Oregon Liquor Control Commission
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OLCC Commissioners approve liquor licenses, appoint a new Liquor Store Agent, new Liquor Store location, issue 11 sanctions and approve new liquor rules

PORTLAND, Ore. – At their monthly meeting April 21 the commissioners of the Oregon Liquor Control Commission approved the following liquor licenses:

Curly's Café, 305 Junction Road, Glendale; Licensee is Darrell Luttrell

Faith Hope and Charity Vineyard, 70455 NW Lower Bridge Way, Terrebonne; Licensee is Faith Hope and Charity, LLC; Roger Grossmann and Cynthia Grossmann, members.

Picomart, 810 SW Washington St., Portland; Licensee is Vasilios P. Flevaris. License was granted with three restrictions.

The commissioners of the OLCC appointed the following liquor store operator:

The commissioners of the OLCC approved the following liquor store location:

Running Y Ranch Resort, Klamath Falls

Retail liquor agents are independent contractors; they are not state employees. The Retail Services Division of the OLCC works closely with liquor agents to help them understand and follow liquor regulations and store operating procedures.

The Commissioners ratified the following sanctions based on stipulated settlements:

La Fogata Mexican Restaurant, 3905 SW 117th #H, Beaverton; will pay a fine of \$3,135 or serve a 19-day liquor license suspension for permitting five minors to be on the licensed premises or in an area of the licensed premises that is prohibited to minors. Licensee is La Fogata Mexican Restaurant, Inc.; Annie Zavaleta and Rafael Zavaleta, corporate principals.

On the Roc's Co Sports Lounge, 3838 River Road N, Keizer has surrendered the liquor license and will receive a Letter of Reprimand for permitting disorderly activity on the licensed premises when an employee and three adult males engaged in a physical altercation with a patron. The Letter of Reprimand will become a permanent part of the licensee's file. Licensee is On the Roc's Co; Lienna Bui, corporate principal.

Marrakesh Moroccan Restaurant, 1201 NW 21st, Portland; will pay a fine of \$7,920 or serve a 48-day liquor license suspension for two violations. The first violation is for failing to verify the age of a minor before allowing him to buy or be served alcoholic beverages when he reasonably appeared to be under 26 years old. The second violation is for permitting the corporate principal to mix, sell, or serve alcoholic beverages, or supervise those who do, without a valid service permit. Licensee is Marrakesh Moroccan Restaurant of Portland, Inc.; Mohamed Ibrahim, corporate principal.

TNT Hollywood Tavern, 4310 Silverton Road NE, Salem; has paid a fine of \$6,105 for three violations. The first violation is for knowingly selling, giving, or otherwise making alcoholic liquor available to four visibly intoxicated persons. The second violation is for permitting an employee to mix, sell, or serve alcoholic beverages, or supervise those who do, without a valid service permit. The third violation is for permitting three minors to be on the licensed premises or in an area of the licensed premises prohibited to minors. Licensee is TNT Hollywood Tavern, LLC; Terry Sellers, member.

For an employee(s) failing to verify the age of a minor before allowing him/her to buy or be served an alcoholic beverage when he/she reasonably appeared to be under 26:

Towne Pump & Pantry, 612 N Madras Hwy, Prineville; will install age verification equipment in lieu of a 10-day liquor license suspension. The licensee will use the equipment to verify the age of every patron purchasing alcohol who reasonably appears to be under 26 years old. Licensee will be removed from the Responsible Vendor Program. Licensee is MHTS, LLC; Haseeb Shojai, Masoud Aria, Storai Aria and Tamana Shojai, members.

Minute Market #6, 1690 Siskiyou Blvd., Ashland; will pay a fine of \$3,795 or serve a 23-day liquor license suspension. Licensee will be removed from the Responsible Vendor Program. Licensee is K & H Enterprises, Inc.; Thomas P. Kirkpatrick, corporate principal.

Dakota Street Pizza Co, 105 Dakota Street, Sutherlin; will pay a fine of \$1,485 or serve a nine-day liquor license suspension. Licensee is Dakota Street Pizza Co, LLC; Gordon Atterbury, Allison Atterbury and Rick Atterbury, members.

Round Table Pizza of Bend, 1552 NE 3rd Street, Bend; will pay a fine of \$1,485 or serve a nine-day liquor license suspension. Licensee is RTO, Inc.; David Howland and Lori Howland, corporate principals.

Gino's Pizza Inn, 1324 Virginia, North Bend; will pay a fine of \$1,485 or serve a nine-day liquor license suspension. Licensees are Kelli Watson and Kent Jones.

For permitting an employee(s) to mix, sell, or serve alcohol or supervise those who do without a service permit:

Pop's Branding Iron Restaurant & Lounge, 901 Pacific Blvd. SE, Albany; will pay a fine of \$1,815 or serve an 11-day liquor license suspension. Licensee is Heuvel-Finley & Associates, Inc.; Dolores Heuvel, Julia Goode, Deborah McTimmonds and Susan Holman, corporate principals.

Darcelle XV, 208 NW 3rd Ave., Portland; will pay a fine of \$1,485 or serve a nine-day liquor license suspension. Licensee is Darcelle XV, LLC; Walter W. Cole, member.

The OLCC commissioners voted to adopt the following rule amendments:

Financial Assistance Package (OAR 845- Division 13) The two rule changes were initiated based on a petition by the Oregon Beer and Wine Distributors Association in order to increase the value of display bins/racks and the size of exterior signs that can be given by suppliers.

Hours of Sale (OAR-006-0425) This rule change was initiated by a petition from David Shurtleff, Coyote Ranch Pub at the Redmond Municipal Airport. The amendments will expand the authorized hours of sale to 5:00 a.m. – 2:30 a.m. for licensees located at not only Redmond Municipal Airport, but also all Oregon public use airports designated as Category I – Commercial Service Airport by the Oregon Department of Aviation.

The five citizen commissioners are the policy-making body of the OLCC. They meet monthly for one or two days to make decisions on liquor licenses, rules, contested case hearings and appointments of liquor store agents. Commission meetings are held every other month at OLCC's main office, 9079 SE McLoughlin Blvd., Room 103A in Portland. Subsequent months, the meetings are held via phone.
