

Architect Firm, Not Individual, Capitol Victor

Salem, May 28.—(Salem Bureau of The Journal)—The firm of Trowbridge & Livingston, New York city architects, and not Goodhue Livingston, a member of that firm, submitted the winning design in the state capitol contest which closed here Tuesday night.

This correction to the original announcement of the winning architect was received by the capitol commission in a telegram from the New York firm Wednesday. Press dispatches based upon information released by the commission had credited Livingston individually with authorship of the winning design. Associated with the firm in the preparation of the design was Francis Keally, also of New York.

The capitol commission at its meeting here Wednesday afternoon adjourned to meet on call of the chairman upon the arrival of the New York architect, who is expected here within the next week or 10 days to look over the capitol site, secure local atmosphere in completing the plans and arrange for an Oregon architect to work with the Eastern firm in supervising construction of the new building.


The 117 designs which failed to place among the first six in the contest will be returned immediately to their owners, after which the winning design and the five runners-up will be placed on display at the chamber of commerce rooms here.

C. C. Hockley, state director for the Public Works administration, inspected the winning design Wednesday, and expressed himself as well pleased with the decision of the judges.

Services of Carl F. Gould, Seattle architect, employed as technical advisor to the capitol commission, terminated with the close of the design contest, but the commission asked Gould to hold himself in readiness for call as a consultant during the progress of the program.

The two architect members of the contest jury, Walter H. Thomas of Philadelphia and David C. Allison of Los Angeles, returned to their homes Wednesday. Each received \$250 and expenses for his services. In the case of Thomas, who flew to Oregon by airplane, this totaled \$551.25, while Allison, whose traveling expenses were much less, received \$370.90, including per diem.
