




## Collier Management Unit Park Ranger 2 Position FAQ's



### *What is the Collier Management Unit staff like?*

**Todd Honeywell:** Todd is the park manager at Collier Management Unit. He came to us in January 2014 from Wallowa Lake Management Unit. Todd has been with OPRD since 2007, prior to coming over to parks, Todd worked for ODOT for 7 years.

**John Williams:** John is the most senior park ranger on staff and has been at the Collier Management Unit since 1993. He is currently our campground/ maintenance ranger.

**Lisa Dykstra:** Lisa was hired as Office Coordinator at Collier Management Unit in 2011. After leaving Eugene and her position at the University of Oregon, she was an Executive Assistant at Oregon Institute of Technology before finding her way to parks.

**Randi Crane:** Randi recently came from Sumpter Valley Dredge and is a Park Ranger 3 that leads unit efforts on park projects, interpretation, and the Collier Logging Museum.

**Tim Harris:** Tim is our seasonal park ranger that maintains Goose Lake State Park, Chandler and Booth Waysides. He has been with OPRD since 2010.

We have 6 seasonal PRA positions, most of whom returned for the 2013 season. Overall, we are a young, enthusiastic crew, ready to roll up our sleeves and get to work.



### ***What properties are included in Collier Management Unit?***

- The OC&E Woods Line State Trail offers over 100 miles of rails to trails with various terrain extending out to the Sycan Marsh.
- Collier State Park is a 68 site campground and popular rest area between Bend and Klamath Falls. The unit office sits here next to the meandering Spring Creek and Williamson River and is nestled within the surrounding mountains.
- There are another additional 48 camp sites at Goose Lake State Recreation Area near Lakeview. Booth and Chandler Waysides are maintained out of the Goose Lake State Recreation Area.
- Jackson F. Kimball State Recreation area offers 10 primitive sites at the head of the Wood River.

Klamath County is the Home of Crater Lake National Park. Considered high desert, the region basks in an average of **300 days of sunshine per year**. Klamath and Lake Counties have it all, from the rugged and rural life of Lakeview and surrounding areas to the modern day living with all the new amenities of the Klamath Basin.
