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

### NATIONAL REGISTER OF HISTORIC PLACES:

The National Register of Historic Places is the official list of the nation's cultural resources worthy of preservation. It is maintained by the National Park Service under authority of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966. The list contains districts, sites, archeological sites, buildings, structures and objects of national, state or local significance. National Historic Landmarks are automatically included. A cumulative listing of all National Register properties is published annually in the February issue of the Federal Register, the regular Congressional publication. Under certain circumstances, National Register properties are eligible for federal preservation assistance.

#### DEFINITIONS OF PRESERVATION TERMS AS USED BY THE NATIONAL PARK SERVICE:

Preservation is the process of sustaining the form and extent of a structure essentially as it now exists. Preservation aims at halting further deterioration and providing structural stability but does not contemplate significant rebuilding.

Restoration is the process of accurately recovering the form and details of a property as it appeared at a particular period of time by means of removal of later work and the replacement of missing original work.

Reconstruction is the process of reproducing by new construction the exact form and detail of a vanished structure, or part of it, as it appeared at a specific period of time. Reconstruction should be undertaken only when the property to be reconstructed is essential for understanding and interpreting the value of a historical district and sufficient historical documentation exists to insure an exact reproduction of the original.

Rehabilitation is the process of returning a property to a state of utility, through repair or alteration, which makes possible an efficient contemporary use. In rehabilitation, those portions of the property which are important in illustrating historic and cultural values are preserved or restored.

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National Parks - Outstanding, relatively spacious land and water areas under Federal ownership. They usually contain a diversity of scenic, scientific and other values and support a broad range of visitor-use programs.

National Monuments - Outstanding land and water areas, usually under federal ownership. They generally contain lesser acreage than National Parks and support a narrower range of visitor-use programs. Their purpose is to preserve resources of special scientific significance.

National Historic Sites - Properties of outstanding historical value to the nation as a whole. They may be under federal, state or local ownership. In the latter cases, the National Park Service acts in an advisory capacity.

National Memorials - Properties commemorating historic events and/or personages of exceptional significance to the nation. Usually they are under National Park Service jurisdiction, but ownership may be mixed.

National Historic Landmarks - Outstanding examples of the nation's historical and/or cultural patrimony. They are evaluated and recommended for designation by the Advisory Board on National Parks, Historic Sites, Buildings, and Monuments. Federal ownership is not implied. Ownership may be public or private, but owner must agree to maintain property in accord with accepted preservation precepts if he accepts designation. Landmark status offers higher priority in the distribution of grants-in-aid under the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 and is acknowledged by a bronze plaque and a certificate from the Secretary of the Interior.

National Survey of Historic Sites and Buildings - Conducted by the National Park Service under authority of the Historic Sites Act of 1935 for purposes of identifying historic and prehistoric places of national significance. The Survey forms the basis of National Historic Landmark designations.

HABS - Historic American Buildings Survey - Initiated by the National Park Service in 1933 for purposes of assembling a national collection of detailed records of historically and architecturally significant buildings. Conducted in cooperation with the American Institute of Architects and the Library of Congress.

HAER - Historic American Engineering Record - Established by the National Park Service in 1969 for purposes of documenting historic engineering, industrial and technological works. Conducted in cooperation with the American Society of Civil Engineers and the Library of Congress.

## Cultural Resources In Oregon


To date, some 70% of the State of Oregon has been surveyed by historians to identify historic sites and buildings important to Oregon's past. At the same time, only some three percent of the state has been surveyed by archeologists. The results of these cultural resource surveys indicate that Oregon contains some 2,500 historic sites worthy of placement on the Statewide Inventory and perhaps some 120,000 archeological sites, for a density of about 1.3 cultural sites per square mile.

The large difference between numbers of historic and archeologic sites is merely a reflection of the fact that Indians have lived here for some 20,000 years while Euro-Americans have been in Oregon only about 173 years. The large gap between seventy percent and three percent in completeness of surveys is due to several factors: 1) archeological sites are "buried" to a greater degree and therefore more difficult to locate 2) historians have written records to utilize, often telling them where to look 3) the Indian societies were pre-literate and most of their oral traditions telling of old village site locations were never recorded by early settlers.

Since the year of 1906 the federal government has passed several laws and executive orders in order to try and preserve the cultural remains of both Indian and early Euro-American history. The government realized that the native cultures had been largely destroyed and their cultural remains were likewise disappearing under the shovel of "pot-hunters", the construction of towns, and the activities of road builders, loggers, miners and others.

Each archeologic site is like a book of which only one copy exists. Properly excavated and analyzed, a site can tell who lived there, when they lived there, how large the group was, what the people ate, the climate at the time, the type of social organization the group practiced, average life spans, religious practices and even some of the diseases they suffered from. If this site is destroyed, either through the purposeful digging of relic hunters or through the accidental activities of house, road, sewer line, water line, or other developers, then the book, which is public property has been burned.


Lewis Hayes was born March 1, 1829, in Cuyahoga County, Ohio, a son of Orlando and Nancy (Hull) Hayes. At age 16 Lewis Hayes moved to Iowa and in 1852 came overland to Oregon. In 1853 he married Charlotte Abbott. The Hayeses first lived on the Long Tom River west of Eugene but in 1865 came to the Applegate River. For some fifteen years Hayes worked hauling freight from Crescent City to Jacksonville and later became involved in stock raising. The Hayes family consisted of nine children.

The bridge has a gable roof covered with corrugated sheet metal and an exterior of vertical boards and battens. The bridge has six portals for lighting on its east and west elevations. The exterior flares at the base at the north and south ends of the bridge.

This bridge, constructed in 1920, is the last, remaining covered bridge on the Pacific Highway--the main road between Oregon and California in the early twentieth century. It is also the last such bridge in Josephine County. Nearby stands the Grave Creek Covered Bridge landmark (see file sheet).



The Grave Creek Covered Bridge Historical Landmark is a wood plaque mounted on two wood posts. It stands on the south side of Grave Creek on old Highway 99 in Sunny Valley, Oregon. The sign reads:

"Historical Landmark. One of Oregon's few remaining covered bridges, rebuilt 1925. North of the bridge, covered by the present roadway, is the grave of 14 year old Martha Leland Crowley, a member of the first wagon train to enter Oregon by the Applegate Trail in 1846. This tragic incident gave the Creek its name. Five Indians, killed here in 1853, were buried in the same grave. Northwest of the bridge are the unmarked graves of soldiers killed in the 1855 Indian war Battle of Hungry Hill. Fort Leland, south of these graves, is marked only by the well which served this stockade. Northeast of the bridge is the Harkness and Twogood stage house built in 1857. The 1880 guest register included the names of President Rutherford B. Hayes and General Wm. T. Sherman. Josephine County Historical Society."

Jones rode this circuit for over fifty years and preached over 1,000 sermons.





The Lantern Cafe, formerly an Atlantic Richfield Service Station, is a two story, wood frame building with a hip roof. This building has one story wings on its north and south elevations. The exterior is covered with stucco. The building has oversized quoins on its corners. The front (east) elevation has been altered by the addition of a restaurant area where once the gasoline pumps were located. The building's wings have wide, clapboard siding. The north wing has a fireplace chimney. The roof on the wings has a slight bellcasting.

This station was one of a chain of "200 mile" stations erected along the Pacific Coast in the late 1920's by the Atlantic Richfield Company. At least two other of these stations survive. One is located on River Road north of Eugene, Oregon. Another, yet a service station, stands at the south end of Mount Shasta, California. The company placed these stations at location where it was assumed motorists would again be ready to purchase a full tank of gasoline. The buildings all had the same distinctive architecture. For service stations, these structures were some of the most architecturally ambitious that appeared in the Pacific Northwest.



The Dixon Building, known for the past 75 years as the Herbert Smith Building, is a two story, rectangular brick structure which stands on the south side of G street near the railyards in Grants Pass, Oregon. The building has three bays of one-over-one, double hung sash windows with transom panes on the second floor of the north (front) elevation. The center bay has a pair of windows. The roof level has a brick facade and the faded painted sign "Dixon" appears above the main entry. The entry yet has the original double doors flanked by display windows.

This building was erected about 1890 by a man named Dixon. Herbert Smith, born in England, purchased this building in the later 1890's and first ran a Racquet Store (or variety shop) in the building. For the next sixty some years this building housed Smith's Variety Store. Presently the building houses the Rogue Valley Craftsmen, a retail outlet for art and handi-craft of people living in Josephine County. An interior view of this store about 1899 appears in 110 Years of Josephine. The original glass display cases have been given to the county museum in Kerbyville.



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

This house, perhaps the Thomas Frederick Croxton house, stands in the northwest part of Grants Pass, Oregon. The two story, wood frame structure has a gable roof which has recently been re-roofed with split shakes. The exterior of the house is shiplap. The windows are one-over-one, double hung sash on the second story; some alteration has been made in the fenestration on the first floor. The building stands on a brick foundation. The porch on the east (front) elevation has a balcony above and another porch is located on the south elevation. A one and one-half story wing is located on the west (rear) elevation.

The present owner, James Allen Smithson, states that this house was built by one of three men: Thomas Frederick Croxton, or men named Dimmick or Conklin. This house is situated in the Lincoln Park Addition which was laid out in 1890. Croxton was born May 23, 1850, in Springfield, Illinois. At the age of seven he came to southwest Oregon and attended the Umpqua Academy at Wilbur. In 1873 he settled near Grants Pass and in 1899 moved into town where he became a building contractor. In 1904 a writer noted "he is engaged in contracting and building, and among other structure has built five houses for himself in this town." Croxton's sister, Sarah, married E. Dimmick.

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



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Shubael Edwin Robinson house is a two story, wood frame building with a gable roof. The building has an irregular shape. The exterior is clapboard siding. The gable ends on the front elevation have round attic windows; small sash windows are located in the attic on the side elevations. A porch is located at the entry on the south (front) elevation and continues part way on the west elevation. The dining room has a projecting window bay on its west elevation. The windows are mostly one-over-one, double hung sash. The window in the front door has an etched view of a deer in the glass. The gables are covered with imbricated shingling.

This house was erected by Shubael Edwin Robinson. The structure was completed in 1906 on an tract of 80 acres given to him by his father, R. M. Robinson. S. E. Robinson received the land as a gift when he married Mahala McCollum in April, 1900. Work on the house commenced in 1901. Robinson had worked in 1899 on the construction of canals for the Applegate Irrigation Company. The lumber for the house came from logs on the farm which were cut in the Jack and Tom Williams sawmill. The Robinsons raised many vegetables and prunes which they sold commercially. They had an early prune dryer in the area and had the first walnut orchard in the county. This house is owned by Edwin Robinson, a son of the builder, and his son, James L. Robinson. Edwin Robinson graduated from Oregon Agricultural (over)



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Grimmet School, also known as Sucker Creek School District No. 41 School, is a one story, log building with a gable roof which stands near the Kerby Museum in Kerby, Oregon. This building is covered with split shakes and is of peeled log construction. In building is furnished with old school desks, bell, blackboard, books, and other items donated by residents of Josephine County. A notice on the building reads:

*"Grimmet School 1898-1906 District #41 This log school house was built in 1898 on the Grimmet homestead located just west of the present U.S.F.S. Government Park on the Caves Highway. School District #41 was organized by County School Supt. Lincoln Savage who in later years was County Treasurer for 20 years. This bulding was dismantled and moved here in 1959--log by log through the efforts of Delta Kappa Gamma with the hauling done by Walt Colpitts of Cave Junction."*



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Sherer and Judson Building, erected in 1889, stands on the west side of Sixth Street near G street in Grants Pass, Oregon. This two story, rectangular, brick building faces east and has three bays on its second floor front elevation. The center bay once contained a door which opened onto a small balcony above the main entrance; it contains in 1976 a one-over-one, double hung sash window. The other bays each contain four one-over-one, double hung sash windows in large semi-elliptical openings which are filled in above with many small panes of glass (see photo). The first floor of the building has two commercial sections separated by a central stairway to the second story.

In 1890 this building was occupied by the Sherer and Judson General Merchandise Store. It was pictured that year in the lithograph "Birdseye View of Grants Pass, Oregon." The building has had few major alterations since construction and is presently the location of The Bodi Shop and a shoe store.




