Public Health Advisory Board: Accountability Metrics

This subcommittee last met September 22nd to continue identifying potential accountability metrics for state and local public health. The subcommittee reviewed their work plan and deliverables, and discussed Oregon's State Health Improvement Plan (SHIP) measures related to communicable disease control.

Behavioral Health Collaborative

The Behavioral Health Collaborative met on September 29th and October 12th – both meetings were spent in workgroups, focused on developing a set of recommendations in six areas: payment reform / finance, data, workforce, outcomes, waste, and scope of responsibility.

Workgroups will continue developing their recommendations at the next meeting on October 27th.

Comprehensive Primary Care Plus (CPC+)

In August 2016, Oregon was selected as one of 14 regions across the country to participate in the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services Comprehensive Primary Care Plus (CPC+). CPC+ is a 5-year initiative that provides a multi-payer model that pays for care differently, which results in improved quality of care, improved patients' health, and smarter use of health care dollars. Activities consist of: innovative payment; greater flexibility to deliver comprehensive care; technical assistance providing proactive, coordinated, population-based care; and, regional and national learning, collaborative, and networking opportunities. Specific participating primary care practices within Oregon will be identified in Nov 2016.

The SB 231 mandated Primary Care Payment Reform Collaborative has met for the seven times since April to:

- Identify best practices that support primary care through technical assistance, methods of reimbursement and evaluation
- Work together to seek alignment and agreement around next steps to support sustainable primary care transformation and achieve the Triple Aim
- Provide support and opportunity for the group as a whole or subgroups to identify and work on shared interests and activities to support primary care transformation

The Collaborative has discussed recommendations that will be presented to the Oregon Health Policy Board at its December meeting related to a governance model, payment model, technical assistance, measurement, data aggregation and behavioral health integration. Metrics & Scoring Committee

The CCO Metrics & Scoring Committee met September 16th to finalize measure selection for the 2017 challenge pool, and to begin considering potential topics for measures in 2018 and beyond, including introductions to kindergarten readiness and medication therapy management / comprehensive medication review measures. The Committee also revisited the intent and context for the effective contraceptive use measure.

Opioid Initiative

There are several strategies which span the state for opioid reduction and safe prescribing. Significant projects undertaken are: statewide prescribing guidelines, chronic use opioid reduction strategies with the CCO statewide performance improvement project, naloxone availability, increase in medication assisted treatment, coverage of alternative therapies and prescribing limitation policies.

Particularly, the statewide prescribing guidelines taskforce adopted in June 2016 the CDC Opioid Prescribing Guidelines as a basis for opioid prescribing in Oregon. Specific Oregon topics are being incorporated with anticipated completion by December 2016. Alternative therapies and opioid prescribing limitations for back pain are also being implemented as a result of the Health Evidence Review Commission (HERC) Back Coverage Guidance Note 60; which became effective July 2016. Additionally, legislation to increase naloxone has been implemented, effective September 2016, to allow pharmacists to prescribe and distribute naloxone.
