covered Case management benefits, WIC benefits, etc.
- (b) Grantee must ensure social services referral and tracking processes are developed and maintained for all Grantee clients and community served for whom the Grantee is providing wraparound services.

(c) Grantee may work with OHA-funded community-based organizations and the local public health authority to assure social services and wraparound supports. To the extent Grantee has sufficient resources, Grantee must make available direct services as needed for Grantee's clients and community served.

### (4) COVID-19 Vaccine Planning and Distribution

- (a) Facilitate efforts to assure appropriate access to COVID-19 vaccine for all Grantee clients and community served.
- (b) Grantee will identify, assess and address gaps in the vaccine delivery system to Grantee clients and community served.
- (c) If applicable, Grantee must submit vaccine orders, vaccine administration data and VAERS (Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System) information in accordance with federal and OHA guidance.
- (d) Grantee may work collaboratively with federal, state, regional, local and other tribal partners to support COVID-19 vaccine planning, distribution and administration work.
- **5. General Revenue and Expense Reporting.** Grantee must complete an "Oregon Health Authority Public Health Division Expenditure and Revenue Report" located in Exhibit C of the Agreement. These reports must be submitted to OHA each quarter on the following schedule:

Fiscal Quarter	Due Date
First: July 1 – September 30	October 30
Second: October 1 – December 31	January 30
Third: January 1 – March 31	April 30
Fourth: April 1 – June 30	August 20

All funds received under a PE or PE-sub-element must be included in the quarterly Revenue and Expense reports.
