Establishes procedures and criteria for the Oregon Main Street Revitalization Grant program

Adoption of rules governing the Oregon Main Street Revitalization Grant Program

Need for the Rule(s):

The 2015 session of the Oregon legislature passed a bill to create the Oregon Main Street Revitalization Grant Program. These rules will provide the framework for that program.

Documents Relied Upon, and where they are available:

OPRD grant program procedures for other heritage grants which are available from the Heritage Division

Fiscal and Economic Impact:

These rules will create a process for applicants to apply for the new grant program. The major cost for the groups that apply and state agencies will be staff time. The cost should be minimal and will not affect the general public. There is an economic benefit to recipients of the grants both in hard dollars to support projects and in increased business due to the redevelopment and preservation of historic main streets.

Statement of Cost of Compliance:

1. Impact on state agencies, units of local government and the public (ORS 183.335(2)(b)(E)):

The Department of Parks and Recreation will require staff resources to administer the grant. Any other agencies that participate in the grant selection process would experience a minimum impact on staff time. The public should not be affected.

2. Cost of compliance effect on small business (ORS 183.336):

a. Estimate the number of small business and types of businesses and industries with small businesses subject to the rule:

There is no cost of compliance on small businesses as Main Street organizations (the intended grant recipients) are not businesses.

b. Projected reporting, recordkeeping and other administrative activities required for compliance, including costs of professional services:

Some of the organizations involved in the Oregon Main Street Program already maintain records for their participation. Additional administrative costs for grant recipients are estimated at around 5% of the grant award which is not thought to be burdensome.

c. Equipment, supplies, labor and increased administration required for compliance:

None required for compliance. Participation in the grant program is voluntary.

How were small businesses involved in the development of this rule?

Small businesses were not involved as the rules do not directly affect them.
