

STATE ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON HISTORIC PRESERVATION (Advisory to SHPO):

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NATIONAL REGISTER OF HISTORIC PLACES:

The National Register of Historic Places is the official list of the nation's cultural resources worthy of preservation. It is maintained by the National Park Service under authority of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966. The list contains districts, sites, archeological sites, buildings, structures and objects of national, state or local significance. National Historic Landmarks are automatically included. A cumulative listing of all National Register properties is published annually in the February issue of the Federal Register, the regular Congressional publication. Under certain circumstances, National Register properties are eligible for federal preservation assistance.

National Historic Sites - Properties of outstanding historical value to the nation as a whole. They may be under federal, state or local ownership. In the latter cases, the National Park Service acts in an advisory capacity.

National Memorials - Properties commemorating historic events and/or personages of exceptional significance to the nation. Usually they are under National Park Service jurisdiction, but ownership may be mixed.

National Historic Landmarks - Outstanding examples of the nation's historical and/or cultural patrimony. They are evaluated and recommended for designation by the Advisory Board on National Parks, Historic Sites, Buildings, and Monuments. Federal ownership is not implied. Ownership may be public or private, but owner must agree to maintain property in accord with accepted preservation precepts if he accepts designation. Landmark status offers higher priority in the distribution of grants-in-aid under the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 and is acknowledged by a bronze plaque and a certificate from the Secretary of the Interior.

National Survey of Historic Sites and Buildings - Conducted by the National Park Service under authority of the Historic Sites Act of 1935 for purposes of identifying historic and prehistoric places of national significance. The Survey forms the basis of National Historic Landmark designations.

HABS - Historic American Buildings Survey - Initiated by the National Park Service in 1933 for purposes of assembling a national collection of detailed records of historically and architecturally significant buildings. Conducted in cooperation with the American Institute of Architects and the Library of Congress.

HAER - Historic American Engineering Record - Established by the National Park Service in 1969 for purposes of documenting historic engineering, industrial and technological works. Conducted in cooperation with the American Society of Civil Engineers and the Library of Congress.

Cultural Resources In Oregon

To date, some 70% of the State of Oregon has been surveyed by historians to identify historic sites and buildings important to Oregon's past. At the same time, only some three percent of the state has been surveyed by archeologists. The results of these cultural resource surveys indicate that Oregon contains some 2,500 historic sites worthy of placement on the Statewide Inventory and perhaps some 120,000 archeological sites, for a density of about 1.3 cultural sites per square mile.

The large difference between numbers of historic and archeologic sites is merely a reflection of the fact that Indians have lived here for some 20,000 years while Euro-Americans have been in Oregon only about 173 years. The large gap between seventy percent and three percent in completeness of surveys is due to several factors: 1) archeological sites are "buried" to a greater degree and therefore more difficult to locate 2) historians have written records to utilize, often telling them where to look 3) the Indian societies were pre-literate and most of their oral traditions telling of old village site locations were never recorded by early settlers.

Since the year of 1906 the federal government has passed several laws and executive orders in order to try and preserve the cultural remains of both Indian and early Euro-American history. The government realized that the native cultures had been largely destroyed and their cultural remains were likewise disappearing under the shovel of "pot-hunters", the construction of towns, and the activities of road builders, loggers, miners and others.

Each archeologic site is like a book of which only one copy exists. Properly excavated and analyzed, a site can tell who lived there, when they lived there, how large the group was, what the people ate, the climate at the time, the type of social organization the group practiced, average life spans, religious practices and even some of the diseases they suffered from. If this site is destroyed, either through the purposeful digging of relic hunters or through the accidental activities of house, road, sewer line, water line, or other developers, then the book, which is public property has been burned.



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Merrill Bank Building is a rectangular, two story stucco building which stands at the southeast corner of Front and Main streets in Merrill, Oregon. This brick building has had some alterations. The brick facade at the roof level has been removed and replaced by a wood facade. The windows are one-over-one, double hung sash set in semi-elliptical bays on the second story. The first floor elevation has a main entry with sidelights and transom panes and two large window bays. The building measures 30 x 60 feet. A new addition has been attached on the south (rear) elevation. The building has its original three brick chimneys.

This structure was built to house the Merrill Bank. In 1976 the building has Bowman's Real Estate Office, the city clerk's office, and the city police department. This structure is one of the few which survived a major fire in 1920 in the business section of Merrill. Merrill was incorporated in 1903 and re-incorporated in 1908. The town was founded by Nathan Merrill. The city streets were platted on May 22, 1894 by Nathan and Nancy Merrill.

Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Levi F. Willits Building is a two story, rectangular brick structure which faces north on Main Street. This building stands next to the I.O.O.F. Hall erected in 1910-11. The building has two sections and bears the inscription "Willits 1910" at the roof level facade. The windows on the second story of the front elevation are one-over-one, double hung sash with transom panes. These window bays have a concrete decorative band above them (see photo). The first floor elevation is presently occupied by Nyback's Flowers and Davis Floor Covering. Originally the east side of the building was adjacent to Houston's Temple Theatre which occupied the first floor of the I.O.O.F. Hall.

Judge Levi F. Willits was born in Cedar County, Iowa, on February 27, 1850. He was a son of Amos and Sarah Anna (Thornton) Willits. The Willits family settled in Ashland, Oregon, in 1875. Levi Willits graduated from business college in Iowa in 1873 and joined his parents in Ashland in 1876 where he was a school principal. In 1884 he headed the Lakeview schools and in 1891 he came to Klamath County to head the Yainax Indian Industrial and Boarding School. He later settled in Klamath Falls.



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Methodist Indian Mission Church on the Williamson River Road near Chiloquin, Oregon, is a rectangular, wood frame building with a gable roof. This structure measures approximately 30 by 40 feet. Lumber for the building was cut at the Klamath Indian Agency and was hauled with horses and wagons by the Indians to this site on a hill. The nails are made by a blacksmith. The building has four bays of four-over-four, double hung sash windows in its east and west elevations. The main entry is located in the north elevation. Above it rises a square bell tower with an enclosed belfry surmounted by a hip roof with a steep four-sided cone and a cross. The bell tower roof is covered with imbricated shingles. The exterior is shiplap. The building has one, brick chimney.

This church was dedicated in January, 1876. The church was connected to the "Amity Charge" and was served by a circuit rider for many years. Indians often filled the pulpit between appearances of the regular minister. Approximately 80% of the congregation is Indian in 1976. Jack Palmer, a white, dedicated the land or gave it for this building. In the summer of 1976 young church workers from Covina, California, painted and panelled the interior of this building. The original wainscoating was covered over with wood panels. This church is served in 1976 by Rev. Gerald McCray, Sr., who also serves the Beatty Methodist Church.



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Emma Mary Wilde landmark is a bronze plaque mounted on a brick planter at the base of a flagpole next to the Masonic Lodge at Third and Railroad streets in Malin. The plaque reads:

"In memory of Emma Mary Wilde August 13, 1913-January 29, 1964
 An outstanding citizen of Malin, Oregon."

Emma Mary Wilde was the only daughter of Alois and Marie Kalina, pioneer settlers of Malin in 1909. Her father named the city for a Bohemian settlement in Czechoslovakia. The Kalinas built the first house in Malin in 1909. In 1935 Emma married Mervyn Wilde. In 1947 Mrs. Wilde took over the clothing, drug, and stationery departments of the Kalina General Merchandise Store when the family divided the business's stock. Louis Kalina took the grocery and hardware division.

The nearby Masonic Lodge Building is used also as a church and was erected in 1923.



The Dan, Clinton, and Ben Van Brimmer Cabin is a rectangular, hewn-log building with gable roof which now stands on the lawn of the Klamath County Museum. This building has been re-sited from its location astraddle Willow Creek in Siskiyou County, California. A sign outside the building reads:

"Van Brimmer Cabin 1864-1928. Originally built as a milkhouse straddling Willow Creek, this structure was located on the Van Brimmer Ranch, west of Tulelake, California, 13 miles from the Modoc Stronghold, Lava Beds.

During the Modoc Indian war of 1872-73, the cabin was converted into a fort, with loop holes cut through the walls for defense, but it primarily served as a storehouse for the military.

In 1880 the window and fireplace were added and it served as a residence until 1928.

The cabin was moved to Gillem's Camp, Lava Beds National Monument in 1949 and relocated at the Klamath County Museum in 1974."

The Tower Theater is a 'movie palace' constructed of concrete which stands at the southeast corner of Washburn Way and south Sixth streets in Klamath Falls. The building has a long entry concourse and a set of shops for commercial use on its front elevation. The structure is dominated by a tall tower with art deco style or appearance.

The Evening Herald of April 24, 1941, noted:

"The final brush of paint, the last section of tile, and the polishing of the blue glass windows marked the completion Thursday of the new \$150,000 Tower Theatre at Washburn Way and South Sixth St. which opens its doors Friday evening, April 25 at 6:00 P.M. This is Klamath Falls' first suburban theatre. The theatre is the most recent of a string owned and operated by George M. Mann of San Francisco and is part of the Northwest Theatres Co. of which Al Fourmet is manager... The auditorium of the theatre is on a single floor and will seat 1200 patrons. The decorating was done under the supervision of R. A. Eckels, well known theatre decorator. The spacious foyer will boast a concession counter, referred to as a 'Kandy Bar' in modern theatre jargon...."

The buiding was designed by William David, architect.

The Topsy Grade Landmark is a metal plaque mounted on a metal post which stands on the north side of Highway 66 at the east bank of the Klamath River. The sign has an inscription, highlighted in white, on both sides and bears the seal of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Colonists. The sign reads:

"This marks the road to Topsy Grade. In 1846, first crossed the Applegate Trail. The Southern Wagon Road and Topsy Road made original junction. An Indian Trail, at first; then the Soldiers traversed these roads and in 1863, the Pony Express Trail was used to carry messages from Fort Klamath to nearest telegraph line at Henley, California."

This awkwardly worded landmark is slightly misleading in suggesting that the Pony Express operated in this area. Rather the intent of the marker is more appropriately that messages from Fort Klamath were carried by horse riders to Henley, California.

In March, 1905, telephone service was established between Klamath Falls and Fort Klamath, Oregon. The original Fort Klamath Telephone Office stood about fifty feet west of this structure, the second building used as an exchange in the town. Louis Hessig and H. F. Murdoch incorporated the Klamath Telephone and Telegraph Company in 1904. The firm utilized parts of the old government line to Fort Klamath. This telegraph line had first been established in 1881 and 1882 and connected Ashland and Fort Klamath. These men sold out to the West Coast Telephone Company in July, 1928.



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Brandon house, whose early history is not well known, has been moved several times. At one time this structure stood at the southwest corner of Main and Front streets. It is now located at 203 Monroe in Merrill. This one and one-half story, wood frame house has a "T" shape. The building has a gable roof and is now covered on the exterior with wide siding. The building has one-over-one, double hung sash windows. The house is constructed with hand-forged, square-headed nails.

Donald Ratliffe believes that this house is one of the oldest in Merrill, Oregon. Don Ratliffe's family settled near Merrill in the late nineteenth century. John Ratliffe owned a butcher shop in this town. Under the wallpaper in an upstairs bedroom the Ratliffes have found flour sacks which are printed with the inscription: "Anchor Roller Mills." Frank S. and G. W. Brandon owned these mills, or so it is believed. Frank S. Brandon, who once worked for the Martin Brothers as a miller, later owned his own grist mill. On May 24, 1901 he was appointed postmaster of Merrill. Mrs. John Ratliffe was an early hotel keeper in Merrill. Donald Ratliffe is a potato broker.



The stained glass windows were brought from the Sacrament Catholic Church in Ontario, Oregon. Father Thomas Scanlon serves this congregation in 1976.

Directed by Eulona Chapter. Daughters of the American Revolution in memory of George Nurse June 4, 1820-November 26, 1895 Founder and benefactor of Linkville (Klamath Falls). Rafted lumber down Upper Klamath Lake and built first buildings on this site 1867. Was Linkville's first hotel keeper, postmaster, and livery stable operator. Gave building lots to people who would build. Donated first school site Feb. 26, 1878. Donated courthouse block and the Linkville Cemetery. Mrs. Dick Lane Owens, Regent, Klamath Falls, Oregon. Mrs. Paul Deller, Historian, April, 1966."




Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Modoc Indian Cemetery at the site of old Fort Klamath is located 200 feet north of the Fort Klamath Log Cabin Museum at Fort Klamath, Oregon. Markers are located in this burial plot for four Modoc Indians who were hanged at this fort on October 3, 1873 by the United States Army. Those buried here are the following:

- Captain Jack, leader of the Modoc Indians
- Boston Charley
- Black Jim
- Schonchin John

A chain encloses the site and hangs from iron posts. An account of what occurred is printed in a display in the nearby Fort Klamath Museum. It states: "On Nov. 28, 1872, pressured by settlers, Major Green and the troops of Fort Klamath attempted to arrest the Modoc leaders at Lost River and force the Modocs to the reservation. The talk became gunfire and the Modocs fled as the troops burned their village. The war had begun. These Modocs who attacked the Peace Commissioners were placed on trial at Ft. Klamath and convicted of murder. On Oct. 3, 1873 Boston Charley, Black Jim, Schonochin John, and Captain Jack were hanged. The surviving



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The George W. Loosley house is a one and one-half story, wood frame building with a gable roof. The building stands on the Loosley Ranch, now owned by Glenn Mathias of Hollister, California, in the Wood River Valley near Chiloquin, Oregon. The building has shiplap siding, a porch on the northwest corner, and has one-over-one, double hung sash windows. The window sashes have a decorative entablature. The building has two brick chimneys. A screened porch is located on the northeast corner of the building. A 9 x 15 feet smokehouse stands at the northeast corner of the building. A storage building is located to the east of the house. See file sheet for the barn. The building is in excellent condition.

This house was built by George W. Loosley who was born August 16, 1852, at Champoeg, Oregon Territory. Loosley was the son of John Loosley who was born in 1824 in Oxford, England. Loosley emigrated to the U.S. and came overland to California in 1852. He married Lucy Walling, the daughter of Jerome Walling of Amity, in the early 1850's and worked for some twenty years as a miller in the Willamette Valley. In 1871 the Loosley family moved to Fort Klamath and settled in the Wood River Valley. George W. Loosley married in 1880 to Emma Anderson who was born in 1858 in Brownsville, Oregon. In 1882 he built the General Howard, the first steamboat on Upper Klamath Lake. In 1895 he established the first creamery in Fort Klamath. By 1912 Loosley owned 1,300 acres in the Wood River Valley. His father died in 1900 and his mother died in 1912. George and Emma Loosley had four children.



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The George W. Loosley Barn is a tall, wood frame building with virtually the same styling as the Raymond Loosley Barn which also stands in the Wood River Valley near Chiloquin, Oregon. The building has a steep, gable roof covered with corrugated sheet metal. The exterior is vertical board and batten. The barn measures approximately 40 x 80 feet. Its windows three panes above three. The building's large double doors are located in the west elevation. The stanchions have been removed. The barn is in good condition.

This barn was erected in the 1890's by George W. Loosley. Loosley's brother, Fred, built the barn long known as the Raymond Loosley Barn also in the Wood River Valley. George W. Loosley was born August 16, 1856, at Champoeg. He was the son of John Loosley (b. Feb. 8, 1824 in Oxford, England) and Lucy Walling (born Jan. 22, 1834, in Iowa). His father came overland to California in 1852; his mother came to Oregon with her father, Jerome Walling, in 1847. The Loosley family moved to the Wood River Valley in 1871 when John Loosley, a miller, took a position at the nearby Klamath Agency. In 1882 George W. Loosley built the first steamboat, General Howard, on upper Klamath Lake. In 1895 he established the first creamery at Fort Klamath. By 1912 he owned 1,300 acres in the Wood River Valley.



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Masonic Hall, originally a Presbyterian Church, is a one story, wood frame building with gable roof which stands at Third and Railroad in Malin, Oregon. The building has open eaves with brackets on the gable ends. The original exterior was shiplap which is now covered with asbestos shakes. The original one-over-one, double hung sash windows have been replaced by glass brick in the south elevation. The entry doors are now enclosed by an enclosed porch.

This structure stands at the northeast corner of Third and Railroad and was built as a Presbyterian Church and Community Hall. Later the building was purchased by the Malin School District and used as a gymnasium. In 1952 it was purchased by Louis Kalina who sold it to the Masonic Lodge. Near this structure is a memorial flagpole and the Emma Mary (Kalina) Wilde Landmark (see file sheet).



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Walter Adams Store, known as the Pioneer Grocery Store, is a two story, wood frame building with gable roof which stands on South Main Street in Malin, Oregon. The building has shiplap exterior siding and has one-over-one, double hung sash windows on its second story. All of the windows on the first floor have been replaced by single pane casement windows. The first floor windows were originally one-over-one, double hung sash. The building now has a false front on its front elevation; a photo taken about 1910 shows that this building had no false front but did have a verandah along its front elevation. An addition has been attached on the south elevation. The front elevation is on the west side.

Opinion differs in Malin whether or not this structure is, indeed, Walter Adams' store moved to a new location. If it is the original building, then the false front has been added and the windows altered. This building presently houses a tavern on its first floor. The second story and the addition are vacant.

W.W. S. Adams erected the first store and house in Malin. Adams was born March 16, 1862, in Redwood City, California. He was a son of George and Sarah Ellen Adams. On July 1, 1910 he came to Malin to join his brother, J. Frank Adams, and erected this store.

For the past 51 years Vaclav Kalina has operated the Malin Broadway Hall. Kalina opened his first hall in 1924 and erected a wood frame building which had its first performance on January 25, 1925. In 1930 he erected the present building which was equipped to project sound motion pictures. Kalina is a son of Alois Kalina, a pioneer Bohemian settler and businessman in Malin, Oregon. Many performers have used this hall. They include Lawrence Welk, the Dorsey Brothers, Stan Freberg, and Jack Teagarden.





Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Lost River Diversion Dam is located on Lost River on Reeder Road, nine miles south of the intersection of Reeder Road and Crystal Springs Road. The dam is about five miles southeast of Klamath Falls, Oregon. This concrete dam is used to divert water from Lost River to the Klamath River to keep lands in the Tule Lake region from flooding. The dam was originally built to drain the Tule Lake Basin.

Major work on water and irrigation commenced in the lower Lost River Valley in 1882. The Van Brimmer brothers began in that year to build a canal from White Lake to their lands south of Lost River. Their ditch or canal was completed in 1886. In 1886 J. Frank Adams began construction of the Adams Ditch which branched from the Van Brimmer Canal. From this initial labor several other irrigation systems were developed. For a history of some of that labor see Devere Helfrich's "Before Merrill" and "The Adams Dredge" in Klamath Echoes, 1969.





Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Oscar Green Labaree house is a one and one-half story, wood frame structure which stands on the west side of Sycan Marsh Road about one mile north of Highway 140 four miles west of Bly, Oregon. This building has a gable roof with a longer pitch on the north (rear) elevation than on the south (front) elevation. The front elevation has five dormers with pediments on the upper half story. A porch is located on the first floor. The exterior of the house is covered with shingles. The building has short eave returns on the gable ends. The building is deserted; its windows are missing. It is in poor condition and has not been occupied for many years.

This house was erected about 1915 by Oscar Green Labaree who had made a considerable fortune in Alaska. Coming to the Sprague River region between Beatty and Bly, Labaree, who married a dance hall girl, lived on this ranch for a number of years. Labaree died during World War I. Betty Creswell, Box 66, Clayton, California, has written a genealogy of the Labaree family. Mrs. Creswell is a granddaughter of Labaree.







Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Klamath Falls Armory is a two story, brick building which stands at the corner of Spring and Main streets in Klamath Falls. This building exhibits elements of the Art Deco Style, especially in the decorative metal sections located between the first and second stories between the window bays (see close-up photo). The structure has a main entrance on its south (front) elevation; the entry has been altered and now contains a large mural. The windows are four-over-four double hung sash. The structure has a large vault roof. Mounted between the first and second stories near the entries are partial figures of soldiers in World War I period uniforms and helmets (see photo).

Long used as an armory, this building is now the home of the Klamath County Museum. Commencing in 1940 the armory was regularly used by William R. "Baldy" Evans for dances and musical programs. An appearance by Bob Mills in 1945, for example, attracted 2,719 paid admissions.

The Elk's Temple is a two story, brick building which stands at the northeast corner of north Third and Main in Klamath Falls. This red brick structure has a truncated hip roof and is in the Colonial Revival Style. The building has a tetrastyle portico on its south (front) elevation and has another formal entry on its west elevation with two story high pilasters. The entries have broken pediments for their heads. This building is presently in 1976 the Klamath County Courthouse Annex.

The Elks organized in January, 1909, in Klamath Falls and on April 17, 1915 laid the cornerstone for this building. The structure was completed in December of the same year. An addition was made to the building in 1952 and in 1967 it was abandoned for a new quarters.



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Klamath Falls City Library stands at the southeast corner of south Fifth and Klamath streets in Klamath Falls. This brick building has an "L" shape with its main entry in the junction of the two wings. The building is in the Colonial Revival Style and has an entry flanked by pilasters with a stone railing at the roof level. The windows are twelve-beside-twelve casement type. The building has a full basement and concrete foundation. The exterior is an orange-buff colored brick.

This building was erected in 1926 by the City of Klamath Falls. The mayor was Fred R. Goodard and the Library Board included: Lyle W. Kimball, Alice Z. Goeller, Mary K. Worden, J. G. Bermont, and E. M. Bubb. A beautiful Carnegie Library, constructed in the Mission Style, had been built at the edge of the city in 1913 near the controversial Hot Springs Courthouse. The Carnegie Foundation provided \$20,000 toward its construction. Devere Helfrich noted in 1967: "...the Carnegie library, still so far from the center of population that the office of librarian was little more than nominal, books being circulated only by requisition from the City Library or the school libraries of the county," indicated, perhaps, that the city would not use this library or its adjacent courthouse. In any event a second building, this structure, was constructed in 1926 near the center of the town's business district.



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Klamath County Courthouse #1 is a three story, wood frame building with gable roof which stands on the northeast corner of south Fourth and Walnut streets in Klamath Falls, Oregon. This building, which exhibits elements of the Classical Revival Style, has boxed eaves and, at present, has three-over-one, double hung sash windows. The original fenestration was six-over-six, double hung sash. The exterior, now covered with asbestos shakes, was clapboard. The building was originally a two story structure; a new floor has been added since the conversion of the building into an apartment house. The building has a round window above the center entry in the front elevation (the window is in the attic).

In the fall of 1887 work commenced on new purchased for a courthouse for Klamath County. Linville (Klamath Falls) had served as county seat of Lake County from 1874 to 1876 when an election fixed the seat in Lakeview. In 1882 the creation of Klamath County again made Klamath Falls a county seat. W. S. Moore & Company bid \$3,500 to erect the new building; the structure was occupied on July 2, 1888. The building, which originally stood on the northeast corner of the present courthouse site in Klamath Falls, was later moved.



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Raymond Loosley house is a one and one-half story log building which stands on the Loosley Century Farm in the Wood River Valley near Chiloquin, Oregon. This building, which has a gable roof with a dormer on its west elevation, is constructed of peeled, pine logs which were cut on this ranch. The logs are chinked. The windows are casement type and contain six panes each. The building has two, brick chimneys. The gable ends are covered on the exterior with shiplap.

Maxine Loosley Kizer, the present owner, is the last of her family to own land in the Wood River Valley. Her great grandparents, John and Lucy (Walling) Loosley came to this area in 1871 when John Loosley was employed as a miller at Klamath Indian Agency. Loosley was born in Oxford, England, February 8, 1824. He emigrated to California in 1852 and later worked for many years as a miller in the Willamette Valley. He married Lucy Walling, the daughter of Jerome Walling of Amity, Oregon. John Loosley constructed the first house in Wood River Valley not associated with Fort Klamath. Fred Loosley was one of eleven children born to John and Lucy Loosley. Raymond Loosley, a son of Fred Loosley, erected this house in 1926. Raymond Loosley died in 1957. His wife, Willeska, resides in Klamath Falls. The Kizers run about 250 head of cattle on this ranch.



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

This wood frame barn has a very steep gable roof which is covered with corrugated sheet metal. The exterior is vertical board and batten. The structure has a large hay loft and stanchions for livestock. The building has an open doorway in the east elevation. A "separator house" stands on the south elevation. The structure is framed with pine logs and beams. Double doors are located at the southwest corner of the building. The structure is in poor condition.

This barn, which stands near Loosley Road south of Fort Klamath, was erected by Fred Loosley, grandfather of Mrs. Hollis Kizer--present owner. The barn was long owned and used by her father, Raymond Loosley. Fred Loosley, as a boy of ten, carried messages from the U.S. Army at Fort Klamath to the field commanders during the Modoc Indian War. Fred and George Loosley, a brother, constructed a flat-bottom sternwheel steamboat which they hoped to use on Wood River. A Congressional appropriation for their project never was approved. In 1897 Fred, John, and George Loosley constructed an irrigation ditch to irrigate their lands. The father of these men was John Loosley who was born February 8, 1824, in Oxford, England. John Loosley emigrated to California in 1852, was a pioneer miller in Oregon, married the daughter of Jerome Walling of Amity, and in 1871 settled near Klamath Agency. John Loosley died in 1900; his wife, Lucy Walling, died in 1912. She had emigrated to Oregon in 1847.



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Alois Kalina Building is a two story structure of dressed stone which faces east on Broadway in Maline, Oregon. The building measures 75 x 180 feet. The windows on the second story are one-over-one, double hung sash set in semi-elliptical bays. A small shelf projects on the front elevation at the roof level. The building has three brick chimneys. The south wing of the building (50 x 130 feet) has a metal awning across its front elevation. Brick additions have been attached to the rear elevation of this structure.

This building was erected by Louie and John Kandra, Bohemian stone masons, for Alois Kalina. In 1909 sixty-six Bohemian men emigrated to Malin to examine the desert land which they had purchased sight un-seen. The Lakeside Land Company had offered them 6,500 acres at \$35 an acre with one-fifth down and the remainder at eight per cent interest. Additional charges were made for irrigation and drainage. The men had purchased the land because of ads in the Hospodar, a Bohemian newspaper published in Omaha, Nebraska. Alois Kalina, one of these emigrants, erected his first store in 1911-12 across the street from this present building. That structure has been razed. His family continues to operate this business.

Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Malin Post Office is a rectangular, wood frame building of one and one-half stories which stands on the north side of Railroad Street in Malin, Oregon. The building, set on a stone foundation, has shiplap siding and a gable roof. A verandah extends across the front elevation. The windows are one-over-one, double hung sash; the window on the second story is two-over-two, double hung sash. The original building, before conversion to a residence, measured 14 x 20 feet. The structure has a 14 by 20 feet addition. The building has a small cellar.

This building once served as the Malin Post Office. The first post office was housed in the Walter S. Adams store. Adams, a brother of J. Frank Adams--developer of desert lands in this area--became postmaster on August 11, 1910. On November 17, 1913, Mary Halousek became the postmistress in this small building at 2625 Railroad. Charlotte I. Evans became postmistress on July 8, 1916, with the post office at the same location. Miss Evans married and as Charlotte I. Tower was reappointed postmistress on June 25, 1917. On July 16, 1918 Mike Dobry became postmaster and the post office moved to the Dobry Building on the west side of Main Street. The Irwins purchased this structure in 1942.



The I.O.O.F. Lodge Hall stands at the southwest corner of south Fifth and Main streets in Klamath Falls, Oregon. This three story, brick building has a rectangular shape and faces north on Main Street. The building has one-over-one, double hung sash windows with transom panes set on arch bays on the third story and has one-over-one, double hung sash windows in its second story. The first floor elevation has been altered in recent years and is presently occupied by Jick Reeder's Store.

R.E. Wattenburg received the contract to erect this building in July, 1910. The cost of the structure was to be \$41,520. On July 16, 1910, the old Masonic Temple which occupied this site was moved to the rear of the block so that this building could be built. Work began on the I.O.O.F. Hall on July 27, 1910 and was completed in the spring of 1911.

In 1911 this building housed Houston's Temple Theatre on its first floor. This was an early movie theatre in Klamath Falls.



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Fred Goeller house is a two and one-half story, wood frame dwelling which stands on the west side of south Riverside Street in Klamath Falls, Oregon. This dwelling has a hip roof with dormers and a major gable on its east (front) elevation. The building is set on a brick foundation; many of the piers under the front verandah are enclosed with wood lattice. A verandah extends across the front elevation and has a balcony above with a small, five-sided balcony on the upper half story; there are thus three levels of front porches. The verandah and balconies are decorated with turned spindles and balls. The building's exterior is shiplap with imbricated shingling on the gable ends. The windows are one-over-one, double hung sash. The main entry has stained, leaded glass sidelights and transom.

Wallace Day Huntington has referred to this house as having "the maximum conceivable decoration." He concluded that "the lightness of the web-like screens turn the house into a weightless fantasy--a Moorish confection."

Fred Goeller and his wife came to Klamath Falls in 1891 and Goeller purchased a half interest in a planing mill. The mill also manufactured sash, door, and furniture lines. Goeller constructed this house in 1905 and did most of the carpenter work.



The O. F. Glick Homestead buildings are four, wood frame structures which stand in a meadow facing the Malin Highway. The Glick house is a "T"-shaped, one and one-half story, wood frame structure with a shingled, gable roof. The building has one-over-one, double hung sash windows and shiplap siding. The outbuildings are covered with shiplap and narrow, clapboard siding. These structures are abandoned and in poor condition.

O. F. Glick of Ashland, Oregon, was one of the successful applicants who in 1916 filed for some 5,900 acres of former lake bed of Tule Lake. This property, 3,250 acres of private land and 2,700 of public land, were opened by drawing to settlement in April, 1917. Of 180 names submitted, thirty-five were selected. O. F. Glick was one of the thirty-five and moved to this property and erected these buildings.

The Daniel Colwell house is a square, two story, wood frame building with a hip roof which stands on East Front Street in Merrill, Oregon. The building has a verandah on its front elevation and has one-over-one, double hung sash windows. A dormer with window is located in the attic on the front elevation. A large fireplace, made of local stone, is located on the side elevation. The building has a recessed porch on both stories on the east elevation. Some of the windows have leaded glass sections. The house has been altered in its interior.

Daniel Colwell was born in County Tyrone, Ireland, August 12, 1831. At the age of 18 he emigrated to the United States and in 1852 came overland to Oregon. In 1872 Colwell settled in Klamath County as a partner in a cattle ranch with W. S. Bybee of Jackson County. In 1881 Colwell settled near Merrill. In 1872 he married Mary Duggan who was born in Ireland. His son, John Colwell, was born October 11, 1873. This house may possibly have been that of John Colwell, but Daniel Colwell was living in 1904 so it may have been his retirement home. John R. Ratliffe, age 86 in 1976, helped haul rock for this fireplace in this house at age 12.

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

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



The Post was abandoned by the United States Army in 1890. Now preserved as a Klamath County Park for all people. Dedicated August 1973."

The landmark stands about 25 feet east of the Fort Klamath Log Cabin Museum.



The Fort Klamath Landmark is a bronze plaque mounted on a rubble stone base which stands on the west side of Highway 62 about one-fourth mile north of Fort Klamath, Oregon. The landmark is just south of the junction of highways 62 and 232. The plaque reads:

"Site of Fort Klamath Established 1863 Abandoned 1889 Soldiers were stationed here for protection of settlers and travelers in early days. Placed by Eulalona Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, Klamath Falls, Oregon."

William T. Shive was born in Metcalf County, Kentucky, on December 25, 1858. He was a son of George W. and Arminta E. (Branstetter) Shive. In 1882 Shive moved to Missouri and in 1885 to Oregon. In 1887 he came to Klamath County and in 1895 established a general merchandise store in Fort Klamath. In 1900 he opened a hotel in Fort Klamath and also operated a feed and stock ranch; the feed he sold in a store in Fort Klamath. Shive served for five years as mayor of Fort Klamath.

Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Fort Klamath Hotel is a two story, wood frame building with a hip roof that faces Highway #62 in Fort Klamath, Oregon. This building is constructed of old lumber salvaged from Fort Klamath which was abandoned in 1890. The exterior is narrow, clapboard siding. A verandah extends along the front elevation and has a partial extension over it from the second story on one end. The windows are one-over-one, double hung sash. The roof has decorative brackets and boxed eaves. The building is in poor conditon and was vacant in August, 1976.

This building was originally constructed as a general store by a Mr. Shive who salvaged lumber from nearby Fort Klamath. Shive and a store and living quarters in this building and occasionally took in overnight guests. Shive was also postmaster in Fort Klamath in 1896. C.E. Hoyt and J.B.C. Taylor purchased the building for \$700 in 1906. They changed the structure's name to the Hoyt Hotel and in 1907 altered the building. In 1965 the structure had seventeen guest rooms and baths on the second floor. The first floor had a dining room, lunch counter, soda fountain, and kitchen.

Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

This one story, wood frame building with a gable roof stands about 200 feet east of Crater Lake Highway (#62) in Fort Klamath, Oregon. This building has a gable roof which is covered with corrugated sheet metal. An open belfry with a steep, hip roof is located atop the roof gable near the front elevation. The building has a small, enclosed front porch with gable roof. The building has three lancet window bays in its side elevations. The building measures 28 x 40 feet and has a vestry of 12 x 14 feet in the rear. The foundation is of stone. The windows in the lancet bays are one-over-one, double hung sash. The weathervane on the belfry was knocked off a few years ago by a low-flying airplane.

This church was the first erected in Fort Klamath. The building is on a county road near the main highway. The bell in the belfry was the gift of Senator Weed for whom the town of Weed, California, was named. The first pastor of this congregation was Rev. J. Worrell who was born in Ireland. Evening services were conducted with gas lantern lighting until power was put in in 1927. Several alterations have been made over the years. The pews are hand made of pine.

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



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Fort Klamath City Jail is a small, three-room, wood building constructed of horizontal two-by-fours, nailed together with large spikes. This structure stands near Highway #62 South in Fort Klamath, Oregon. The exterior of this building was originally covered with shiplap. The windows were small and made of four panes of glass. Originally these windows were covered with iron bars made by blacksmith Dolphin Wimer and his son Harold Wimer. The gable roof is covered with shingles. The shiplap on the south elevation has fallen off, revealing the underlying two-by-fours. A small out-house is located on the west side of this building.

This city jail was moved from its original location in the center of Fort Klamath to its present location near the Crater Lake Highway in the 1920's by John and Joe Hessig. At one time a race track, ballpark, and rodeo grounds (on the present Joe McAuliff Ranch) drew crowds to this town. Frequent fights and brawls necessitated the construction of the jail. The town also had three saloons and the jail was used for drunken people in the community. In 1926 the law enforcement agency formed the Wood River Precinct and consolidated responsibilities over Chiloquin, Klamath Agency, and Fort Klamath. Since that date this jail has not been in use.

Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The First Methodist-Episcopal Church is a stucco building with gable roof which stands at the southwest corner of North Tenth and High in Klamath Falls, Oregon. The building has open eaves and buttresses on the north and south elevations of its sanctuary. The window bays contain stained, leaded glass. An educational-office wing is attached on the south elevation and has a two story bell tower with louvers in the belfry. The building is in good condition.

The cornerstone for this structure has the dates 1899-1907, 1927. This fellowship was founded in the early 1890's when T. L. Jones of Grants Pass secured a hall and began preaching in Linkville. In 1893 Rev. J. C. Hocket came to the town to serve this parish. The fellowship erected a frame building at this location in 1907-08, having had a previous structure elsewhere in the city.



The First National Bank of Klamath Falls is a three story building which stands at the northeast corner of Sixth and Main streets. The building a white, terra cotta exterior with scences in the Art Deco Style of the 1930's above the two story window bays on the west and south elevations. The structure has six-beside-six casement windows in its third story.

This building was erected for use as a bank and bears the words "First National Bank" above its main entrance on the south elevation.

Between 1900 and 1910 four banks were established in Klamath Falls. The Klamath County Bank was formed in 1900, the First National Bank in 1903, and the American Bank and Trust Co. and the First Trust and Savings Bank were established shortly thereafter. The First National Bank was first located in the A.O.U.W. Building on Main Street (see file sheet). During 1921 this bank merged with the Klamath State Bank and late in that year moved to the former Klamath State Bank Building. Probably about 1922 the bank was moved to the former American National Bank Building and then in 1930 moved to this building.

The Esquire Theatre is a large, concrete building which faces east on North Seventh Street in Klamath Falls, Oregon. The building has a tall tower which is the highest structure in the business section of the city. The Herald and News carried this article on November 29, 1940:

"Completed in record time, the colorful new Esquire Theatre, Klamath Falls' towering new \$150,000 motion picture palace, is scheduled to open tonight with a special inaugural program, playing to an estimated 3,000 invited guests... Known as a stadium-type house, the Esquire Theatre is built to seat 1,000, with burgundy and blue the predominating interior color scheme. Each side wall of the auditorium contains three beautiful murals depicting the winning of the west. Done in flourescent paint, they will be lighted by blacklight projectors concealed in the ceiling. Miguel Santocono, noted decorator in charge of decorating the new theatre, has worked on the murals for three months."

The building has commercial rentals on Pine and Seventh streets.



The Vaclav and Agnes Drazil house is a rectangular, wood frame structure with a gable roof which stands on a ranch near Malin, Oregon. The windows are two-over-two, double hung sash. The exterior is narrow, clapboard siding. The structure measures approximately 14 x 26 feet. The building has its original brick chimney. The interior is made of 1 x 10 inch boards. The ceiling has narrow tongue-and-groove boards. A small door leads to the loft.

Vaclav Drazil purchased forty acres of desert from J. Frank Adams in 1909. He brought his wife, Agnes, and his children to this property in 1912 and erected this house. The Drazils were born at Velky Tehor, Czechslovakia. Agnes Drazil worked with her husband to clear the fields of sagebrush with pick and shovel. She and the nine Drazil children helped plant and harvest crops on this farm. For many years Agnes Drazil canned 1,000 quarts of fruit and vegetables each year on her wood stove in this building. Vaclav Drazil died in 1964. The Drazils erected a new house in 1927. Mrs. Agnes Drazil, age 88, lives in this newer structure.



The Morris Sewald house is a large, one and one-half story stone building with a hipped gable roof. The structure has a major dormer on one side elevation and has a tile roof. 



The D Irrigation Canal is now part of the Ankeny Canal. The Ankeny Canal had its origins in the canal building of William Steele which commenced in 1884. According to Devere Helfrich, writing in Klamath Echoes in 1969:

"Steele began work in '84. The winter was a very mild one, and only half a day's work was lost because of snow. The ditch was extended for fifteen miles into the Klamath valley. Farmers who believed they were sure to be ruined by water moved out of the valley into the foothills. The work cost Steele close to \$20,000, a fortune in those days." (p. 4)

The Steele-Ankeny-D Canal system drains Klamath Lake and provides water for thousands of acres in the Klamath Basin.



The Bonanza Community Church is a rectangular, wood frame building with a gable roof that stands on a street parallel to main street. The south (front) elevation of this structure has an enclosed entry porch with double doors with transom lights. A square bell tower rises on the front elevation in its center and is surmounted by an open belfry which has a hip roof with a center cone of low height. The church has four bays of lancet windows, each being four-over-four, double hung sash. The building has additions on its north and west elevations. The exterior of the structure is shiplap.

Bonanza was founded in 1873 by J. P. Roberts. The town was platted in 1878 by Benjamin Price. Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Nichols gave the lot for this church on September 3, 1902. Initially this was a Methodist Episcopal Church. In 1947 the Nazarenes purchased the building and later it was owned by the Assembly of God.



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Williamson River Methodist Mission Church is a "t"-shape, wood frame building with a gable roof which stands near Highway 140 in Beatty, Oregon. This building has open eaves. The west elevation is now covered with plywood on the exterior. The ell on the east elevation has vertical, shiplap siding. The windows are one-over-one, double hung sash. The south elevation has a cross mounted on its exterior. The double entry doors are located at the southeast corner of the building.

This church was founded in 1876. This building dates from 1900. At the time of the 1900 treaty with the Klamath Indians many of the signers were leaders in this congregation. These included Monchnkasgitk, Long John, Chief Agency George, Lilo, Henry Blow, Tom Chocktoot, Jack Palmer (who donated land for the building), and others. Rev. Jesse Kirk, Sr., was the first ordained minister of the mission. Rev. Gerald McCray, Sr., presently serves this congregation.



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Balsiger Motor Company Building stands at the intersection of Main and Esplanade in Klamath Falls, Oregon. This structure is an excellent example of the Egyptian Revival Style. This concrete building, which has a triangle shape, is a one story building. The original windows have been replaced by aluminum frame sections, but the basic appearance of the building remains unchanged. The front of the building is at the apex of the triangle and is dominated by a two story tower that rises like the entry to a temple. The symbol of the sun and what appears to be a Phoenix are centered above the word "Ford" above the entry. Iron lanterns are suspended from the second story of this entry tower. Flanking either side of the door are bas-reliefs profiles of a human figure; these are repeated at other entries along the sides of this building.

This structure was erected in 1923. It was placed on the site of the White Pelican Hotel, a building called "the most magnificent" ever erected in Klamath Falls. Built in 1888, the White Pelican burned in October, 1926. The Balsiger Motor Company began selling Ford products in 1923.





Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Lindsay Applegate Landmark is a metal plaque mounted on a metal post which stands on the north side of the Malin City Park. The marker has two sides and bears the symbol of the organization which erected it. The plaque reads:

"In memory Honorable Lindsay Applegate son of a Revolutionary soldier with Colonial ancestry, born in Kentucky, September 13, 1808. Explorer, soldier, trailblazer. Came to the Oregon Country 1843. An Oregon Patriot, served in provisional territorial and state government. In 1846 blazed the 'South Road' or Applegate Trail which passed through this area. He died in Klamath County, November 20, 1892. Mrs. Dick Henzel Klamath Chapter Regent 1964-66 Erected by Klamath Chapter, Oregon State Society of the National Society of Daughters of the American Colonists. Erected Sept. 13, 1965."

From 1864-69 Applegate was special Indian agent at Fort Klamath. He had six sons prominent in Oregon affairs.



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The J. Frank Adams landmark is a bronze plaque mounted on a rubble stone base which stands on the east side of the Malin City Park. The plaque reads:

"Dedicated to the memory of J. Frank Adams 1855-1929 'Master of Horses and Men Conqueror of Deserts Protector of the Poor, and Pardonable Egotist,' Klamath County Historical Society 1972."

J. Frank Adams sold land at Malin to Bohemian settlers in 1909-10. He loaned these people horses and cattle to being their reclamation of desert lands. His brother Walter Adams opened the first general store in Malin. In 1886 Adams with the help of other settlers completed a small canal from Lost River to Adams Point, a distance of six miles. He agreed with Van Brimmer Brothers to furnish 5,000 inches of water through their system to the west bank of Lost River from which point he proposed to carry the water across the river in a wood flume. The canal was enlarged and extended so that by 1904 it reached twenty-two miles. Adams' 'Little Known Ditch Company' led to his purchase of 6,500 acres of land which he later sold to Bohemian immigrants.



Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The A.O.U.W. Hall-George Baldwin Hardware Company building stands on the north side of Main Street near the east bank of Link River. The site is at the northeast corner of Main and Payne Alley in Klamath Falls, Oregon. The building is presently a two story structure with the first floor made of roughly dressed stone and the second story made of wood frame construction. The exterior of the second story is now asbestos shingles or shakes. Originally this building had a steep gable roof with two front dormers. The building retains some of its original one-over-one windows.

K. D. Jones, a contractor, laid the foundation for this building in July, 1899. Devere Helfrich has written: That was the beginning of the western half of the building, still standing at the northeastern corner of the intersection of Payne Alley and Main Streets, or directly west of the present day Baldwin Hotel. It was to be 40 x 70 feet, two stories high, the first of stone, the second of wood, which was to be occupied by the A.O.U.W. Lodge. The building was, for many years, known as the 'A.O.U.W. Building.' An annex was constructed on the east side of the building in late 1901 or early 1902. In 1904 the First National Bank occupied part of this building.

The A.O.U.W. Hall in Antelope, Oregon, is possibly the only other such structure in Oregon.
