Access to Recovery (ATR)

Oregon Access to Recovery program increases access to substance abuse services and creates a recovery-oriented system of care.

What is Access to Recovery

Access to Recovery (ATR) puts an emphasis on personal choice for substance abuse treatment and recovery support services. Services include clinical, community-based and faith-based care. Access to Recovery is funded by a \$7 million, three-year federal grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Administration (SAMHSA), Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT). The funding is available to people with a substance use problem. The funding follows the person through an electronic voucher management system.

People served

ATR Recovery Support Services (RSSs) are available to residents in Multnomah, Clackamas, Washington, Lane and Marion counties. Individuals participating in the program must be 18 years of age or older and in the first six months of their recovery or community re-entry from an institutional or residential setting.

ATR prioritizes RSSs to special populations including:

- returning veterans and active duty military
- parents involved with child welfare
- transitional age youth (18-25); and
- individuals re-entering the community from institutions like prison and residential treatment programs

Benefit to clients and community

Oregon ATR will have served more than 3,723 people by the end of the three-year grant cycle. The program helps people in the community get access to services so they can be successful in their recovery efforts. People can choose services which they feel best help them. Some examples of services include:

- Peer-to-Peer Services
- Marital and Family Counseling
- Pastoral/Spiritual Support
- Transportation
- Recovery Housing
- Acupuncture
- Parent Education/Child Development

System Impact

Access to Recovery provides additional wraparound and recovery support services for people in recovery. For coordinated care organizations in a participating county, people must be referred to the ATR Recovery Management Center (RMC). The RMC will complete an intake/screening and work with the person to create a Recovery Support Services Plan. The RMC will provide case coordination/case management, and will provide the client with a menu of services that the person qualifies for with an emphasis on individual choice.
