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<p>Prescription Drug Abuse in Adolescence Robert Nystrom, Public Health Division</p>	<p><u>Handout #2</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • “Hard” data is inconsistent • Oregon data shows little trending • No quantitative data available from schools or school-based health centers • Anecdotal reports being heard • Often gathered through surveys • SAMHSA survey: 12-month prescription drug abuse among 13-17 year olds – shows decrease from 2002 to 2007. However, this data is 2-years old; use has gone up • Very little difference between males and females • Oregon is slightly higher in use of pain relievers among those 12-17 years old compared to 2006-07 National data; has decreased since 2003-04 • Concern regarding prescribing practices • Currently conducting 3 question survey of 214 School-based Health Clinics (SBHCs) <p>Stephanie requested that Karen Wheeler, Bob Nystrom and Bill Bouska collaborate to implement the prescription drug monitoring bill (SB-355) as it relates to medications prescribed to children in foster-care.</p>			
<p>DUII System Review Karen Wheeler, Addictions and Mental Health (AMH)</p>	<p><u>Handout #3a & 3b</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • DUII offenders represent the largest proportion of referrals in the addiction treatment system • Approximately 25,000 DUII clients enroll in treatment annually • The system was originally organized in the early 1980s after a number of DUII laws were passed • At the request of the Council, AMH convened a workgroup and drafted a report with recommendations for several system changes • The scope of these recommendations are limited to those under the statutory authority and control of AMH • Several strengths in the current system 			

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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Offenders receive a diagnostic assessment - Level of service and length of time in treatment based on assessment and progress rather than arbitrary assignment - Coordination and monitoring function provided by Alcohol & Drug Evaluation Specialists (ADES) • Treatment Services Recommendations <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Eliminate “Information Only” program option - Lengthen the time DUII offenders are monitored by treatment program <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Differentiate length of time for first offenders vs. multiple or repeat offenders ▪ Develop a two-tiered system of treatment to expand monitoring and treatment outcomes; increase frequency of urinalysis (UAs) <p>Council member suggests including “monitored” UAs to Integrated Services and Supports Rule (ISSR). Per Karen: “already in draft language”</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • ADES Recommendations <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Core training series for ADES applicants - Annual, ongoing training to maintain certification - Change screening and referral form and process to include: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Mental health issues ▪ Breath test refusals ▪ Multiple DUIIs ▪ Conviction vs. Diversion ▪ Require status reports from treatment provider to ADES every 30 days at minimum ▪ Develop protocol and require written justification for clients wanting to transfer from one treatment program to another • Next Steps <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Continue to pursue additional funding for indigent DUII treatment for those unable to pay the full cost of services
